HARBY HISTORY GROUP – Louise Herrick 703662

Our new year kicked off in January with a DVD entitled "The Lincoln Cathedral Story" which we all watched together. It was a very informative DVD, telling the history of the cathedral with a few short interviews from people who worked there. It also included CGI to bring to life how Lincoln and the cathedral would have looked like in days gone by which really brought the story telling to life.

In February, Chris Lester from the Society for Lincolnshire History and Archaeology came to talk to us about the important work their industrial heritage team do with regard to water pumps. His talk with slides was entitled "The Supply of Water to Lincolnshire Country Houses". It covered the different ways of supplying water to country houses in the days before homes in general had access to mains water. He showed diagrams and photos of water wheels, ram pumps, hand pumps, horse engine pumps and more and explained how these worked. He told us where these examples could be found and also told us about one in particular that he couldn't divulge the location of as it was unguarded and the society was worried that it could be looted for scrap metal. Sadly, because of this, they can't even apply to get it protected as then its whereabouts would be made public knowledge and put it in danger.

Our next meeting is on 30 March. Returning guest speaker, Charles Parker, will give a talk and slide show on "The Development of Humberside Airport". He will have books available to purchase on the night.

The April, May and June meetings will all be trips. The cost to those attending will be a donation. The trips are as follows:-

27 April –Laxton 3-field system. Film show and walking tour including the site of the ancient castle. If the weather is poor then they will ensure there is an alternative activity for us to enjoy.

25 May-Darlton Manor House. Walk and talk round the ancient castle site, tour of the house followed by talk, tea and biscuits.

29 June-Lincoln Stonebow and Guildhall. Tour and mayoral regalia.

From the September meeting, the cost to attend will rise from £1 to £2 per person, due to increasing costs of speakers and the need to pay for the hall.



THORNEY SPOTTINGS (11) - Janet Collins

The continuing mild weather has had its benefits in several ways for bird spotters. Apart from it being cheaper to feed them because there is usually plenty of food left in the countryside, it also means you get a good look at the changing condition and colouring of the birds that do frequent your garden while the trees and bushes are still bare.

It meant that many animals were building themselves up early for the breeding season. Male birds, in particular, put on their best display of colour in order to attract the females. This magnificent show of feather colourings is an obvious sign of peak condition. It soon becomes apparent, when doing your spotting, which birds have had access to ample supplies of quality food sources. They are no different to humans, in this respect.

Mild conditions have also induced early breeding. Dick Padley had robins nesting close to the house at the beginning of March, so was able to do some spotting in the warmth. The rooks along the edge of Crow Wood were feeding young in mid-March, female pheasants were looking for likely nesting areas along the garden hedge and surrounding woodland areas, and the woodpeckers were hammering away in there, too.

Heightened activity has meant a greater number of birds visiting the area and our gardens. Very early in March a red kite gave a fantastic flying display in the sky over our garden and the surrounding properties. (Did anybody else spot it?) It was flying so low, at times, that the red colour in its forked tail was clearly visible. Spotted at such close quarters, you are entitled to refer to it as a red-tailed kite! Much of its undercarriage is a similar chestnut red colour, but this is not so obvious at its usual higher altitude, although the deeply forked tail with its effortless twisting movement is a giveaway characteristic. You may remember that Colin and Josie had a similar visitor last year. This year Colin was lucky enough to take a photograph of a tawny owl sitting on a post in the garden. Unfortunately, it was his mobile phone camera, so the quality was not clear enough to copy into this article. He is going to try to be more organized with a suitable camera for next time!

The feeders have attracted the usual chaffinches, blue tits, great tits and nuthatches. These were joined in early March by a few goldfinches, but not as many as usual. Then, suddenly, in mid-March, their numbers grew, quickly followed by long-tailed tits, goldfinches, siskins and several red polls. Of course, the usual ground feeders have been there to pick up the droppings. Blackbirds, robins, dunnocks, pigeons, and even house sparrows, mallard and a rook have all joined the party. It's been quite hectic at times!

March also saw the end of hibernation for toads that breed in the local ponds. Unfortunately, they are still fairly useless at crossing the road, which is why their arrival is usually spotted so easily. The grey squirrels are not much better. I suppose it is because they are still in 'waking up' mode. Of course, this early start bodes well for the rest of the year, with plenty of opportunity for the raising of several broods. And now the leaves are beginning to break in the local hawthorn hedgerows the birds will soon be whizzing across the roads from dawn to dusk. That's when they become as accident-prone as the toads and squirrels. Ah, well, c'est la vie!




Harby Thorney Wigsley Community Led Plan What's next...
