Chairman's Report 2018/19

he last year has again seen further improvements to the Hall. The interior lights have been upgraded to LEDs and the external lights that illuminate the car park have been replaced with sensor controlled LED floodlights. We are very grateful to Folkestone and Hythe District Council and Kent County Council for grants towards these. In a similar vein, thanks are due to Ashford Borough Council for providing us with a grant towards the cost of repainting the Hall.

Our Solar Panel project came to fruition during the last 12 months, kindly led by our project leader, Will Day. We now have 10.2 KWh of Solar panels fitted to the South facing roof plus 3.24 KWh of batteries. Together, these should provide enough electricity to power the hall "free of charge" for most of the year, thus reducing our electricity bill. We should

also benefit from the "Feed-In Tariff" whereby our panels feed in to the National Grid and we get paid for the electricity our panels generate. Amazingly, 100% of the cost of this project (£16,699) came from donations from local residents / organisations and associated Gift Aid claims. On behalf of the Trustees, I should like to thank everyone who helped in this way.

The Evington Players have replaced the old Stage Lighting system with an ultra-modern programmable multi-coloured system which they have gifted to the hall and for which we thank them.

Thanks are also due to Paul and Robbie Boxall for continuing to keep our windows and gutters in a sparkling condition and to John & Jill Argar for continuing to dispose of the Hall's rubbish.

The Hall website continues to be well used and provides users with easy access to bookings, the Hall calendar, etc. I should like to thank Shelley and Sue for their ongoing involvement with this.

Our two main fund raising activities, the Christmas Bazaar and the Jumble Sale were, yet again,

In The Garden

Dealing with slugs

fter such a long cold and dry spring (save February when in a warm spell we ate a couple of meals outside!) the weather at last broke in June and the rain came tumbling down. During April and May the ground was so dry we had no cause to worry about slug damage but, as we expected, the rain brought them out in force. And How! Where they had been all that time is almost a mystery.

Slug damage can be the bane of a gardener's life. The trouble is simply that slugs tend to like the things that we like. Flowers such as hostas, marigolds, dahlias and larkspur are joy to a slug, they can power towards them licking their lips with delight. On the other hand if we grow geraniums, alliums, asters phlox and dianthus for example the slugs will virtually leave them alone. So that's one

tactic; if you have access to the internet you can search for what plants – flowers, vegetables and herbs that slugs like or detest and, to some extent your planting can be guided by this.

Natural predators are ground beetles, hedgehogs, toads, centipedes and frogs and we can do what we can to encourage them into our garden. As far as possible avoiding the use of herbicides and pesticides will encourage biodiversity and allow the ground based creepy crawlies to flourish and have a go at your slugs and snails. A nearby pond will encourage frogs and toads and a well built hedgehog house and plenty of dried leaves for winter hibernation will be a start to encourage them into your garden. So no feeding in the winter while they are hibernating but from warmer spring days they can be attracted to cat food (so might stray cats!) and meal worms. Thrushes will eat both slugs and snails, breaking the shell of the latter using a stone as an anvil.

When all is said and done though you may not have enough predators to keep the numbers at bay. This is when you may have to become the predator. The now old fashioned use of metaldehyde

slug pellets will be rightly banned from the spring of 2020 as this poison poses an unacceptable risk to birds and other wild life. The Jan/Feb issue of Which? Gardening calls into question the claims that ferric phosphate slug pellets, which are approved for use by organic growers, are really safe for pets and wildlife. The chelating agents they contain and particularly one called EDTA is particularly toxic to earth worms. We all love earthworms, don't we?

Slug traps that contain bait that can attract slugs and they fall in and cannot get out. Beer is an effective bait and the slugs drown or, some say, are killed by the alcohol. I have other more useful uses for beer and my alternative is adding to 1.5 litres of warm water, 4 tablespoons of flour, 2 teaspoons of sugar and 1 good teaspoon of dried yeast. Mix up well and allow to stand for about 6 hours before use to allow the yeast to develop. Simple traps can be made from used yoghurt or cream cartons, making holes with a knife (not a

job for the children) about 50mm from the bottom so that when placed on the ground with bait inside ground beetles don't get inside and die instead of eating your slugs. Some say this exercise can make things worse as slugs can be attracted from 100 metres away and you can end up with more slugs in your garden than you started with.

Other approaches use copper tape or strips or wool pellets as barriers both of which I have found helpful. Good luck; all in all I think slugs are going to be around for a long time

Nature Notes

June

7 e had a first at home at the end of May. I saw my first ever Dingy Skipper butterfly which suggests we must have a colony, however small, in our wild flower meadows. It slightly resembles its name - it is very small drab brown and grey and difficult to see. She will lay her eggs on Bird's - foot Trefoil which we have allowed to re-establish over 25 years in huge clumps in its stunning vellow pea-like blooms all across the fields. One has a small vignette of how meadows and common land heath might have looked around here 150 years ago. Also on the wing is the exquisite Small Copper butterfly which performs like the mini-Ferrari of the down lands.

The Magpies and Jackdaws have made the most of an early dry Spring and the young are all fledging with a cacophony of cackle. The song thrush also shepherds its brood off the nest with surprising commotion. The first Spotted Flycatcher has returned. Taking vantage on a slim exposed branch it darts and drops or rises to catch unsuspecting flies. He will have amassed significant Air Miles travelling from southern and central Africa.

It has been a strange and drawn out Spring. The nights are quite cold and some butterflies like the Blues, which over winter as caterpillars then fatten up in April and hatch in May/June, have never really got going - unless something more sinister is afoot.

