# FORD END WATERMILL **IVINGHOE, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE**

The only working watermill to survive intact in the county. The mill, recorded in 1616 but probably much older, was in use until 1963. Now restored by members of the Pitstone & Ivinghoe Museum Society, it retains all the atmosphere of a small farm mill of the late 1800s. Visitors can work the sack hoist and mill wheat on a rotary hand guern. Stoneground wholemeal flour for sale on milling days.


# A load of Tweets

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# **J H Emlyn Jones**

he truly amazing life of Emlyn Jones late of the Manor lyinghoe received a fulsome obituary in both the Times and Telegraph.

The Times: Bomb disposal officer who blew up the Nazi super gun, and was later selected for the 1953 Everest Team.

The Telegraph: Fearless mountaineer who was one of the crucial back up team of the historic conquest of Everest in 1953.

His bomb disposal exploits with the Royal Engineers reached what could be described as a high point on his successful removal of an extremely dangerous fuze, the ZuS40 from an unexploded bomb. On presenting it to the high ranking officers at the war office they took cover under their mahogany desks shouting "Get out, get out". On asking what would happen if it went off, he replied "Oh it would blow your hand off". Such was the calibre of Emlyn. For this he was awarded the M.B.E.

After D-Day he continued with the Royal Engineers clearing mines and booby traps in Normandy. He took part in the destruction of the V3 launch site. fortunately for London, never deployed, greatly upsetting General De Gaulle who wanted a hand in its destruction being on French soil. Emlyn said "somehow the message from De Gaulle managed to reach us just a bit too late" accompanied by a mischievous chuckle.

To add to his many accomplishments he was tutored by what he describes "as old lags" in the genteel art of safe-cracking and lock picking required in the search for demolition charges.

In 1952 Emlyn being a member of the Climbers Club and the Alpine Club, later becoming President of both, was selected



to form a backup team should the initial assault of Everest fail.

Sadly for Emlyn the 1953 team succeeded in no small part on account of his preliminary work. For this he received unstinting praise from the leader Sir John Hunt. Well into his nineties Emlyn continued to frequent his London club 'the Garrick club' being driven there on a regular basis by the lvinghoe based London cabbie.

In civilian life he worked as a surveyor becoming an authority on land valuation and appeals. For his work in this field he was awarded the C.B.E. The professional surveyor exams would often include questions based on his decisions. During his long service his judgements were never once reversed. For this he was justly proud.

Having a keen interest in music resulted in the formation of a 60 piece orchestra in which he was the conductor although he played the cello when at home. The orchestra was rather delightfully termed 'The Holiday Orchestra' since the participants were not always to hand necessitating a good deal of improvisation. He also formed a choir the 'lcknield 16'.

Surrounded by his family, daughter Eiluned his sons Tom and William, and his wonderful wife Louise no mean mountaineer herself, nursed Emlyn to the very end at home in the Manor where he died peacefully at the age of 98.

A true gentleman, a great man, and an example to us all.

# **BeaconLit Returns** Bigger and better


B eaconLit, the small literary festival with big ambitions, returns on Saturday June 28 with a new venue, a full-day's programme, and a dazzling array of authors.

The festival aims to raise interest in books and writing within the 'Beacon Villages' – Ivinghoe, Pitstone, Ivinghoe Aston, Slapton, Marsworth, Cheddington and other communities close to Ivinghoe Beacon in the beautiful Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. # **Dog fouling** is not acceptable!

og fouling has been spotted on a regular basis along our footpaths (especially Marsworth Road, Cheddington Road and Queen Street), on our recreation ground, along the permissive footpaths and in the open field off Westfield Road (which is not common ground as it is in private ownership and all dog fouling should be cleared). This inconsiderate behaviour from a minority of dog owners is completely unacceptable and causes particular problems on the approach to Brookmead School and Windmill Pre-School where it gets onto the wheels of pushchairs, onto children's shoes and then onto the carpets in the schools. where children then have to sit and touch the flooring with their hands.

