

Parish Council



The missing link

Let's start with some good news: having completed our rather lengthy co-option process, we are really pleased to welcome Guy Hagan as our new parish councillor. Guy, of course, needs little introduction, but for those of you who are new to the parish, he is the driving force behind the Benenden Action Team, an ongoing volunteer support group known better as BAT, set up when the darkest days of Covid were looming, offering support as a 'good neighbour' to villagers in need. Guy's inclusion brings our council back up to its full strength, and you can look forward to him writing his first piece in his new role in next month's issue.

One of the parish council's ongoing projects is to move forward with the repair and restoration of the Queen's Well (at Benenden crossroads) and the Pump House (at Iden Green crossroads). The Benenden well was built in 1887 to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee, and the Iden Green well was built ten years later for her Diamond Jubilee. Both are Grade II listed and are in desperate need of careful renovation.

We have quotes from specialist contractors, and the work required will come to somewhere between £15,000 and £17,000 for each well. Obviously, these costs are way beyond the parish council funds, and unfortunately grants from organisations such as Historic England are currently only available for Grade I and Grade II* buildings. This means we will need to raise funds via alternative methods, such as a JustGiving page. In the meantime, if you are in a position to offer financial help with this, please do contact Caroline, our clerk. Any donations will be very gratefully received.

Finally, we are hoping to arrange our autumn village clean-up for Saturday 13 November. We will post confirmation of this on our website and social media and post notices in all the usual places.

Rector's Letter



Let's help normality get the better of madness

Another little bit of normality has returned to the village: an incredibly joyful village fete in support of St George's and a lovely Harvest Festival with a beautifully decorated church. We could not have been blessed with any better weather than we had on the day of the fete and the number of people that turned out was amazing. The feel of the event was just wonderful; just seeing people having fun together as families and with friends made all the hard work so worthwhile. So I add to Tracy Claridge's words of thanks elsewhere in the magazine to everyone involved, and say thank you to Tracy for all his efforts in making this a great community event.

We were also blessed by receiving a wonderful amount of food donations from the primary school and the church-family for the harvest service. All of the food has been passed on to Nourish in Tunbridge Wells to support local families, and we will be continuing this community support by collecting for Nourish throughout the year, not just at harvest time, as the need is there all year round.

Another bit of normality returning is in the church service pattern. From the beginning of November we will be returning to an 8am Communion service at St George's every Sunday, and a 10am service at St George's every Sunday. We will also be reintroducing the monthly choral evensong service - at 5pm on the first Sunday of the month - which will begin in January. We are also planning for a normal Advent and Christmas this year, with carol services, crib service, and a 'midnight' service (all of this, of course, subject to any Government restrictions and also local Covid rates). I am also thinking about how we can 'do church and be church' in a more effective way for young families. If you have ideas that you'd like to share, please, please get in touch with me.

There are the good things of normality slowly returning, but there has also been the madness of the bow-and-arrow attack in Norway killing five innocent people; and the killing of an MP, David Amess, in a knife attack as he undertook his constituency work of serving others. A decent man simply holding a face-to-face surgery, in a church, to try to help people in need. What has gone wrong within society that things like this happen? The time has come to stop thinking, 'I can't do anything about this sort of thing'. We can all play our part. We can all play a part in our society, in our local community, by modelling tolerance and respect of other people. We can all live life valuing all human life, valuing our planet, valuing one another, valuing our community. Let's get back to the normality of this way of living, and away from the madness of being so self-centred that we end up permanently damaging the society in which we live.

Talking Point



Reflections on a country churchyard

Some years ago, I was helping with the regular working party in St George's churchyard when something shocking happened. I was mowing around a very old gravestone when much of what remained of the inscription on the stone fell off and broke into little pieces on the ground. Years of weathering had taken their toll and the stone had delaminated. Getting too close with the mower had been the final straw.

I was distraught (much as I told myself that it would have happened anyway). Would the person in the grave be forever forgotten? What about descendants trying to trace their ancestors? What about historians piecing together the story of Benenden and its people?

