





**TICKLERTON TALES** follow-on: the consequences of **WAR.** There is an effect on the whole population. From Lilian's diary 1916 (p.149):

"A great many new and increased taxes were imposed, most trying of all was Income Tax which, in January 1916, was two shillings and six pence (12.5p) plus 20% on the two shillings and sixpence, in all three shillings (15p) in the pound. In 1915 it was one shilling and three pence (approx 6p) plus the same as war tax. There was a small amusement tax on theatre tickets, a tax of one third of their value of foreign motors, watches etc. Heavy duties on beer, tobacco, tea, sugar, matches and other commodities. Increased taxes on motors. Postage rates were increased from 1d per 4oz to 1d an ounce and parcel post was increased by a 1d in the pound (weight). Most of these taxes, though singularly small amounts, add up to a great deal as a whole.

Also the cost of living, wages etc. were mounting all the time, in fact by the end of 1916 most of the principal foodstuffs had advanced from between 75% and 100% higher than before the war". (From 'Ticklerton Tales' by Alan Dakers)

As they say. History repeats itself. Keep on smiling.

## A MESSAGE FROM HEREFORD...

#### Time for a Spring Cut?

Do you have an area of meadow or long grass within your churchyard and perhaps your garden too? If so, March may be an excellent month to give it a cut and vigorous rake. Wildflowers and fine grasses can become swamped by coarse tougher grasses, the bruisers of the meadow world, and a spring cut can make all the difference. Cutting in spring really knocks back these coarser grasses such as Yorkshire Fog and False Oat Grass, giving other meadow grasses and flowers a chance to take up the space and receive lifegiving sunlight onto their leaves. The vigorous raking will expose soil and break up mats of dead plant matter, all of which allows seeds to germinate in soil and seedlings to reach the sunshine.



But, I hear you say, what about the invertebrates which need coarse grass tussocks and hollow stems to overwinter? This is where management planning is so important; can you designate an area of coarse grass, perhaps adjacent to a wall or hedge, where you can leave it uncut for a year or two? In this way you can maintain areas for over-wintering and also manage the wildflower meadow well.

That's all very well but I have spring bulbs. Ahh, in that case you don't want to do a spring cut, but don't leave areas with bulbs uncut for too long. It's a good idea to cut a meadow after 3 or 4 months growth, never more or it starts to get overrun with coarse grasses and other plants such as hogweed. If you can't do a spring cut because of bulbs then plan for one in early summer - early July or even late June. This area can fill with lovely flowers in May and June and is a *spring meadow*.

A meadow which is cut in March or April can then be left until late July or August and fills with summer flowers such as knapweed or scabious. This is a summer meadow.

If you have a bit of both then you'll have flowers all spring and summer long, but it can get a little complicated and it may be best to keep things simple! Have a look at our Action Pack sheet AZ Caring for Grassland (https:// tinyurl.com/22af3rpv) to remind yourself of the timings.. All the best.

Dear Friends,

Isn't it lovely to start to see the early Spring flowers starting to come through? Such a sense of promise for the year to come!



A defibrillator is able to give a high energy electric shock to the heart of someone in cardiac arrest.

ANYONE CAN USE A DEFIBRILLATOR. No training is necessary although there are courses available and also useful on-line videos (for example see NHS West Midlands Ambulance Service, or St John Ambulance.)

The device itself gives very clear instructions on how to attach the pads. It also assesses the heart rhythm and will instruct you to deliver a shock if it is necessary. You cannot give a shock by accident as the device will only allow you to do it if it is needed.

They can often be found in public places, workplaces, community spaces and are often found in repurposed red telephone boxes. We have access to several defibrillators in our villages.

## Ancient woodland restoration in the Shropshire Hills

Ancient woods are some of our most valuable habitats. Centuries of undisturbed soils and accumulat- Shropshire Hills ed decaying wood have created the perfect place for communities of plants, fungi, insects and other micro-organisms. Birds and mammals, including vulnerable and threatened species, also rely on ancient woodlands.

Around 5% of the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) is classed as ancient woodland, but two thirds of this is Plantations on Ancient Woodland Sites (PAWS). These are ancient woodlands which have been largely felled and replanted with non-native species. Although damaged, these sites still have the complex soil of ancient woodland and can be restored with careful management.

In partnership with the Woodland Trust, the Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership has secured funding from the Forestry Commission to work with woodland owners to actively restore PAWS and ancient semi-natural woodlands in the AONB.

Ancient Woodland Restoration Project Officer, Dougald Purce, is identifying priority and at-risk woodlands in the Shropshire Hills and contacting their owners. Dougald can offer advice and condition assessments, fund practical management and support woodland products or timber marketing/sales. The project is intended to be at no cost to woodland owners and easy to access with minimal paperwork.

If you own woodland in the Shropshire Hills, you can check whether it is classed as ancient or PAWS by looking on the online Ancient Woodland Inventory. There is a link to the inventory and more information about the Ancient Woodland Restoration Project on the Shropshire Hills AONB website at The AONB's ancient woods are some of our most valuable natural assets. Dear all.

I have already had the pleasure of meeting some of you. My name is Simon and I am your new safer neighbourhood officer. I have been working on the rural west patch for the last 18 months along Jim.

In response to recent rural burglaries I have now started running a rural crime disruption operation that I have been working on for some time.

On the 11th and 12th of January, officers from Shrewsbury's Rural Safer Neighbourhood teams (us) supported by the Rural and Business Crime officers (from Shrewsbury) carried out Operation Headlight working into the small hours.

Headlight is a rural crime disruption operation that aims to pull resources back out into the countryside and intensively patrol these areas in order to disrupt the criminals targeting our farms and villages. The team stopped numerous vehicles and employed tactics such as stop and search, unmarked police vehicles and the use of thermal imagery. Due to the success of the operation it will now be run on a regular basis.
