

Grafty Gourmet

I had some friends round for dinner last weekend, and they all asked if they could have this recipe. I think they may have had too much wine though ! So I said I would put it in this months magazine. Its again, a very simple but very tasty meal. Serve with potatoes and veg, or chips if you prefer.

Filet Steaks with Brandy Cream Sauce Serves 2

2 x 1 to 1-1/4-inch-thick pieces fillet beef (about 7-1/2 ounces each) Salt and freshly ground black pepper 1 tablespoon unsalted butter 3 tablespoons finely chopped shallots 1/4 cup brandy 1/2 cup beef stock 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard 1/2 cup double cream 1/2 to 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice

1. Season each steak generously with salt and pepper. Ensure that steaks are at room temperature, and not straight from the fridge. Heat a heavy-based (preferably cast-iron) frying pan on a high heat. Test by touching the edge of one steak to the pan surface; it will sizzle briskly when ready. Immediately drop in the steaks and sear one side for 2 minutes. Flip the steaks and sear the other side for 2 to 3 minutes. Cook for longer if you prefer your steaks more "well done". Remove the steaks to a

warmed plate and let them rest, covered loosely with foil, while you make the sauce.

2. To make the pan sauce: Return the unwashed pan to medium heat. Add the butter and let it melt. Add the shallots and cook, stirring, until tender, 1 to 2 minutes. Add the brandy and stir with a wooden spoon, scraping up any browned bits stuck to the pan. Add the stock and Worcestershire sauce, raise the heat to medium high, and bring to a boil. Whisk in the mustard and then the cream. Continue to cook at a boil, stirring, until reduced to a sauce consistency, 3 to 5 minutes. Taste the sauce and season with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Serve the steaks with the sauce.

Village Hall News www.graftygreenvillagehall.co.uk

The **Village Hall AGM** was held last month. It was disappointing that no one new offered themselves as potential committee members, but the existing stalwarts all agreed to serve for another year and so the committee continues to comprise myself, Carol Hulm, Robert Turner, Sue Burch, Liz Burgess, Stefi Graziola, Sandra Pilborough, Jacky Simmons, Jacqui Thompson and John & Angela Thompson.

Robert continues as our Treasurer but Sue will take over from Carol as our secretary, enabling Carol to concentrate on the annual fete and our links with the local community. We already have the above website, of course, but would like to develop more of a presence on Facebook, and perhaps launch an interactive page for the village, where news could be exchanged between individuals, 'sales & wants' advertised, neighbourhood watch items published, etc. If you would be interested in getting involved in this, do contact Carol, whose details will continue to appear on the first page of this magazine as she also remains the Hall Booking Secretary.

Continuing the 'digital' theme, we agreed at the AGM to invest in **Wi-Fi for the Hall**. We believe this will benefit existing hirers and encourage new ones by offering, for example, smart phone connectivity for those who can't receive a phone signal in the Hall, the ability to stream music, and the facility for visiting speakers to access photographs or YouTube clips as part of their presentations. Perhaps we could even offer 'Telecottage' facilities (as at Egerton) where volunteer 'experts' can help local folk with simple IT issues.

At the AGM the committee also decided that the **Hall hire fee** should increase by 25p/hr, but this will not be instigated until the Wi-Fi facility is available.

It was a vibrant meeting, and a bold idea to **up-grade the Hall kitchen** was put forward by one committee member and received with enthusiasm by the rest of us. A subcommittee has been formed to consider the viability of the plan, which would involve moving the kitchen door to where the serving hatch presently is, re-laying the floor (which has a damp problem) and fitting out with modern units. If you have an interest in this possible up-grade (which would require closure of the kitchen for a period) do get in touch with me and let me know your views. If we go forward with the idea I will, of course, publish further details in the Malherbe Monthly in due course.

Now, in 2016, we held a **photo competition** - judged at the fete that year - for images to adorn the 2017 village calendar, and at the AGM we decided to do the same thing this year.

So get snapping (or get delving in those files on your computer or those shoe-boxes of old prints). Full details will appear next month, but I can tell you that any image appropriate for a calendar will be eligible, though preference in the judging will be given to those photos with a seasonal flavour and/or a local theme. Photos must be in 'landscape' format (ie broader than they are tall).

Joan Angela Davidson

Joan was born on 29 June 1939 the eldest daughter of Cath and Algy Stanley. Her sister Ruth was born a few years later. They were raised by their mother until the return of Algy in 1945 when Joan was 6 and at Yalding Primary School. She moved to the Convent of the Sacred Heart in Maidstone aged 8, finishing at Maidstone Technical College before starting work at Barclays Trust in Maidstone. She made many lifelong friends during these years, with plenty of fun on the Number 24 bus from Yalding to Maidstone.

Living in the heart of hop country meant that Joan was able to earn extra pocket money hop picking.

Her father loved cricket and so the family spent a lot of time at Yalding Cricket Ground. Joan met Mike, who had just returned from working in Australia and New Zealand, at Yalding Dancing club in the summer of 1958. It wasn't his dancing skills that attracted her as she always called him "unrhythmic love" for the rest of their married life.

