

#### **MALTHOUSE WELL**

It doesn't take a genius to work out that this year we have had a lot more rain than normal. In fact, September surpassed itself when an amazing 216mm of rain fell. This is about 345% higher than the average for this month. Fortunately, October has been kinder to us and its rainfall has been around 70-75mm, which is around average for the month.

This year's rainfall has had two main effects on the Malthouse well water level. Firstly, it hasn't dropped as low as usual during the summer months. In fact, it bottomed out at the beginning of October around 14.5 meters below ground level. This is about 2.2 metres higher than last year's low point. Secondly it has started to rise about a month earlier than last year.

At the beginning of November, the Malthouse water level stands around 13.5 metres below ground level. This means we will have to hope that November, December, January, and February are kind to us in terms of rainfall if we are to avoid any water problems in the February / March next year.

#### THE ILSLEYS' NEWSLETTER

This term, we have been thankful for nine new pupils at our school! The Ilsleys have had 6 children join in foundation and 3 into different year groups. We were very pleasantly surprised with how quickly all of the children have settled in to the school environment and made new friends.

On Friday 28th September, we had a MacMillan coffee morning where we sold tea, coffee, freshly grown school tomatoes, cakes and biscuits with the help of our Year 6s. We were surprised to find out that we made a total of £136 for the amazing charity, thanks to all of the donations made by parents, grandparents and students.

Very kindly, Bucklebury Farm came to visit Reception and Year 1s with some of their animals. They learnt about baby animals and what their names were such as horses, when they are babies, are called foals. They were able to stroke guinea pigs and rabbits and they thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience.

On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> October, the whole school took part in a sponsored walk to raise money for the Dogs' Trust charity. When the children had completed the walk, our Year 6s and the teachers helped set up activities for everyone to play like: guess the name of the teddy and guess how many dog treats are in the jar. Some children and parents donated for the sponsored walk and the children paid with donations to play the games. Overall, we raised a grand total of £263 for the Dogs' Trust.

Recently, some of the children have joined a rock music club with a company called IRock. In this club, the children are put into their own bands and they get to choose the instrument they would like to play, as well as what song they would perform, which they were very excited about. At the end of the term, they will be able to perform their talent to all of the pupils, teacher and parents.

On 8<sup>th</sup> October, parents came in to look at their child's books to see all the hard work they have done over the past weeks. This is also a chance to have a chat with the teacher if parents would like to. We also had an Open Morning for upcoming students and parents to look around the school as they may be joining our school in September 2025.

As some of you may know, it was recently harvest festival and our school likes to celebrate this by having

a special assembly where we sing songs and thank farmers and food producers for the harvest. Children bring in donations for our local food bank so we can offer our support to those who are less fortunate than

At the beginning of October, one of our pupil's parents was kind enough to bring in their tractor and they let us look around it, sit in it and ask questions about the equipment. Our students and teachers were very grateful for their generosity and our younger class (Year 1 and Reception) learned a lot more about their topic.

The whole school were a part of a big Black History Month assembly online with many other children from all over the country. It was presented by a 13-year-old who is an inspiration to many young people. We then created our own artwork to represent a person who inspires us.

On Friday the 18<sup>th</sup> of October, the children were very lucky to have a sportsman called Ryan Raghoo come and visit. He held a record for running. Ryan told the school about his life and how he went from being left out in school because of his disability, to a world champion. He taught each class the rules of wheelchair basketball and even got them to play it. The children had lots of fun playing against each other as if it were the Olympics!

Pacific Class have recently had a Stone Age Day where they learnt a lot of new things about what happened in that era. They even got to make their own Stone Age village using clay, sticks, hot glue, cardboard, card and paper. At the end of the day, they were extremely happy with the results. When they had finished, they even got to weave baskets which would have been made in the Stone Age. The class enjoyed this thoroughly!

For the next Stay and Play, the theme will be Toy Story, so the children can have lots of fun while you can enjoy a nice cup of tea or coffee. 

# HELP REQUIRED TAKING RESIDENTS TO THEIR MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS

You may have heard of the Downland Volunteer Group (DVG) or even used our service. We are a registered charity set up in 1986 to help residents in the Downland villages attend their medical appointments at surgeries, hospitals, dentists etc in the surrounding area. The residents we support are mainly the older members of our community, but we are here for anyone unable to drive or get transport to their appointments. In the period April 2023 to March 2024, we made nearly 1,000 such trips. We are one of a number of volunteer groups around the country assisting the NHS and the local community especially where public transport is limited

#### **Car Drivers**

Could you spare a few hours each month? The demand for driving residents in our area to their medical appointments is increasing as the NHS tries to clear

the backlog of appointments. We need volunteer drivers, using their own cars to take patients to the surgeries, dentists or hospitals in our area. As a volunteer



driver you can claim 50p per mile, tax free, whilst transporting a patient.

#### **Office Volunteers**

Could you spare two hours a couple of times a month? We need volunteers in our office in the Compton surgery which is open Monday to Friday from 9.30am to 11.30am. If you are happy dealing with telephone requests for transport to medical appointments, we would love to hear from you.

Volunteer work is rewarding for both the volunteer and those we help. If you can spare some time and want to help others, do please contact us.