### How serious is this?

Dog mess is not only unpleasant it is a risk to health. The biggest threat to public health from dog excrement is toxocariasis, an infection of the roundworm toxocara canis. The eggs of the parasite can be found in soil or sand contaminated with faeces and if swallowed, result in infection that lasts between six and 24 months. Symptoms include eye disorders, vague ache, dizziness, nausea, asthma and, in extremely rare cases, seizures/fits. Toxocariasis most commonly affects small children as they tend to put their hands in their mouths after crawling around.

It is an offence for dog owners to fail to clear up any dog foul left by their dogs.

Offenders can be issued with a fixed penalty notice or a fine of up to £1,000 if the case goes to court. Being unaware that your dog has fouled or not having a suitable means of clearing up after your dog is no excuse – you should carry poop scoop bags whenever you are out with your dog.



You should clean up after your dog wherever you are. Kicking dog waste into the gutters is not acceptable. Nor is kicking it under a hedge.

# Where can I dispose of my dog's waste?

There are currently 16 dog waste bins in Pitstone alone. However, you can dispose of dog waste in suitable bags in any public litter bin, of which there are 19 in Pitstone, so there are 35 opportunities for you to dispose of your waste as you walk through our village. You can also take your dog waste home and dispose of it in your green general household waste bin.

### What else can I do to help keep Pitstone clear of dog waste?

Please report all incidents of dog fouling on our footpaths, particularly between Glebe Close and Brookmead school, to the Aylesbury Vale District Council dog warden service on **01296 585605** / e-mail **envhealth@ aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk** and to PCSO Jackie Dodson on 101. AVDC can implement more frequent cleansing visits or patrols by the dog warden if they are aware of a large scale problem and Thames Valley Police has the power to enforce fines and prosecute.

If you witness someone allowing their dog to foul, please report them to both the AVDC dog warden service and PCSO J Dodson using the contact details above. Photographic evidence on your mobile phone would be very helpful in securing a prosecution.

Let's work together to prove that dog fouling in our public open spaces and on our footpaths will not be tolerated and culprits will be reported and fined.

# The **Miller's** Tale...

mentioned in the last Miller's Tale that David Lindsey, my predecessor as mill manager, had been steadily renovating our old Kell, Meats and Co, Winnowing machine (A machine used to remove contaminents from the wheat so it is ready for milling) over the winter and during the last few weeks he has been putting it all back together with my help when needed, usually for the lifting/moving of heavy parts. I had a bit of a swear when I was using an electric plane to shape a piece of wood we had replaced and a section of it split and broke off, but David managed to repair it with a little careful fettling. Once it was all back together we filled it with wheat and tested it out.

It's a really simple machine and turning a handle on the side is all that is needed to operate it, the turning motion is tranformed into a back and forth motion by gears and levers which causes the wheat to drop down through a series of mesh seives, as it drops through the seives a fan blows air through/across it blowing away any straw, grass, leaves and lighter material. As the wheat drops through the seives the mesh gets finer in each one and collects any mud, sticks and stones which fall into a seperate compartment. The last mesh seive is too fine for the wheat to pass through so it is jogged along the screeen and falls off the back edge into a compartment as clean wheat.

Well that is the theory anyway, but as the winnowing machine originally came to us with the wrong mesh seives fitted we have had to try and find out the correct size we needed by experiment, we thought we had it all worked out but during our first proper test after all the work on it we realised we needed to reduce the mesh size slightly as some of the clean wheat was falling through the final seive instead of jogging along it and falling off the back edge. If the wheat falls through this final seive it ends up in the wrong compartment with all the contaminents that the first seives removed, which defeats the work you are trying to do as the wheat which is almost finished being cleaned ends up back in with all the stuff you have just seived out!

I'm confident that we can change the seive mesh sizes and get it working 100% as it should do, and apart from having the wrong sized seives it works extremely well for a machine that is over a hundred years old. It is interesting to note that the internal mechanism in modern machines for cleaning wheat is an almost identical layout to our old winnowing machine except steel now replaces wood for the main construction, otherwise nothing has changed in the design of winnowers for hundreds of years.

