DON'T HAVE A RUBBISH CHRISTMAS – **RECYCLE** – 'Tis the season for family and presents – and plenty of extra household waste. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is urging residents to recycle more and try to waste less during this festive season.

There is no limit to how much you can recycle. Any extra recycling can be put in cardboard boxes or clear sacks which are available from larger supermarkets and homeware stores. Leave the cardboard box or clear sacks filled with recycling and large, flattened cardboard boxes next to your recycling bin. Please remove the polystyrene and plastic packaging before leaving cardboard out.

There are lots of items that can be recycled including cardboard packaging, paper, newspapers and magazines, food tins, drinks cans, aerosols and plastic bottles.

Remember that Christmas wrapping paper cannot be recycled and needs to go into your black waste bin. Try wrapping presents with brown paper instead, it's recyclable and can look beautiful when decorated. Christmas cards can be recycled but only if they do not contain glitter, ribbons or bows. If you're unsure about what can and can't be recycled visit www.basingstoke.gov.uk/recycle or call the council on 01256 844844.

Christmas can mean extra rubbish which can't be recycled, so extra sacks will be collected for the first collection after Christmas only.

If you're thinking of getting a real tree, you can recycle it at one of a number of drop off points across the borough between Thursday 2 January and Sunday 26 January 2020, a list of the collection points will be available in December.

For the first time those people signed up to the Garden Waste service will be able to put their real Christmas trees out for collection with their fortnightly garden waste. Christmas trees over 6ft need to be cut in half and decorations must be removed from all trees. For more information visit www.basingstoke.gov.uk/christmas-tree. Cabinet Member for Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "It's inevitable that extra rubbish will be created over the festive period. I would ask residents to make sure they're disposing of their waste and recycling correctly so we can enjoy a more sustainable start to 2020."

This year bin collections will be affected over three weeks and, unless adverse weather affects bin rounds, collections should return to normal from Monday 13 January 2020.

Instead of the normal Wednesday collection dates, the Festive Collection dates will be Friday 27 December 2019, Friday 3 January 2020 and Thursday 9 January 2020.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council would like to hear your views on its draft Council Plan to ensure the borough continues to be a great place to live over the next four years and budget proposals to support this.

The draft Council Plan for 2020 to 2024 sets the key priorities for the council over the next four years and into the future.

With a focus on putting residents at the heart of everything the council does, four priorities have been developed – strengthening communities, protecting and enhancing our environment, improving safety and planning for the future. Supporting the council plan, proposals for a balanced budget for 2020 to 2021 aim to protect services that residents value.

To do this, proposals include a £5 average increase for the borough's part of the council tax and a 3% average increase in fees and charges to help pay for the cost of optional services the council offers.

Over the last 11 years £13.7 million in savings have been made without cutting services, with the borough council continuing to look at how it can run more efficiently.

Further savings of £1.42 million have been identified in 2020/21, increasing to £1.82 million by 2023/24.

Executive Director of Finance and Resources said, "Residents give the area a 94% satisfaction rating however the council is not complacent. Based on what people and businesses have said matters to them, this draft plan sets priorities that put residents at the heart of the council's future plans.

This is supported by the council's proposals to deliver a balanced budget for 2020 to 2021.

As residents, businesses and partner organisations are key to the success of these plans, the council would like to hear from a range of people to help shape its proposals."

Police Report

Kingsclere Headley and Ashford Hill

There were no residential burglaries reported this month but a commercial premise off the A339 near Wolverton was broken into. Power tools and petrol were stolen. Fuel was also stolen overnight from a parked lorry at Ramsdell

Village Hall. We received reports of anti-social behaviour around St Mary's Church, where someone tampered with the bell ropes and left litter in the church. There were also reports from several landowners of vehicles driving onto farmland in the area. The occupants were seen getting out and looking at outbuildings, and other suspicious behaviour. If you see people acting suspiciously with a vehicle, please report the number plate and descriptions of the occupants. If it's happening there and then, always call 999. Did you know?

When you meet a police officer, it is now most likely that they will be wearing a camera. The body-worn video is only activated if a situation requires it, such as during an arrest or search. It helps provide evidence and also allows police conduct to be monitored. Hampshire Constabulary was one of the first forces in the UK to introduce body-worn video.



The hope that Christmas brings is something that is sorely needed this year. The year has been a turbulent one, with various Brexit deadlines extended, two prime ministers, fierce arguments, a Parliament prorogued (was it only me who didn't know that word before?) and then recalled after a



Supreme Court decision, and all that with a general election still to come.

But Christmas gives us hope for the future as we remember the birth of Jesus Christ. It reminds us that God is somehow at work bringing light into darkness, hope to the hopeless and order to the chaos. It must have felt quite turbulent for Mary and Joseph as they made their way to Bethlehem for the census with Mary heavily pregnant. Changes to St Mary's Church Interior

The project team have been busy preparing the very important Statement of Need and Statement of Significance which are the vital documents which put our plans into the public eye. The two statements accompany our application to the diocese planning office (DAC) which then goes before a committee of experts for their consideration and

comment. It is also the time at which the plans become available for comment and scrutiny by other organisations, such as Historic England.

So, we have had to consider a number of factors before we take this step forward.

Is the plan a final plan and have we considered all the feedback we have received?

Have we considered the impact on the community of Kingsclere?

The approximate cost and is the cost of our plan achievable?

Have we researched the background and history of the church and that in doing so made sure we preserve those elements of the church that have significance?

Primarily it is a place of worship but it must have a future as more of a community space able to be used by everyone in the village.

It must meet the 21st century standards for these uses and have modern clean and adequate toilet and catering facilities.

Our church has been in the centre of the village for hundreds of years and during that time it has changed and been altered to meet the changing needs of our society.

Some of those changes have been made without consideration for the future and we must make sure the changes we make are for generations not just for tomorrow.

Where are we in this process?

It has been decided not to rush into making our application immediately. We are looking again at our plans with a view to change some of the things. Why? Well for many reasons but cost is a factor, feedback from a number of people over some elements of the current plan and after consultation with a number of experts we feel we need to consider the heritage of the building and its future community use.

I was advised when I took on this project that it would not be a quick fix and that it would take time. Its important that the project continues to a conclusion and we don't falter, put off by the mountain of paperwork needed

to make it happen.

I think by allowing ourselves time to make adjustments and a breathing space for the process to be made more acceptable to everyone we will see the changes finally take place.

Nature Notes

Sharp-eyed residents have made contributions to the last notes of 2019. A bat seen roosting beneath a door canopy but subsequently found dead, was identified as a brown long eared bat. This is a widespread and common species. It was only by being given an opportunity to examine one closely that one could appreciate its name, its near transparent ears were truly huge.

There was news of a rose ringed parakeet regularly visiting a sunflower seed feeder recently. These small, social, Asian parrots are well established and breeding in England and are common in Home Counties' parks. Something of a pest now, they are voracious feeders and compete with our tree hole nesting birds for nest sites.

And finally, a real bonus; an osprey was spotted and photographed by another observer. It was perched high in a large tree visible from Swan Street and was doubtless on its migration southwards to West Africa.

There was a large tree at the head of the lake whose spreading branches were irresistible to the cormorant population. They loved to stand upon them in heraldic pose, wings spread to dry after a fishing trip, eight or nine birds sometimes. They are large birds and inevitably produced large quantities of droppings which scorched the leaves and after a few years the tree died. Was this a cause for dismay - not a bit, bare branches were even better as perches. However as time slipped by, branches fell away until, rather pathetically, there now remains only a large stump and the birds have been forced to move to smaller, inferior trees.
