

People may have heard the doleful news that the Woodcock Inn is closed 'until further notice'. We are not certain exactly what is happening. It's not been possible to contact landlord Nigel Roberts and the Brewery that owns it, Green King, has been unforthcoming. But it looks as if it may well be the second pub that the village has lost in two years after the recent closure of the William IV/Kitty Fisher.

It may be part of a national trend. The real ale group CAMRA says 1,500 pubs a year are shutting their doors. But it's also a bit of a local tragedy. However good The Bull remains, greater choice for drinkers and diners as well as an element of competition must be a good thing.

It's hard to escape the conclusion that the major brewery chains are very largely responsible for the situation. Sky-high rents and unreasonable restrictions on beers offered, and other drinks sold, make it extremely difficult for tied house tenants to make a go of small rural pubs. But will companies like Greene King sell freeholds to create free houses? Just ask Nigel.

The one glimmer of hope is that smaller niche brewers are opening up and prospering - a local success story, Old Dairy, is profiled on pages 32 and 33.

Also not to be missed in this packed edition of the magazine is Ernie's Pollard's extraordinary story (pages 18 and 19) of our former church spire - so tall it could be seen from boats passing in the English Channel.

Enjoy the magazine and remember, spring is just around the corner.

Parish Council



Here at the Parish Council we need as much help as we can get and we are extremely grateful that we have two very able and enthusiastic Borough Councillors to fight our causes on our behalf. We have Tom Dawlings (TWBC Borough Councillor), who amongst many other issues is presently doing a sterling job helping us put together our Neighbourhood Development Plan, and Sean Holden, who also fights our corner at TWBC as well as in the hallowed corridors of KCC in Maidstone.

You may have seen Sean on the local TV news lately, calling for a ban on lorries in parts of Kent. Sean says lorries are breaking up roads and creating potholes, claiming that a 40-tonne truck had the same impact on a road as 10,000 cars. Locally, Goudhurst and Sissinghurst probably suffer more damage from lorries than we do here in Benenden, but I think most of you will agree that we would like to see less heavy traffic passing through our villages if at all possible.

We mentioned in the January issue that we are looking for a Youth Liaison volunteer to work with the Parish Council. This role would involve finding out what activities young people would like to see in the village, encouraging them to join in and giving feedback to the council. Obviously parents with school-age children would be best placed to help us with this - do please get in touch with our Clerk if you are interested in helping.

Our Neighbourhood Development Plan is coming along at a very brisk pace and there will be a Village Exhibition from 10-4pm on Saturday 7 April in the Memorial Hall. Each Working Group will display updates on progress. Please see Paul Tolhurst's current update on page 15 for further details.

And please do think about putting your name forward to the Clerk for the election for Parish Councillors in May. We will be putting details of this on our website soon, but in the meantime please do contact our Chair, Peter Davies, myself or our Clerk if you have any questions.

Finally, our village spring clean will be on Saturday 14 April - please come along to the village shop or Iden Green Pavilion at 9-9.30am. Our village is beautiful - and this task helps to keep it so. There will be free coffee and cake at the community shop for all litter pickers.

Rector's Letter



I encourage you to use your church this Lent and Easter

We are very fortunate at St George's to be able to keep our church open every day of the year (apart from a few days around Christmas). Anyone can pop in for a few minutes of peace and quiet, away from the hectic pace of a busy life. Like most things that we take for granted, we do not appreciate it until it is not there. Regrettably, when it's not being used for services, we've had to close the Mission Church in Sandhurst for the time being - due to the thoughtless actions of a few individuals. I encourage you, through this Lent, to take the opportunity to use and enjoy the quiet, spiritual space at St George's church; it is open from 8.30/9am until about 4.30/5pm. Thank you to those who unlock and lock the church every day; to those who keep it clean and tidy, and to those who provide beautiful flowers to decorate the church.

