

Charlton Footpaths Group



hairstreak butterfly through June and August, but be sure you first seek permission to visit the wood, as it is off the public footpath.

Our group meets on a Saturday morning, usually to walk from about 10:00-13:00, every 5-6 weeks for the enjoyment of exploring our local area and maintaining our footpaths, so they are not lost for future generations.

Gem Festival in Charlton Park 13-15 Jun

- Gem Festival are offering free tickets for Charlton residents,(also for some other local parishes).
- Sadly the detail of how to apply is not yet clear but in simple terms it will be handled by the Festival not by the Clerk. However there may be a need for the Clerk to confirm that applicants are genuine Charlton residents.
- · Therefore if you want free tickets, register with the Parish Clerk (by email).
- · Also recommended that you google the Festival to look up their genres of music may not be to everyones' taste!

Existance Festival

- Existance Festival are in Charlton Park on the same weekend as Gem Festival (but starting one day earlier) 12-15 Jun.
- Entry to Existance Festival is off the A429. Entry to Gem Festival is off the B4040 at Charlton Bridge.
- · We have no special arrangements with Existance Festival.

Parish Council Election

- · Local elections were held on 1 May 25. Names of our Parish Cllrs are on the inside back cover.
- Jennifer Walker stood down as a Parish Cllr after 38 years service. The PC will make a small presentation to her to thank her for her service at the Village Hall Coffee Morning on Mon 2 Jun.

Defibrillator – a reminder – what to do ...

- · Someone is unresponsive, not breathing normally. Dial 999 and ask for an ambulance.
- · Start CPR 30 chest compressions, 2 breaths, repeat and keep repeating.
- · If you are alone with the casualty it is far better to do CPR than to go to fetch the defibrillator. However if anyone else is with you or you can shout and call anyone else send them for the defib.
- You need to understand the 400 metre Rule when you call 999, the operator's computer will not tell the operator about our defib if your location is further than 400 metres away from the defib, so the 999 operator can't tell you. That doesn't matter you know where it is so you can go and get it or send someone else to get it.
- The cabinet on the Village Hall outer wall is unlocked. Open the defib when it gets to you it starts operating as soon as you open it. It tells you what to do, with a recorded voice. It cannot do any harm to the casualty it will not give a shock unless it detects that a shock is needed.
- · But tell anyone else in the vicinity to stand back before shocking.
- · Keep going with the CPR until the ambulance arrives (or until the casualty starts breathing normally on their own).



80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe Day –Westminster Abbey

It was a privilege to be present at the service at Westminster Abbey to remember all that was suffered and all that was lost and to honour those whose courage, strength and skill through long years of war brought victory and a new dawn to Europe.

To be involved in the ceremonial procession in the presence of the King and Queen and other members of the Royal Family and, most significantly, the wartime veterans, was a truly memorable occasion and at times quite emotional. Following the national two-minute silence, the choir of Westminster Abbey sang the most beautiful introit 'For the Fallen' with words by the war time poet Laurence Binyon.

For me, the Procession of Witness when artefacts from the Second World War were processed through the Abbey and placed on blue velvet cushions on the High Altar and then the lighting of the Peace Candle and the prayer so eloquently spoken by Alexander Churchill, the great-great-grandson of Sir Winston Churchill were truly memorable – 'Let us pray for peace in Europe and across the world; in our time and for generations to come. For the sacrifice of those who have gone before us to be honoured in the defence of liberty, justice and peace.'

At the end of the service the King and Queen together with the Prince and Princess of Wales paused to speak to the wartime veterans in the Nave of the Abbey before laying flowers at the Innocent Victims' Memorial and as the Abbey bells were 'fired' eighty times. All ten bells were sounded simultaneously, producing a powerful clashing sound, as is generally reserved for great celebrations, anniversaries and rejoicing interspersed with the bells being rung sequentially in descending scales. Church bells were rung in celebration throughout the United Kingdom on the 8th May 1945.

The service concluded with the singing of the National Anthem accompanied by the great Abbey organ and bands from the Household Cavalry, the Royal Marines and the Band of the Royal Air Force Regiment.

The service was conducted by the Very Reverend Dr David Hoyle KCVO MBE, Dean of Westminster (formally Dean of Bristol) and the address was given by The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York.



Bell Ringer's record "attempt" on 10th May

Bellringers always refer, prior to succeeding at ringing Peals and Quarter Peals, as 'attempts', as there is no certainty of success until we get to the last change. What we "Attempted" on May 10th was bound to succeed, as there was no existing World Record for the most number of ringers, verified through a tower in a day (12 hours). We knew that the National 12 Bell Striking Competition Final, has 10 teams, so we needed to beat 120. Well we achieved 176, which may not have been as high as we would have wished for, but it is now a challenge for anywhere else that may wish to beat it. We were very grateful to all who participated, with some coming from as far afield as Hereford, Lichfield, Lincolnshire, Bury St Edmunds and a band from Kent. Also, Roz Savage MP came to find out what it was all about and to have a go at ringing at the Church, under instruction. And it was wonderful that Jacqui Pearson, an ex-Churchwarden came back from where she has moved to in South Wales and where she has started ringing again.