Fortunately, I learned shortly afterwards that there is a comprehensive, indexed record of the graves in the churchyard, including photographs of inscriptions and a detailed plan. This has been a labour of love for several people over the years, culminating in a superb database put together by David Harmsworth, which is now online (burials.benendenchurch.org).

So, I needn't have worried too much that this person might become a blank in the pages of history. However, when I am in the churchyard now, I am all the more conscious of the people whose lives are remembered there, and of what an extraordinary community Benenden is. As the years pass, an increasing number are old friends.

For me our churchyard is a wonderful place, and I know many agree and visit regularly. A number of things make it special. It is a rich natural habitat, home to some very unusual mosses and lichens. It is a beautiful place with a great sense of timelessness. But two things in particular are brought home to me when I am there.

The first is about people. In the rush of each day, we often don't devote enough good quality time to those we care about: family, friends and neighbours. It's no good having regrets when they are no longer around and it's too late.

The second is about perspective and peace. It seems there is always so much to worry about; and no sooner have we escaped one crisis than we are in the midst of another one. By then we have almost forgotten the one from last month that then consumed our thoughts. No doubt the residents of the churchyard had lots of things to worry about, whether they were rich or poor. But, like us, they probably worried about the wrong things and it didn't do them any good.

So, for a bit of perspective, you might want to visit the churchyard. You might also consider joining the working party, which takes place on a Saturday morning roughly once per month. The dates are published in the Village Calendar in this magazine, or you could contact Dick Hill (dd.rhill@btinternet.com).

Remembrance events

On Thursday 11 November, the Benenden Branch of the Royal British Legion will, as usual, invite Year 6 of the primary school to join a gathering of local residents at the war memorial at 10.55am to remember the armistice that took effect at 11am on that date in 1918.

This brief assembly is open to all. On 14 November, we hope to resume the normal format of the annual Remembrance Sunday parish church tribute to those who lost their lives in the two world wars. That morning service will start at 10.45am at St George's. Members of the Legion's branch committee, the parish council, Benenden Hospital, and Benenden School's Combined Cadet Force will attend and lead the congregation to the war memorial after the service for the laying of wreaths. Trumpet calls will be sounded in church and at the memorial.

If you wish, please gather around the war memorial in Walkhurst Road as soon as you can after the church service. All those with service medals are invited to wear them for this special act of Remembrance.



Benenden Village Trust

We are investigating ways to improve footpath access to the Benenden playground, which has become so popular that the main path to it has become rutted and muddy with use. At the same time, we are looking to address concerns raised by parents about dips and holes in and around the playground.

The Trust, which owns and manages important recreational facilities in the parish, held its annual general meeting on 11 October, at which Jonathan Strong, the chairman, said that despite Covid, the Trust was in reasonably good shape, and outlined a series of initiatives being explored to further improve village facilities.

He thanked members who had attended the meeting but noted that the turnout was disappointingly low. This led to a discussion about ways to engage members more fully in the work of the Trust.

Members elected a new trustee, Julie Lewis, who is also vice chair of Benenden Parish Council and played a pivotal role in the creation of the new Iden Green playground. The three longest-serving trustees - Kent Barker, Tom Dawlings and Jonathan Strong - were re-elected by members after standing down as required by the Trust's constitution.




The Importance of Green Spaces

Neighbourhood Plans were conceived by central government to encourage local input to the planning process. They enable communities to set planning policies for the local area, including allocating sites for development. But NDPs go beyond a simple blueprint for housing, they also provide the opportunity for communities to identify and protect important local green spaces.

In urban areas such as London or Birmingham, identifying and protecting green space is an essential way of preserving and improving the quality of life for local people. Here in Benenden, with our beautiful countryside and many quiet footpaths, the need to identify and preserve local green spaces may seem less apparent, but in fact, listing local spaces and providing protection for them is an aspect of our NDP that the six volunteers of the Landscape & Environment Committee took seriously from the start.