We have spent the last few weeks down at the mill getting prepared for the opening season and checking everything is ready to receive visitors and to start milling again.

It can be quite hard work at times and none of us are getting any younger, so I would like to publicly thank John Wallis, Keith Russell, Nigel Thompson and David Lindsey for turning up, almost without fail, each and every Sunday and freely volunteering their time and energy to keeping the mill going for future generations to enjoy.



We're looking forward to another good open season and hope to see some of you visiting the mill on one of our open days, or milling days when our lovely stoneground wholemeal flour is available for sale.

n Saturday 13th September, sponsored cyclists, walkers and horse riders all over the country will be visiting as many beautiful churches and chapels as they can between 10am and 6pm to raise money for the repair and restoration of these lovely buildings. 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# Walks in and out of the Parish

ontinuing our series of **Walks in** and around the Villages, Sylvia Piggot has kindly shared the details of this beautiful walk to Aldbury. If you have a walk, in and out or around lvinghoe or lvinghoe Aston that you would like to share with your fellow residents please do get in touch with the Editor.

### A round trip Ivinghoe to Aldbury (approximately 3hours 7miles)

From lvinghoe church head along the B488 towards Tring, cross the Dunstable road and take the first footpath on your left through a gate.

Follow this path through another gate, go straight on through another gate, straight on up the hill you will come to a well marked crossroads (crosspath). This is the Ridgeway, go straight across on up the hill through yet another gate, across another path and straight on up the hill until you come to a track. Go right.

Follow this track through a gate past a house on your left and stay on this track (Duncombes Terrace) until you get to The Bridgewater Monument. Here you'll find the N.T. café, shop and loo and most likely an ice cream van. (Any stops not included in 3hrs).

Walk past the monument across the green stay right of the buildings ahead of you and when you get to the track turn right. There are two forks on this track go right at both on down the hill until you come to the road. Now you're in Aldbury.

At the road turn right you'll come to the village pond on your right, The Greyhound Inn also on your right. On your left the post office and shop. (Again any stops not included in 3hrs).

Take the road straight on towards Tring

Station past the church on your right and take the first footpath on your right just past the church.

Through a gate across a field, through another gate along the edge of this field, through a gate and follow the path with a big barn/farm building on your left. Go straight on through a couple of gates, straight on, cross a path and go through a gate onto Stocks Golf Course.

Go straight on across the golf course, cross the perimeter track the other side and go through a gate into the wood.

Follow this path, at the next path turn left, shortly you hit the Ridgeway path turn right onto the Ridgeway and go up the steps.

Follow the Ridgeway right through the woods through a gate and out onto Pitstone Hill.

Stay on the Ridgeway in a dip there's a crosspath go straight on. The next Ridgeway sign goes to the right stay straight on, on the stronger looking path. This path bears left, to your right car park, cattle pens and ahead right a water trough. To the left of the trough (you guessed it) yet another gate.

Through the gate follow this path until you reach a style on your right. Cross the style come out on the road, turn left then cross the main road into the windmill field.

Turn right and go round the edge of the field straight past the path that leads to the windmill until you reach another footpath. Here go right through a gate and follow this path until you reach the road.

Turn right and follow the road through the village back to lvinghoe church.

Boring to read but lovely to walk. Follow the arrows and read the signs you can't go wrong. *Happy Hiking*, **Sylvia Piggott**

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# Tales from the compost heap, the wonder of weeds!

Veeds – perennial ones in particular – are the bane of a gardener's life. Couch grass, ground elder, bindweed, celandine, dandelions, thistles, nettle roots and docks – to name but a few – are all possessed of an almost miraculous ability to keep going and prosper, no matter what. Most gardeners will have pondered at length how to get rid of them, solutions varying from curses and incantations to the prolific use of certain proprietary mixes.

In the majority of cases and assuming that the curses etc. turn out to be ineffective, the only solution is to dig them out carefully, bit by bit. This is wonderfully good exercise for those who wish to develop large biceps and possibly triceps also. Then, confronted by a heap of weeds, what should one do next? These weeds, added to the standard home compost heap, may well demonstrate their unique ability to survive by reappearing to live another day. This is because such a compost heap rarely reaches the temperatures necessary to kill the weeds off. A different strategy is called for - and in fact there is more than one way to go here.

