Draft Parish Notes

Meeting of the Parish Council was held at the Pavilion on Monday 20th March 2023 at 7:30 pm. The meeting was attended by: Cllrs S Harrod (chair), B Fox (vice-chair), D Harms, M Horsley and C Deacon. Apologies were received from Cllr P Allen, Cllr F V Mierlo (OCC). and Cllr C Newton (SODC). Chris Ashworth (Clerk) and 5 members of the public were in attendance. Cllrs S Harrod and B Fox declared an interest in item 24/23. Cllr M Horsley declared an interest in items 25/23 and 26/23. There was one variation of order of business as item 27/23 was discussed during item 16/23. The County Councillor's monthly report was received and reviewed and is available on the Parish Council website.

A litter pick has recently been completed on Thame Road up to the A239. There was a considerable number of branches, foliage and cuttings littering the verges. It has been asked if a working party from the Parish or South Oxfordshire Council can be used to clear this up, and if so, can it be arranged. The Parish Clerk will email the waste team to see if it can be cleared.

27/23 The members of the public raised the issue of parking along the bottom of Thame Road and that it is becoming more dangerous. There have been instances of wing mirrors being broken, arguments outside residents' homes, people knocking on local residents' doors in an aggressive manner, because they think the homeowner's cars are parked badly, and buses are getting stuck and are unable to pass. Let alone if an emergency vehicle needs to pass.

The council discussed these issues raised, and Cllr Harms mentioned the possibility of erecting a sign to make people aware not to park at the bottom of Thame road as it becomes a hazard. The members of the public noted that many of the drivers that park there are aware of the issues their parking causes but still continue to park there.

Cllr Harms said that the school has raised this parking issue with the parents and has pleaded with people to stop parking in that area.

Cllr Horsley mentioned the possibility of double yellow lines. The Parish Council and the members of the public both agreed that this is not a route they want to take at this point. Cllr Horsley suggested road markings in forms other than double yellow lines; a single white line was suggested, along with asking the local PCSOs to attend the area as the parking is a safety issue.

Cllr Harrod has asked the Parish Clerk to get onto Oxfordshire County Council Highways and ask about the possibility of marking the road as a box junction including the words Keep Clear.

The members of the public also mentioned that this point that some road markings

need repainting as they are almost impossible to see.

Neighbourhood Watch update:

Now that the new gateway features are in place, it was asked if the Neighbourhood Watch signs could be attached to them, and the Parish Council agreed with this.

There was a report of 2 teenagers on the Pavilion roof. The Rec Committee was made aware, and when someone went down to check, the teenagers had left. A catalytic converter was recently stolen from a vehicle along Thame road.

Cllr Horsley raised that door-to-door salespeople had been in the village recently and for local residents to be aware.

Discussion on the potential sale of the Bull

To discuss what the potential sale of The Bull would mean, including:

What is a Ransom strip?

What would the implications for the Parish Council be?

The Parish Council discussed the matter of the sale of the Bull pub. It was agreed that a ransom strip, a 2m strip of land that curls around the access to the Bull, would be sold to the Parish Council for £1 for 25 years. This strip of land will allow unrestricted access to the Bull on condition that it remains a village pub.

Cllr Deacon asked for confirmation that the ransom strip would be owned by the Parish Council, which was confirmed. Cllr Deacon also asked what would happen if the Parish Council ceased within those 25 years. It was agreed that something like a community venture would be set up to control the strip if that does happen so that the Bull would remain a village pub.

The costs to sell the rights to this land will be split 50/50 by the Pub committee and the Parish Council. Cllr Horsley raised a point if the pub committee should be covering the whole of the costs, this was discussed, and it was agreed on a 50/50 split.

Cllr S Harrod and Cllr B Fox did not vote in the matter.

Churchyard grass-cutting grant

The Parish Council have been asked if it is possible to increase the grant given towards the Churchyard grass cutting. The Parish Council currently give £600 per year towards the grass cutting costs. The Parish Council discussed the request for an increase in the grant given for the Churchyard grass cutting. It was agreed to increase the grant to £650 from this year going forward.

Churchyard wall rebuilding

The Rector Simon Cronk is seeking a further £500 from the Parish Council towards the rebuilding of the churchyard wall. A £500 donation has already been made towards these costs. The Parish Council discussed the cause for the increase in cost for these repairs/rebuilding. It was agreed that a further £250 would be granted from the Parish Council.

Thame Road speed/parking concerns raised.

