Letter from Sally

rowing up in Stratford-on-Avon one of the highlights of the year was the mop fairs held each October right in the centre of the town. The lights, music, smell, excitement together with the rides and entertainment are a strong memory from my childhood. The first mop fair in Stratford-on-Avon was held in the 14th century after the black death had ravaged the local population. People without work would come to the fair and offer their services to employers who were only too happy to come as the disease had wiped out much of their workforce. The fair is still held today under a Royal Charter of 1676. However, I am not sure the businesses situated in the town centre are always happy with its presence as it does mean enormous disruption in so many ways!

As we ease ourselves gently out of the pandemic we can relate to certain employment issues, not the same as in the 14th century, and not may I add all caused by the pandemic, even so they are beginning to impact on our lives. Some companies are already planning to shift to flexible workspaces after positive experiences with remote work during the pandemic. A move that will reduce the overall space they need and bring fewer workers into offices each day, reducing the need to travel and all the harm that can cause to our environment. But the most worrying work crisis is that there is now a huge shortage of workers in the social care sector, which means the elderly and vulnerable are at most risk of suffering. There is also a lack of trained lorry drivers to transport our food and goods, becoming another problem as we rely so much on this movement of our vital supplies. But we probably hear less about the impact which is going to be caused by the loss of the £20 a week Universal Credit ending 6th Oct. This has been a "vital lifeline" for low-paid workers during the pandemic and now will mean many families will be going without even the essentials in life. As I write this letter higher gas and electricity bills are also predicted causing fuel poverty and even more hardship to these families.

We are in the season of Harvest when traditionally in the church, it is a time to give donations of food to the less fortunate, particularly those who society often forget or even reject. Our benefice Harvest Festival service is at St. Mark on Sunday 10th October at 9.30 am, when we will be asking for donations for the Winchester Churches Night Shelter, a charity who offer an essential lifeline to people who are experiencing homelessness wcns.org.uk. If you are unable to attend the Harvest service but feel that you would like to donate food or money to them, or perhaps your local food bank; then maybe this is an opportunity to seriously consider helping those who are now finding life such a struggle in every sense, physically and emotionally.

As churches emerge from the pandemic, worship and many other parts of the everyday life of a church has changed. This has particularly been the case in our benefice especially now that Victoria has left. We will so miss her spiritual guidance and her support to everyone who lived in the parishes of Ampfield, Chilworth and North Baddesley. Therefore, we must continue to make sure that we are seen as a living and vibrant presence of God in our communities, especially when it comes to helping those in need.

I end with a quote from the Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby who I believe is speaking to those who have faith as well as those who have none.

"As a civilised society, we have a duty to support those among us who are vulnerable and in need. When times are hard, that duty should be felt more than ever, not disappear or diminish."

1st Sunday - Worship for All, online only

2nd Sunday - Communion at St Mark, Ampfield

3rd Sunday – Communion at All Saints, North Baddesley and streamed live online

4th Sunday - Communion at St Denys, Chilworth

5th Sunday (when there is one) – Communion at St John, North Baddesley

Sunday at 11:30

Morning Prayer using the Book of Common Prayer (on Zoom) **Tuesday at 10:30**: Morning prayer in the glade at St Mark's, bring a picnic chair (in church room if raining).

We have reviewed the Covid restrictions to help prevent the spread of the virus in our churches and have decided to keep them unchanged for the time being – in particular, strongly advising mask wearing and retaining socially distanced seating. The full details are available here.

He has, during Victoria's time with us, lent her significant support in her role. At the end of the service Mark, a church warden of All Saints, gave a thoughtful presentation to Victoria after which we repaired to St Mark's room for tea, coffee and lashings of cake. It was joyful to catch up with so many after so long. It brought an end to a poignant yet happy morning. We all wish Victoria, Andrew and their family a very happy future wherever their ministry may send them.

During Covid our organist, Derek, retired after many years of loyal service to us and other churches. David fortunately came to our rescue just in time but as Victoria's farewell was his first Service, it was a baptism of fire for him in many ways. It was a joy that our Covid-masked singing could once more be to fine accompaniment.



