



Melverley Parish Plan

2017



A vision for the next 5 years



Background

Melverley Civil Parish is a small community in Shropshire situated on the River Severn and the River Vyrnwy, near to the Powys (Welsh) border. At the time of the 2011 census the population of the Parish was 156.

The Parish comprises Melverley and Melverley Green as village settlements but it is overall a very rural setting. The surrounding countryside is a controlled flood area (water is allowed to flood the fields and naturally recedes when water levels in the rivers fall). Because of this, scope for housing development is minimal compared to other local areas.

In terms of facilities, there is a small but well equipped village hall (converted

from the original village school) where annual community events are held throughout the year. The Parish has a beautiful 13th century timber-framed church. Unfortunately the Parish no longer has a Methodist Chapel or pub but the Royal Hill in Edgerley is the nearest of several pubs/restaurants not far away, just over the Parish border.

The landscape is predominantly used for agriculture, but it also has a number of tourism related businesses and two wildlife areas.

The Parish has a close link to Kinnerley in terms of provision for young people, where the nearest primary school is also located. The nearest doctor's surgery is in Knockin.



Introduction

In May 2015 Melverley Parish Council decided they would like to support the production of a Parish Plan for the community and they embarked on the process of initial fact finding and formation of a steering group to take this further on their behalf.

A Parish Plan is a document which sets out a shared vision of how a community wants their Parish to develop over the next five to ten years. It will set out the aims and aspirations of residents within the Parish and will identify strengths and weaknesses through community consultation. Parish Plans have been used both locally in Shropshire, and by communities countrywide to:

- **Highlight action which can be taken**
- **Pool knowledge, skills and experience**
- **Identify aspects of the community which need to be preserved and improved**
- **Influence decisions by external stakeholders**

With help from a small grant from Shropshire Council, the steering group

which formed following the initial community event, analysed the initial feedback and undertook a programme of consultation to establish the views of local residents. This comprised a resident's questionnaire and a youth survey.

The survey data was independently analysed by staff from Shropshire Rural Communities Charity and a number of issues were highlighted. A draft Action Plan was written and presented back to the community on 9th October 2016. Following this event, and incorporating further feedback, the final Action Plan was written. This Action Plan has now been adopted by the Parish Council who will take on the responsibility to facilitate and monitor (and report back to the community) the actions to see that they are carried out, thus achieving the aspirations of the community.

Thanks go to the residents of Melverley Parish who took the time to share their views and members of the steering group who gave up their time to undertake the process. Further thanks go to Shropshire Rural Communities Charity and Shropshire Council for their advice and guidance and financial support provided.

Survey Results

Community Consultation

A total of 120 residents' questionnaires were sent out (every adult over 18 years of age) with a Freepost reply envelope and 80 were received back giving a 66.7% response rate. A separate Young People's survey was distributed and 21 were received back.

Important issues

All issues put forward in the survey ('transport and road safety', 'community identity, history and heritage', 'appearance of the Parish' and 'community safety') are important to the residents with housing being the topic where opinion appears most divided.

Improving quality of life

When asked what would improve quality of life in the Parish, not surprisingly 'access and egress during flooding' was highlighted as an important issue. Also important is the 'general state of the roads and verges'. Opinion was a little more divided regarding traffic speeds but 87.2% of respondents agreed that depth gauges on the Cilloe (Clewy) would be an improvement.

Community Identity & Communication

There appears to be good interest in an annual Parish event. As there are already a number of these e.g the Summer BBQ, perhaps this needs more investigation as to what residents would like to see.

There was some interest in a newsletter just for Meverley but as Meverley has coverage in the wider 'Telescope' publication, perhaps more can be made of this both in terms of utilisation and promotion. There appears to be scope for some improvements of the notice board but knowledge about its location and use is good.

Family life

The majority (74.7%) agree that speed and weight restrictions on through traffic would improve road safety. 65.3% of respondents would like to see a regular event for young people. Broadband is an important issue and improvement is needed. Nearly 60% of respondents thought collaboration in fundraising activities between the church and the village hall was a good thing.

Appearance

All topics mentioned in the survey get good support ('improved signs and signs cleaned more regularly', 'reduction of litter', 'planting of trees, plants and wild flowers', reduction in fly tipping'). The community clearly cares about their area.

Community Safety & Security

Just a small minority don't feel safe walking about the roads or are concerned for their personal safety and possessions. There is already a Neighbourhood Watch (NP) Scheme in the area and many respondents indicated that they would join this scheme. Opinion is divided about police presence but many would like to meet their Community Safety Officer (many don't know who they are).

Environment

There was good interest in wildlife protection (77.2%) but quite a few respondents don't know where the reserves are. There was also good interest (64.1%) in improvements to rights of way. Respondents appear to be happy with the frequency of waste collection but have expressed interest in further recycling options.

General Community Aspects

There was some interest in further (affordable) housing, commercial development and tourism in the area. Whilst the Parish Council can be supportive, it is up to individual residents to take these aspects forward. Respondents showed some interest in history and heritage.

Local Awareness

There is scope for better information sharing on the membership of the Parish Council and when and where their meetings are.

Young people

It appears that the youngsters of the Parish appreciate the peace and quiet of the area as much as the older residents do. The interests of those who responded lie in country pursuits and they generally feel safe living in the Parish. However, they too indicated that road safety is an issue. General consensus was that there isn't enough to do and they would like more facilities and activities for them. Only one of them thinks they will move away when they become an adult, the rest would consider staying in the area if it was possible.
