



## **Background: Frederick Lyon**

Born in 1886 to John Lyon of Castle Bytham, Lincolnshire and Susan Lyon (née Rudkin) also born in Castle Bytham.

Fred was baptised 29<sup>th</sup> August in Little Bytham, Lincolnshire.

In the 1891 census the family is living in Caseby, Lincolnshire.

John Lyon (farm labourer) is 30

Susan is 32

Children are: Edward, Frank, Frederick, Gertrude and Kate.

1901 **Fred** (14) is a carter on the farm of Mary Pollard in Normanton St Nicholas, Lincs. His parents and siblings are also in Normanton St Nicholas with additional children: John William (8), Evelyn Annie (2) and Thomas Alfred (4mths)

1911 John Lyon is a widower and a wagoner on a farm in Ingleby, nr Saxilby, Lincs. **Fred** (24) is back with the family and also a wagoner. Census shows 8 of John and Sarah's 12 children are living and 2 more are included in the 1911 census: Florence (8) and Mabel (6) both born in Burton Coggles, Lincs. Their mother, Sarah, died in January 1909.

The family moved to North Collingham sometime after 1911. Fred worked for his father, a farmer. John Lyon died in 1922 and is buried in All Saints, Collingham. Fred's sister Mabel, died 1945 in the Bingham Public Assistance Institution<sup>1</sup> (a former workhouse) aged 40 and is also buried in All Saints.


## Military History: Pte Frederick Lyon

Fred enlisted in the Lincolnshire Regiment (date unknown) and transferred to the Machine Gun Corps – units that were formed for the fittest and most intelligent soldiers. He was in the 25<sup>th</sup> Company, formed on 19<sup>th</sup> January 1914 from various regiments including his, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion Lincolns.

The Corps took part in the battle of Pilckem Ridge in the Ypres sector and Fred was killed on July 31st.

A total of 170,500 officers and men served in the Machine Gun Corps, of which 62,049 were killed, wounded or missing.

Frederick Lyon is buried in the Divisional Collecting Post Cemetery Extension, Ypres. Plot I K 6 and remembered on the All Saints War Memorials, Collingham.