National guidelines do not allow NDP groups to set up a massive green barrier across the parish as a protection from development. Local Green Spaces must be properly assessed, and they must meet national guidelines. Local Green Spaces need to be small, not an extensive tract of land, and they need to be a space valued by the community, either as an amenity for local residents, such as a tranquil area of peace and calm, or a space for recreation and exercise, or to preserve biodiversity.

With your help during the build-up of the plan we identified, assessed, and allocated 11 Local Green Spaces. Some favourite spaces are already protected, such as the historic parkland at Benenden School and the village green, and do not need further protection from development, but once the NDP is finally approved at referendum, it will provide further protection for sites dotted around the parish and will help to support local



wildlife. So where are the sites? Here is the list, taken from Policy LE2 of our NDP.

- East End Old Cricket Pitch
- East End Corner green at junction of Goddards Green Road and Walkhurst Road
- New Pond Road Catholic Chapel Field
- The pond at Benenden crossroads New **Pond Corner**
- Central green area, Cherryfields
- Glebe Field/Playing Fields
- Benenden Recreation Ground
- Beadle Platt beside St George's Church
- St George's churchyard
- Beacon Field by the Primary School
- Iden Green Recreation Ground


Fibre optic cable installed

We are pleased to say that the installation of the 'fibre to property scheme' for parts of Standen Street and Woodcock Lane is now complete. This scheme was community funded using the government voucher scheme for rural internet connectivity. The Standen Street scheme includes about 59 properties under the postcodes TN17 4HP, TN17 4HR, TN17 4HS, TN17 4HT, TN17 4LA and TN17 4LB. There is a link below to check whether or not your property is able to access fibre to property.

The final properties included in the scheme were decided upon based on a number of factors, including the network layout and the current speed you could obtain. We are sorry if your property is not included (even if it's within the postcodes listed) but that was out of our hands.

The following link will allow you to see if you can take advantage of up to IGB speeds: www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/. The next step is to choose a provider for your service and contact them directly to place your order, and then they will then arrange for Openreach to install a new modem and connect you by fibre optic cable to the new service. Please check to make sure you are aware of any contractual obligations you have with your current provider.

I returned from the conference to a fabulous spectacle of our Nigerian students dressed in traditional attire to celebrate Nigerian Independence Day, which culminated in an excellent assembly. This began a busy weekend, in which we also held an A Level fair for the Upper Fifth, welcomed over 70 prospective pupils for our taster weekend and managed to avoid a near total sporting washout when some netball matches against St Paul's survived the rain.

Topical health

In the era of coronavirus, it is easy to understand why some people regard the prospect of winter flu as a bit of a non-issue. Sadly, this is not the case. Flu is not 'just a bad cold', it is a potentially life-threatening illness responsible for around 20,000 deaths in England alone in 2017-18.

Flu, or more properly influenza, is a contagious (sometimes highly so) respiratory illness caused by any number of influenza viruses. Flu causes a wide range of signs and symptoms, which vary between flu types and individuals, including a high fever, body aches, fatigue, coughing, a sore throat and headache among others. Unlike coronavirus infection, flu is not usually associated with a loss of sense of smell or taste and the cough tends be dry rather than continuous.

The best defence against seasonal flu is isolation; during the recent lockdowns, we saw a huge downturn, perhaps as much as 95%, in the number of people suffering with seasonal flu. Isolation aside, the next best defence is vaccination. Vaccination is widely and freely available to people over 50, pregnant women and those living with certain long-term health conditions. As with most vaccines, the site of the injection can ache for a few days and the individual can experience mild symptoms.

Some people think that the choice of flu vaccine used each year is random. It isn't. The choice is based on national viral surveillance, which identifies the common viruses in circulation each year alongside epidemiological modelling of which viruses are most likely to be in circulation during the flu season. Given that coronavirus is still in circulation and that we are all trying to return to some form of social normality, getting the flu vaccine, even at the same time as a coronavirus vaccine booster, will prove to be the healthy option for many of us this year.





