News from St. Nicholas Church

Cream Teas: The Cream Teas have proved once again to be very popular this year with many people coming along for the first time. Our reputation has spread far and wide. There are two more Sundays left; 4^{th} and 11^{th} September 2.00pm – 5.00pm, unless we decide to do an extra Sunday which will depend on the weather. Look in the 'KM Around the Villages' for information. We now have mains water piped to the Church and this has made a big difference.

Morning Prayers: Prayers will begin again at the beginning of September. Prayers are said in St. Nicholas and All Saints Ulcombe on alternated Tuesday mornings starting on 6th at 9.30am for about 30 minutes.

Bible Study: Bible Study will resume on the 15th September at Weirton Villa, Grafty Green. On Thursday mornings at 10.15am for a 10.30am start. If you would like to come along ring Joan Drury on 01622 853766 and you will be most welcome. The sessions are very interesting indeed, so why not join us.

Coffee Morning: The Village Coffee Morning will be held on 14th September in the Village Hall Grafty Green from 10.30am to 12.00 pm. Do come along and join in the chat and enjoy a piece of homemade cake or a biscuit - sometimes there are cheese scones or sticky tea-bread. A choice of coffee or tea is served. There is no charge, but we always have a dish for a donation if you would like to give one, which is given to a charity at the end of the year.

Harvest Supper: The date has changed from that printed last month - it is now on 22nd October, 7.30pm for 8.00pm and there will be a licensed bar and a raffle. Tickets will be available soon.

Ride and Stride: The Friends of Kent Churches are once again organising their Ride and Stride Event around the Churches of Kent on September 10th starting at 10.00am until 6.00pm. The idea is for each Church to encourage members of their congregation to ride a bicycle or walk around a route visiting churches on the way. A list of churches that will be open can be obtained from Joan Davidson in advance, so you can plan your route and get sponsorship forms.

The money raised is sent to the Friends and each Church is given back half of the sum raised to go into their funds for improvements and repairs. The Friends put their share into an account, which is used to support Churches who are in need of help to be able to carry out repairs to the fabric or in re-organising their interiors. Any church can apply to the Friends for help stating their needs. Churches are encouraged to open their doors to meet and greet the walkers and riders, so we will need some people to be at St. Nicholas Church to do this. Report from Jenny Whittle, County Councillor for Maidstone Rural East



GET ON BOARD YOUR BUS – USE IT OR LOSE IT - I am a passionate advocate of protecting public bus services in rural areas as vital lifelines for the young and older people, the disabled and those without access to a car. I initiated the Wormshill-Sittingbourne minibus service in November 2009 immediately after the withdrawal of the last Postbus service in the South

East which covered this route. I fund this service with three other County Councillors which provides one return trip five days a week for residents (and the bus does a return trip to pick up passengers waiting if it is full).

That is why I am very concerned about the proposed withdrawal of the **Saturday No.59** bus service that runs from Grafty Green to Maidstone. In the current financial year, KCC has had to find some £95m of savings (10% of the revenue budget) and next year will need to identify a further £65m of savings. This has inevitably meant having to make some very difficult decisions and KCC has highlighted 15 services which require significant public subsidy and/or are poorly used.

The KCC Cabinet Member for Highways, Bryan Sweetland, has offered to protect these services if more people use them, thus reducing the level of taxpayer subsidy which is currently \pounds 5 per trip on the no.59. Mr Sweetland will review service usage at the end of the year to establish whether continuing to fund these services, against the other massive pressures in the KCC budget, is viable.

The message is therefore clear – we must get as many people as possible to use the No.59 on Saturdays to protect this service beyond the New Year. If you are a parent who drops off your child(ren) to town on a Saturday morning, can you encourage them to use the bus instead (free to use if they have a Freedom Pass)? Do you do your shopping on a Saturday morning – and can you use the bus even say once or twice a month?

Let's get on board the **Saturday no.59 bus** and help those who need the bus service to continue enjoying it in the future. The bus leaves the Kings Head at Grafty Green at 0733, 0923 and 1336. Return services from King Street in Maidstone are at 0838, 1241, 1525 and 1755.

If you would like to contact me about the bus service (e.g. is the route too long, does it take too long to reach the town centre), please let me know.

REDUCING THE SPEED LIMIT ON LIVERTON HILL - Last year I met with residents of Liverton Hill who called for a reduction in the speed limit to 30mph. Robert Stuttle established the "30 on the Hill" website

(<u>https://sites.google.com/site/30onthehill/home</u>) and since then I have met with Kent Highways, Robert and Parish Clerk Pat Anderson to discuss the best way to take this forward.

All residents and interested road users will be able to make their views known shortly. I am advised at the <u>time of writing</u> that Kent Highways will publish a statutory Traffic Regulation Order in the **Kent on Sunday on 11th September**. Notices will also be displayed in the area and a letter drop may be organised for residents living on Liverton Hill. This will give ample opportunity for comments and views on the proposed reduction.

