Parish Council News

HAYFIELD GREEN MEMORIAL:

The developers at the new housing development had planned to unveil a memorial plaque dedicated to those individuals who died building or operating from Stanton Harcourt airfield. Due to COVID restrictions the unveiling has been delayed

PLAYGROUNDS:

The Parish Council hopes to upgrade equipment in the Bury Mead play park this year. During the current lockdown, playgrounds remain open with restrictions.

Some of the swings have been removed to help aid social distancing. We do not have the resources to man all play areas; therefore rely on you to help ensure they remain open by looking after yourselves, the safety of your children and observing the guidance that is posted. Please use the play areas responsibly. Please inform the Parish Clerk* of any concerns with the play equipment.

VILLAGE VOLUNTEERS:

Don't forget, the 'Village Volunteers' are still ready to help with shopping, errands, prescription collection, or just to chat. Please don't hesitate to ask for any help you need – there are plenty of willing neighbours ready to help.

OXFORD COUNTY COUNCIL (OCC):

The OCC 2021/22 Budget consultation closed on the 13th January. The council's Cabinet met to formally agree the proposed budget ahead of the annual meeting on 9 February when the budget will be debated. Proposals include a 1.99% rise in basic council tax plus an extra 1%, which would be

required to be spent on adult social care under national rules, making a total of 2.99%. An update will be provided in the next issue.

PILOT ELECTRIC SCOOTER HIRE SCHEME:

Residents in Headington, Oxford will soon be able to rent an escooter as part of a trial to allow residents to travel in a socially distanced manner and cut carbon emissions. The launch is part of a 12month trial led by OCC and Swedish e-scooter operator Voi Technology.

FLOODING:

Discussions are planned with the Environment Agency re Bablockhythe, with the aim of lessoning their flooding risk. A flood warning means that flooding is expected and immediate action is required. More detail is provided by the Environment Agency.

Oxfordshire County Council has a flooding toolkit (https://www.oxfordshirefloodtoolkit.com/), giving advice to residents, business and landowners on how to prepare and respond to flooding.

DUMPING RAW SEWAGE IN OUR WATERWAYS:

Philip Dunne, M.P for Ludlow, has tabled a Private Member's Bill aimed at stopping the Water Companies from dumping raw sewerage into rivers and streams. Many of the ditches on the path between Sutton to the Thames are contaminated with effluent from the local sewage works and Thames Water is currently pumping out Standlake and transporting to Eynsham putting extra traffic on the B4449 through Sutton 24 hours per day.

The second reading of this bill did not go ahead as planned. But it continues to remain an extremely relevant issue to our local community.

OXFORD FIRE AND RESCUE:

Remind you that in winter weather it is even more important to look after our vehicles. Lights must be clean and working; wipers must be in good condition; and washer bottles topped up with water and screen wash. Adjust your driving to suit the conditions.

SUPPORT YOUR RELATIVES AT HOME:

NHS and social care staff in Oxfordshire are asking families to help support their loved ones when leaving hospital. For some people the medical, nursing, and therapy care they need is able to be delivered at home, which avoids the need to go to hospital in the first place. As pressures in local hospitals grow, families are reminded of their pivotal role in how they can support this approach.

OXFORD COVERED MARKET:

As the jewel in the crown of the city centre, Oxford City Council has begun a project that could see the Covered Market transformed for future generations. The City Council will set out how the market could be regenerated and improved during the course of 2021.

Campaign to tackle river pollution

A message from Robert Courts, MP for Witney:

The Government's landmark Environment Bill, currently progressing through Parliament, will for the first time ever place a statutory requirement on water companies to produce drainage and sewerage management plans committing them to network upgrades and to addressing the risks their sewerage assets may pose to the environment.

The Government and the Taskforce has committed to a series of short, medium, and long-term actions focused on the ambitious goal of eliminating harm from storm overflows – a system that has been operating since the Victorian Era.

Making sure our local rivers are clean and healthy has been a priority of mine I welcome today's announcement which, together with the measures in the Environment Bill, will ensure we tackle and ultimately end the harm of storm overflows.

Please <u>DO NOT</u> phone your GP about getting a vaccine. The vaccine roll out is being expedited as we write.


If you are eligible you will be contacted by your GP.

Liz's Lockdown Pick-me-up!



Arriving in small flocks from central Europe, these exotic peach-tinged birds with black eyeliner and debonair crests are a sign that it's even colder on the continent than it is here. Waxwings love hedgerow berries. Some of the wing feathers have red tips, the resemblance of which to sealing wax gives these birds their common name.



Scams

Information from our local PCSO Helen Keen:

If you think you've uncovered a scam, been targeted by a scam or fallen victim to fraudsters, contact

Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or via their website, <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u>.

Call the Police on 101 if you know the suspect, or they're still in the area. Reporting crime, including fraud, is important.

Courier Fraud:

Victims receive a phone call from a criminal, pretending to be a police officer or bank official. They ask victims to move money to a 'secure location' or withdraw money for a courier to collect. Please don't fall victim to scams. If something doesn't seem right don't respond and report it!

Bee Friendly Gardening

There are lots of ways that you can make your garden friendly for wildlife.

- Leave dead plant stems over winter. Hollow stems may be used by bees for over wintering.
- Provide flowers throughout the year some bees emerge as early as February.
- Buy organic to ensure bulbs and plants haven't been treated with Neonicotinoids.
- Have a flowering lawn.

LETTERS OF T. E. BROWN

TO HIS MOTHER.

OFFICE

CHRIST CHURCH, March 11, 1851.

I was very glad to get your letter, which reached me yesterday. I had rather expected to hear before, but (as Mr. Toots said) 'it's of no consequence in the world, thank 'ee.' My health (always the primary consideration) is still unimpaired: and in fact the other day I felt quite ashamed when, after a bit of a run in the wind, I found a most delicate crimson glow spreading over my exquisite features.

A fortnight ago last Monday I and another man walked about twenty-six miles; it was St. Matthias' Day (I'm much obliged to his saintship), and therefore we had no lectures; so we took the whole blessed day, and started about 10.15 a.m., after breakfast.

First we went through Cumnor, where an inn called the 'Bear and Ragged Staff' still purports to be kept by one Giles Gosling of Kenilworth celebrity. (This however I had been at before.) Thence we proceeded to Bablockhythe Ferry, where we crossed the Isis and kept on through very pleasant rural scenery to Stanton Harcourt, where there is a rum old Manor House, with a kitchen of earlier date than the rest of the building-being, in fact, the kitchen where good Queen Bess had her dinner cooked when staying at Stanton H. I never saw such an old thing. They were killing pigs in it when we were there.