Work in the churchyard May 1987-July 1989

he church by this time was very smart and leak-free and Arthur Moore suggested a project which would make the maintenance of the churchyard much easier. Many of the burials had been carried out by one of the great personalities of the village, Mr. Jack Pack, vicarage gardener to the Awdrys who was also sexton and

generally cared for the church for many decades of the 20th century. He retired officially in 1950. If there was to be no gravestone he marked each grave with a numbered iron cross, but as he liked to bury people alongside their earthly friends rather than in any sort of chronological order, and since from time to time hooligans enjoyed pulling out the crosses and throwing them around the churchyard, no-one any longer has any idea of where specific people are

buried unless they had a gravestone. Jack had continued an earlier tradition and left the graves with very high grass-covered mounds, which were extremely difficult to mow. Arthur Moore's suggestion was that we could level these, a group of us working each Saturday morning, just one or two humps at a time by splitting the turf, folding it back, removing the

unwanted soil and then folding the turf back so that it was level. By each lunchtime a fresh batch of graves were completed with no mess left to show, and plants still flowering in the grass. Cont. ...

It was a hugely successful project and as each hump was levelled, so its position was marked by the placing of a square granite cobble. This are all still in place and can be found, though many are somewhat buried in the grass now.

At the time we were discussing this project, I happened to visit a churchyard further up the Test valley, where they had just levelled their grave humps the easy way, using a digger, and it had left an unsightly sea of mud and must have involved a great loss of wild flowers. Our method did

neither of these and we had enormous fun and camaraderie as we worked, finishing each session with a cold drink and biscuits provided by Renate Moore. I do have a slight reservation about this levelling job though. Once the mower could keep the grass under control I fear that we lost many varieties of the wild flowers which had abounded. Hugo Scucek had carried out a survey in 1971 in which he had counted over 100 different species of wild flower, including some very rare specimens. It has been a great joy however, this spring, to see how the bluebells and primroses have spread so profusely across the main part of the churchyard and to know that orchids and other

species can still be found.

This month's article of the activities of the Friends of Chapel Wood has not

been the easiest to prepare. Apart from the usual report of our monthly working party, we have some good news, but we also have some very disappointing news.

The monthly working party went well. Half of our group concentrated on putting together some seating around the new dipping platform. We hope that the children of Ampfield School will find them helpful whilst they are enjoying lessons on biodiversity and ecology, using the dipping platform to assist with the search for good examples. As you will see below the seats are relatively simple but effective. Whilst this was going on, the remainder of the group finished the tidy-up of the burial ground started last month and managed to walk the footpath network clearing the undergrowth which had accumulated over the summer.

On the good news front, we reported last month that we had been in tentative discussions with an offshoot of the Hants and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust called Team Wilder. It is exciting to report that we might now be in the throes of joining forces with them. We are looking forward to working with Team Wilder as it would provide the Friends with additional insights into how we can help and support nature on our own doorsteps. It would also provide valuable support for the local schools as they seek to impart a love of nature amongst their children. We have two links:

The second is a link to the on-line blog, as these comments can offer a good insight into what really goes on. We will keep everyone posted as this develops.

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Finally, the disappointing news. Sometime between mid-afternoon on Thursday 16th September and the morning of Friday 17th September, much of the cross sections of wood we were using to construct our seating was removed from the site and thus is no longer available to us. In the process, it seems the gate entrance on to Chapel Hill was also badly damaged. These pieces of wood are so heavy it is hard to know why someone would bother. The police have been advised. Indeed, whilst writing this article a member of Hants. constabulary rang me to let us know they are on the case, as it were. We are grateful for their input.

In terms of the outstanding seating, we have sufficient sections of oak in other parts of the wood to make a further four or five seats. We will start on this next month. On the subject of next month, the working party will be deferred for one week to 16^{th} October, in the morning at 09:45; all welcome.

St. Mark's PCC Meeting held on Monday 13 September 2021

This meeting was the last to be chaired by Rev. Victoria, as she leaves the Benefice at the end of September. It was also the first to be held in St. Mark's Room, and face to face, for a long while. There was a great deal to discuss, including the following:-

Organist -

David Truslove has accepted the post and he will play at Victoria's Farewell Service on 26 September at St. Mark's. He will play for our monthly service. We extend a warm welcome to David and look forward to hearing him play.