The time of Lent (preparing ourselves for the celebration of Easter) is, ironically, a busy time within the church. Again, though, I encourage you to get involved in as many of the services through Lent and Holy Week as you can. On Sunday 4 March, during the I 0am All-Age Communion service, we will be raising awareness of safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults in our community and in the church setting in particular. The issue is a sad reflection on our society, but not a new one, as we see so often in the press or on the news. Ian Malaugh will be helping us become more aware of our personal responsibilities for safeguarding those unable to protect themselves. The following Sunday I I March is Mothering Sunday. This will be marked in the I 0am service. Sunday 25 March is Palm Sunday. You are very welcome to join us for breakfast at the Memorial Hall before processing up to church for the I 0am service.

Following Palm Sunday, we enter Holy Week. There is a Reflective service, in the benefice every day at 7.30pm. (All are at St George's except Tuesday's is at the Mission Church.) On Maundy Thursday there is also a lovely service at I I am at our Cathedral in Canterbury. If you've not been before, why not try it this Lent. Good Friday we spend an 'Hour at the Cross' together, remembering the crucifixion; on Holy Saturday there is another Reflective service at 7.30pm. Then we can celebrate together on Easter Sunday, the I April this year; we start early with a sunrise service at 6.15am at St Nicholas Sandhurst. (That is not an April Fool! Breakfast is served afterwards as well.)

This world needs more of the joy and love that is expressed in the celebration of Easter Sunday. I encourage you to come and be part of it. God bless.



And from your hugely supportive reaction it seem that after 19 weeks of rehearsals, the show went down well. Among the notable firsts for the Players include the youngest ever mini-dame, the 'hunt the Queen' video, a flashback to the Generation Game (cuddly toy anyone?), and of course probably the only ever pantomime cactus. Some lovely dance sequences included the free-style efforts of Ant and Geck, Pearly Puss and her kittens, a smouldering tango, and an entrancing UV piece. The junior Players shone as ever, and Bev's writing again proves that panto can be bang up-to-date; with fake news, strong female leads (and the odd pop at the salaries for male TV stars). Not a stereotyped Mexican in sight: Tequila!

Each year we re-invest any profits in improving the kit we have available. This year every cast member had their own headset so you could hear all the fine singing all the time, additional lighting meant that the men in those huge false eyelashes and fabulous makeup, and the women too, were able to shine. And despite explosions, magic flash-bombs and glitter everywhere there were no firealarms this year. With a cast of 35 children and adults, and a crew of 25, plus 12 helpers shanghaied from friends and family across the five performances it is a huge team effort, but so rewarding when all that hard-work is appreciated. Panto runs on a strange mix of ginger biscuits, tea, and regular visits to The Bull. Watch out for auditions in early September and join in!

News from Benenden School

I write at the end of a week in which the country has been celebrating 100 years of women having the vote, and I feel indebted to the school's founders, who were amongst the first women eligible to vote in 1918 and who had the vision, independence and means to found Benenden in 1923. I feel proud that almost 100 years on, Benenden is now amongst the most forward-thinking, innovative schools [for girls] in the country.

When I look around Benenden, I see young women who are confident, motivated and skilled to become the leaders of tomorrow. There is no doubt that they are growing up in a world where they see no limits to the aspirations of women, and whilst recent headlines about BBC pay imbalance and sexual harassment issues in Westminster and Hollywood are reminders that there is still some way to go to achieve gender equality in the workplace, there has been enormous progress in every walk of life and this will only continue with the next generation.

To that end, we will soon be announcing details of another event as part of the Dads4Daughters movement, which is aimed at ensuring greater gender equality in boardrooms and workplaces across the country.

From a varied programme of recent events the following have stood out. The Burns Night Reeling for parents and sixth form girls was a great success. This was followed by Cultures Week, run by the girls and offering a fascinating celebration of the diversity we are proud of at Benenden. Neighbourhood Plan

Working groups get off the mark

All five working groups have met and are getting on with their priority tasks. The Business and Local Economy group is surveying local businesses and you may have seen members of the Landscape or Housing Groups prowling the lanes and hedgerows.