The new 20 mph speed limit has also been raised that along Thame Road, especially in the morning, is not slowing people down. It has been asked if there can be more road markings and some form of enforcement to try and slow people down.

Cars parking around the bottom of Thame Road are causing impassable obstructions,

preventing vehicles, including buses, unable to pass. This also would include any emergency vehicles if they're ever needed. Local residents along this area are being confronted by drivers assuming it is their car/s. The speed limit put in place is potentially not enough as cars are still parking dangerously, which could lead to a serious accident. The residents have asked for the Parish Council to look into ways that they could potentially help this parking situation. This item was discussed during item 16/23.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday, 17th April 2023, at 7.30pm at the Pavilion. Meeting ended at 8:15pm.

The Rector's Pint

A recent news article captured my attention. The headline read: What can you say when a Ukrainian Bishop in Kyiv asks 'Has God forgotten us'?

The Bishop is Sviatoslav Shevchuk, the Head of the Greek Catholic Church in Ukraine. He said this after the Russian withdrawal from Bucha, "I saw so many dead people in the street, so many men and women in mass graves".

It is a fair question, and I cannot judge the Bishop for asking it. I can only imagine what witnessing the aftermath of such an atrocity must be like, or how terrible it must be to live in the ruins of war.

It would be foolish to attempt to offer a neat explanation to the reality of suffering. So much cannot be explained. War though does have causes. Subsequent historical reflection can try and make sense of the politics, the hunger for resources, geo-political meddling and personal egos which all have their part to play - in other words, human sin! However, understanding the causes will not take away the terrible toll on life. 'Has God forgotten us?' is a very understandable question to ask.

It is that very question though that lies at the heart of the Christian faith. Jesus on the Cross, the man Christians believe is God as man, cried out in his physical and spiritual agony "Eli Eli Lama Sabacthani, My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" Christians proclaim that Jesus died for the sins of the world. The terrible truth behind that is the possibility for humans to come to a state of 'God forsakenness', and we need saving from that. For those who object to this insight, we need to look again at the account of Jesus' death when he experienced what being cut off and deaf to the goodness and grace of God was like. It was for him, a personal hell. The paradox of the Cross, however, is that in Jesus, God has taken on the full reality of human sin, failing and suffering, God in Christ has taken it all. The depth of that experience led him to utter that terrible desolate cry.

We want the world to be comfortable and good, but it is not entirely like that, and the Christian faith is honest with us about that truth. This is, of course the first part of the great story that leads us on to Easter Sunday, to the resurrection, the great Christian hope, and one we hold onto in the difficult times as well as celebrate in the good. We need to remember that God has not forgotten the pain, the suffering, and the desolation that is a part of our world, God in Christ has been to the very heart of it, but was not overcome by it so that we will be able to cry on Easter Sunday, 'Alleluia! Christ is risen, He is risen indeed Alleluia'.

In Search of Peace

A few weeks ago my wife, Liz, and I had day out to Coventry. Our aim was to visit the cathedral where I will be ordained in June.

There are actually two cathedrals in Coventry, they sit next to each other, almost physically joined together. The old medieval cathedral is essentially a ruin: the bombed-out shell of a once magnificent place of worship, built to the glory of God. Destroyed by bombs dropped by the Luftwaffe in 1940, its empty remains stand as a victim of conflict, a sign of the pain, suffering and destruction that war brings. A few delicate fragments of stained glass can still be seen near the still standing tower, looking like they could be blown out by the next strong gust of wind.

Next to the ruin stands a new cathedral. Another magnificent place of worship. A remarkable building with many beautiful features, including some beautiful stained glass and an incredibly huge tapestry.

One feature that we nearly missed is to be found at the back of the cathedral. On the altar-table at the foot of the great tapestry stands a cross. There's nothing unusual about that, except that the cross is made of rusty medieval roof nails. Nails that had held together roof timbers in the old cathedral and had been salvaged from its ruins. The Coventry cross of nails has become an international symbol for peace and reconciliation.

After the old cathedral was bombed, the words 'Father Forgive' were written on the wall of the ruined chancel. Provost Dick Howard made a commitment not to seek revenge, but to strive for forgiveness and reconciliation with those responsible.

Events at Coventry were symbolic in rebuilding relationships between Britain and Germany after the War, and gave rise to the Community of the Cross of Nails - a worldwide network of churches and other organisations dedicated to peace-building

and reconciliation.