Village Charities

Making a difference

Every year the St George's Church Mission allocation committee (part of the Parochial Church Council) gets together and decides which charities it will support in the coming year, aiming for about 15 local, national and international organisations, including the Children's Society, Medecins Sans Frontiers, Hospice in the Weald, the Weald Family Hub and Sight Savers. Much of the money comes from the annual village fete. Earlier in the year, Chris Parkinson told us about Tools with a Mission, Crossroads and Dolen Llanbrymair. This month I focus on three further charities: Nourish, Catching Lives and Demelza House.

Nourish is our local food bank and provides help when it's needed most. The support it offers to those across the whole borough of Tunbridge Wells, including Benenden, is more than a bag of food, it's a helping hand for people. People like you and me who come from all walks of life. What they have in common is that life has dealt them a blow and they need support to get back on their feet. In 2019/2020, Nourish needed over £120,000 a year to run and it forecasts that this year that will double. As well as covering the costs of its storage and packing unit, its staff and its van delivery costs, donations allow it to fill the gaps in supplies. It buys wholesale so every £1 donated goes further. It often buys tinned items that haven't been donated, breakfast cereals and healthy snacks for children, sanitary products, laundry powder and nappies. 

Hot Topic

A sign for our times

It's lovely to see the Benenden village sign beautifully rebuilt in oak by Fox Construction and restored to its place on the green once more. I hate to admit that I'd never really taken much notice of it, until it was no longer there after it suffered from the slings and arrows of outrageous weather, and I found its absence unsettling. Seeing it back in its rightful place prompted me to investigate its history and that of the two cricketers it portrays.

The tradition of village signs is believed to have been started by Edward VII on the Sandringham Estate in the early 20th century, when he suggested they would aid motorists.

Our sign was commissioned in 2000 as part of our millennium celebrations and features Edward Gower 'Ned' Wenman and Richard Mills, both first-class cricketers who played for Kent and England. The sign was painted by Guy Bedford and unveiled by the descendants of Wenman and Mills. Unfortunately, the painting lasted only nine years before it began to suffer from the wind and rain. The image you see today was painted by Stephen Message (a cricketer himself) and installed in 2009.

The portraits are based on old prints of the two players and Stephen recalls: "I asked a friend to dress up to match the prints, complete with top hat, so I could get the right effect." The painting was then scanned and printed onto a metal plate by Iden Signs, using a process that would ensure it lasted many years.

It seems Benenden produced a number of fine cricketers who went on to play for Kent. The most notable were Mills (1798-1882) and Wenman (1803-1879), who are both buried in the churchyard. Mills, who was considered one of the best cricketers of his era, was born at Pump Farm and made his first-class debut in 1825. He played mainly for Kent sides, including one match for the newly formed Kent County Cricket Club in 1843 in Hemsted Park (now Benenden School). He also played for the Players in the Gentlemen v Players series which was popular at the time. Players were working class

professional cricketers who earned their living through the game, while Gentlemen were middle and upper-class and played cricket for leisure.

Wenman also made his debut in 1825, alongside Mills, and while he was also a first-rate batsman he is generally remembered as one of the greatest wicket keepers of the 19th century. He was clearly a character and very confident of his cricketing skills, so much so that he and Mills liked to challenge cricket teams to play a match against just the two of them for money. As you would expect the 'Two against Eleven' competitions

attracted considerable crowds and lots of side betting!

I found
a lovely
description by

of one of
these two-day
matches in
1834, against



the Isle of Oxney XI in Wittersham, in 'Benenden. A Pictorial History' compiled by Michael Davies: "Upwards of 2,000 spectators assembled to witness this singular contest which has no parallels in the annals of cricket. The chances against the two enterprising players were great: the two against the eleven in every point of the game, they having none to field, and their opponents being all in the field. And what was more particularly against them was that when one was out, both were out." The match ended in a victory for Wenman and Mills by 66 runs and a prize of £20.

