Yoga and Health

Practicing yoga has many benefits. It is famous for keeping you flexible which is achieved by working gently and consistently to lengthen muscles that have become tight.

When you move your body, it enables fluids to exchange and refresh, for example synovial fluids in your joints that keep the surfaces smooth, more slippery than ice on ice. Another example is the work that your lymph nodes do (over 600 or them in your body). These are in your elbows, armpits, chest, behind your ears, back of your head, pelvis and behind your knees; movement is essential for the lymphatic system to perform efficiently as part of your immune system; lack of movement will cause them to become congested so exercising now is more important.

Not only will exercise improve your overall health but it also mitigates the negative effects of stress; Yoga (which has been around for over 3000 years) recognised the importance of a healthy mind as well as a healthy body and developed different ways of being mindful. The simplest is to take a few minutes to sit and watch yourself breathing and noticing any pleasant feelings; a positive and uplifting mind will also help keep your immunity buoyant.

Sue's nature notes - Woodcock Lane Oak Trees

Listening to the early spring bird song as I walk along Woodcock Lane I notice there is one particular oak tree (out of at least 60) that seems to attract more birds than the others. This oak is a short distance from the junction with Coldbridge Lane. Taking a moment to stand under this tree, which has quite a generous covering of ivy on the trunk, you may well be treated to the sight of a treecreeper or goldcrest as well as the familiar blue and great tits, all searching the crevices for insects and over-wintering pupa; at the base there could be a wren, robin or black bird.

Fascinating facts about the oak - it is said to be the host to more varieties of lichen than other tree and is able to support many thousands of different creepy crawlies, lady birds, lacewings, earwigs, spiders, woodlice, millipedes, aphids and caterpillars, these bring in the foraging birds that delight us.

Not only does the oak play host to such a wide range of wild life but stores carbon too; a single mature oak can lock up 8000 tonnes of carbon¹. There must be hundreds or maybe thousands of oak trees in our parish as each field bordering this walk has a good number in their hedgerows.

Some of my information is from a book written by a local wildlife expert, Jim Flegg, 'Oakwatch' which describes the year of an oak tree and its associated woodland setting; it's a delight and which was the one that kindled my interest in oak trees. Let me know if you would like to borrow it as it is no longer in print.

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

Editorial

In the January issue of Malherbe Monthly I said I would ask the Parish Council in the Extraordinary Meeting of 11th January 2021 the following two questions:

- 1. Does the Parish Council believe this scheme will be effective in slowing down the traffic given all the comments and discussions they have held with Kent County Council and the Highways Authority?
- 2. In light of point 1 does the Parish Council believe this is a prudent way of spending a large sum of public money and if so does it believe it has control of how the money will be spent now and in the future given it has no idea what the maintenance of this scheme will be.

This I did and I have to report I did not receive a satisfactory answer to either question. As can be read in the minutes of that meeting published in this magazine, it was stated that "Comments from Mike Hitchins on Traffic Calming were noted".

I tried again in the Parish Council meeting of 25th January 2021 to get the Parish Councillors to understand what I wanted to know about this scheme. As the minutes of the meeting are not yet available I have reproduced below the presentation I made at this meeting. Again, I have to say the replies were not helpful and it seems that the Parish Council is unable to understand why these comments need to be taken seriously.

They are faced with facts that they do not like and are unable to accept that this Traffic calming scheme in its current guise will not achieve the objective that this scheme is supposed to address. They also have ignored comments and advise made by KCC and the Highways Authority. This is documented in the minutes of a meeting between the Parish Council and KCC on 20th November 2020. It states – "**KCC confirmed that as we have no street lighting and cannot have true traffic calming features (raised obstacles in the highway) our scheme is likely to have limited effectiveness. Grafty Green speed survey showed that speeds are not excessive".**

Below is my presentation to the Parish Council during the meeting of 25th January 2021:

"Traffic Calming. One of the justifications the Parish Council has put forward to proceed with this project is that of the responses it has received from parishioners. The method the Parish Council used to evaluate these responses was crude and unprofessional. It just added up the yes and no responses and came to the conclusion that the project should proceed. In business any responses to a consultation would be weighted by the points raised for and against and totalled up resulting in a much more informed and accurate position. If this method had been undertaken the Parish Council would have come to a very different conclusion.