They married in 1960 and Joan left Barclays Trust to start working full time with Mike. Within 6 months they moved to their first firm at East Malling and Mark came along in 1962. Two years later Ivy House was purchased and in 1965 Gail was born. (Mike was very brave - making an offer to buy Ivy House before Joan had even seen it!)

As well as giving Mark and Gail a happy and adventurous childhood she was fully involved in the running of the farm - keeping the books and working in the pack house when deadlines loomed. She became involved in local clubs, was a keen tennis player and started to get involved with the Church.

When the children left home she became more involved in village life and the church with flower arranging skills. She always loved singing and became a member of the Invicta Singers and had many fund raising concerts in the lawns at Ivy House. She was a regular on the church committee and served as Church Warden for 23 years. She organised the Harvest Supper in the village hall for many years.

Joan was a keen gardener and fantastic cook. She designed and maintained the gardens at Ivy House - Mike was allowed to undertake the heavy work, but only under close supervision.

While Joan was involving herself with all these activities her family was growing - 5 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Joan's first battle with cancer was in the new Millennium and she recovered well with only a few lasting difficulties. Unfortunately, her second brush some 18 years later was to prove too much, although the complication of kidney failure meant she was fighting with one hand tied behind her back. She fought so hard to keep going over the last three years. Her ability to adapt to the demands of dialysis three times a week and still keep her life going virtually unaltered was inspirational. Unfortunately she lost the battle on 15th April.

Mobile Phone (Android) – Transferring Contacts

Getting a new phone, giving your old phone to a friend or family member, then you will need to transfer your contacts (and content optional).

Here's what to do:

Step 1: Export the contacts to either the SD card or SIM card as follows:

- On your Android device, go to Contacts, tap menu. Top right
- 2. Select Settings
- 3. Then: Select Import/Export contacts. Select Export
- 4. Choose from the available options Export to SD card or SIM card.

Note: Do not Export to the Device storage, because you will not be able to Import to the new phone.

Step 2: Import the contacts to the new phone, once you have put the SIM and/or SD card into the new phone

- 1. Repeat 1 and 2 above
- 2. Then: Select Import/Export contacts. Select Import
- 3. Choose from the available options Import to Device storage, SD card or SIM card.

The import will begin automatically and will display how many contacts have been completed. **Step 3:** Ensure that you have the correct contacts displayed. If the previous owner had saved their contacts to a Cloud account (eg: Google or Samsung accounts), you may still see them in your contacts: So to ensure you just display your contacts:

- 1. Repeat 1 and 2 above
- 2. Then select Contacts to display
- 3. Then choose the location where you Imported the contacts, e.g.: SIM, Device or SD card.

Additionally – you can back-up contacts to a cloud account (eg Google, Samsung) – if you have one of these:

- 1. Repeat 1 and 2 above
- 2. Then select Move device contacts
- 3. Then select which account to move to.
- 4. When you then do the Display contacts you can select that account.

More information about setting up a back-up for your contacts, which means that you don't need to worry about loosing your phone as your contacts will always be available to download go to : <u>http://androidfact.com/how-to-backup-android-contacts/</u>

Coconut Macaroons

Worshippers at the postponed Women's World Day of Prayer service in Lenham enjoyed the macaroons made to a recipe from Suriname. So here it is ...

Ingredients

5 and a quarter cups of desiccated coconut 397g condensed milk Cup of plain flour 2 tsp vanilla extract Melted chocolate (optional for dipping)

Method

Heat oven to 170 degrees C. Line baking tray with lightly greased parchment paper.

Mix flour and coconut together in a bowl. Add condensed milk and vanilla extract, stir well together until well blended. Scoop by teaspoonfuls and , using wet hands, shape the macaroons into round balls before dropping them on the baking tray. Bake for 12-15 minutes until top is golden brown. Cool completely before dipping in melted chocolate (optional).





Christian Message June 2018

For me, there's nothing to beat that warming cup of coffee! Maybe for you it's a cuppa tea? Most drinks need to be served either hot or cold rather than somewhere in between. Recently while staying in a hotel in Malta, I was excited to learn that I could request a bowl of porridge for my breakfast. I usually start my day with porridge so this was good news for me! However, when it came , nearly every day it was lukewarm and very disappointing. It reminded me of this passage from the book of Revelation.

I am well aware of your actions, and fully realise you're neither hot nor cold. How fervently I wish you were different, but no, you are lukewarm – not cold but not hot either – for that reason I spit you out of my mouth! (Revelation chapter 3: verses 15-16). It seems that lukewarm believers are in need of hearing the Gospel message, as well as everyone else.

I do see that having a little faith can be a good thing. And surely it's better to believe a little than believing nothing at all? But an apathetic or nominal faith might well presume that all is well, that it's just OK to go through the motions with a commitment only a shadow of what it's meant to be. If your faith is lukewarm we might not even notice what's happening, we might have stopped listening.

I ask you to ask yourself what is sapping your energy, causing it to cool off? And what measures can you take to prevent it? Are such steps needed now? If our faith is to be all it should be, we need the courage to look at ourselves, measure the temperature of our commitment and acknowledge where it is lacking so that we burn genuinely hot for God, not lukewarm.

Forgive us Lord, when our faith doesn't blow as hot as it should Amen.