On 7 February we met Tunbridge Wells Borough Council Planning Department. They gave us some insights on their own plan development, and agreed to help us with technical training. A draft of their Local Plan - to run until 2033 - is expected to be published on their website by early June. Discussions will continue with Parish Councils, Neighbourhood Planning teams and others. Formal public consultation is planned between November 2018 and January 2019. March 2019 is the target for the plan approval.

TWBC's 2017 Call for Sites has been closed with 14 identified in Benenden. Our Housing Supply Working Group has determined criteria to assess each location for development suitability. TWBC will undertake their site assessment over the next few months while our involvement will add local knowledge.

We plan to circulate an explanation of the process and criteria to all those on our email circulation list, and the Housing Supply Working




Group will make a presentation at our planned Village Exhibition on 7 April in the Memorial Hall.

We have decided not to undertake an additional local Call for Sites as the outcome of the TWBC call appears to exceed our housing planning needs. This may change depending on outcomes from the site assessment process, so we will review if necessary.

We are also working on the Neighbourhood Plan website which should be ready well before the Village Exhibition.

Congratulations to Hawkhurst, who have had their Neighbourhood Plan passed at a local referendum with over 90% approval. There is still a great deal of work to be done on ours and we would like more people involved. Above all please put 7 April's Village Exhibition in your diary; we want your views as we go along. CAFÉ REFURBISHMENT


Long have we celebrated Benenden's community shop with its wonderful design, friendly atmosphere and welcoming café. Little did we realise when the café was first laid out, how popular it would become and what demands would be made on it.

Now we find we need to look again at how it works for staff and volunteers who frequently find themselves having to squeeze past each other during food preparation. The menu we now provide is a far cry from the original tea/coffees, hot pies and cakes first envisaged and so we have decided to change things around a bit to facilitate the preparation of this. All being well, the work should begin in March so don't be surprised to see a little upheaval and, at times, a reduced menu, to allow space for some gallant workers.

The general aim is to create a food preparation area on the right. New work surfaces will be constructed around that end and the tall freezer in the corner will go to the back of the shop to be accompanied by another tall freezer, replacing the chest freezer presently there. In the café an under-counter freezer will be installed for regularly used frozen products. The sink end will then be freed up to accommodate dirty crockery and will allow the dishwasher to be loaded without having to fight for space with the person preparing food.

This of course will improve general hygiene and facilitate high standards of cleanliness. We are planning to have two microwaves to aid the speedy preparation of food during busy periods. To minimise disruption, much of the work will be done after the café has closed and any new cabinets will be pre-made and simply fitted when a space is clear. The general appearance of the café will remain very much as it is.

Local History

The Great Steeple of Benenden

Ernie Pollard looks at the extraordinary bell tower that graced the village church before a disasterous fire almost 350 years ago.


In 1659 the Kentish historian Richard Kilburne wrote of Benenden: "The Steeple of this Church standeth off from the same, and is of rare and remarkable workmanship on the inside thereof, the same standing very high, having a long spire or shaft, and the foundation thereof (for a small part only of the height of the same) being of stone, and all the rest to the top of Timber of exceeding great bigness ..."

In 1893 Granville Leveson-Gower surveyed the church and said bluntly that Kilburne was wrong and was thinking of Brookland church - a view shared by other antiquarians of the time. Then, in 1896, out of the blue, some long-lost churchwardens' accounts were returned to Benenden from Scotland. They recorded the collection of taxes in the parish and their expenditure on the maintenance of the church.


Remarkably, between the accounts for 1671-2 and 1672-3 was some urgent writing - a message to later generations:

"Munday the 30th day of December 1672 between Twelve and one in the morning Arose a Storm of Lightning Thunder a hard gale of wind, and some rain out of the south west, which set fire to the steeple at Benenden, whereby the said Steeple, with the Roofe and all the Timber worke of the Church was consumed in 4 or 5 howers time, the five large bells melted; also five houses ajoyning the Church Yard Gate on the North Side burnt to the Ground; the Steeple was built all of Timber from the ground: the Lower Story was compiled of nine trees or peeces of Square Timber 16 inches Square which stood upon great Sells of a bigger Square; the middle post being larger considerably than the other Eight and each out-post had a Shore of the same bignes as their post ... [the construction of the steeple is then described in some detail and the writer concluded] ... the Steeple stood on the North west Corner of the Church about 16 or 20 foot distant, the height of the Steeple from the ground according to the best Information was 132 foot. The five melted Bells were Cast 1619 Simon Henden (churchwarden) on the fifth bell: on the fourth Bell between the Crown Rings this verse: 'in me concordia'.'