This match was re-created on its 150th anniversary in 1984, when Derek Underwood of Kent and England and Alan Ealham of Kent played a Benenden XI. Rain stopped play, which ended in an honourable draw.

I expect that Mills and Wenman would be extremely pleased to be 'playing' still on the village green over 200 years later.

Pilgrim on the long, hot walk to faith

Robin Dalton Holmes describes what inspired him to walk 800km along the Camino Way in Spain for the first time 12 years ago My first visit to Santiago de Compostela was 33 years ago on a family holiday spent driving in Spain. Then we stayed in the 500-year-old former hostel for pilgrims to the city. Since the early Middle

Ages, Santiago has been third only in importance to Jerusalem and Rome as a destination for Christian pilgrimage. St James the Great was believed to have a mission connection to northern Spain, and after his execution in Jerusalem, tradition relates that his remains were shipped to Spain in a stone boat and rediscovered 800 years later on the site of what is now one of Spain's most striking cathedrals: Santiago de Compostela. James is also credited with a significant part in the battle to terminate centuries of foreign domination of Spain 1,200 years after his death.

On that first holiday I had noticed a handful of individual trekkers plodding westward and learned of the pilgrimage route to Santiago from France - the Camino de Santiago, known in English as the Way of St James or, colloquially, the Camino Way - of which 800km lie in Spain. In my working life I had never had enough annual leave for long walks, but I resolved that when I retired in 2003 I would follow the Camino Way.

After I had trekked several times in Morocco, Sinai, Namibia and Ethiopia, I was ready to walk the Camino. Santiago can be approached from various directions, and I learned that many spaced hostels had been opened on the route down from France. I was attracted by the challenge of walking the Camino, on

what I thought

could be a four-week stretch, and meeting my wife, Jane, at my Santiago destination.

My first pilgrimage began in 2009. Not knowing how I might respond to 29 days of walking, the comfort was that, without the need to book ahead, I could stop each day whenever and wherever I liked, or when I

had been confounded by August heat.

I flew to Bilbao with a rucksack containing all I needed for the four weeks of walking ahead. Years of trekking have shown me there is an art to selecting, packing and carrying all one's possessions for a remote journey. Self-

sufficient, I set off from near Pamplona and soon became tuned to the conventions of the Camino.

Proof of walking and accommodation was validated by getting a pilgrim pass stamped at the hostels and places of interest en route. Sleeping in bunk beds, in large, unisex hostel dormitories, lights out were at 10pm and we had to leave by 9am. I adopted early starts, getting up an hour before dawn so that, in the cool of the pre-dawn air, I enjoyed first light, and an hour later seeing my shadow stretch 40ft ahead of me, shortening as the sun rose.

Breakfast consisted of tonic water, coffee and toast in the first open café of the day. Depending on temperature, I would repeat this pit-stop midmorning, and then, around lunch time, start looking for somewhere to stay the night. Hostels were rarely re-opened before 2pm, but being first in the queue outside gave the best choice of bed,

hot water for a shower, and getting my washing on the line to dry

by sunset.

In clean clothes, I could explore each village or city in the afternoons, when nothing stirred except domestic kitchens, rattling cutlery, and cooking. Unlike Spaniards, who eat supper very late, pilgrims were hungry, ate early, and were snoring by 10.30pm.

There are three significant, but not over strenuous, mountain ranges on the 820km route from France, but long stretches are at over 4,000ft above sea level. In addition to hostels there were many monastic refuges, several of which had been used by St Francis of Assisi, and some convenient hotels, but the latter required advance reservation. So, the religious ambience grew for me while staying in the monastic refuges with voluntary evening prayers led by monks and nuns.

During the day, the company of others was intermittent, sometimes just walking alongside or sitting with a fellow pilgrim for 15 minutes over coffee. However, the universal greeting of 'Buen Camino' was a catalyst for companionship. Conversing with walkers from every continent tested my linguistic capabilities, but we all felt equal in our non-discriminatory trekking clothes and, despite few native Britons, everybody seemed keen to practice their English if we ate together.

