#### **RECTOR OR VICAR?**

The Incumbent of Kirton is traditionally known as 'Rector'. In years gone by Rectors were appointed by the Patron of the Church - they may have been the son of an acquaintance of his, or a friend who needed a good 'living'. They were not required to have any theological learning, or required to do much work. They lived well, usually in a large Rectory, and were entitled to the largest tithes and rents from the Church glebe land. They might on occasion preach a sermon, but it was quite usual for them to employ a 'vicar' or deputy to do this for them. Vicars received a stipend, sometimes paid by the Rector, and could claim some of the lesser tithes of the parish, but they were very much a minion by comparison to the Rector! Nowadays however, there is no difference in their status, although the incumbent here is traditionally still known as Rector.

In the past, Kirton has had its fair share of dubious Rectors! Two of these were - Rector John Blythe (1559 - 1583) who was accused of being 'often times so drunke that he could not say his sermon!'

John Clarkson was not impressed by the preaching of Rector Robert Blackwood (1585 - 1603) who was reported to the Archbishop of York (in whose Diocese Kirton then was) He said 'the roaring of an oxe in the toppe of an Ashe tree is better than all the preachings that he can preach'. They didn't mince their words then!