Option one is to stuff the weeds, roots and all, into a black plastic sack; add some green material such as lawn clippings, secure the top and put the bag behind the shed, or some other out-ofthe-way spot. After about 6 months, check the contents – which should have turned into a kind of black sludge, or weed soup if you prefer. All traces of the original plant material should have disappeared. You can then add this to your compost heap. Option two is to create a separate heap, just for these perennial weeds; cover it completely with black plastic – not beautiful, but necessary for this job, to smother the weeds. Again, check the contents carefully after a few months. If no traces of the original material can be detected, add the material to your normal heap.

Either way, you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have performed that marvellous alchemy of turning nuisance weeds into a valuable addition to your garden, and in the process have let nothing go to waste. Which is surely one of the greatest joys a gardener can have.

# Ivinghoe Allotments from the Plot

he other morning just before 8am, I was just about to drive off the second tee at our picturesque golf club, with the sun shining, everything looking lush and green, when I heard the lamb's bleating in the adjacent field. Fantastic sound, I paused and thought to myself Spring is here. Great time to be alive – this time of the year lifts people up after the really wet winter months and it is great to see so many people happy and smiling.

What is happening in the allotment world? Well, quite a lot it appears. In Nottinghamshire this week, a parish council's monthly meeting erupted when allotments were discussed and police had to be called and more than 20 villagers were ejected from the meeting. In the 'old days' it would have been 'pistols at dawn' but these days more like 'leeks at dawn'! When you think of all the troubles that are going on in the world and young people dying, something is fundamentally wrong that police had to be called to a parish council meeting discussing allotments!

By the time you read this, the new BBC 2 series 'The Big Allotment Challenge' will have been shown and, with what I have read, is set to show tantrums and tension in each episode (get a life!)

However, tantrums aside, if any local residents watch and feel inspired to grow their own then please contact Maxine Haynes, Clerk to Ivinghoe Parish Council to discuss the availability of an allotment plot.

I must admit that until very recently I did not know that allotments are also known as victory gardens; a term dating back to the Great World Wars 1 and 2, hence the 'Dig for Victory' slogan.

This month is a busy period on the allotment. For now is the time to plant your broad beans, beetroot, peas, spinach. All of your potato varieties should by now already be tucked under earthed up mounds.

I start all my vegetables in an unheated greenhouse and about two weeks prior to planting in the allotment I leave them outside to harden off – this certainly gives them a good start.

Generally speaking, beetroot does not like to be transplanted. But you can get over this by getting a long piece of guttering about 12 to 16 inches long, drill some holes in the bottom, close both ends with tape, fill with compost, cover seeds and once they are big enough they can then planted in your plot. Make a suitable space, remove the tape and slide the whole lot on to your plot and there we are! You will potentially have prize-winning beetroot!

The recent lovely warm weather certainly promotes growth for our vegetables but unfortunately, the weeds also relish the warm days. It is really frustrating that they grow so close to the veggie plant, as it means you spend a great deal of your time on your knees weeding the bed!

Watch this space, and any other space for the matter, as to whether lvinghoe will have a Horticultural Show this year.

Hope you have a successful growing season – mind how you go.

# **Honey Bee swarms** are important

### **Honey Bee swarms**:

Swarms such as the ones pictured are merely Colonies that are in transition. Normally these Swarms are found hanging from tree branch, fence post or any place where the swarm can gather close to the Queen while scouts are sent out to look for a more permanent home. A swarm left alone will only be in place from just a few minutes to a few hours and occasionally a few days. Generally these swarms are very docile and the swarming Bees usually will not sting. When Honey Bees swarm they gorge themselves with honey before leaving the hive which makes it very hard for them to double over and sting.