INFORMATION ON KCC GRANTS FOR LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

Small Community Capital Grants (the total available to distribute across Maidstone is £52,400)

This fund is available to formally constituted organisations in Kent that wish to obtain money **only for capital works** connected with a project that will bring community benefit. This includes parish and town councils, district councils and KCC, voluntary and community groups, churches, societies and charities. The maximum application is $\pounds 20,000$ (although in reality, and considering the amount to distribute, grants are usually offered at a much lower level).

Small Community Capital Projects Fund grants are one-off grants, available only in the financial year in which the Council awards them. An organisation cannot apply for additional grant for the same project in a subsequent year. An organisation can put forward more than one project at a time, but will usually only receive a grant for one project in any year.

Local Schemes Grants (the total available to distribute in Maidstone is £12,200)

This fund is available to formally constituted organisations in Kent that wish to obtain money for minor **capital or revenue** improvements connected with a project that will bring community benefit. This includes parish and town councils, district councils and KCC, voluntary and community groups, churches, societies and charities.

The grant is offered as one-off and non-recurring payments with no on-going revenue or capital commitments. An organisation cannot apply for additional grant for the same project in a subsequent year. An organisation can put forward more than one project at a time, but will usually only receive a grant for one project in any year.

Member Community Grant

County Councillors have an annual £10,000 fund to support organisations across their electoral Divisions. I represent a large area comprising 15 parishes stretching from Stockbury to Headcorn. Boughton Malherbe Parish Council has a vacancy for a Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) from 1st April 2012. The appointed person would be expected to shadow the current Clerk so that they will be independently up and running by April 2012.

Responsibilities include offering legal guidance and liaison with five parish councillors, parishioners, agencies and other local authorities, financial and administrative duties including correspondence, minute- taking at 5 Meetings a year, budgeting, year end accounts and a wide range of matters affecting the Parish of Boughton Malherbe.

As announced in the August issue of the Malherbe Monthly, an open meeting of the Village Hall committee was held on 18^{th} August, following Mike Hitchins' announcement that he wished to step down as chairman.

At the meeting, long-standing members Bernard Dobson and John Collins retired from the committee and Mandy Hitchins relinquished the role of secretary, but a good turnout of villagers meant that the vacancies could be filled with keen newcomers!

Richard Pilborough was elected chairman and Carol Hulm secretary. Annie Henderson, Margaret Neaves, Jacky Simmons, Barbara Pearce and Jacqui Thompson all joined the Committee - which also still includes John Maunder, Sue Burch, Sandra Pilborough and Robert Turner (Treasurer).

The Grafty Gourmet

This is another very simple recipe that can be served with salad or vegetables. One Salmon Fillet is required per person. I have therefore based the ingredients below for a family of 4.

Salmon in Puff Pastry

4 skinless salmon filet 3/4 - 1 inch	1/2 cup white wine
thick (approx 6 to 8 ounces each)	1/4 teaspoon thyme
2 tablespoons olive oil	4 cloves garlic, minced
1/2 teaspoon salt	dash of cayenne pepper
2 tablespoons butter	1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
1/2 teaspoon white or black pepper	4 tablespoons Philadelphia Cheese
3 large leeks (white part only)	1 packet of frozen puff pastry, thawed
1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard	to room temperature

1. Set the oven to 180 degrees (centigrade). Slice the leaks thinly crosswise. Warm the olive oil and butter in a frying pan and add the leek slices. Sauté over medium heat for 3 - 4 minutes until the leeks begin to soften.

2. Add the wine and garlic, and continue cooking for about 5 more minutes until the liquid almost evaporates. Remove from the heat. Stir in the lemon zest, half the salt, half the pepper, mustard, thyme. and a dash of cayenne.

3. Lightly roll out 2 pastry sheets on a floured surface into 12 inch squares. Cut each square in half to get 4 rectangles measuring 6×12 inches.

4. Spoon 1/4 of the leek mixture onto the middle of each pastry rectangle, spreading the mixture in an area roughly the shape of each piece of salmon. Put the salmon filets on top of the leeks, and sprinkle with the remaining salt and pepper. Place a tablespoon of Philadelphia Cheese on each fillet and spread evenly. Bring together the ends of each pastry rectangle, and pinch to form tight seams. Pinch together the side seams as well.

5. Place each salmon pastry packet on a non-stick baking sheet, seam side down. Bake for about 20 minutes, until the pastry is golden brown. Cut one pastry in half to see if the salmon is done (exact cooking time depends on the thickness of the filet). If not, push the two halves back together, return to oven for 3-4 more minutes, and check again. When the salmon is done, cut remaining pastries in half. Serve with salad or vegetables of your choice.

