#### Well, let's get going.



## Thorney telephone box enjoys new lease of life!

Thanks to a small working group of residents the old phone box on Main Street has undergone a complete refurbishment during the last three months to become the home of our new defibrillator. After some tedious negotiation of endless red tape, led by our parish councillor, Martin Cooper, the project has at last been completed. This has been something we have wanted for a long time but it goes without saying we are hoping never have to use it. Although it is straightforward to use, all you need to know is just dial 999, report the emergency and you will be given the code to release the defibrillator from its case. For peace of mind, training will be made available to interested residents so watch out for more information through your letterbox if you live in Thorney.



On Sunday July 11th, as part of our Celebration Weekend in the village, 62 residents & friends plus 3 dogs attended the official opening of our defibrillator at 3pm. Our Chair of Thorney Parish Council, Dean Sheehy thanked everyone who had played a part in contributing to the completion of this project, either in the planning stage, with their labour or through financial donations. Dean then invited our District Councillor, Linda Dales to cut the ribbon and officially declare our Defibrillator/Phone Box open, which she did in fine style! It's been a real community joint effort which we can all be proud to have played our part in.




Afterwards we enjoyed tea and cake outside St Helen's Church raising just over £90 to go towards our Community Space Fund. People were also given the chance to see an initial draft plan for the redevelopment of our Play Park which is opposite the church. 



## Seasonal Flu Vaccination Campaign 2021

We will be holding 2 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 18 September 2021, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 23 October 2021, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2021 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Flu Vaccinations (and possibly 3<sup>rd</sup> COVID vaccine once details are confirmed) will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation. We will continue to wear face coverings to protect your healthcare setting.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

Housebound patients will be contacted by the practice in due course.

These are appointment only clinics. Appointments will be available to book from 1 September 2021. Please contact the number below, book online or ask at Reception.

## **Harby History Group**

In May, we finally managed our first meeting since February 2020! Sam Millard took us on a guided tour of Historic Newark. We started in the castle grounds. King John had died at the castle. Later, the Cecil family of Burghley House were converting it to a home, but the plague stopped building works in their tracks. Sam mentioned at this time that Newark was once known for the huge number of breweries it had, which surpassed even Burton-on-Trent. We then walked along the River Trent and Across from here was Newark Dry Dock which is the largest inland dry dock in the UK. We moved on through the town, to the Market Square and past the church. Sam showed us many fine examples of Tudor, Georgian and Victorian architecture along the way and led us through many undercover passages. The building which now houses Greggs is a wonderful Tudor piece and is worth an indoor visit when possible due to the original beams inside. Behind here was a tiny courtyard that once contained 20 houses. At the church, Sam showed us a cannon ball hole in the steeple. It was hit accidentally during the Civil War. It was meant to fly over the top of the church and into the Market Square. Beside the National Civil War Museum was a wonderful oddity. There was a wall to a newer building built halfway across the doorway to any existing building. On the Market Square was the old town water pump and beside it a wooden block that had been used during bear baiting.

In June we went on a tour of The Cathedral Quarter featuring Jewish Lincoln led by guide Brian Taylor. We started off on Castle Hill and headed through Exchequergate. On the West Front of the cathedral, we were told how the carvings in the frieze had once been painted in bright colours to grab the attention of those who couldn't read. As these have been replaced over the centuries Around the side of the cathedral we saw more of these modern carvings. On the corner were large statues carved into the cathedral of Edward I and Eleanor of Castile and just along from them was Margaret of France, Edward's second wife. We were reminded that at one stage Lincoln Cathedral was the tallest building in the world which took the title off the Great Pyramid at Giza. The flying buttresses were the first of their kind in England. We stopped to view the Chapter House and the Tennyson statue and crossed the road to see the ruins of the Roman Gate. We then started on the walk down Steep Hill where we were shown various good and bad examples of timber framed houses. As to the Jews, outside of London, at one stage Lincoln had the largest Jew population in England. There were about 200. The Jews were traditionally lenders and were owned by the King so if a Jew died, the King got his money. We were then shown examples of Jews' properties.

We are now having our summer break.
