

Parish Council Report

The appearance of spring bulbs poking through around the Recreation Ground heralds the ebb of winter, and indeed the last few months of the current Parish Council term. With this in mind, we will be setting our focus on completing some key projects in this time. Supporting the delivery of the Neighbourhood Planning Statement is our biggest priority, which has reached the significant milestone of a first draft, so many thanks to the NPS team, steered by excellent co-ordination (and delicately applied pressure) from Sue Powell. Keep up the amazing work everyone!

Elsewhere in the parish, we have been considering several planning applications - the latest in a recent series of diverse proposals, including ones relating to some of the Listed buildings of the parish. With the additional information required to support Listed Buildings planning consent, these have given us all some new and interesting insights to the heritage of our village and also helped us to understand how the balance between protecting that heritage and allowing buildings to evolve and remain cherished homes is developed during the application process.

Commenting on planning applications is one of the key areas of Parish Council responsibility, but it's also important to remember that the wider community has the opportunity to take part in the process by making comments on applications as well. As we are all no doubt aware, there is considerable pressure around this area for development that has the potential to impact our village. As we head into our final months, the current PC has only a few meetings left. If you're interested in potentially getting involved as a Councillor yourself or want to find out about current goings-on, please do come along and see us soon!

What is a Parish Councillor - Sarah Elvy

When I stood for election as a councillor on MPC, I did so because I knew all our councillors were standing down and I wanted to ensure Moulsoford had representation. Having been inactive on the volunteering side in the village since coming off the MEC some 10 years previously, my motivation was simply to give something back.

Over the last 4 years, I have been well-educated on what's important here and have a greater understanding of how our many volunteers help keep Moulsoford in good shape, a warm, engaging community, well represented at local level. Of course, there have been good experiences (many) and not so good (strengthening apparently!) but throughout I've benefited from a supportive community of councillors, both current and past, who have shared counsel and experience and lent an ear from time to time.

We all know that the parish council has little power in the district but it does have influence, so maintaining our local voice on matters impacting our lives is important. Our current participation with the NPS pilot scheme was undertaken in that spirit. It will be taken into account by SODC and developers when looking at new and existing projects. It provides an insight into what makes Moulsoford unique, what we seek to preserve and what we want to enhance. And it's an evolving document which can be updated and expanded in future years to help councillors at parish and district levels make well-informed, consistent judgements in the future. It's needed a lot of work and that's still ongoing, but it's an important document for Moulsoford and something I'm very pleased to have played a part in.

The Queens Green Canopy

250 Jubilee Citizen trees were planted at Wittenham Clumps last Friday (2 Dec) as part of the Queens Green Canopy Oxfordshire.

New British citizens living in Oxfordshire were offered the opportunity to donate a tree for planting on their behalf. This was part of the Queens Green Canopy Platinum Jubilee earlier in the year. Since the start of the programme in February 825 trees have been donated.

Following the wishes of His Majesty the King upon the passing of Her majesty, the initiative has been extended until the end of March 2023 to allow more people to plant trees in memoriam.



Council Renews its Commitment to the Armed Forces

As a Military Champion for Oxfordshire I am delighted OCC have renewed their commitment to our armed forces as a new law comes into place.

The Armed Forces Covenant, which I signed in 2011 is a voluntary 'promise from the nation' that those serving or have served in the armed forces (and their families) should be treated fairly and not disadvantaged in their day-to-day lives.

Oxfordshire is home to

25% of the UK's RAF personnel and 49% of RAF Reservists

50% of UK Army logistics capacity

2,200 cadets across various units including Sea Scouts

6,500 recipients of armed forces pension/compensation

We also have five major military bases including RAF Benson an important part of this Devision.

We encourage all organisations and businesses to consider how they can uphold the ambitions of the Armed Forces Covenant and support Oxfordshires armed forces community.

Traffic Restrictions in Oxford

The ruling administration at its Cabinet meeting last week pushed ahead with its trial for six new 'Bus Gates' whereby car owners will be restricted to the number of journeys they can make into Oxford. This comes on top of road closures in the form of Low Traffic neighbourhoods (LTNs) and Zero Emission Zones.

You will be aware from local and national media these divisive schemes are causing much concern amongst residents and business owners.

£73,000 has already been spent repairing vandalized plastic bollards used in the LTNs. Steel bollards are now to be installed at a cost of £100,000 after the 'unprecedented levels of vandalism'.

The Conservative Opposition are questioning the vast sums of money being poured into these unpopular schemes, while rural residents are complaining that budgets for some highway matters, footpath repair, etc. are inadequate or experiencing long delays.

Motorcycle Speeding/Noise Issues

Motorcycle noise and speeding issues continue to be a concern for residents living along the A4074 and I am delighted Matthew Barber and his team at Thames Valley Police are meeting residents from a number of parishes to discuss their concerns. I had a meeting (12 Dec) to discuss a strategy for the A4074 corridor at which I raised feedback from residents and look forward to working with TVP where possible.

Spring is around the corner and planning is under way for the social season ahead.

A highlight this year is going to be the very special occasion of the King's Coronation on Sunday 7th May at our Pavilion. The full timetable and itinerary will be made known in April's Moulsford News but rest assured it will be a glorious celebration of our new Monarch.

On to more regular matters, our next event is the village Quiz night on Friday 24th March with fish and chips (but bring your own booze, or stay sharper with alcohol free perhaps?). You can set up a team or indeed join one for this great community event, just call Twinks for details on 01491 651548.

It feels that Easter will be with us quicker than we think, so keep in mind the kids Easter egg hunt on Easter Sunday morning, meet by the Pavilion 10.30am to find out what the Easter bunny has left around the Recreation Ground.

Our first summer Social will be the popular Bangers and Bubbles on Friday 21st April, and we are then aiming to run all Fridays thereafter for the season.

Keep Friday June 16th free subject to confirmation we hope to run the village boat trip again; full details to follow in April's Moulsford News.

Last, but definitely not least, myself and the Events Committee would like to say a very big Thank-you to Rob Longden, who is stepping down from the committee after many years, following a recent move out of the parish. Rob has been a rock on the events and without him at times it would have been a struggle to get the Friday nights going particularly with the beer logistics, so we raise a glass for Rob: cheers!

With Rob's departure and a busy season ahead, we are keen to find fresh volunteers to join and help out on the committee or lend a valuable hand. It's a great way of helping your community and maintaining one of the key things that makes Moulsford so special. 

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

Gardening Diary

Hello! This month I have been planting some lovely things. First I planted some shallots. They are one of my favorite vegetables, especially for cooking. I think I planted around 10-15 bulbs at the front of my bed. I didn't water them, because it is currently raining enough to keep them hydrated. I hope they grow well, because they are really yummy. I have also planted some peas. These took up around a third of my bed. In our family bed I planted some red onions on one side. My dad planted broad beans and peas. In our big shared bed, we are going to stagger planting our peas so that we don't get them all at once, because then we won't be able to eat them all at once! We also prepared some pots of soil for peppers and tomatoes, which are currently inside, warming up before we plant the seeds. I think that's all for now. Bye!