It was a warm and pleasant walk through the woods to reach the bank. We were too late for the early purple orchids but the lady orchids were in full bloom and

growing in abundance, as were the unassuming twayblades.

There were also a few helle-borines just coming into bloom. Twayblades, identifiable by the two basal leaves and a spike of yellow-green flowers which resemble little people, and broad leaved helleborines both belong to the orchid family but are less distinctive in appearance and easy to miss when out walking through the woods. The butterfly orchids were in bud but not showing colour yet.

The next event on the Gardeners' calendar is the BBQ on 14th June. In July a visit to Pheasant Barn, Oare, has been organised.

Wye Volunteer Car Service

o you need a lift to travel to a health related appointment?

There are times when all of us may appreciate a bit of help with transport, either because we are unable to drive through illness, injury or disability or because we do not own a car. Buses can be unreliable and taxis very expensive. If so, help is at hand.

For some years, patients of Wye Surgery benefited from a volunteer car service run by Graham Duddy, but since his retirement some months ago, there has been no replacement and the service fell into abeyance. Now, however, the service is up and running again, thanks to a team of local volunteers and to Robin Pelham-Reid who has kindly offered to coordinate the drivers.

The service is available to all those who live within the Wye parish boundary or just outside it and it is free to those who use it. It covers medical and related appointments such as visits to Wye Surgery or to a dentist, physiotherapist, chiropodist or osteopath in the area. It does not cover hospital appointments at the William Harvey or other hospitals, as the waiting times are uncertain and the car parking very difficult.

The availability of help to travel to the Surgery could mean that patients may be able to take advantage of appointments offered at relatively short notice. Hopefully, it may also help people to keep scheduled appointments, rather than risk losing their slot because of transport difficulties.

The service can be accessed via Robin Pelham-Reid. His landline number is **01233 812298** and his mobile number is **07880 800938**. If you can give him as much notice as possible, so that he can locate a driver, it would be appreciated. He would also welcome hearing from anyone who is interested in or willing to give a little time to join the team.

Farming Notebook

After three to four weeks of dry conditions, the weather broke and we have had several days of good steady rain. Many local farmers have come out with the same comment..."it will do far more good than we will". Very true.

The potatoes emerged four weeks after planting and looked good and even. The rains came just at the right time. And now, with moisture and warm soils, it is easy to believe that you can see the crop growing. But with these ideal growing conditions comes the increased risk of potato blight infection. We are being very cautious and have reduced our fungicide spray intervals. It is vital that every new leaf is protected. If blight was to come in, it would spread very quickly and could be devastating. The Irish potato famine of the mid 1800s was caused by potato blight. The subsequent complete destruction of Ireland's staple food led to unimaginable hardship.

We had a team of Ministry (DEFRA) Plant Health inspectors checking all of the potatoes. I am pleased to report that all the seed

stocks have passed their first inspection. The second and final field inspection is due at the end of June, by which time the crop will have met across the rows and be one enormous canopy of green leaf and white or pink flowers.

It is not only the potatoes which have been inspected, but also the spring beans and all of the wheat. The spring oats and grass seed are not quite ready just yet. All these crops are grown for seed and all need a thorough visual inspection to ensure purity and uniformity. Vigour and germination tests will be carried out after harvest.

We are again hosting the variety trials day for Zantra and First Crop Seeds. Isolation strips and walkways have been mown through the crop to allow visitors a good look and enable comparisons between varieties to be made. It is staggering how fast a wheat plant will grow after mowing. It has become a weekly task to trim pathways to keep them clear. One area of the field was planted with grass in the autumn last year to provide a car parking area, and somewhere to erect the hospitality tents. We have already taken one crop of silage off this grass, but with the rains it looks as though we may have to take another one in the next couple of days to keep the area tidy. The scourge of arable cropping is blackgrass. Fortunately we have very little, but even what we have must be

removed as the problem will only be much worse next year if ignored. Some say that one plant can produce a million seeds, and these set and shed before the drilled crop is ready for harvest. Our trial field had a light infestation of blackgrass. The only control is to hand rogue the weed. One enterprising farmer's daughter from Romney Marsh saw an opportunity and employs a large group of rougers. Originally the gang was made up of the wives of Gurkhas stationed at Hythe barracks, but latterly it is families of Romanians. They stick at the task all day and painstakingly pull every grass plant by hand until the field is clear. They do a fantastic iob. What will we do after Brexit??

During the rain showers we have been very busy in the potato sheds. Every single bin has had to be stacked outside to empty the cold store. In the next few days a contractor is going to spray an extra 55mm of foam insulation over the inside of the entire barn. Although already insulated, we were persuaded that the extra layer would reduce our energy consumption significantly and that the investment would soon be paid back....

Also, the whole potato grader and sizing units are being given a thorough overhaul. It is easy to forget how old some of the components are. Maintenance now will, we hope, lead to a trouble free harvest.

At the beginning of June our new, yet to be named, Hereford bull was introduced to his girls. There was a great deal of noise and mutual interest....Fingers crossed for a good crop of healthy calves next spring.

We have selected a few cows for AI (Artificial Insemination rather that Artificial Intelligence!!) as we felt the herd was a bit too big for the young bull to cover on his own. These cows were in the next door field to the rest of the herd. It must be true what is said about the grass being greener on the other side of the fence... The AI cows fancied the bull. the bull ignored his cows and fancied the AI cows. Would the fence hold? All was fine and everyone remained where they were supposed to be and the bull wandered off with a little gaggle of cows. I did double check the fence later that Sunday evening and ,armed with a puller, hammer and a bucket of staples, decided to re-tension the barbed wire just in case...

Time is marching on. Harvest is only a few weeks away. Still so much to do...