### What causes Honey Bees to swarm:

Honey Bees have a natural instinct to survive by sending out new colonies. They may also swarm through overcrowding or because an old queen is thought to be failing and they wish to raise a new one. Honey Bees usually swarm in early spring just as the colony is building up numbers in anticipation of the upcoming honey flow but swarming can happen through to late summer. It is difficult to predict if weather conditions will lead to a large colony.

# If you see a swarm:

Declining Honey Bee numbers make the collection of swarms an important part of the work of bee keepers. You should never interfere with a swarm an pest control companies will not kill a swarm

# Session availability and admissions

This will prove favourable when there are children of the same age waiting for a place, especially when places will be offered to those who have been on the waiting list longer. We start the Summer Term with a few places available on Friday afternoons. More sessions will become available in September when our older children leave us to start school. With the continuing expansion of the village, there is great demand for sessions and we strictly adhere to a policy on allocation of places. For parents with children at Pre-School, if your preferred sessions are not available you can request that your child's name be placed on a waiting list. As places become available they are offered to the child at the top of the waiting list. If the parent does not wish to take up the session offered, they remain at the top of the list and the next child is offered the place. This process continues until the place has been allocated. Priority is given to funded two year olds and children with Special Educational Needs if extra sessions are thought to be beneficial. These children are offered available places before those on the waiting list as are children of staff and committee members.



# Spring News from the estate



### **Ivinghoe Hills**

An area of two acres on the lvinghoe Hills has been cut and raked to promote effective grazing by sheep and cattle. This has been achieved by 12 volunteer sessions including a combination group of staff and volunteers. The clearing of scrub has been carried out to help the survival of, amongst many other species, the rare and tiny Duke of Burgundy butterfly.

### **Annual Deer count**

Yes, we actually do count deer! In early March, at 6am, volunteers and staff were out on the estate counting fallow deer. The deer count at Ashridge has been running since the 1970's so we have deer population information that spans decades. The method of counting is simply to record numbers of deer within a given area. The counter notes the sighting time and the location of the deer marked on a map. We then gather all the count data together and add it up – easy.

### **Recent storms**

We lost quite a few trees in the the recent storms. The team have been busy clearing windblown trees from the more public areas. Apart from the damage caused by storms is might surprise you to know that they can have a positive effect on the Estate.

Head Forester Bob Davies explains "The beneficial effect of storms concerns nature itself. Firstly torn and ripped branches are quickly colonised by lots of different bugs and beasties. Another benefit is the natural nursery that can occur when a large top has crashed down and not been cleared up. Lots of sapling use this as protection and within a couple of years quite a thicket can develop, especially with the extra light that is available for flora and fauna on the forest floor – this is especially so under trees that cast a lot of shade such as Beech.

# **Chilterns** villages and vineyards

t's all happening amongst unspoilt scenes of peace and beauty; on open hilltops with dramatic views across four counties, in woodlands glowing with bluebells, or deep in summer shade, down winding lanes of ancient hedgerows and wild flowers, in the intimate valleys of small chalk streams or on the broad waters of the River Thames. This is where you will find the pretty villages and vineyards of the Chilterns.

The Romans were the first to grow vines on the thin chalky soils of the Chiltern slopes. Vineyards and breweries still thrive here, producing a range of award-winning wines, liqueurs and ales. Enjoy their home-grown brews in local pubs and restaurants or try and buy them on the spot.

Our favourite is Frithsden Vineyard, tucked away in a little village near the historic market town of Berkhamsted. Owners Simon and Natalie have planted about 6,000 vines including Solaris, Rondo, and Phoenix varieties. These vines are specially developed in Northern Europe to thrive in our cooler climate. Their wine is grown, pressed and bottled on site and sold in the vineyard shop. http://frithsdenvineyard.co.uk



### Hambleden

Old Luxters is home to the Chilterns Valley Winery and Brewery situated in the picturesque **Hambledon village**, and recipient of scores of trophies and commendations with wines from its vineyard overlooking the lovely Hambledon Valley. The microbrewery is the first in the UK to hold a Royal Warrant. You can now enjoy B&B in the vineyard farmhouse too.