I believe that God is the ultimate peace maker and the Cross of Christ, the ultimate act of peace making.

One of the names for Jesus is Emmanuel, which means ‘God with us.’ It is found in the first chapter of Matthew’s Gospel, part of the nativity story, and so Emmanuel has become a Christmas word and we don’t necessarily hear it outside of the Christmas season. Yet Emmanuel gets to heart of the incarnation. Of God becoming human in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. In Jesus Christ God becomes a vulnerable new born baby, and continues to be vulnerable as a fully grown man. He comes to be with us, not in power, but in weakness. Not to declare war on sinners, but to declare peace and reconciliation with those he loves. It is a dangerous path, one that leads to pain, suffering and death on the cross.

The Coventry Cross of Nails is not about nails that held together roof timbers – even though that is what they are. Yes, it evokes, the painful loss of a much loved building, crucified by the violence of war, but more clearly it evokes the cross of Christ, together with the nails that held him there; crucified by the violence of people in conflict with God, as he cried out ‘Father Forgive’.

But it wasn’t simply the nails that held Jesus to the cross, but love: the desire to be with us and for us to be at peace with him. St Paul writes, ‘God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.’

The story of Coventry Cathedral is a story of death and resurrection. And like the death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth which it echoes, it reveals something of how peace can be found.

Jesus tells us to love as he has loved us. To love our neighbour, yes, but to love our enemy too. It is in the risk and the desire to love and to forgive, to seek the good of the other person – even when we think they might be hostile – that peace is found.

Your Public House

Villagers will be aware that there has been much speculation recently regarding the future ownership of the Bull PH. For the last 10 years, the pub has been owned by the community, having been bought from Greene King in April 2013. The ownership vehicle was then known as an Industrial & Provident Society for the benefit of the Community. Since then, we have had four different tenants, the last of whom, Vinay Shivasankar, gave us notice to quit last November. The Management Committee duly embarked upon yet another tenant recruitment campaign.

At about this time, the Committee received an unsolicited approach to buy the Bull from Bob Hutton. It should be stressed that the Committee were not seeking to sell the pub and were committed to continuing with the community-ownership model.

Having heard more about Bob's proposals for the pub, the Committee decided his interest was worth pursuing, and at an informal meeting on 5 January, shareholders gave the Committee overwhelming support to continue negotiations with him and the newly-formed Great Milton Pub Company.

Shortly thereafter, two shareholders approached the Committee with an alternative proposal which would have enabled community ownership to continue and provided finance to upgrade the premises. Further discussions with these shareholders were held, and their proposal was circulated to all shareholders to enable an informed decision to be made.

Throughout this process, negotiations with Bob were continuing, and provisional terms were agreed which the Committee were prepared to recommend shareholders to accept. One of the key conditions was the inclusion of a restrictive covenant which will prevent the Great Milton Pub Company, or any successors-in-title, from operating the Bull as anything other than a village local pub for a minimum period of 25 years. This will be achieved by transferring ownership to the Parish Council (PC) of a 2-metre wide strip of land across the whole length of the accessway to the pub, the Pub Company and its customers being granted unrestricted rights of access and services over this strip, provided the Bull remains a pub. Any attempt to change the use of the Bull, and the PC can withdraw these rights of access, rendering the property inoperable. So our village community, through the PC, will be able to ensure that the Bull remains a pub for at least 25 years.

On 16 March, a further meeting was convened during which shareholders were invited formally to vote on whether or not we should proceed with the sale in line with the strict terms negotiated by the Committee. The vote was overwhelmingly in favour. And, having reviewed the proposal with its own lawyers, at its meeting on 20 March, the PC agreed to take on ownership of the ransom strip on behalf of the community.

The Committee now aim to complete the sale of the Bull in the next few weeks, following which the Great Milton Pub Company will further develop their investment plans for the property, and then seek the necessary planning and Listed Building consents.

The Committee strongly believes that villagers will be excited by the plans for the pub, all of which will be shared as they evolve.

One final point. You may ask why we went to all the bother of buying the Bull in the first place, only to sell it 10 years later. The answer is one word: CONTROL. If we had not stepped in and bought the pub from Greene King, they could have sold it to anyone, free of any restrictions, and, subject to planning, that purchaser could have done what they wanted with it. That could have included running it into the ground, boarding it up, and waiting until the time was right before seeking consent for residential redevelopment. Essentially, the village would have relinquished control over the future of our pub.

