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Parish Council Meeting: 14 December 2006

Present: S. Bust; G. Herbert; A. Paris; D. Parrish. Apologies: A. Fraser, N. Armstrong; I. Sharman.

Matters Arising: 1) Norwood Park Golf Course Extension – the reply from District Council is that, as the Course has a Southwell address, Halam was not consulted on this application. A. Paris moved that the Clerk should write to District Council expressing our concern and dissatisfaction with the situation – agreed. 2) Interactive speed sign – should be erected shortly after the Christmas break

<u>Village Hall</u>: Extension/refurbishment – Draft plans were examined and discussed. Agreed unanimously to ask John Thornewill to draw up plans for an application to the Planning Department. He will also submit an estimate of his costs to oversee the project. The Parish Council expressed thanks to John for his contribution to date.

<u>Village Hall Cleaning</u> – Tony Denyer has offered to clean the hall (at no charge) from the start of March.

<u>Draft Regional Consultation</u>: A. Paris circulated notes he had made regarding suggested responses to the document; accepted – A. Paris to forward to GOEM.

Government White Paper: A. Paris to investigate further. Parish Plan: Actions up to date.

<u>Design Statement</u>: Draft documents regarding Village Envelopes and Conservation Areas from the PWG were circulated and read. Agreed to issue with Halam News.

Xmas Tree: It was agreed that the tree looked very festive. Payments totalling £80 were agreed. A larger tree will be considered for next year.

<u>Noticeboard</u>: G. Herbert & D. Parrish to investigate further and report back.

Fencing: Glenys Herbert commented that she thought the fence in front of the old people's bungalows created a loss in amenity for the elderly residents. It also cause shading which was encouraging the growth of moss & slime on the pathway. Andrew Paris moved that the Clerk should write to Newark & Sherwood Homes requesting that the path be cleaned as soon as possible – agreed.

Open Meeting: Matters raised 1) Mrs Simmons expressed her dissatisfaction with the previous meeting - she felt her questions re planning at Grange Farm had not been answered and that unprofessional comments had been made by members of the P.C. She felt that the council had not expressed the views of the parishioners that it is appointed to represent. 2) P. Thompson asked that costings from John Thornewill should be discussed in public at a P.C. Meeting. 3) A window at the school was recently broken by a football. If further damage occurs, the school will review the use of its playing fields out-of-hours.

3) Tony Denyer asked about a second position for the speed watch scheme at the Edingley end on the village.

Correspondence: 1) Halam Parish Paths Partnership – a year is left to run of the present scheme. Clerk to liaise with E. Gathercole. 2) Community Safety Liaison Group – Monday 29 January: Andrew Paris to attend. 3) Touring Cinema Group – information to be passed to K. Lindley.

4) NALC Training - the Clerk & Mandy Rickett to attend financial training session.

<u>Planning</u>: 1. Orchard View, Radley Road – Single storey extension and loft conversion: supported unanimously.

Planning Decisions: Fairfield House, School Lane – Demolition of existing conservatory and erection of two-storey extension: approved by District Council

Finance: Resolved to pay village hall cleaners and the cost of the licensing advert in the Bramley.


The 2007-2008 budget was discussed & accepted. A three monthly review was agreed. The precept for next year was set at the same as last year's, i.e. £7,000.

A. Paris will prepare a Risk Assessment for next meeting.



Halam Post Office and Stores

At different times in the last century Halam Post Office has been housed in all the above locations. The first postmaster was Thomas Bust in 1885, although prior to that date Mrs Ann Richardson was Receiver. It was part of the Waggon & Horses 1885- 1899 and again from 1963 - 1983. It was located in Barn Cottage from 1899 - 1938, and then Yew tree Cottage from 1938 - 1954. From 1954 – 1962 it was located at Roseneath, and finally it operated from 1985 until 2002? where the shop currently stands, sadly no longer a post office and stores.

Following last month's article...... Halam Post Office and Stores

Janet Arnold was one of the postmistresses during the time when the post office and shop were located in the Waggon and Horses. Janet was a likeable Halam character who lived with her father Joe at Thornholme on Gray Lane.

Her shop was crammed with every conceivable item including vegetables grown in their garden. Her speciality however was the huge selection of sweets which attracted hordes of school children, including our own, who streamed across the road under the supervision of crossing lady Edith Brown and later Jill Wright. Under Janet's stern gaze those that sought to handle the goods before purchase were told sharply to "look but don't touch duckie". Our cat Jasper loved visiting the post office and his favourite spot was dozing on the stamp book. On one occasion he spent the night in the upstairs storeroom causing Janet to ring the police in the belief that there was a burglar up there!