The points that were stated that KCC would not fund this scheme as it did not meet its criteria and that of the Highways Authority advice that the proposed scheme would not result in effectively slowing down of the speed of traffic would have scored a high value, whereas responses that talked about the "Volume of traffic" and "Yes I would like a Scheme" would either be classed as not valid or scored a low value.

I think it about time that the Parish Council took notice of KCC and The Highways Authority as they have the experience and expertise on projects like this. It is clear the Parish Council does not have the expertise to run with this project.

This risks exposing that the Parish Councillors have not been following the guidelines in the 'Good Councillors Guide' and the implied ramifications that may follow an unprofessional decision to proceed with this project in its current form. This scheme has now has now taken the form of a vanity project which is completely unacceptable when dealing with public money."

In light of KCC comments and advice it begs the question why are the Parish Council so determined to plough on with this project and spend in excess of £50,000 of public money on a project they have been advised will not solve a speed problem that KCC states does not exist. Without physical barriers in place, you will never stop the determined drivers who will speed though the village regardless.

Traffic Calming Update

Following the receipt of a quotation from KCC for the cost of the agreed traffic calming scheme, concerns were raised in this magazine, the Parish Council therefore sought views of residents before proceeding. The October edition included a request for comments on the cost of the scheme, with a commitment from the council to re-think if the overwhelming response was negative. The majority of responses received were in favour of continuing with the approved scheme, however, the Parish Council felt that it should respond to those expressing concern at the cost, together with other comments received in this consultation. As a result, the Parish Council agreed to amend the scheme at an Extraordinary Meeting on the 11th January. The scheme remains the same in all respects except the chicanes will now be painted on the road surface rather than constructed from granite setts. This will reduce both the construction costs and ongoing maintenance costs. The Council is now awaiting a revised design and costing and if these are satisfactory the current expectation is that the scheme will be constructed in the summer of 2021.

However, in order to ensure that there is an impactful feature in the village centre, the council also agreed to apply for a mobile Speed Indicator Devise(SID) to be placed on a pole just to the north of the Kings Head in the region of Sunny Bank and Glenderry. This is the only suitable site in the village and the scheme will therefore be run in conjunction with Lenham Parish Council sharing sites in Platts Heath.

The Parish Council has created a Traffic Calming page on the Council's website containing key background documents and a question-and-answer section addressing comments received from local residents.

Minutes of the Extraordinary Parish Council on Monday 11th January 2021, 7.30pm held by teleconference

- 4. Public Session A representation from Chris Wheal was presented and noted. Comments from Mike Hitchins on traffic calming were noted. Following comments from Mike Hitchins it was agreed that the Council will write to Maidstone Borough Council to ask why our objections to Planning Application 20/504038/FULL were rejected and to ask them to investigate whether a breach of the planning application has occurred.
- 5. Public Comments on Traffic Calming Received representations from residents in the Southernden Road/Lane area to consider funding improved broadband rather than traffic calming from the Quinn donation. It was agreed that this was not possible for legal and financial reasons and the Clerk will write to those making representations to explain this. The Clerk was asked to produce a summary of the questions asked by the public with factual answers for the website.
- 6. Traffic Calming
 - (i) It was unanimously agreed not to proceed with the current scheme as agreed at the Council meeting on the 14th September 2020
 - (ii) It was unanimously agreed not to abandon the traffic calming project
 - (iii) It was unanimously agreed to amend the current scheme as follows:
 - a)To remove all of the granite setts and replace with white painted chicanes (with hatching) on the road surface at all locations
 - b) To jointly apply to KCC for a Speed Indicator Device (SID) in collaboration with Lenham Parish Council to be placed at the location in the centre of the village identified previously by KCC and locations in Platts Heath

An amendment was moved by Councillor Eastwood to remove all the traffic calming features from the scheme which was rejected by 3 votes to 1.