The situation now is completely different. The sale with conditions means the village retain complete control over the future use of the Bull and have the power to enforce the restrictive covenant through the PC. Buying it in 2013 was exactly the right thing to have done to secure the future of our pub.

We can all now sit back and watch as plans for the Bull are developed. We on the Management Committee are confident it's going to herald a new and very exciting chapter in our great pub's long history, and we hope all villagers will get behind the new model and support this vital village amenity.

The Great Milton Neighbours' Club extends an invitation to anyone over the age of 55 to join them in one or more of their specially arranged 2023 day visits;


Thursday, 15th June: Two hour cruise on the River Thames at Henley (preceded by about 90 minutes in Henley for lunch/shopping/walking by Thames).

View from Views



“February Fill Dike”, (I recorded 4mm rainfall with an average of 55 over the last 11 years), then “March in like a Lamb out like a Lion”, both common sayings the first certainly wrong this year, the second as I write will mean that as you read this you may well be clearing up after a storm, “who knows”. As we entered March we were hoping for a nice warm rain, as things were beginning to dry up, in fact what we got was plenty of rain but ,cold frosty weather now, after about 15mm rain the floods are out again, unbelievable it just illustrates the limitation of the usefulness of the meadows to produce anything in the way of food. We will all be glad to see the back of this winter, although I think the longish frosty periods will have done some good, killing some nasties that have built up over the last few years. Most wildlife has survived fairly well. It is amazing how the long periods of cold weather have affected the undergrowth opening up areas that we are may not have seen for years. I just hope these conditions will not affect ground nesting birds, plus there would be I imagine less natural feed around with the countryside as bare as I can ever remember, save 1963. I cannot make up my mind whether I should up the rate of the wild bird seed we feed at this time of year.

March is the time for March Hares to go mad and, Views Farm is no exception as there has been an explosion in their population over the last year, it has become a daily entertainment to watch them, what a pleasure, also a bird I have not mentioned before is the Sky Lark we have always had plenty, this year being no exception, I am reliably informed that the first of our summer visitors has returned, the Chiff Caff, so once Blackthorn Winter has passed we should be able to enjoy better weather, just as long as we get plenty of rain as well. Most crops seem to have wintered well but just need to start growing now as time is getting on, except for the Rape that has suffered badly from hungry Pigeons. I guess we will soon be thinking most are now backward for the time of year, due to the early march snow.

There has been much criticism in this parish about the expansion of “le Manoir quat Seasons”, all I can say is the quality of the preparatory work done so far is a sight for sore eyes, the craftsmanship of the hedge laying is unbelievable, I do a little bit but, nothing to their standard, it is exceptional. The rest is beyond comment as, it seems to me that Raymond is about to allow his favoured and, developed garden to be destroyed.

Jeremy Clarkson’s Farming programme seems to be getting a lot of publicity, not a programme I have watched personally but, from what I hear his comments will not have done our industry any harm. He has illustrated all sorts of issues that are being thrust at us, too numerous for me to mention or even annotate, even if I knew what they were all about. This of course includes planning, how the planners in this area seem to have a different view to those in other areas of the country. This is also the case on various measures that the County



Council seems to be adopting, Vegan food and traffic restrictions, without any consultation with the public or local businesses that they may affect. It does not seem to worry them if they are throttling local businesses who, after all support the local economy, these provide all the necessities of life, at the same time it is important we do not forget the issues of nature and, pollution. This is all a question of balance, I believe also there is something in the budget regarding nutrient neutrality, for development, too early for me to comment yet, as I have not seen it mentioned as yet, so perhaps another time.

Regular readers will be sick and tired of me continually harping on about food security and other issues connected, well the “Hens have come home to Roost!” as, the lack of some vegetables illustrates this fact. We now have a situation where the shelves of supermarkets are empty of these items, the weather is blamed, this is not strictly the case. Suppliers are favouring those retailers that are prepared to offer sensible renumeration to the supplier which, it seems the British Supermarkets are not, so our national growers have either cut back on producing when costs peak or, gone out of business. I understand that other retailers in the EU are paying their suppliers as much as twice than they can get here you cannot “Have your Cake and Eat it”. We tend use the smaller, local retailers and farm shops so have not found shortages a problem.

21st May sees us once again partaking in the Chiltern Vintage Tractor run in aid of the Thames Valley Air Ambulance, I would hope, as always you will feel able to support us again this year, we are entering 3 Tractors. 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
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