Grafty Geeks - Computer Tip of the Month

Save money on Ink and Paper when Printing Use "Print Properties" to save money on Ink and Paper as follows:

When you select **PRINT** from any application eg: email, the internet or word processing, you are presented with the following:

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From here you can select which pages to print and the number of copies you need.

There are also options to select the whole document or a selection of the document.

BUT if you want to save money on Ink and Paper you can select, Printer Properties, seen on this screen in the top right-hand corner. **Warning:** with some computers and printers the Properties option could be in another location, but it will be somewhere to be found.

Once you find "Printer Properties", you will see many different options to select; you will also see some Tabs at the top, usually saying "Features" or "Advanced Settings" which hold even more options other options.

BUT options to **SAVE YOU MONEY** are "**Twosided printing**", printing "**two papers per page**" (which are still legible) and the best one is "**fast/economic printing**". This saves lnk and prints faster. You could save this as your default and only use the other type of printing when you want special copies for special occasions.

Note: All printers are different, so you may need to refer to your user guide to find the appropriate options. Or you could use **F1 – Help** and search for the options listed above.

Kent Police Neighbourhood Watch

If you have the occasion to call the Police because of an incident that is happening in your area and you do not wish a Police attendance at your address, please tell the operator. Kent Police aims to attend every call, particularly those that report Anti Social Behaviour, but there are going to be occasions where you do not wish a visit. The operator will most probably ask you, but if they do not, you will have to tell them

Police in Mid Kent are issuing a reminder to not leave valuables on display in cars.

The advice comes after a number of thefts where valuables were stolen from cars, having been left clearly on display in unattended vehicles.

As part of the force's 'Stay Safe' campaign, which focuses on helping the public avoid becoming victims of crime, officers are reminding motorists to take all their belongings with them when they leave their vehicles.

Inspector Jerry Prodger from the Maidstone Neighbourhood Team said: "Motorists can reduce the risk of becoming a victim of crime by ensuring they take all their belongings with them when they leave their vehicles. Items such as satellite navigation devices, mobile phones, or even loose change are an easy target for criminals. Thieves will often look for marks on the windscreen where a satellite navigation device has been previously attached so its good practice to ensure this kind of mark is wiped away.

"In the summer months some motorists leave their windows slightly open to let cool air in and thieves will look to take advantage of this. Our advice is to take your valuables with you and fully secure the vehicle before leaving it unattended."



The September Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Leo at the start of September, and moves into Virgo.

The **Autumn Equinox** occurs on Thursday 23rd September, when the Sun crosses the celestial equator. At this point, night and day are of equal length. After this the Sun moves into the southern half of the sky, and I'm afraid that for the next six months the nights are longer than the days.

Full Moon is on Monday 12th September when in the constellation of Pisces. The September Full Moon is often called the "Harvest Moon", because it continues to rise around sunset for several evenings, allowing farmers to work long after sunset. **New Moon** occurs on Tuesday 27th September. I have more on the **Moon** at the end of the article.

Mercury is at its greatest elongation west of the Sun on 3rd September, so there will be a brief opportunity to see the planet in the dawn sky. Earlier in the month it will appear high in the eastern sky, and the best time to view it will be about an hour before sunset.

Venus is setting only a few minutes after sunrise, so we will not be able to see the brilliant "Evening Star" until well into autumn.

Mars is rising in the northeast just after midnight, and is high in the east at dawn. Relative to the stars, **Mars** is moving eastwards, leaving the constellation of Gemini on 15th September, and crossing into Cancer. We will have to wait until later in the year to see more detail through a telescope.

Jupiter rises in the east at dusk, and is high in the southern sky at dawn. Relative to the stars it is moving north-westwards in the constellation of Aries. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons.

Saturn is nearly at **superior conjunction** (almost directly behind the Sun), which occurs on 13th October, so again we will not be able to see the planet this month.

Some of you may have read that experts believe that the Earth originally had two moons in orbit around it, but that one was absorbed into the other when they smashed together about 4.4 billion years ago. The theory would explain why the far side of the Moon has a thick mountainous crust, while the near side is flat. It could also explain why the near side is rich in minerals and the other side is not. They believe it is likely that both moons were formed when an object the size of Mars crashed into Earth and broke up.

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
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Bull Heath, a Sand Pit, a Lichen Heath, a Sanctuary for Wildlife

August 2011

Bull Heath, a site owned and managed by the Heaths Countryside Corridor (HCC) is a disused sand quarry. The remnant quarry has left a bowl in the landscape that has flourished as a sanctuary for wildlife. The HCC proudly maintains the site and its rich diversity including lichen, pyramidal orchid and a wealth of specialist acid loving plants.