**Nettlebed** is in attractive wooded countryside on a ridge between Wallingford and Henley-on-Thames. The village is surrounded by large areas of common land and is the highest in the South Chilterns. Clay suitable for pottery and brick making was found locally and, as a result, Nettlebed was the most important brick and tile making centre in the Chilterns from the mid-14th century onwards. A disused lime kiln is prominent in the centre of the village which was in use until 1938 and was restored in 1972-4.



**Stoke Row** is at one of the highest points of the southern Chiltern hills between the Wallingford to Reading and the Wallingford to Henley roads. In the centre is a village store and an unusual Indian-style well and a cherry orchard. The 365-feet deep well is known as the Maharaja's Well and was dug in the C19 entirely by hand as a gift from the Maharajah of Benares due to his friendship with a prominent local landowner as he thought it important the locals had access to clean drinking water.

**Little Missenden** is the smaller neighbour of Great Missenden, and the village has been used in many films and television programmes over the years, particularly as one of the more frequent Midsomer Murders filming locations – "Missenden Murders" was considered as a possible title for the series. The Red Lion pub has appeared in three episodes, and despite being a small Chilterns village, it has hosted acclaimed comedy and arts festivals.

### Turville

Five miles west of Wycombe, in a sleepy corner of the Chilterns, you will find the lovely village of Turville. Once home to Ellen Sadler, who fell asleep in 1871, aged eleven, and purportedly did not wake for nine years, becoming known as "The Sleeping Girl of Turvile". The case attracted international attention from newspapers, medical professionals and the public. Rumours persist in the region that Sadler was visited by royalty for a "laying on of hands". These days more famous for a TV sitcom, The Vicar of Dibley with the local church renamed as St Barnabas.



Cobstone mill and cottage were purchased in 1971 by Hayley Mills and her first husband Roy Boulting, and extensive conversions and re-modeling of the interiors were completed as well as interior and exterior restoration and conversion of the mill. It has been in private possession ever since.

**Ewelme** is an interesting and attractive village and is a delight to visit. It lies in a small valley just south of the B4009 Benson to Watlington road about 5 miles east of Benson. The name means (place at) the river-source – the river being the small chalk stream, the Ewelme Brook. The Ewelme Brook was at one time used extensively for the cultivation of watercress, much of which was dispatched by train to London. However during the last quarter of the 1900s, regulations prevented the sale of watercress from Ewelme and this, together with greater competition **>**  from other areas and countries, led to the industry's demise and production ceased in 1988. The Ewelme watercress beds are now owned and managed by the Chiltern Society as a local nature reserve. They run the whole length of the village and are accessible from the road in places. In the centre of the village is the source of the Ewelme Brook and an attractive pond. The almshouses are the oldest brick buildings in this part of the country, and is where scenes from the Les Miserables movie were filmed here too.

Built in 1688. Jordans Village was originally established and built by the Quakers, or Religious Society of Friends and Jordans Meeting House is the place of worship. It is one of Britain's

earliest purpose-built Quaker Meeting Houses, located in idyllic surroundings, near the village of Seer Green. William Penn, the founder of Pennsylvania and other famous Quakers rest in the burial ground. It is a site with remarkable character and history, and the wonderful staff can show you around or answer any questions which you may have about the Meeting House, Jordans and the Quakers. Restored after the fire in 2005, visitors are very welcome every afternoon from 2–5pm between March and October inclusive. Popular with North American visitors, some of whom have reportedly wanted to re-inter William Penn back in North America! www.newiordans.org

DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

### CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

In some circumstances, we may be able to undertake hospital trips to the John Radcliffe or Nutfield hospitals. Please contact the number below if you are having difficulty accessing transport to these hospitals.

The volunteer will usually wait while the appointment is taking place, and then take the resident home. However, there may be circumstances where the return trip is much later or another day. In this case, each journey will be classed as return – as the volunteer will need to return to Pitstone using their own vehicle and petrol.

These charges are exceptionally good. The trips are being undertaken by volunteers so, at present, these cannot be extended to include appointments other than healthcare. Also, there is no guarantee of an available volunteer driver, but we will do all we can with the volunteer resources we have. Please give as much notice as you can.