New Kitchen -

this is almost finished apart from the tiling and flooring. The Romsey Men's Shed have carried out this work brilliantly and a donation will be sent to them. Kate McCallum was thanked for her hard work on this project.

Sound System -

we are hoping to update this in the near future as our old system is not working at all well and many people have complained that they are unable to hear at services, funerals etc. The cost will be well over £2,000.

Rotas -

now that the Church is opening up again we will need more volunteers to help with certain jobs; cleaning the Church and Church Room; flowers (until the end of the year we have volunteers to bring flowers in once a month so they are in place for the second Sunday service); Brass cleaning, which has not been carried out at all during the pandemic! If anyone would like to volunteer to help with these jobs, and/or would be able to organise any of the rotas to start in the New Year, please chat with any member of PCC. Thank you.

Finance -

Pam, our Treasurer extends the PCC's thanks to our congregation for all their support during the pandemic. The Friends of St. Mark's hope to meet soon to discuss possible future fundraising events.

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Village Market Church Table -

Daryl Pugh, Churchwarden, has manned this table, which sells various cards, calendars,

notebooks/Fairtrade food etc. for many years. We are hoping that we could have a rota of different people who would like to help on this stall. The Market takes place on the first Saturday of the month from 10am – 12pm. Please contact Daryl or any member of PCC if you would like to help.

Harvest Festival -



Maintenance of the church

t the period when Ampfield church was built it was customary to meet the expenses of the church repairs and maintenance by a church rate, agreed to by the parishioners assembled in Vestry.

Unfortunately the Vestry minutes, church wardens accounts and church rate book do not go back further than the year 1862.

In that year a Vestry meeting was held, and it was agreed to levy a rate for this purpose, the agreement being signed by Thomas Sillence and Chas Eavis, churchwardens, and Nick Lavington on behalf of the parishioners. The rate levied was on an average 3d which brought in a sum of about £37.

In 1868

"the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act" was passed, under which a rate could no longer be received by legal process from those who refused to pay it. This really gave the death-blow to this method of meeting church expenses, as in the case of Ampfield the following extracts from the Vestry Minutes will show:-

1869:

"That a rate of 2d in the [?] be raised, but in as much as the amount thus collected will be insufficient to meet the expenses, a bag be held at the Church door on every Sunday afternoon to collect the offerings of all persons willing to contribute as a supplement of the rate."

...Cont.

1879:

"The accounts were examined and was found to be a deficit. Besides the former defaulters, the Rev John White, (vicar of Timsbury 1859, succeed to Ampfield House Estate 1866, died 1885) had refused to pay his rate, he will therefore have no claim to his pew in the Church, but must be content with some other seat at the lower end of the church."

1889:

"That the Church rate be continued as hitherto, but that all parishioners be invited to contribute towards a fund for supplementing this, and that there be two collections in the church in support of the church fund each year."

1906:

"The Church rate came to end in 1906, when the number paying Rate was reduced to four, the amount received from this source being only 13, as against 35 from offertories."

From that time the church has been maintained by collections in church and by voluntary contributions.

A few years ago, Victoria (new to the parish) decided to use this loaf as the communion bread. Little did she know that so many little hands (clean and otherwise) had joined in this creation! All the bread that has been blessed must be eaten at the end of communion. Watching Victoria and her helpers trying to

gobble up the rather substantial amount of leftover bread is a sight I will never forget!

Here is Steve's basic bread recipe:

3 lbs flour

4 tsp salt

1 tsp sugar

1 tsp milk powder

2oz vegetable oil

1 oz fresh yeast

1.5 pints water (98°F)

Pre-heat oven to 230°

Place a tray of water in oven base to create steam
Put salt, sugar, oil and half flour in bowl
Mix on slow speed for at least 4 mins until dough is clear of
bowl

Cover with cloth, allow to prove for 35-40 mins Knock back for 15 mins and shape into desired pieces (Bread 1lb, rolls 2oz)

Cover with cloth and plastic sheet and prove for 30 mins Bake - Bread 25 mins; rolls 12 mins.