Fortunately, I never felt tired, despite daily distances up to 25 miles in the dry air; I suffered no blisters and found I was approaching Santiago four days ahead of my schedule, so I slowed down.

Recalling the city from our previous family holiday, I knew when to expect a first sight of the great cathedral spires; and the urban bustle grew. At last, after 28 days and much anticipation, I was finally walking into the main square dominated by Santiago de Compostela Cathedral. Musicians played in the shade of an ancient archway and the space thronged with the triumphant arrival of a fairly steady stream of pilgrims, elated to set down heavy rucksacks and sharing noisy greetings in the camaraderie of reaching a journey's destination.

To my right was the ancient Hostal dos Reis Catolicos or Hotel of the Catholic Kings - which still gives free lunch to the first 12 pilgrims to arrive each day - while to my left was the town hall, part of the university and the grand





facade of the cathedral. I climbed the cathedral steps to find the column in the porch where centuries of arriving pilgrims had placed their hand and worn a five-finger grip on their destination.

Walking into the cathedral and up the south aisle past the early arrivals' midday pilgrim mass, I joined a queue that looped behind the apse. Fifteen minutes later I had shuffled my way to the narrow smooth steps up behind the altar to take my turn in clasping the jewelled bust of St James. Then I shuffled again, squeezing my rucksack down the crypt steps, into the small space in front of the silver casket containing the remains of St James the Great, apostle of Jesus Christ. I had arrived!

Emerging from the crypt, I then crossed another huge square to find the first floor Dean's Credencial Office to gain the final stamp in my pilgrim passport. Among a crowd of pilgrims, my ascent into the office was paused. I was asked to complete a form with name, place of birth, journey start point, age and mode of travel and then asked if the purpose of my journey was 'recreation or faith'. After hesitation I opted for faith and showed my pilgrim or Credencial passport. A Latin certificate with an unfamiliar 'Roberto' as first name was granted to me as validation of achievement of my pilgrim status.

What definitely started as a physical challenge transmuted into much more of the pilgrimage experience, which embraced me on its fringe. I had morphed, from a mere sceptic of St James' alleged

influence on Spain, into a more rounded pilgrim.



Alan Pickett: his life and love for Benenden

Bev Beveridge marks the recent passing of one of Benenden's most inspirational and well-loved residents

After serving as a flying officer navigator in the RAF Volunteer Reserve from 1943-47, followed by three years at the North British Rubber Company, Alan Pickett took over the management of Park Farm in Biddenden.

During his varied career, Alan was also a publisher and international conference organiser. In 1962 he was invited to become the first Weald of Kent Preservation Society (WKPS) life member and greatly admired their pioneering work. He was also a long-standing member of the British Legion and of the St George's congregation, where he regularly read the lesson with great clarity.

Alan was a long-term partner of the late Angela Lloyd-Jones, with whom he shared many interests, particularly the same tastes in music and theatre productions. For 30 years, they lived on the Cranbrook Road in Benenden, the village

for which Alan had a great affection. His love for Benenden and its community engendered many selfless acts on his part as he engaged in setting up the 'Save Our Shop' Campaign in 2012. He continued to devote much time and energy to this project until its completion.

His relaxation came from the many walks he took in Hemsted Forest with his beloved dog Monty - he was a member of the Kennel Club. He also had a passion for jazz. For many years he was the guitarist in a band called The Last of the Summer Jazz, which included several WW2 veterans, and they played together for fun and, of course, for charity.

Alan was an amazingly energetic, intelligent, and capable man with a high degree of humanity. In his 80s he achieved a degree in psychology and, as a Jungian psychotherapist, became a counsellor. A member of the family explained that one of the people he counselled gratefully believed that Alan had saved her life. He wrote two books about life and relationships,

no mean feat at that stage of life, yet imbued with the wisdom of years of experience. Long after retirement,



he was meticulous in keeping organised, once exclaiming: 'I can't do this - I'm 48 hours behind on my paperwork!'