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# Ivinghoe Beacon May 2014

his is the time of year for annual reports. Looking back over the County Council year I would sum it up as being all about change.

Never have I been more inundated with so much information. Local, operational information embedded with the local, operational information for other far flung parts, and also with top level strategic information.

The County Council delivers services, often in partnerships with others, in the following areas:

- Transport and rights of way, some aspects of planning and environment including waste disposal
- Adult services, older people, some health and mental health
- Childrens services including education but not schools
- Community services such as libraries museums, and with others community safety
- Public health
- Economic Development

# **HS2** (high speed rail)

Much time, money and energy has gone in to the anti HS2 campaign this year and previous years, although all the judicial reviews brought by the 'M52' group of local authorities were lost. Recently the council voted unanimously to 'petition' for mitigation measures, which is really important, and where the County's legal and planning expertise can really make a difference.

# **Council Tax**

All Councils have been permitted to raise council tax by up to 1.99%, without

going to prohibitively costly referendum, so the County Council decided to raise the tax to the maximum. My group made alliance with UKIP and voted against this. I strongly felt this was gesture politics, they raised the tax in tough times for people because they could, not because it was necessary.

By increasing the council tax they turned down £2M from the government in council tax freeze grant which would have been continued in future years, and took £3M from Buckinghamshire residents pockets instead. The differential, just under £1M, could have been found from unused contingencies, and the 'generous' reserves. The total County Council budget is more than £300M.

# School Transport

The charges introduced two years ago are set to be increased. One of the largest 'savings' in the budget is from this area, with very few changes being made as a result of the recent consultations with parents.

### **Innovation and good practice**

Since 2010 the county have cut a third of their budget without total collapse of services. Instead they have won new grant funding, for roads in particular, and made far reaching changes to how services are delivered. One approach is to 'demand manage' – prevent people from needing services in future. Three programmes led by the council but in partnership with others are proving very successful in this. Families First – working with 600 families identified as high service users, Prevention Matters – helping keep older people independent, and a programme to reduce the impact of the welfare reforms on services and the users of those services.

### **Public Health**

This year has been the first year that the Council has had full responsibility for the public health service. Although the Council was shortlisted by the Local Government Chronicle for how the service was being embedded in to service delivery, the Peer review singled the service out for criticism, saying it used its budget very much in the old medical model rather than on improving health outcomes for people through other services, such as education, economy and environment.

# **LGA** (Local Government Association) **Peer review**

A recently completed review of BCC by a team officers and councillors from other similar local authorities, praised these innovative programmes, as well as the County's use of the Better Care Fund to provide joint community health and social care services.

### **Future Shape**

In a programme called **'Future Shape'** more and more functions will be transferred to independent or semi independent bodies like the new Bucks Learning Trust, Buckinghamshire Care, and Transport for Bucks, a new Museum Trust is being formed, a Country Park Trust. Not forgetting the majority of secondary schools are already Academies.

This new, indirect, method of service delivery, even if clear governance

structures are in place challenges the transparency and accountability of public services.

# **Roads and Potholes**

Dissatisfaction with the state of the roads is constant. Over £500K has been spent in this division (Ivinghoe) on road repairs and improvements from the revenue budget, so that is in addition to any capital expenditure. Each member can nominate three roads for repair. I asked for a full breakdown for the county by member division and some of the biggest spend was in Ivinghoe, Wing, and Great Brickhill.

In January TfB repaired 4,431 potholes across the whole County, of which 2,381 were in need of urgent repair. In February all resources were diverted to flooding.

More money still has come in to the budget last week, for more piecemeal schemes, but at last the County are considering a more fundamental approach to upgrading the road network with capital spending – lessons learned from the success of the prevention programmes elsewhere I hope.

Grass Cutting comes under this area. Last year the verge cutting was distinctly unsatisfactory. This year the same contractors have been engaged for some reason, for 3 cuts outside village signs and 10 cuts within. Please be vigilant to see that happens. Parishes should consider taking this work on themselves.

