Dogs and Sheep

There are 2 main ways in which dogs present a danger to sheep. First, and most dangerous, is sheep worrying. There have been several instances of this near Culworth recently. Even dogs which are normally well-behaved can decide to chase sheep if they are allowed

to run free near livestock. Spring is a particularly dangerous time as the ewes are either pregnant or have young lambs.

The second problem is dog tapeworms which can cause several diseases in sheep. The dog excretes the worm eggs onto the grass which are then eaten by sheep. The eggs hatch and the immature worms burrow through the sheep's gut and migrate around the body. If they reach the brain they develop causing the sheep to become disorientated and turn in circles, hence the common names for this condition 'turning sickness' or 'gid'. The sheep eventually dies.

Please can I ask all dog owners to:

- a) Keep your dog on a lead particularly around livestock
- b) Pick up any poo your dog does and put it in the bins provided by the Parish Council
- c) Worm your dog regularly
- d) Keep to the footpath.

Public Health Northamptonshire

My name is Fatma and I work as part of Public Health Northamptonshire for the Supporting Independence Programme. Now, more than ever, services across the community are working together to support those most affected by COVID. Our aim is to support and enable people to maintain their independence and resilience for as long as possible. We are keen to work in partnership with local parishes to promote our service to the wider community, in order to support vulnerable adults to improve and maintain their independence and wellbeing.

Our service can be tailored to support anybody in the county, over the age of 18, who may be struggling with one or several areas of their life, leading to mild frailty or reduced independence. We are currently operating as a telephone service, offering 12 weeks of person-

centred support with a trained Wellbeing Advisor. Advisors have a wealth of knowledge and contacts for community services, charities and organisations across the county, working in partnership to achieve a positive outcome for customers. Referrals are dependent on successful completion of the eligibility criteria, which are just a few quick questions included within the referral form. Our administrator will then contact the customer within 2 working days to arrange an initial appointment with an allocated advisor. Examples of areas we support with include:

- Social isolation
- Falls
- Lifestyle
- Medication
- Mental and emotional health
- Physical health and mobility

HS2: Magpie compound lighting

As you know, HS2 are building a compound the other side of Magpie farm. This compound will eventually have a number of buildings, and a concrete-making plant. During the construction process, the whole area is lit up by floodlights on towers, and regrettably these are very visible from Culworth, damaging the night sky darkness sky in that direction.

The Parish Council has been in touch with HS2, seeking to understand the need for the lights and the type of lights being used, and the need for lighting throughout the night.

The response from HS2 is as follows:

“HS2 position is pretty clear security is needed, security risk is real. We have instances on other parts of the route of trespass, protester action and damage, we need to keep people and property safe and secure. The lighting we have at the moment is lighting towers which are temporary whilst we build the compound. As the compound is constructed the lighting will change – festoon lights, lower lighting on the cabins rather than the towers and lights on motion sensors. The lighting heads are as low as they can be and directed to the ground.”

Let us hope that as the buildings go up, the lighting impact will be reduced.

There has been no income since the last meeting as the hall has remained closed due to the continuing pandemic and Government restrictions. At present, overheads are running at about £95 per month (slightly higher in the winter months).

Expenditure

The outgoings since the last meeting are as follows:

Insurance: £114.90

Electricity: £56.45

Water: £22.75

There have been no other payments incurred.

MI also reported that another grant has been made available to village halls, but the committee unanimously felt we shouldn't apply for it as we are still in credit from the previous one.

Buildings and renewals:

Acre Correspondence- there are several online events this week including a talk called: Beyond Covid 19-a roadmap to help village halls recover. There is also a Village Halls Doomsday book being compiled, JT will write something about Culworth and submit it.

Village Hall & Health and Safety Policies- we all had a chance to read these and agreed they are still relevant. JT will update.

Risk Assessment- We will revisit this just before we reopen the hall.

Any other business:

JO mentioned that she regularly checks the hall and has noticed some mould growing on the wooden tables and the floor. It was generally felt that this was because there is no circulation, and we would look into it further. There is a heater on low to stop the pipes freezing.
