SpeedWatch.....

By the end of the September the SpeedWatch team will have been out monitoring traffic on 4 occasions. After 3 events the monitoring shows around 21% of cars speeding on each occasion who's details have been passed on to the local police team. Get Involved!

If you attended the Village Meeting you'll see there are many village groups and activities to get involved in, including the Parish Council! Its everybody joining in together to make the village a nice place to live that makes a village what it is, if you have time to spare why not get involved in many of the village activities, we'll include more info next time or on the PC website.

The Parish Precept

The Parish precept forms part of the council tax bill for everyone living in the village, it's essentially the budget the PC has to look

The current Stanton Harcourt precept is around 3% of the council tax bill for an average (band D) house, with the remainder going to WODC (~5%), the Police (~11%), and OCC (~79%).

The Parish Council can request any amount of precept that is agreed by the council and we have to account for the increase in houses as it doesn't go up automatically when new houses are built, note the village has increased in house numbers by ~13% with the former airfield site, and will increase a further ~8% with the Butts Piece site.

At present the precept is around 3% which is low compared to other villages with the average precept in West Oxfordshire being ~4.5%, any change to the precept is decided in the autumn and submitted to WODC to be included in the annual council tax review.

The PC and other village organisations are working hard to secure money from S106 (housebuilding) funds, along with other grants available to minimise the need for a high precept. We are also working hard to make good use of money by using it efficiently by reviewing the costs of insurance, village maintenance and grass cutting which is the majority of annual

However, we hope you'll agree that we live in a wonderful village and we are keen to both maintain this and invest in village facilities for the future so will be carefully looking at whether we need to increase the precept slightly to ensure we can invest in the village over the coming years.

When suddenly I am old, and start to wear purple. Jenny Joseph 1932 -








Town frowns: Thames clowns make river brown

Your Parish Council needs your help...

Raw sewage is being dumped in rivers and streams near where you live, in ever increasing frequency, duration and volumes. The current inadequate system of government regulation means that even where sewage works are failing to cope on a catastrophic and illegal scale, more housing can be and is, routinely added to the Network. Take Stanton Harcourt sewage works, as an example. It dumped untreated sewage on 132 occasions for a total of 2,484 hours into a small woodland brook which flows into the Thames near the Eynsham toll bridge and Swinford Water Treatment Works. Between September 2019 and March 2020, the works actually dumped untreated sewage almost continuously - for about 6 months. With similar events happening all over the county and country. Whose fault is this? Thames Water is your water company and, no, you can't change it as it is a monopoly and it has never been forced to invest to cope with demand. This needs to change and we need to pressure both Thames Water and the government to change their approach. You can read more about all of this on the www.windrushwasp.org website.


Lower Windrush Historical Society


The Lower Windrush Historical Society is running face to face talks: a perfect way to find out more about the rich local history in our area. New members are always welcome.

Apple of my Pie...

Apple Crumble Blondies It's Apple Day on 21st October. Celebrate with this tasty combination of apple delicacies

Ingredients (makes 9)

Crumble

-115g butter cold and cubed - 55g brown sugar

- 50g cup sugar - ½ tsp cinnamon - 125g flour

Blondies

- 155g cups flour - 2 tsp cinnamon - ½ tsp nutmeg

- ½ tsp salt - ½ tsp baking soda -1 eg

- 115g unsalted butter, melted -110g cup brown sugar


-1 tbsp lemon juice

- 55g maple syrup -1 tsp vanilla extract

- 2 apples, cored and diced

Method

1. Preheat oven to 180°C



- 3. *The Blondies:* In a bowl, add the flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt, and baking soda, stir to combine.
- 4.In a large bowl, add the butter, sugar, and maple syrup. Whisk until fully incorporated
- 5.Add the egg and vanilla to the bowl with the butter and mix until fully incorporated.
- 6.Add half of the flour mixture, and mix until just combined.
- 7.Add the second half of the flour mixture and mix until there are streaks of flour still showing, making sure to not overmix.

Pour the lemon juice over the apples then gently fold the apples into the batter.

8.Spread batter evenly into a greased 9-inch (23 cm) square cake pan.

9.Sprinkle crumble mixture over the top, creating different size crumble pieces by squeezing some small clumps together in your hands for varying texture.

10.Bake for 25 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean, cover with foil the last 5 minutes

11. Cool for about 20 minutes, slice and serve.

Did you know? We typically think of 'fall' as the American word for 'autumn', but it was in widespread usage in England until relatively recently. Originally a shortening of the phrase "fall of the leaf", the phrase was common in England in the 17th century. The word autumn entered

English from the French "automne" and didn't become common usage until the 18th century.