It was agreed that the Clerk will inform KCC that this is now the revised scheme and to proceed with implementation and enquire whether the white painted chicanes can be applied with sufficient thickness to create a sensation to drivers when run over.

Having followed the progress of the BMPC traffic scheme through numerous meetings one is left with a sense of awe and desperation: readers will have read much about the saga so I'm not going to add to this except to leave you with some thoughts and questions for BMPC – YOUR PARISH COUNCIL WHO ARE PROPOSING TO SPEND YOUR MONEY – THE QUINN BALANCE (or most of it, or may be even be more) AMOUNTING TO THOUSANDS (TENS OF) POUNDS ON A SCHEME WHICH HAS SERIOUS QUESTION MARKS AND IS OF DUBIOUS MERIT WHEREBY IMPLEMENTATION WILL NOT ACTUALLY DELIVER MEANINGFUL OR ANY IMPROVEMENT IN SPEED REDUCTION TO THE ENTIRE 30mph SECTION OF HEADCORN ROAD. IT WILL HAVE NO IMPACT ON HGV'S OR VOLUMES OF TRAFFIC WHATSOEVER.

Would you, as a lay person, spend an unlimited amount of thousands, tens of, pounds on any project without proper professional advice and guidance?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project if any of the intended / proposed benefit(s) were questionable?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project without the amount of spend being directly related to the benefit?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project without the detail known?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project before knowing the final cost?

Would you just spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project as you've got the money?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds of others people's (public – your) money without proper professional guidance and advice, full consultation and agreement to a final detailed plan and costs before agreeing to spend the money?

Would you spend thousands, (tens), of pounds on a project on a "whim" that it might work?

IF YOU HAVE ANSWERED "NO" TO ANY OF THE ABOVE YOU NEED TO QUESTION BMPC – THE PARISH COUNCIL - AND MAKE UP YOUR OWN MIND AND MAKE YOUR THOUGHTS KNOWN.

In case of any doubt, regularly witnessing excessive speeds on the stretch between Woodcock Lane and start of 30mph at Wren's Nest, I am in favour of any practical traffic calming measures but **CANNOT CONDONE SPENDING ANY AMOUNT OF MONEY** without reasonable indication / justification that the spending would be proportionate to delivered benefit.

In our gardens:- February is a very hungry month for our wildlife, and putting out seeds and water for them might distract birds and small mammals from helping themselves to our buds and bulbs! Organic fertiliser will release their nutrients more slowly that inorganic ones, so they will be available to plants just as they start to grow. Now is the time to plant snowdrops and winter aconites and in the kitchen garden to plant shallots. Grafty Gourmet

This is such a simple homemade curry recipe. The chicken can be swapped with any meat of your choice, or prawns if you prefer. Chopped fresh chilli's can be added in the second stage if you prefer a hot curry. Serve with rice.

Easy Chicken Curry

Oil for frying 2 bay leaves, crumbled 1 large onion, diced 3 cloves of garlic, crushed 1 teaspoon of ground coriander 1 teaspoon of garam masala 1 teaspoon of ground cumin 1 teaspoon of ground turmeric

- 1 teaspoon of tandoori masala
- 1 teaspoon of mild chilli powder 4 chicken breast fillets, diced 60ml of tomato ketchup 250ml of chicken stock 250ml of single cream

1. Heat oil in a large heavy based pan. Cook bay leaves for 30 seconds in the hot oil. Stir in onions and cook for 2-3 minutes until soft.

2. Mix in the garlic and all spices and stir forming a paste. Stir in the chicken and coat in the spice paste. Cook for about 5 minutes until chicken is no longer pink in colour.