During this time the post office was situated at the Waggon & Horses. A Post Office had existed from an earlier time but as a receiving office only. – The Ed.

<u>Chapel Bungalow</u> on Back Lane owes its name to the fact that it was once used as a chapel and meeting house for the Methodists in Halam.

The 1844 Directory records a 'Church Sunday school ...also used by the Methodists as a preaching room' above what was the Post Office and stores at one time, attached to the Waggon & Horses public house. Later a chapel further up Back Lane 'complete with Steward John Rollings and harmonium players R. Linney and Miss Gibson' was in existence. This was later converted to farm buildings and then a house. On the outer walls traces of the formerly high windows of the chapel exist. According to Miss Coulthard's book about Halam, services took place at 6pm on Sunday evenings, one Sunday afternoon monthly, once a month on Wednesdays and every third Thursday. This chapel was eventually replaced by the new chapel built in 1897, which is now Halam Village Hall.

The Annual Meeting of the Halam Vestry

This will take place at the school on <u>Monday 26th March</u> at 7 p.m. This is a public meeting open to all members of the village. The purpose of the meeting is to appoint church wardens and members of the Parochial Church Council.

The Parish vestry was developed in the 14th century and became the main instrument of administration of the village. It was composed of all the men of the village who were rate payers. The vestry was in fact the Parish Council up to 1894 when it was replaced by a non-ecclesiastical body by the Local Government act. It was responsible for care of the poor and sick; the maintenance of footpaths and roads; provision of justices of the peace, and the appointment of church wardens. Up until 1894 the vestry could appoint, if it so wished, a parish constable; parish way wardens, and a beadle. The vestry was also responsible for establishing a village goal or lockup and a cattle and sheep pound. Halam folk must have been very law-abiding as there is no evidence of it ever having a village lockup!!

I am sure that many of you are interested in keeping alive this village tradition and so do please come along to the statutory meeting and have a say in who you think should be a church warden and who should look after the churchyard. This is important as the present day parish council has little or no power, - it can no longer lock people up for the night; give out alms to the poor; make decisions about its roads; but the office of church warden still has some power. Come along to the meeting and learn more.


Mr Povey. The club stopped regularly here on outings and after the tree was planted would come to St Michael's in October for a memorial service. They gave a Christmas party for Halam children, and this continued until 1960. Over the years the tree has given great pleasure to Halam residents and enhanced the overall appearance of that part of the village. Generations of children have joyfully collected conkers. Sadly those days may soon be ended: the tree is infected with the fungus phytophora or "red canker". In the last 3 years serious winter droughts, to which the horse chestnut is susceptible, have affected it. It has also been plagued by the leaf miner moth and now shows signs of being heavily infected. Phytophora causes a bleeding canker and can be observed as dark red or orange gum-like ooze which runs down the bark and dries - in these areas the bark cracks and wood rot fungi invade,

'Red canker' appeared in Nottinghamshire about 3 years ago, spread by imported timber from America. Presently there is no known remedy. Nothing needs to be done to the tree presently but in the autumn, if there are signs of canopy failure, associated branches must be removed. The tree may live as long as 5 years. Hopefully treatment may become available in that time. In the meantime dead areas have become a treat for the greater spotted woodpecker regularly tapping out his amorous messages.

branches break off and the tree finally dies.

Once again there has been some very unpleasant dogfouling in the area of the churchyard. It is against the law to foul footpaths and public areas, with large fines payable. Those responsible will be reported if it continues! Be warned! – From the Ed (on behalf of several complainants).

Halam Church Fabric

Work has now been completed on redecorating the internal walls of the tower and staining of the wood surfaces including the ceiling. The cost of this work has been partly met by a grant of £300 provided by Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) who distribute the Landfill Tax Credits of Waste Recycling Group plc. The allocation and distribution of the grant has been made by the Nottinghamshire Historic Churches Trust, a registered charity whose aims are to assist with the restoration of historic churches and chapels of all Christian denominations throughout Nottinghamshire. Simon Settle of WREN says "We are very pleased to be able to help finance this project which will ensure that a bit of Nottinghamshire's rich church heritage is preserved for generations to come."
