Tour de Yorkshire

I hope you will all be excited by the announcement of the Tour de Yorkshire passing through your parish on Friday 28th April next year. You can see the route detail here.

You can zoom into the map for more detail. At this stage, we understand that this year the whole route will be televised and that there will be a 20 vehicle sponsorship 'caravan' ahead of the race. We don't yet know the timings, but I suspect it will be coming through Ryedale in the early afternoon.

Clearly a lot of planning goes into hosting a successful day and to ensure that spectators remain safe, have sufficient parking, and stay around locally to boost the economy of the area, both on the day and into the future. We also look to minimise disruption to all the businesses along the route with their day to day business.

We also encourage communities and schools to join the fun and excitement by 'dressing the route' and encouraging children to engage with various pre race activities and line the route on the day.

CPAD "How do we address the 'lone rescuer' situation"?



In about 30% of cases, the rescuer is alone with the patient, and will be told to stay with the patient by the ambulance service. In this instance how do you get the defibrillator? CHT has developed the VETSTM scheme (Village Emergency Telephone System) to aid communities in this type of rescue. Using telephone technology, a village has a single emergency number they can ring if required to alert up to 10 volunteers to bring the defib, or otherwise assist. This has to be activated by the rescuer and not by the ambulance service (currently). The cost of this is a fixed price per year.

Slingsby and Marton are part of it, I think it's about 100 pounds a year.

Coneysthorpe Table Tennis Club

Swinton Reading Rooms based York & District Table Tennis League Division 1 teams Coneysthorpe A and B have experienced mixed fortunes during the first half of the 2016/2017 season.

Coneysthorpe A,

League winners for the last seven consecutive seasons, are determined to equal the post war record of eight recorded by "Sessions A" between 1996/97 and 2003/4.

Unless something totally unforeseen occurs in the next three months, such as a total loss of form or long term illness, Coneysthorpe A, who presently have accrued 106 points from eleven matches, will undoubtedly achieve their target. Their nearest challengers York RI A are twenty points behind (each set won in a match counts as a point).

Martin Lowe and James Rule have continued where they left off last season, still undefeated with 33 set wins to their name, whilst colleague Ashley Hodgson has only lost one set from 24 played.

By contrast, Coneysthorpe B have struggled somewhat, yet have generally remained competitive. Joel Wright (16 wins from 33 sets) and Paul Young (11 wins from 21 sets) are the mainstays, but fielding a reasonably reliable third player remains a problem, particularly now that Chris Londesbrough and Charlie Allott have announced their unavailability for virtually the rest of the season.

Coneysthorpe B are currently in sixth place out of eight with 40 points, fifteen better than York RI B who are in the play off with the Division 2 runners up position.

Clarence B with 17 points already look doomed to automatic relegation.

In the first round of the Shepherd Handicap Trophy, Coneysthorpe A and B teams successfully negotiated their way through to the next round with well earned victories. Not so for Coneysthorpe C who now must partake in the Machell Handicap Trophy open to first round losers."

REQUEST FOR POLICE ASSISTANCE

HMRC and Apple gift card fraud

Fraudsters are continuing to request victims to purchase Apple iTunes gift cards as a means of payment for unpaid taxes to Her Majesty Revenues and Customs (HMRC). The fraudsters are using the following contact methods to defraud people:

• Voicemails:

Scams.

Fraudsters are leaving victims automated voicemails stating they owe HMRC unpaid taxes. When victims call back on the number provided, they are told that there is a warrant out for their arrest, unless they make payment via iTunes Vouchers.

Spoofed calls:

Fraudsters are cold calling victims using a spoofed 0300 200 3300 number and convincing them that they owe unpaid tax to HMRC.

• Text messages:

Fraudsters are sending text messages requesting victims to urgently call back on the number provided. When victims call back, they are told that there is a case being built against them for an outstanding debt and they must pay immediately.

Fraudsters are using iTunes gift cards to collect money from victims because they can be easily redeemed and sold on. The scammers don't need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to read out the serial code on the back over the phone to them.

Payment diversion alert Fraudsters are emailing members of the public who are expecting to make a payment for property repairs. The fraudsters will purport to

be a tradesman who has recently completed work at the property and use a similar email address to that of the genuine tradesman. They will ask for funds to be transferred via bank transfer.

Once payment is made the victims of the scam soon realise they have been deceived when the genuine tradesman requests payment for their services.

4 dangerous WhatsApp scams you need to know about.

As WhatsApp adds its billionth user, take a look at some of the common scams and tricks virtual conmentry using the messaging service. You just need to con a tiny fraction of these users to make serious money. Fraudsters using WhatsApp often try to persuade you to hand over details that can be used in identity theft, such as your name and address. Other scams will try to install malware, malicious software on your phone. This effectively spies on you and collects information that can be used for sinister purposes. A third type of tricksters just starts charging you for services that should be free.

Migrant Helpline' email scam

Fraudsters are sending out a high number of phishing emails to personal and business email addresses purporting to be from 'Migrant Helpline'. The email address sending the majority of emails is <u>noreply@yeshivadonations.c</u>

<u>om</u>.

Although Migrant Helpline is a genuine charity, fraudsters are using it to trick members of the public into becoming victims of this fraud.

It should be noted that this fraud is in no way related to the real charity. The subject line currently is Thank you for choosing to donate to Migrant helpline'

The message body reads as the following:

Thanks again for donating; we're sending it straight to Migrant Helpline so you'll be making a difference very soon. Your donation details: First name: ****

Last name: ****

Tel. ******** Amount: *f*,196

Donation Reference: 09493495 If you have any questions about your donation, please follow this link and download Your (Donation Reference 09493495), with the transaction details listed above.

February

Spring is in sight.

This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase.

There's plenty to do indoors this month to prepare for the season ahead.

Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs and climbers, such as *Wisteria* as well as evergreen hedges.

Top 10 jobs this month

1. Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover.

2. Chit potato tubers.

3. Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches.

4. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off.

5. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering.

6. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'.


