VILLAGE FUNDING

After discussions with various village fund raisers I've pulled together some figures to get the overall picture of the funds needed by the following village organisations/facilities – the church, tennis court, evergreens, under 5s, play area and village hall.

Broadly, the total annual running costs of our village organisations/facilities exceed their income by about £7,500 per annum. Unless they are going to dig into any reserves they may have to fund future running costs until those reserves are exhausted, the deficit needs to be made up somehow.

Historically, fundraising events are the way in which this has been done, organised by the individual groups to fundraise for their facility. However, several people have commented that the responsibility falls on very few shoulders which are beginning to droop and they also find themselves in competition with each other for dates and types of events which will draw the

most money. Also, fundraising isn't that efficient – I suggest that to raise £100 of funds for a cause the event attendees probably have to spend £200. Raising £7,500 per annum would actually cost about £15,000 per annum. I estimate that there's a core of about sixty people in the village who attend most fundraisers, so that means they'd have to spend about £250 per annum each on events to raise the money. That seems a lot to me, and would also mean rather a lot of fundraising events to attend which means it probably isn't achievable.

Similarly, some rough figures on necessary future capital projects indicate that in the next few years we'll have to find over £70,000 which if raised only by fundraising would mean expenditure by each of those core 60 of at least another £250 per annum. So is there an easier and more reliable way to fund the village? I think so. One suggestion is that adding the money onto the rates precept would spread the cost amongst a greater number of people (I'm guessing about 200) and by giving the money directly to the facilities rather than having to spend out for the "entertainment" part of a fundraising event, the average sum paid by each person would be far less – under £40 per annum per adult for ongoing costs, plus about £40 per annum to meet future capital expenditure.

So what do you think? The parish council have agreed to have this topic on the agenda of the September meeting and I hope that everyone with any interest in the future of our village facilities will attend to join in the discussion so that we can try to find a way forward.

INITIAL FEEDBACK ON THE CHURCH QUESTIONNAIRE

We would like to thank the 33 people who took the time to respond to the church questionnaire that was sent out at the end of last year. As you can imagine, replies were varied and often conflicting but we thought you would like to know the highlights, so please read on.

More people than not (over 60%) believe there should be a church in West Ilsley, whether as an active and integral part of the community or just as a beautiful old building which should be looked after for generations to come. Over 69% feel All Saints is a spiritual place, while over 78% would happily take a friend there.

There were numerous reasons given as to why some don't attend church regularly: these include other commitments, a desire for more 'relevant' and child-friendly services, as well as a need for better publicity for services. It is felt by some that 'the church' should help with social needs in the community by home visiting and care for the elderly, although the latter is seen as something everyone in West Ilsley should help with. It was good to hear that you believe the church and churchyard are well maintained and that our social events help to support the community. However, some feel there is too much emphasis on fundraising and where an event was organised, it should be priced to include the whole community. Others want more of a focus on spiritual needs and outreach, while groups and services for children and young people are also seen as important. The question about using the church building for other purposes if it had better facilities received conflicting replies, with 41% saying a definite 'no', 17% concerned about the detrimental effect on the village hall, but around 42% saying 'yes' or 'yes for some purposes'.

Obviously, with so many conflicting replies, it would be very difficult for the church community to easily or quickly come up with answers to satisfy everyone. However, we are beginning the process of making small, but hopefully, not too

insignificant changes, which will prove that as a church, we would like to be inclusive and empathetic to community needs.

