THORNEY SPOTTINGS (12) – Janet Collins

This is the season of 'ups' and 'downs', though not necessarily in that order. Following shortly after the last article, Dick reported that the robin family in his hedge had come to a disastrous end. This was followed by the demise of one of the female mallards in our garden. She was found under a shrub with her head over her shoulder, looking as though she had died in her sleep.

Problems that lead to these kinds of situations are fairly common. The robin family may have suffered from the death of one parent, and the remaining parent was unable to provide sufficient food for the family and her/himself. The female mallard was probably one of the weaker members of a group. When the group visits a feeding station, provided by generous villagers or naturally, and is disturbed for some reason the weaker members of the group are always the ones to miss out on a full feed – if they manage to get anything at all. They will not stay to eat, but will leave with the rest of the group, with results such those detailed above if it happens too often. This is particularly true running into spring when they are trying to build up for the breeding season. It seems particularly sad when they have come through the harsh winter period unscathed.

But on to happier situations! The wood anemones were in full bloom along the edges of several woodland areas in Thorney from mid-April. These delicate white flowers with obvious yellow anthers are also known as 'wind flowers', which is supposed to be because they open most frequently when the wind is blowing. Presumably, this is because pollination is by the wind rather than by insects.

About the same time, brimstone butterflies were on the wing. The sulphur-yellow males, with their distinctive curved wings, are easily spotted, but the females, which appear slightly later, can easily be mistaken for cabbage white butterflies. However, the time of year should be a giveaway, as they are usually several weeks later.

By late April (about 28th April for me) the first cuckoo was heard and the first house martins were arriving. The swifts were not long in following. It seems strange to me that they seem to appear and then disappear altogether for a while. Stan has told us in the past that if you look closely you will notice they reappear at dusk, to take up residence where they intend to nest. Certainly, there were a number of martins building their muddy homes on several eaves along Main Street by early May. Where the swifts are nesting, I have no idea. Do you?

This year there seem to be more pied wagtails about than usual. In particular, I have noticed them on the roof of the old village hall, and along Roundwood Road and Drinsey Nook. The red-legs were introduced as a game bird in the 1700's and have become very common in the east of England. Plenty of arable land for them here.

Orange tips have been spotted in several of the lanes around Thorney since mid-May, so there must have been plenty of garlic mustard in the hedgerows by that time. This is the vegetation the orange tips need for egg laying purposes. By the way, this strong-stemmed plant with small white flowers is not a member of the garlic family; it is actually a member of the cabbage family. So perhaps there **were** cabbage white butterflies about this month! I love watching that rapid bobbing of their tail. It's like somebody rapping on a table while deciding what to do next!

The skylarks have been singing away above the fields around Grange Lane since early May, if not before. They are the only bird that sings while ascending almost vertically, and are more frequently spotted by their singing, even though 'spotted' isn't necessarily accurate. There have been a number of red-legged partridge around the same area. It's a shame there do not seem to be any common partridge around.

George Townsend

Private 3632, 3/4th Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment

George Dixon Townsend was born in Harby on 4th September 1894, son of William and Hannah Townsend, though his 29 year-old mother Hannah (nee Dixon) died during his childbirth and was buried 7th September 1894 in All Saints' churchyard. George was baptised in All Saints' church on 7th October 1894 and appears to have been raised by his paternal aunt and uncle, George and Emma Maplethorpe in Wellingore. George was back in Harby for the 1911 census, recorded as a Gardener's Labourer, aged 16, living with his father at Littleworth on Church Road.

George enlisted on 23rd March 1915, though his military career was short-lived, as by 30th October 1915 he'd been diagnosed with an aortic aneurysm and was discharged on 14th February 1916 as medically unfit for service.

He died in late May 1916 aged 21 years old and was buried 2nd June 1916 in an unmarked grave in All Saint's churchyard.

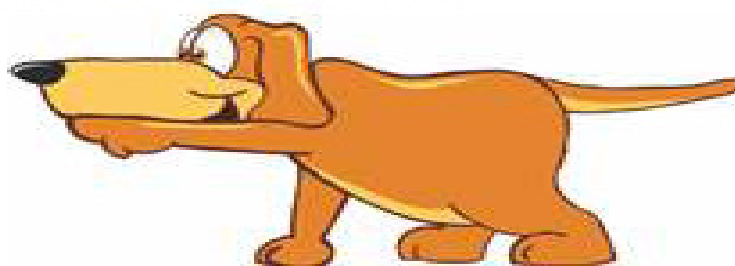

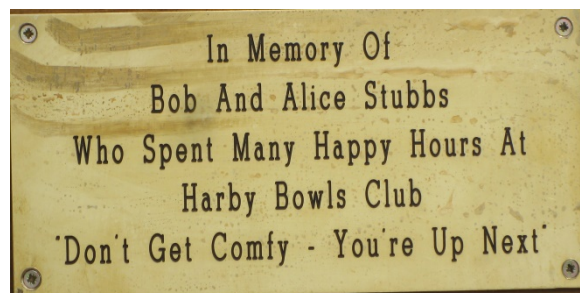

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome the local new members to the club and hope they enjoy the game.