This was certain proof that Benenden once possessed a great timber steeple standing detached from the church. A suggested date for it's construction is the 13th or early 14th century. The Kentish



steeple most resembling it is not the detached steeple at Brookland, but the attached steeple at High Halden about six miles north-east of Benenden. The High Halden steeple is much smaller, about 75 feet high, and has six main posts compared with the nine of Benenden (including its central post) and lacks the second stage, the lesser square. Timbers of the High Halden steeple have recently been dated,



suggesting that it was built in the period 1470 to 1490. However, the present steeple there may be a rebuilding of an earlier one.

So Benenden lost its steeple as well as the roof and interior of the church in the fire of 1672. The tombs of many leading families of Benenden, the Moores, Guldefords, Sharpes and Gibbons, were lost. Houses



to the north of the church were burnt to the ground. A new church was needed but would the old, detached steeple be recreated?

Rebuilding the church A trust was set up to collect money. Briefs (royal mandates) were issued for collections from other parishes and sums were received in 1673 and 1674 from Chislet, Patricksbourne and Smarden in Kent and from other parishes

as far away as Devon and Cornwall.

In 1673 a London master mason, Timothy Townshend, was commissioned to produce plans and estimates for rebuilding. The interior of the church was rebuilt in 1677-78 in neo-classical style. A tower was planned, but there was not the money to build it and it was not until 1691, 19 years after the fire, that further moves were made. There was a presentation to the Vicar-General of Canterbury, a petition to the magistrates and a vote in Benenden church on how £147, realised by the sale of the melted bellmetal, should be spent.

A form was pinned up in the church in April 1691, offering four options on the use of the bellmetal money. The form has survived and is now at Canterbury, the voting was as follows: Votes for the use of the bellmetal money: For church repairs 14; For rebuilding a steeple 49; For the poor 0; For church and poor 0.

The clear wish of the parishioners was for a new steeple. They may have had the lost steeple in mind, but sadly there was money only for today's more modest stone tower which was finally completed, after another long delay, in 1715.





Panto review - Regal dogs' dinner collars audience

Some might think it a risky undertaking to write a new pantomime from scratch, but if you're going to do it you might as well throw everything into the mix. That's certainly what Bev Beveridge has done with the Benenden Players' latest offering, Raiders of the Lost Monarch. Instead of Indiana though, we take Lindy-Anna Jones straight from the Welsh valleys - the always adroit Bonny Sullivan. We add to the pot a bit of 101 Dalmatians in the stellar form of Debbie Katis - Cruella's sister Nutella Brazil. Then Rub up a Genie in the form of Grant Matthews. Throw in Tintin's Thom(p)son twins - the underused Michael Patrick and Bob Barrow. Mix with Pearly Puss a fine feline Tilly Milnes apparently exiled from the cast of Cats. And, give or take a Mexican restaurateur - Ian Aldridge, a depressed talking cactus - Cameron Rance, a clutch of journalists, a comic rail announcer and a man from the ministry - a suspiciously accented Pierre Gautier, and you've got quite an eclectic feast.

Only missing from the above cast was Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth herself. No, wait a minute; she was there (treasonably demoted to a 'Royal Highness' at one point). Nutella had abducted her with a pair of Corgis from which to make fur coats (the Corgis not Her Maj - do keep up!). Playing her was last year's star Katelyn Malaugh who hardly had a line until the very end - which was a pity.

