TO AVOID MISTAKES

Advice to Exhibitors

ON ARRIVAL

Exhibitors should report to the Show Secretary's table to collect their entry cards. These should be placed name downward by their relevant exhibit.

If possible, name all exhibits. Check all exhibits before leaving, for correct class, number and name. STEWARDS will be present to help and advise exhibitors. No exhibit may be moved by anyone other than the owner, or a show steward, should the need arise.

PRESENTATION

An exhibit should be staged as attractively as possible. Quality and uniformity are a 'must' in any exhibit. In close competition arrangement may be the deciding factor. **The area around your exhibit must be left clean and dry and any unwanted material removed.**

VEGETABLES

Roots should be carefully washed. Beet, Carrots, Parsnips, Turnips and Swedes should have the leaves removed, leaving 3in/75mm of stalk. Cabbages/Cauliflowers should be trimmed to a 3in/75mm stalk. Lettuces should be staged with roots intact. Beetroot to be shown on a paper plate. No onion to be more than very lightly peeled in any class.

FLOWERS

Bikini vases are available without charge. In all cases where cut material is shown, all stems must reach the water in the receptacle. Flowers should be arranged as attractively as possible. To hold stems in place, vases can be packed with twigs or paper (not newspaper). Paper towels will be provided by the club for staging exhibits in bikini vases. Please could saucers be used under pots to prevent staining of the tablecloths.

1. 'Cultivar' is the international name for the word 'Variety', e.g. 'PEACE' is a Rose Cultivar, whereas Roses and Dahlias are kinds of flowers.
2. In Dahlia classes, pompoms must not exceed 2in/52mm in diameter.

FRUIT

All fruit exhibits must be shown on plates. The appearance of all fruit is enhanced by its natural bloom. Apples should certainly not be polished. Gooseberries, Raspberries, Strawberries and other soft fruit should be shown on the stalk. Currants should be shown in bunches as grown.

JUDGING

Unless otherwise stated judging for flowers, fruit and vegetables will be undertaken in accordance with the Royal Horticultural Society's Handbook, Revised 2016.

Points awarded: 1st Prize - 3 points; 2nd Prize - 2 points; 3rd Prize - 1 point.



EGGS

- 100 3 Hen eggs.

Queen Cakes (class 91)

Ingredients

110g/4oz soft margarine

110g/4oz caster sugar

2 eggs

110g/4oz SR flour

A little milk

60g/2oz sultanas

Method

Pre heat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C/ Gas mark 4 and prepare a bun tin with 12 paper cases.

Cream the margarine and sugar together. Add beaten eggs one at a time. Fold the flour into the mixture with a little milk if necessary to give it a soft consistency. Add the sultanas and mix well.

Spoon into the paper cases. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden brown. Cool and sprinkle with a little extra caster sugar.

Jubilee Cake (class 96)

Ingredients

3 large eggs, separated

110g/4oz caster sugar

Grated rind and juice of an orange

75g/3oz semolina

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C/Gas mark 4. Grease a 20cm/8in tin and line the base with baking parchment.

Place the egg yolks, sugar, semolina, grated orange rind and juice into a bowl and beat until they are thoroughly blended.

In a separate clean bowl, whisk the egg whites until they are stiff but not dry, then gently fold into the orange and semolina mixture. Turn into the prepared tin.

Bake for 30/35 mins or until well risen. Leave to cool for a few minutes and then turn out, peel off the parchment and cool on a wire rack.

To fill and top the cake

Cut in half horizontally, sandwich and top with butter cream using **30g/3oz softened butter, 110g/4oz icing sugar and 1tsp milk beaten together.**

Decorate the top of the cake in RED, WHITE and BLUE to celebrate the JUBILEE.

Suggestion: Strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, white chocolate but you can use your imagination.



RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1. All entries must be delivered to the Show Secretary by 6 p.m. on Wednesday 13th July 2022.
2. Entries submitted to the Show Secretary or representative by the due date and time will be subject to disqualification if any such entry be altered in any material way or exhibit changed after acceptance and registration by a Show Secretary - See rule 9.
3. All exhibits must have been made or grown by the Exhibitor. Any garden may be inspected by appointed members of the Committee. No Exhibitor is allowed more than one entry per class.
4. Numbers of entries per household: unless otherwise stated in the schedule, two or more persons may not compete separately in the same class with produce from the same garden or allotment. If members of a household wish to share the credit or prizes then the exhibits can be entered in joint names. This ruling does not apply to classes such as floral art where Exhibitors are allowed to use plant material that has not been grown by them.
5. No additional staging e.g. blocks, to be used.
6. Children's exhibits must be arranged by the children themselves.
7. Prizes and Medals will be awarded at the Judges' discretion, and where there are two or three entries in a class, no prize or medal will be awarded unless the entries are of sufficient merit. Any exhibit can only be awarded Best in Show once.
8. No Challenge Cups, Trophies or Shields may be won outright but must be returned to a Show Secretary eight days before the next show. Any losses must be made good.
9. Exhibits are shown at the owner's risk and must not be removed before 4.30 p.m. except with the permission of the Committee.
10. In the case of any dispute, the Committee's decision shall be final. All protests must be delivered to a Show Secretary, in writing, together with a deposit of £5 (which will be returned if the protest is upheld) before 4 p.m. on the day of the show and must bear the complainant's signature, which will not be divulged, unless the Committee considers such a protest is prompted by malice.
11. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.

Please note:

All Exhibitors must ensure that the area around their exhibit is left clean and free of litter to ensure a high standard of presentation.

Newspaper must not be used in bikini vases as this can stain them. Paper towels will be provided by the club for staging exhibits in bikini vases.

Saucers must be put under pots to prevent staining of the tablecloths.