HARBY HISTORY GROUP – Louise Herrick 703662

In March, returning guest speaker, Charles Parker, once again gave us an interesting and enjoyable presentation, this time on the “Development of Humberside Airport”. Not only was it a history of the airport in question, but a social history of aviation in general from the first commercial flights to the present day, and also included pictures of specific pilots and aeroplanes that had visited the airport, including Concorde & Jackie Stewart’s private plane.

April’s meeting was a trip to visit the Laxton 3 field system. As the name suggests the 3 fields are used for crop rotation. The system also is the last remaining open field farming in the country. The fields are still farmed in strips & rented to different farmers within each field.

We met in the visitor centre where there was a small display of artefacts and a large map showing the area. We watched a 20 minute film on how the system works including the jury who has to check that no one is farming more than their fair share of land.

Our host, Stuart Rose, who is one of these farmers, then took us on a walking tour. He showed us old animal enclosures, old farm buildings and explained what each part would be used for, the church, the old manor house site that was in a motte and bailey style and of course the field system itself.

Regrettably, the planned trip to Darlton Manor on 25 May has been cancelled as they are currently undergoing major building works following chimney damage. We have, however booked a guest speaker, Graeme Wade, who will give a talk with slides about “Canals-From the Trent to the Wash” which will cover the area from Torksey to Boston.

The trip on 29 June to Lincoln Stonebow and Guildhall is still to go ahead. This will include a tour and sight of the mayoral regalia. There is no cost but donations to the Mayor’s Charity are invited. Please let me know if you’d like to attend by phoning.

After the summer break we will be back in the village hall lounge again on 28 September with returning guest speaker Paul Croft who is a heritage conservation expert. He will be sharing his latest work news with us. He provides a slide show and sometimes has items to show us as well. He is a popular guest of the group and we look forward to seeing him again. From the September meeting, the cost to attend will rise from £1 to £2 per person, due to increasing costs of speakers and the need to pay for the hall.

The second edition of the Harby History Book is getting closer to being finished. Before we send it to the printers it would be useful to know how many copies we are likely to sell initially so we can judge how many we will have left in stock for the future. I’d be grateful if anyone who is interested in buying a copy could let me know. This doesn’t commit you but would be really useful to us for the reason already mentioned.

Meetings are on the last Wednesday of the month in the village hall lounge and unless specified start at 7:30 pm. £1 entry for the May meeting and £2 from September. Everyone is welcome. Steve Hogg and the London Marathon

On the 24th of April I attempted to achieve one of my bucket list actions by running the London marathon. On a chilly but nice Sunday morning I set off from Greenwich park with 39,500 other men,women,dragons,Spongebobs, and rhinos to attempt to run 26 ish miles. 3 hours 39 minutes and 44 secs later I crossed the finish line and achieved my aim.

Due to the generosity of so many people, I also managed to raise £4,491 pounds for **Children with Cancer**, a fantastic charity set up by Marion and Eddie Gorman following the tragic death of their two children in the same year from Leukaemia. Since 1988, with the help of this charity, childhood survival rates for Leukaemia are now 90%.

The day of the marathon was a fantastic experience. The crowds lined the entire run, cheering, singing, drinking, offering Jelly babies and orange segments and creating an atmosphere where, although you knew they weren't cheering for you individually, it actually felt that they were.

I had trained to try and achieve a time of 3 hours 45 minutes so I was happy with my time but paid for it the next day or two. I was very grateful I lived in a bungalow as I had completely lost the ability to use my legs to climb up or down stairs. The training was hard but I would say to anyone with the slightest interest in entering the London Marathon to give it a go, it really is one of the most fantastic experiences you can have.

So for the last time, I would like to thank every single one of you who helped with the ball, bought the tickets, sponsored me and encouraged and pushed me. The fantastic hamper that was donated as a prize to be awarded to the person who guessed the time I ran it in, was won by Adam and Katie Walker who got within 2 seconds of my time.

I am hoping to put on another ball next year and am looking for another challenge. If my little old legs hold up I am hoping to run Hadrian's Wall,69 miles long so watch this space. Cheers, Steve Hogg.

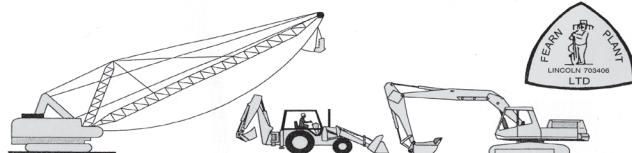