Also waiting until late in the day to strut his stuff was the irrepressible Mark "The Bull" Barron-Reid. Whenever he hits the boards almost anything can happen - and often does. Out of the window goes any semblance of accent, or it would appear, script. But who cares, as his 'ad libs' can be funnier than Bev's book. Once he's singing and dancing the stage lights up - his 'James Brown' duet with Pierre Gautier was electrifying, his Tango with Debbie Katis was 'Strictly' awful! Quite why he needed a Peaky Blinders haircut is anyone's guess. His character, Blowsmelt, filched from James Bond,

came complete with a hand puppet cat that was as animated as almost anything onstage.

Perhaps the lesson might be that a bit less could be a bit more when it comes to constructing a panto. Certainly a bit less dialogue and a bit more singing and dancing! And as for the dialogue, perhaps a tad more rehearsing - you can forgive the youngsters for fluffing a few lines and cues, but some of the grown-ups really should do better - even on preview night. Bev and her Players have set the bar high in previous years and this mashup was, in the main, very enjoyable and very funny. But one has to say there were a few longeurs before Debbie or Bonnie or Mark or Tilly rode to the rescue.

A few final plaudits - the band, the sound effects, the sets and the costumes were, as ever, all great. The younger members of the cast were wonderful, but the break-out performances, as Ant and Geck, came from Archie Bunch and Seth Williams.



American takes the bull by the horns at Old Dairy

Peter Thomas visits one of the Weald's finest breweries

The Old Dairy name

may not be quite as apt since our local brewery moved to its new home in the heart of Tenterden, but at least the smell is better. The old milking parlour at Hole Park was atmospheric but it still had a lot of cows in amongst the mash tuns and there was little to recommend the fragrance.

The former WWII Nissen hut that now houses the operation has the whiff of nothing

less delightful than fermenting ale and the steam trains from the Kent and East Sussex Railway station next door. It's light and airy, although in the middle of February it could also be described as draughty and a bit parky.

Luckily, when you've flown in from the northern wilds of Minnesota, a British winter holds no terrors, so head brewer Wes Lynch is able to focus on maintaining the reputation of this multiple award-winning business whose reach

extends from our own community shop to some of London's finest watering holes.

Many of you will be familiar with Old Dairy's traditional British beers, but there's also now a flight of funky craft beers, under the Cattle Shed brand, and three gold medals in the recent CAMRA London and South-East Area awards (for Red, Snow and Copper Top)



suggest that the brewhouse is safe in Wes's hands since he took over last July from Glenn Whatman.

"Glenn was from
Tenterden and lived here
all his life," says the 28year-old native of Duluth,
"but I've focused my life
around beer, fell in love

with British brews when I was at university over here and now Kent is my adopted home.

"Being from the States, though, I hope I can add something to what we do here, and the Cattle Shed range is my chance to play around with new recipes."

Wes first arrived on these shores in 2010, on an exchange year studying English at Birmingham University, where he met his Kentish wife Lucy before returning home to

Castle Danger
Brewery on the shores of Lake
Superior. A masters degree in brewing and distilling at Heriot-Watt University in Edinburgh took him to the Charles



Wells outfit in Bedford, before the lure of the Weald brought him here a year ago.

The range at Old Dairy these days is eclectic; some are even available in cans, to appall the traditionalist; but the core range remains and thrives, many of them flavoured with Bullion, Fuggles and Challenger hops from Ross Hukins' farm in St Michaels.

"Uber Brew is new this year," says Wes, "a real success, a session pale ale, citrussy with new world hops from US and New Zealand. There's nothing wrong with having a beer that tastes great and you can drink it all day!"

From Minnesota to the shelves of the village shop, it's a long and rewarding journey for some of the great beers of the Weald.





Tasting the Old Dairy brews

A careful tasting of Old Dairy beers revealed their breadth, complexity and unique signature. They seem to combine both a sense of place and the spirit of adventure. Here are some of the cream of the crop:

Working Class Hero, a homage to the brilliant Belgian beer aristocracy will certainly satisfy those who prefer the fuller, yeasty and more powerful drinks of the continent.

Those who want their pint to taste like it's from Kent will enjoy the familiar territory of Gold Top and Red Top. Gold Top's generous flavours and lemon verbena lift made it my favourite beer of the evening and certainly one that might kindly complement a Thai curry.