He was fortunate in that he enjoyed good health for most of his life, regularly taking a mixture of vitamins to maintain his fitness. Alan was 96 when he died and although, tragically, it was Covid which finally claimed him, as he was laid up with a broken hip, it is plain to see that his was a life well lived and he will leave behind a legacy of service to Benenden, where he wanted his funeral to be. Alan will be much missed by all those who knew him and all those who have benefited from his kindness.

Entering into the spirit of the Wealden gin revolution

Ruth Clark talks to Will Edge, founder of Greensand Ridge Distillery, and samples his ecofriendly Kentish delights

First off: full disclosure. I like gin and I really like a carefully crafted gin, straight up with ice, as a gimlet with an equal measure of fresh lime juice or tempered with a light Fever-Tree tonic (other

brands are available). So, I was very happy when my co-editor agreed to let me have a go at reviewing a Kent-based distillery.

I find that I am not alone. My research shows that the number of UK distilleries has dramatically increased from about 160 in 2013 to over 440 last year. Six million cases were sold in 2018 and this is predicted to rise to ten million in 2023. The trend

shows that drinkers are looking for locally produced, unique spirits with great stories and that's what attracted me particularly to Greensand Ridge Distillery in Shipbourne, near Tonbridge.

Everything about Greensand Ridge appeals to me: the evident passion of its founder Will Edge, its considerable ecocredentials and use of Kent botanicals and surplus produce from local farmers. And that's even before I tried Will's range of superb gins. He also produces

a brandy, a rum and an eau de vie which, in the 'spirit' of research, I also sampled - but more of these later.

This is an award-winning, carbon-neutral distillery, which takes its name from the Greensand Ridge where it is situated, a line of

hills which surrounds the Weald of Kent and Sussex, and around which Will grew up. The building is an old Victorian coach house, and the distillery operations spill out of the huge doors into the large open courtyard. Through a massive archway to the front is a view over the fields and woods to the Greensand Ridge - a view that inspires the label design.

"The flavours of our spirits are directed by the produce grown or growing nearby in the fields, orchards, nutteries and hedgerows," he explains. "The ridge encircles and contains these flavours and gives us a focal point for our quest for great flavours and lost ingredients.

"Gin is a natural way to represent the flavours of the lands around us in a beautiful spirit. Anything with carbohydrate we can of

course ferment and represent in its pure form, as with our apple brandy, but many of the aromas around us are bound in oils or resins, for example. The incredible complexity of some of those aromas lend themselves perfectly to my gin, which is like a walk through the Wealden woods, fields and orchards, with sweet/floral and woodland/herbaceous

characters."

The backbone of
Greensand Ridge gin is
eight local botanicals: bay,
laurel, poppy seeds, oak
moss, cobnuts, gorse flowers,
hawthorn berries, rosehips
and honey. These can be
found growing within a mile
of the distillery, although
Will sources the botanicals
for distilling from suppliers
to ensure consistency of
flavour and because, in some

cases, he'd be stripping the local environment of important parts of the ecosystem. "Better to source from where they are sustainably produced," he says.

Before Will started the business, he had spent ten years working in IT, marketing, finance, all the





while making alcoholic drinks at home. "First it was those awful lager kits but that eventually led to full mash brews including my all-time favourite, brett-fermented Flemish red ales. I served my craft cider at my wedding in 2009 and over the years have had various infusions and macerations secreted about my dwellings."

A Masters in Brewing and Distilling at Heriot-Watt accelerated his move from passionate hobbyist to full-time career only six years ago. "My vision from the start has been to build a different kind of distillery: one which has the lightest possible touch on the lands, but also benefits the community by preferentially fermenting and distilling surplus produce."