# Local Area Forum (LAF)

We have yet to see how our LAF will manage without Jackie Wesley to ensure things happen. She will be sorely missed and I thank her for the fantastic work she has done for the three divisions of Wing, Great Brickhill and Ivinghoe. Paul Hodson has been assigned to our area and we will be working with him at the workshop now scheduled for April 26 in Edlesborough. We have also had a change in our Local Area Technician. We will miss Paul Foot, but his replacement Rob Anderson, is up for the challenge.

# **Community Leaders Fund**

This year the fund was divided between the lvinghoe Village centre, to complete the internal decorations, BBOWT at College Lake to support the publication and launch of Graham Atkins book on the creation of College Lake, and The Villager, Slapton's newsletter which is on line as well as on paper.

### **Beacon Villages Community** Library

The library has had a successful year and has recently extended its opening hours to Wednesday morning. Many thanks to librarian Shelle, all the volunteers, the fudge makers, Frances who is running the DVD scheme, and the hard working committee members under the leadership of Emma Huxley. I enjoy the time I can spend supporting them, and particularly want to mention how much I enjoyed the recent successful Library Lunch in Cheddington Village hall, and helping with BeaconLit Festival, running this year for a whole day on June 28th at Brookmead School.

### Aylesbury Vale District Council

Equally important is the work I do on the district council. This year has been all about the impact of government changes to planning, and the inability of Aylesbury Vale to draw up a robust local plan. I will be covering this in the next edition of the Beacon.



# Have your **voice heard...**

wrote in my piece for the last Beacon magazine on planning matters. I still have ongoing issues with our planning appeal systems and am taking this up with AVDC. I hope to have more to report by the time of the next magazine.

Whilst I held a meeting at our offices with the leader and his deputy I picked up a report detailing our achievements over the last 5 years. Starting in 2009 the then leader set out his plans on various topics and it was good to see the results.

In all this report runs to some 50 pages and clearly demonstrates the achievements of your District Council over the last 5 years. Not only in attracting new business but also in transforming the way in which we work in order to drive down costs and increase efficiencies. Much of this concerns Aylesbury town itself. Whilst many of us in this part of the Vale travel to our County town rarely, development there is very important to us all. After the theatre opened there was an upsurge in retail letting and in particular the food offering. The night time economy is now quite vibrant and more development has been announced. There is an exhibition at present and details will be in the local press. A vibrant town centre will attract more businesses to settle across the Vale as a whole and hopefully reduce the amount of people travelling out of the area to work.

The Waterside theatre opened in 2010 and has since generated £2.3m added value to the economy. It has attracted 200,000 visitors every year.

The new Gateway council offices opened fully in 2012 and brought various office functions together for the first time. The covered open space has been used for various events including business shows and health commissioning presentations. Both this and the Oculus chamber are now used at vote counts locally and was also used in the Police and Crime Commissioner election counts. The Oculus meeting chamber and other rooms have been hired out when not in use and have raised in excess of £100k.

The new recycling system has been rolled out to much acclaim and in fact won awards. A text alert system, covering this and other matters, was introduced at the same time.

AVDC have increased income from payroll services by exporting to 6 outside organisations including some neighbouring local authorities. Arla have finally started operating from their Aston Clinton site and will eventually employ approximately 700 people directly. Naturally there will be many supporting industries serving this operation. I have already been there to work and can say that the whole operation is impressive in its scale and technology. There is an in house education facility for apprentices.

After the much heralded Enterprise and Innovation Centre in Partnership with Peter Jones of Dragons Den fame failed, AVDC have gone ahead with the development of this new education facility at the old canal basin site in Aylesbury. This promises to be a fantastic place for students of all ages to increase their educational and vocational qualifications.

Now we have a new leader whose background in business will, I feel, continue this great work. We are aware that the likelihood of a zero contribution to this authority from central government will happen in the next few years. This despite the fact that Buckinghamshire as a county is a net contributor to central government.

There is still much work to be done and I have confidence that we have a great team of politicians and civil servants dedicated to delivering the very best for Aylesbury Vale.