Whilst we still seem to be very much in the grip of frosty mornings and unfriendly nights, the range of winter beers are as timely as they are powerful. With names that milk their dairy identity, for those old enough to remember that milk got delivered in foil topped glass bottles, Silver Top and Snow Top both bring those black treacle, dried fruit and Christmas puddingy flavours that make stout such a distinctive winter tipple. The inspired Imperial Porter, named Dark Side of the Moo (no udder brewery puns their names quite so well) was deceptively fragrant and a winner for anyone like me who mourns the departure of porter from the pub pumps. Alfred Nicol



STOUT AND HEARTY IRISH STEW WITH PARSLEY DUMPLINGS Serves 4

No claims whatsoever to authenticity ... Preheat the oven to 340°F/170°C/Gas 3 FOR STEW

I.4kg middle neck of lamb on the bone, cut into portion sizes (ask in Wards Butchers - they know everything about Irish Stew)
2tbsp seasoned plain flour
350g onions, peeled and thickly sliced
225g carrots, peeled and thickly sliced
2 large potatoes, peeled and thickly sliced
285ml Old Dairy Silver Top cream stout
I.2litre lamb stock (Knorr concentrated tubs)

3 or 4 thyme sprigs
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
FOR DUMPLINGS

175g self-raising flourPlenty of chopped parsley, flat or curly75g shredded suetSalt and freshly ground black pepper

METHOD

- Dip the lamb in seasoned flour and place a layer in the bottom of 3.5litre casserole, followed by a layer of onion, carrot and potato, season with salt and pepper. Add more meat and layer again until everything is in. Pour over the Silver Top, and top up with hot lamb stock so everything is covered. Add thyme sprigs. Put lid on and into the oven.
- Now go and walk the dog. After two hours come back in and make the dumplings.
- Mix flour, parsley and seasoning in a bowl. Mix in suet with a wooden spoon. Now add a couple of tablespoons of warm water and mix using your fingers. The dough needs to come away cleanly from the sides of the bowl, so add a little more water as required. Shape into about 12 walnut-sized dumplings and place on top of the stew. Cook for a further 30mins at 370°F/190°C/Gas 3 with no lid. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve with buttered savoy cabbage.

Bird Notes

In the middle of January we went to the island of Fuerteventura, one of the Canary Islands just off the coast of North West Africa. They are volcanic islands with little vegetation and larva fields. The habitat does not support many species of birds but as is often the case there are some species that have adapted to the harsh conditions. It was some of these species I was hoping to see. Our accommodation was well off the beaten track close to one of the nature reserves.

On the first day, in a temperature of only 16 degrees and a stiff breeze, we walked for several hours into the reserve. The landscape reminded me of the terrain on Mars as seen from the rovers that have landed there. Apart from a distant sight of a large bird we saw very little and it became obvious that bird watching was going to be pretty challenging. As we were just finishing our walk we suddenly heard a lovely bubbling flight call and we looked up to see four or five




Black-bellied Sandgrouse. With black bellies and white underwings contrasted against rusty brown upperparts, these grouse-size birds with pointed wings looked fantastic and certainly worth the wait. A small flock of sparrows also got up and landed in an evergreen bush. When we managed a closer look it was quite clear they were no ordinary House Sparrows. These had chestnut coloured heads not unlike our Tree Sparrows but the males had very bold black arrow shaped spots on their flanks, giving a very distinct appearance. They were Spanish

Sparrows and a new species for me.

The next day we met with an English birdwatcher who had emigrated to the island some years ago and who guided us to the best places. The weather at the start was not brilliant as the wind had strengthened and it was drizzling. We were well wrapped up and the terrain now reminded me of the bare mountain tops of the Cairngorms! Despite the conditions during our first stroll around a clump of bushes our guide heard the alarm call of a warbler. This little bird soon appeared on top of a rock, giving us excellent views. It looked like a very strongly coloured


Whitethroat with a blue/grey head and dark lores contrasting with a white eye ring, which is why it is called a Spectacled Warbler.