Will believes that any business should be run sustainability by default and takes great pride in being the UK's first carbon-neutral distillery: "Re-engineering a traditional business to be sustainable is incredibly difficult but it's important and defines every decision we make here. We use only renewable energy and some of the things we do are innovative, like using the heads from distilling as a sterilant for lines and fermentation vessels.

"We make most of our spirits from surplus produce from local farmers, but we also focus on what goes out," emphasises Will. "Our own organic waste feeds local boar. Our total non-recyclable waste output is one bag every six to eight weeks. We don't use any non-biodegradable chemicals, and where we absolutely have to use plastics, we use plant-based options."

The time had come to sample some of the Greensand Ridge spirits - it's tough what we go through for this magazine!

Will makes three gins: a classic London
Dry Gin, Rye Cask Gin and PX Cask Gin. The
London Dry is perfect, aromatic with a fresh
taste evocative of forests. I'm not a fan of
flavoured gins, but I was blown away by the Rye
Cask and PX Cask versions. Will ages an adapted
version of the London Dry in rye whiskey casks
for up to a year to produce a gin that combines
oaky undertones with vanilla, toffee-apple and
citrus (his tasting guidance helped here as my
aroma identification vocabulary is sadly lacking,
I'm afraid). I took Will's advice and tried this

neat over ice and a coil of orange zest.

Cleverly, he has taken a similar approach to create the PX Cask by ageing gin in oak casks originally used to hold Pedro Ximénez sweet sherry. The result is an intense sweet and spicy character layered over the already aromatic gin. Again, delicious straight up over ice or long with ginger ale and fresh lime.

If you would like to try a selection of Greensand Ridge spirits before choosing

your full-size favourite(s) then I recommend buying a selection box. It contains six 5cl bottles, including the three gin flavours, a Wealden Rum, Apple Brandy and the intriguing eau de vie 'Raspberry Ghost', which is



stunning and captures the delicate aroma of Kentish raspberries in a dry spirit. These last three are also excellent and use quality surplus fruit which can't be sold to supermarkets.

If you want to tour the distillery, learn about the origins of distilling, try a cocktail and create your own bottle of gin, selecting from Will's extensive botanical library, then you can join one of the weekly gin-making experiences.

Spring bulbs in pots

Deciding on which bulbs to plant for spring pots is one of my favourite parts of the gardening calendar. Over the years I have smoothed the process to make it an enjoyable task that I look forward to rather than the frazzled approach I used to have, almost always last minute, with whatever was left behind on the shop (or my own) shelves. I also believe having to pot up displays for clients has cornered me into a more streamlined system, for which I am thankful.

I have definitely discovered planting one variety of bulb in its own pot works extremely well. Not only is it easier to label, but later on in the spring, when everything is in full fettle, you can group pots together depending on what display you are after. A favourite combination of mine is blue hyacinths, some tiny 'Tete-a-Tetes' and anything in white (anemones or snowdrops dug up from the garden and dressed with moss). It makes a very pretty spring display, which I often pair with a bowl of primroses. Paperwhites flower in weeks and fill a room with scent, grape hyacinths are brilliant too (I like 'Valerie Finnis', a light blue) as well as iris reticulata ('Harmony' is tiny and blue and 'Purple Hill' is more jewellike in purple), both of which are reliable in early February. My other tip would be to really pack the bulbs in cheek by jowl, they don't mind at all and the display is worth it.

If you are planting bulbs into pots without drainage holes (for indoors) you could fill the pot with bulb fibre that contains charcoal - this absorbs any odours should the display be overwatered and the bulbs start to decompose. Otherwise, use any container with drainage holes and put a saucer underneath.

To top-dress displays, I cover the soil with either alpine grit or a fine gravel, or I find moss taken from the garden looks attractive and fresh, especially bun moss, if you can find some. Be generous with any top-dressing and fully cover the soil.

Finally, and to get some height into the display, I break off hazel twigs or coloured dogwoods, and push them into the soil around the bulbs - again be quite generous and you will find they also act as a useful plant support once the flowers arrive. It's possible the twigs may root - if so then at least you will have new plants for free.