Sandmartins, the smallest member of the Hirundinidae family (swallows and martins) have been seen living in the sheer sand cliffs on the site. This summer migrant burrows into fresh cliff faces to lay their eggs. In conjunction with a clear cliff face, this species needs to eat a large number of insects to survive. The presence of a pond at Bull Heath increases the number and range of insects available to the birds and enables the species to breed successfully.

A natural process called succession takes place in the quarry. Succession is the gradual formation of a climax community of plants. In this instance, woodland including alder and silver birch are establishing across the site. This process is impeding on the sites true value as an open lichen heath with low ground cover and open cliff faces for the sandmartin, solitary bees and other reptiles. Volunteers from the Kentish Stour Countryside Partnership (KSCP) have been working with the HCC to remove areas of woody growth in an effort to maintain the high biodiversity value of the site.

KSCP volunteers cleared the pond area of all alder and silver birch growth, creating a vast open space for Sandmartins to hunt for insects on the wing. Other work included scrub clearance and management of an open glade behind the pond. Removing the vigorous growth of trees and scrub encourages an attractive array to flowers including white Campion, vipers bugloss and common stork's-bill to establish.

Managing the site in this way, with conservation volunteers, mirrors the effect that browsing animals such as goats would have on the site. Maintaining low vegetation and thus increasing floral diversity creates a honey-pot of pollen and nectar sources for butterflies, moths and insects.

Grafty Green Roads Update

I had hoped to have a definitive e-mail regarding various works now in hand following a further meeting with Kent Highways. However the following is a brief summary.

Kent Highways apologise for lapses following the resurfacing of the 3 miles of Lenham Road between Grafty and Headcorn almost a year ago. Kent Highways are now undertaking necessary remedial work to bring the surfacing and various safety issues up to a satisfactory standard, the cost of which will be taken from the retention monies from the contractor. Work includes many surface repairs, infilling where the surface is above verge / ditch level together with edge marker posts where appropriate, also centre white line and / or edge white lines.

Eastwood Road has now been bought up to standard for the entire length apart from a bit of patching at the Ulcombe junction which will happen soon.

Potholes which have previously been temporarily or badly patched should be remedied from September with the starting of a new KCC main contractor.

Ulcombe Hill and Chegworth Road will be assessed and where necessary remedial work undertaken.

Headcorn Road between the Post Office and Eastwood Road is showing many signs of wear and 'break down' which could become serious over the winter, the engineer I met will be carrying out a detailed assessment to determine the extent and timing of remedial work.

Kent Highways has recently had a major restructure and so far I am positively encouraged.

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Christian Message September 2011

Stepping back helps us to step forward: I wonder how many of us have visited the magical coast of Northumbria during the Summer. It is a place that I have fond memories of. I visited Lindisfarne with a friend a few years ago, and it made a huge impression on me. At that time I had recently finished a three year training as a lay minister in our local churches, and felt fulfilled in that role, thinking I was in the role that God had called me to for the rest of my life.

Maybe you have heard of Henry the Hermit, or St Cuthbert? Both of them are associated with that coastline in Northumbria. St Cuthbert made his home on Lindisfarne, otherwise known as Holy Island. It is a small area, connected to the mainland by a narrow causeway which for a lot of the day is submerged by the sea. For access you are at the mercy of the tide. Henry was even more of a recluse. He spent his days in prayer and meditation on an island some distance offshore. Maybe we have something to learn by their example.

There are times when we all need to get away from it all, if only for a short while, possibly a day or two, in order to hear God's voice. It's not that he's removed from our busy lives - far from it - but our business can obscure his presence with us. For example, there was I, determined I was where God wanted me to be. Looking back now, I know his voice was speaking to me, but it seemed dim, and I was unconvinced, possibly because I was so busy with all the other things going on in my life. It was only when I made time to step back, times like my stay at Lindisfarne, that it slowly dawned on me. God was calling me to ordained ministry.

It is noticeable that Jesus himself, at key moments in his life, made time for quietness, drawing away from the crowds, spending time alone on high hills so that he could focus on the presence of God, away from the innumerable pressures and demands put on him. I do know that it's not always easy to do that. Maybe the children are screaming, and there's a pile of washing, or another meeting to attend, another deadline to meet, and stepping back can seem like a luxury we can not afford. Yet, my experience is it is a necessity, a step we sometimes need to make if we are going to have any hope of progressing further.

This year is only about 34 of the way through, yet it has been an amazing year for me. Having been ordained as deacon last year, I was preparing for priesthood this year. As part of that preparation I spent some time in Israel. This was time to explore the roots of my faith, and understand more of the background to our scriptures, and of the land where our Lord lived and ministered. I was ordained priest on 3rd July and my feet haven't touched the ground since. I love the business of my life as priest, serving you, the people of this benefice as part of our local ministry team. I thank you all for your support and encouragement. I thank you all for your prayers. And I invite you all to join with me in finding God and therefore finding time time for for all. I pray that you will make enough time in your life to step back so that God can lead you forward.