3. Stir in the tomato ketchup and chicken stock. Cover and simmer for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

4. Stir in the cream, cover and simmer for another 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Zoom - Tricks and Tips

These tips apply to the Desktop Application. When you are in a meeting you will find the following toolbar at the bottom of the screen. If you cannot see it, just move your mouse to the bottom of the screen and it will appear.

Music Notes for February 2021

Well, I wasn't too pessimistic about the chances of live music locally in January – perhaps not pessimistic enough! There is now plenty of music to find on the internet in one form or another, and we did get the New Year's Day concert from Vienna on the TV (without an audience) but there will be nothing live locally this month. I will therefore continue on my quite different theme, as promised last month. Here are some of the significant musical anniversaries in February:

*8th February – 100th anniversary of death of Georges Gillet, French oboist and music educator

*13th February – 100th anniversary of birth of Eileen Farrell, US opera singer and music pedagogue.

British audiences may not know of Eileen Farrell, so I will quote from Wikipedia to give a biography:

Eileen Farrell was an American soprano who had a nearly 60-year-long career performing both classical and popular music in concerts, theatres, on radio and television, and on disc. It was said that "She possessed one of the largest and most radiant operatic voices of the 20th century." Her career was mainly based in the United States, although she did perform internationally. The Daily Telegraph stated that she "was one of the finest American sopranos of the 20th century; she had a voice of magnificent proportions which she used with both acumen and artistry in a wide variety of roles." And she was described as having a voice "like some unparalleled phenomenon of nature. She is to singers what Niagara is to waterfalls."

Farrell started as a member of the CBS Chorus on CBS Radio and in 1941 she got her own program, Eileen Farrell Sings, on which she performed both classical and popular music. In 1947 she launched her career as a concert soprano and nine years later began performing on the opera stage, leading to five seasons performing at the Metropolitan Opera from 1960–1966. She performed and recorded both classical and popular music throughout her career and is credited for releasing the first successful crossover album: I've Got a Right to Sing the Blues (1960). She continued actively up into the late 1990s. She also practised as a voice teacher, both privately and for nine years at Indiana University.

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Christian Message February 2021

At the time of writing, we are still in the Christmas season, and Kent is in Tier 4. I hope that when you are reading this that we are back in Tier 3 or lower and that many of you will have had a Covid - 19 vaccination, and that the rate of infection will have gone down.

The coming of the Christ Child brought hope and light: hope of a brighter future and a light that cannot be extinguished by the darkness. We all need hope; hope of better times to come. Sometimes that hope comes amid the messiness of life. Think of the birth process itself and how the pain of labour turns into great joy at the birth of a baby. Circumstances, as we know well from last year, can change in an instant.

You will be reading this as we approach the season of Lent which begins early this year, on 17th February, and foreshadows Easter which also brings us hope: hope of new life when Christians celebrate Christ's resurrection from the dead. On Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, we hear the familiar words from the funeral service: '**Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust',** which is quite sobering and reminds us of the frailty of life. In life there is much waiting; waiting for Easter, waiting for a vaccine to be developed, waiting for the vaccines to be delivered and given out, waiting to see family and friends, waiting to be able to hug people again. I could go on forever here. But in the waiting we do during Lent, there is an opportunity to reflect on our own actions and to set aside some time to see if we can make some improvement on how we live our life.

Perhaps we need to stop doing something to be able to free up some quiet time. I find that people are often busy helping others before themselves, which is a good maxim, but it is also important to make space for ourselves to have time to think on the deeper things of life and question why we do the things which we do.

The ashes which are used on Ash Wednesday to make the mark of a cross on the forehead are an ancient sign of penitence dating from the middle- ages; of being sorry for something which we have done that we know is wrong and of being forgiven. Who do you need to forgive, and to whom do you need to say 'sorry'? Maybe this is the time to seek the peace that only God can give.

'Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.' (Psalm 51 verse 10).

No payments are made during verification
