

## Village Precept - Vote

To keep the village precept level unchanged at £2000.00 for 2022/23

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## Proposals for distribution of funds

- St James Church £2000
- Reading Room £2000
- Labour costs to install new all-weather cricket pitch £1620
- Balance to remain in Community Fund

St James Church - £2000

The church is requesting £2000 to help towards the huge expenses of keeping the church alive and maintaining an 800 year old grade 1 listed building. Every 5 years the church is inspected by a church architect and this was carried out in October. Unsurprisingly this has revealed urgent work that needs to be carried out. The first of these is the need for a new vertical access ladder with a cage to gain access to the bell tower which is essential for maintenance – This is a matter of Health and safety. Estimates for this so far are in excess of £3500, and further quotes are being sought. The current ladder is an old wooden ladder with rot and wood worm in it with no safety whatsoever. The other major work needing attention is the removal of cement which is probably at least 50 years old, on the low level stonework round the church and has to be replaced with lime mortar. The cement is causing degradation of the stone work and should never have been put there in the first place. An estimate is that it will take a craftsman at least 3 weeks of work to sort out so the cost of that at a minimum say of £150 a day for 15 days work will be £2250, in all probability more.

The effect of carrying out these works alone will at a minimum reduce the fabric fund from £25,000 to below £20,000. It is likely that when we see the architects report (estimated 2 months from the date of his visit) there will be further items requiring attention. From the fabric fund is also paid the insurance premium for the building and that is £2215 a year.

Over and above that the cost of maintaining the fabric of the church we have to find £7085 for the quota which is paid direct to the Diocese which comes out of the general fund. Next year this is rising by 5% to £7,439. With less money from church collections in the past 2 years due to COVID this is becoming increasingly difficult to pay, not to mention the routine upkeep of the church such as oil for the boiler, boiler maintenance, electricity, fire extinguisher annual tests etc etc. The church has been very dependent upon the monies raised from village events in order to keep solvent. This in recent years has been around £2000.

It is with huge thanks to many in the village who make a personal contribution to the church that we are able to keep the church going.

Attached are the church accounts for 2021 up to the end of October.

## Reading Room - £2000

The Reading Room committee are asking for £2,000 from the village fund to keep our funds healthy after we have had the thatch roof replaced and in anticipation of other works which we will have to attend to very soon. The nature of the fabric the Reading Room means it will often require attention, but the room has improved as a building in recent years with the damp proofing of the walls and most recently the new flooring and a safer entrance with the moving of the front door.

Our funds at the moment are: - £8,000 savings account £15,032.62 current a/c.

Within the current account is the money for the thatch made up from £4250 recently received grant, £4250 matched to grant, plus £2500 contingency = £11,000. Leaving £4032.62.

### **Expenses**

£8,500.00 for thatch. (To be done in January) But we think it could end up being substantially more as the thatch has recently deteriorated so much that water is now coming into the hall and loo area. £2500 contingency has been allocated but this is likely to be an underestimate.

Probable new tin or tile roof for the lobby area (Estimated £1,500), and investigations regarding leaks.

Expenditure on the following will be needed very soon. Prices are not known yet. Roadside cob wall will need attention.

Re decorating the interior.

Looking into Loop system, microphone and therefore repairs to rear speakers as requested.

Cricket Pitch - £1620

I write to request that the next village meeting consider giving up to £1,620 towards the labour costs of a new all weather cricket pitch. I attach a formal quotation to that effect.

The last Village v Pub match was attended by something like 100 people of all ages from the village and vicinity – whether playing, having picnics, talking or just enjoying a wonderful afternoon. This village is so lucky – we have a wonderful old church, a pub, a farm shop and a reading room. So there is something for the religious, the regular, the foodie and the book worm. But there is not so much for the sports minded. I believe that such upgrade of the pitch will appeal not just to another section of the village but also to the young, whether at heart or in body, or both.

The cricket club itself charges no subscription but only a match fee for those who play. At present cash in the bank held by the cricket club totals approximately £290. There are no major projects planned for the next 12 months other than the hoped for replacement of the all weather cricket pitch costing a total of approximately £3,000.

Cricket Pitch - £1620

That hugely enjoyable Village v Pub event raised £1,300 which will cover the expected cost of materials within that figure of £3,000. A further £1,620, most of it already matched by takings from the event, is needed to pay for labour costs to prepare and lay the pitch professionally which seems sensible to ensure that the pitch can last for as many years as possible for the enjoyment of all.

As I understand it, the cricket pitch is an asset of the village kindly donated by the Street family rather than something of use to the cricket club alone. Any donation should be viewed on that basis. It will enhance village life for the benefit of all. I hope very much that the village meeting will support this request from the sums raised at the auction.





How concerned are you about climate change and its impact on biodiversity?




Do you think that the village should explore ways in which we can work together to reduce our carbon emissions and promote biodiversity?






We are all on a journey so I think education of ideas, practical solutions is key.


Do you support the idea of having a coordinated approach to promoting wild flower verges in Berwick St James?

# Survey – Other comments


Verges represent one of the best places for restoring wildflowers currently available. The fact that they are linear is a positive advantage. But they must be protected from superfluous or premature cutting and mowing.

Any verges left to become wild must not hinder views for road users when pulling out of junctions or blind corners

Fully support but **would need help** to manage our verges.

In addition to the limited number of verges we have, the 'wild' area at the back of the churchyard could also be properly managed as a wildflower area. At the moment this is an area of wasteland with as far as I can see nothing but thuggish grasses dominating. Many churchyards are havens for wildlife but this does require proper management. It would be lovely to see an insect 'hotel' in the churchyard too. I imagine there must be information on this within church circles.

Some communities have started their own community energy generation schemes where solar panels are owned by the community group and are placed on buildings such as churches or schools. These schemes require a lot of work to get started but can provide clean energy for the community. Please could you indicate your level support for such a scheme to be explored.

If we could use the church roof that would be a wonderful way to give an old building an extra relevance today. The problem may lie with its Grade 1 status although much of the roof is relatively hidden.. newith anew old


The village has a number of potential assets that could be utilised, i.e roof space on the church, or area around the church, the river - either watersource heat pump or water turbine. additional projects such as community shared heat or energy generation may need collaboration between local businesses/landowners./invest ors

# Survey – Other comments

It would be good as a village if we could all commit to using our bus service more. Only if we all use it can we then lobby for an improved service. Many villagers must be in possession of bus passes so it would be great to see the buses better used.

I would find it helpful if Berwick residents who have successfully taken measures to insulate their homes share information about who they used and how much it costs, whether there is financial support available etc. I am in principle for taking action to make houses more energy-efficient but it would be a much easier problem to tackle if we had Berwick residents recommending builders and providing more information about the process.

Information is king. Enlightening individuals as to best ideas that probably don't cost money but which could greatly help the environment should be promoted over and above a cooperative approach.

Reduce the use of bright lights outside on walls as it confuses bats and moths.
Reduce use of pesticides in gardens.
Leave it to natural predators

Better use of existing services and products offered locally such as Farm shop, local food producers, local clubs etc. Investigate potential for consider the affects of river pollution by local sewage treatment plants and also outdated private septic tank systems into the SSSI River Till