It was during one overcast period whilst closely watching some heathery looking scrub that I noticed a long neck appear followed by another with a black stripe running down the side of its neck. This long-legged, long-necked bird was well camouflaged as its upper parts were heavily barred and matched the surrounding vegetation. This was a Houbara Bustard and top of my list of birds to see. Their courtship display is a most extraordinary sight. The male bird throws its head so far back that it is totally buried



in his back feathers while the brilliantly white breast feathers arch up, completely covering the remainder of the body. He then races around like a headless chicken. I was looking forward to witnessing this ridiculous, somewhat bizarre spectacle. Although we were right in the middle of the courtship season the birds were not displaying. Our guide explained that due to the lack of rain the birds might not breed and hence did not display and unfortunately despite the fact that it was raining it was not enough to encourage display that day or for the rest of the week.

Our next stop was in a ravine where we were hoping to find Fuerteventura's only endemic bird living on the










Although we had found many of the local rarities we were determined to find one of the more sought-after species. Our guide earlier in the week had taken us into one of its favourite habitats but due to the inclement weather we did not locate it. Later in the week the sun shone but the wind had risen to 40mph and birdwatching from inside the car seemed a very attractive idea. Our quarry was cream/yellow in colour, well camouflaged in its sandy-coloured rocky habitat. We spent a very long time scanning the landscape for movement. Then a long legged wader ran across the road in front of us with its blue/grey head held high. What a wonderful moment this was and we watched a pair of Cream-coloured Coursers running about searching and feeding for about 40 minutes, following them in our car which acted as an excellent moving hide. They occasionally took short flights showing off their black primaries and black under wings; a really dapper bird.

Fuerteventura's commonest bird was a rather plain-looking pipit called a Berthelot's Pipit named after a French naturalist who lived in the islands. It only breeds in the Canaries and Madeira but its long legs and tail gave it a wagtail appearance and being the only bird to watch on many occasions, I became rather fond of it.

The UK is at last beginning to take notice of the issue of waste and the damaging environmental effect it is having. Inspired by the pollution seen on Blue Planet 2, plastic has captured news headlines and become a prominent public concern. Manufacturers, retailers and government ministers are rushing to see how we can reduce waste and deal with what we do produce. But this deals with the symptoms, not the cause, of the problem which is the sheer volume of waste we produce.

We should want to recycle as much as possible, but we also cannot be content to do no more than just dump our paper, plastic and glass in our green boxes. The journey of waste goes well beyond the point of disposal, yet we rarely think about what happens next. Once out of sight, they are out of mind, but these materials do not cease to exist when they leave our homes.

Once collected, mixed recycling is usually sent to a sorting plant where it is separated into different waste streams. In order for the material to be of further use, the recycling has to be free of contamination - it must consist of just one type of material - or it cannot be processed into new products.

The majority of this segregated recycling is shipped abroad to places such as Malaysia, Vietnam and Taiwan. These countries have little waste management infrastructure but need cheap materials, hence they import our recyclates in huge quantities to support manufacturing. However, it is not the case that all our rubbish is transformed into new goods, considerable quantities are mishandled and end up in the ocean. This explains why 95% of ocean plastic is fed into the sea from just ten rivers across Asia and Africa.

So we are partly complicit when it comes to pollution as we are responsible for sending our waste to places not necessarily set up to handle it reliably. Plus it is exceptionally hard to track the final destination of exported materials, so often we do not know where our food wrappers or plastic bottles will end up.

China has been the single biggest market for the export of our waste and recycling for the last decade. However, recent policy reforms and economic restructuring in the country have resulted in a dramatic decline in demand for the type of low-quality recycling we currently produce in the UK. A complete ban has even been issued on certain low-grade recyclates. Waste exporters are becoming increasingly desperate to find new markets - almost invariably in developing countries.

We must stop exporting our waste problem to other, generally poorer, countries or pollution levels will inevitably increase. Next month, I will suggest some ways in which this can be done and how you can help do it.