- All Saints does have two child-friendly services a month, on the first and fourth Sundays at 9.30am and 11am respectively, which we hope you will bring your family to whenever possible. Children are also particularly encouraged to attend special services, such as Pet Services and Mothering Sunday services, as well as services at Harvest, Christmas and Easter.
- We are planning to put more obvious notices about services outside the church, as well as in the pub to advertise all our services. There is also a list of services on the board in the lych-gate and in the WIN every month, as well as on the website at www.eastdownland.org.uk
- If anyone would like a weekly email, to include times of services as well as a sheet with other news and notices for the benefice on, please ring (01635) 281625 or email eastdownland@btinternet.com
- As some of you may already know, our new associate priest, Douglas Dales, has taken on the mission of visiting people within the benefice. We also now have a trained benefice visiting team which is able to undertake regular visiting in addition to the clergy. If you know anyone in particular who would like a visit, please contact either Douglas direct on (01635) 247404 or one of the church wardens (Ian 281625 & Alexandra 281306).
- Whilst our regular Children's Church was suspended last year through lack of children attending, it could be reinstated if there is a demand for it.
- Our social events continue to attract a core of people within the community. In response to the request in the questionnaire for event pricing to be inclusive for the whole community we held our free Community Lunch in February, thus intended to be accessible to everyone in the village but the numbers attending suggested that such an event was not particularly sought-after.
- Much as we would like not to have to 'fundraise', unfortunately it is an important way of obtaining the money we need to maintain and run All Saints. We are indebted to those who kindly donate, especially on a regular basis, to our funds. The planned giving in 2012 was, however, barely 37% of what was needed to pay for the running of our church (annual costs, excluding unexpected repairs, in 2013 will be approximately £11,000). The remainder of our receipts, from collections and one-off donations, as well as

from social events, are always an unknown quantity, so it is difficult to plan ahead. As we receive no money from the government we are reliant on the generous gifts of others.

Further discussion and feedback relating to the questionnaire will continue to take place and we hope that this will enable you to be more engaged with the life of the church.



Neighbourhood

From Neighbourhood Officer PC Matthew Allen. The latest crime statistics can be found by visiting www.police.uk ([opens new window](#)). This website provides you with helpful information about crime and policing in your area. Enter your postcode, town, village or street into the search box, and get instant access to street-level crime maps and data, as well as details of the neighbourhood police team and 'Have Your Say Events'. The level of crime and anti-social behaviour in the area remains below average compared with the rest of England and Wales. The crime rate in your neighbourhood for the period April to May 2013 inclusive as opposed to the same period in 2012

has reduced by 13%, with burglaries down by over 35%.

The neighbourhood has three priorities; rural crime, speeding, and anti social behaviour & criminal damage in Upper Bucklebury. If you do have some concerns about crime or disorder in the Bucklebury & Downlands neighbourhood please email me at the address below or call me on the non emergency number for Thames Valley Police, 101.

I have started carrying out speed enforcement across the neighbourhood in the last few weeks, which will now be a regular part of my duties. In the villages that I have undertaken enforcement, a lot of the drivers that I have issued tickets to have lived in neighbouring ones so it is important that we remember to keep an eye on our speed and what we wouldn't want in our own village we don't inflict on others.

The mobile police station is coming to a street near you and gives you the chance to meet your local police team and discuss any issues you may have. It will be out and about on the 7th September.

All farmers and land owners are advised to remain vigilant to the possibility of unlicensed music events (Raves) being organised on their land.

Please be alert to any of the following rave related activity:

- Removal of locks from secured access points.
- Vehicles particularly panel vans or larger driving off road.
- Groups of vehicles congregating in rural areas.
- Convoys of vehicles.
- Loud music from remote areas.

By receiving early warnings Thames Valley Police has a much better chance of disrupting the rave and dispersing those responsible for its organisation.

As the summer holidays are fast approaching, many of us are thinking of going away. It is important to ensure preventative measures are taken to deter opportunist burglars.

Break-ins are likely to take place in the summer months, by opportunist burglars looking for insecure windows and doors, so leaving your doors unlocked, even while you're in the garden or upstairs, is taking a risk. The most important thing is that you lock your doors and don't become complacent. It only takes a second for someone to get into your home and take things without you noticing.

Please make sure you report all crimes and any instances of anti social behaviour to Thames Valley Police so we can deal accordingly. Too often we are receiving calls from your parish councilors of incidents that should be reported to the police and too much time has passed by to be able to deal effectively.