All participants received a beautifully designed certificate provided by the Ringing World weekly magazine and our website www.charltonbells.co.uk, was provided by Liz Graney of Escape the Village, Marketing company, and we are very grateful to all the Towers and Ringers that supported our Tower Open Day, with Toby Gordon Smith, giving exceptional help to the organiser.

As well as the ringing in the Churches, we had the Mobile Belfry set up at the back of the village hall, which proved very popular, allowing non ringers an opportunity to have a go. Inside there were refreshments available all day, which was kindly organised by Rachel Swatton with some helpers. Tom Blanden had gone to great

lengths to provide a small Beer & Cider Festival with an appropriately chosen selection, 'Bellringer' from Towcester Mill Brewery, sponsored by A.R.Woodward Ltd, 'Fraid Not' from Exeter Brewery sponsored by Avon Ropes, 'Gravediggerr' sponsored by Mathews Funeral Directors, and 'Vicar's Ruin', both from Church End Brewery, sponsored by Dan Bailey Builders and a selection of Mates of Minety Cider sponsored by Mathew Higby Bell Engineer and Durnford Landscapes. Butcombe's kindly donated some Goram IPA 0%

The whole exercise was instigated by the Charlton Bellringers and organised as a fun fundraising event to improve the facilities within the Church, and we would also like to thank the Team of Verifiers led by the Rev. Bob Molton, and the Village Hall Committee who helped support this event by allowing us an extended use of the hall and recreation ground, along with thanks to the Cricket Club for arranging an away match.

When we know the final figure of what has been raised, it will be published.

June's Message from the Ministry

I want to talk about grief. Most of us have experienced it, and the older we get, the more likely it becomes that we will loose someone close to us. But we rarely talk about it, and we often set mental time limits on how we should feel. Whether it's a sudden, unexpected loss, the slow and painful slide of illness, or simply the gentle end of a long life well lived, the effect on those left behind can be devastating and long reaching.

I spoke to my father this week who confessed that he was struggling with this lovely weather. So many beautiful places to go, so many things to do... the enjoyment of each and every one diminished by no longer having my mother to share them with, so he did nothing. The loneliness of loss can sometimes be debilitating. She's been gone nearly 7 years now, but when I was bored on a long drive this week, I still found myself thinking 'I'll just call mum for a chat' and feeling that familiar stabbing pain of knowing she was gone.

Through my work at church, I frequently encounter death - talking to those who's loved ones have passed away, being involved in funerals, the complicated and sometimes agonising work of making decisions about the graveyard and how it's used by our community, or taking part in worship that reminds us of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Knowing that my mother is safe in the arms of a heavenly father who knew every fibre of her being because he created her, knowing that she's gone home, doesn't

make me miss her any less, just as knowing Jesus rose again on Easter day doesn't take away the pain and loss of Good Friday. But what does help me is being able to turn to that same heavenly father, who knows first hand the pain of death and loss, for solace in that grief. What does help is the joy of precious memories. What does help is the love and support of family and friends. What does help is talking – allowing those emotions to be recognised and acknowledged, sharing those beautiful memories, sometimes admitting that things weren't ok and mistakes were made that can now never be undone. But not everyone has someone to talk to, and sometimes it can be hard to share with others who are also grieving themselves.

Church isn't full of perfect people — I'm sure they won't mind me telling you that — but what I can say without doubt is our local churches are full of people who are kind, caring and willing listeners. We may not be able to work miracles (we leave that to the boss!) but if you need someone to talk to, about grief or any other subject, we are always here for you.

The church doesn't just belong to the people who walk through the door on Sunday morning – it belongs to everyone in the community, and you're all welcome. Our contact details are in this newsletter, or just turn up to a service. We'd love to see you, and I'm sure we'd find something to talk about...

Looking ahead: ATHELSTAN PILGRIM WAY

The weekend of the 6th/7th September is when the six Braydon Brook churches (including Charlton church) and the Upper Thames Benefice churches will officially join this event.

There will be several special events to mark the occasion and details will follow in the next edition of the Chat.

However, preparations currently in hand for a specially extended walking and cycling route from MALMESBURY to KINGSTON UPON THAMES to celebrate 1100th anniversary of Athelstan's Coronation.

In 2024 Malmesbury in North Wiltshire celebrated the 1100th anniversary of Athelstan becoming king. On September 4th 2025 Kingston upon Thames is celebrating the 1100th anniversary of Athelstan's coronation as the King of Wessex and Mercia.

To highlight the connection between these events the Athelstan Pilgrim Way, a popular network of footpaths and cycleways across North Wiltshire, is being extended to Kingston for two special events; a symbolic walk with a crown and a cycle from Malmesbury to Kingston, arriving together in Kingston on the anniversary of the coronation.

The walk will take place over 11 days - divided into three blocks of days - and starts on Monday 18th August, and the bike ride is on the 3rd and 4th of September. Might you be interested in taking part?

Walkers can join for any number of the 11 days of the walk. The daily walks are from 8.75 – 16.75 miles and several days walking follows the Thames Path. The organisers are hoping to provide return transport from the daily finishing point

In addition to the Athelstan Pilgrim Way walking routes, we have now designed a cycle route of around 100 miles, which covers all of the 36 churches in the North Wiltshire Deanery. The route consists of two circular sections, which can be ridden separately or combined into a single route. We have a draft version, but it now needs to be 'road tested'. We are looking for volunteers to try out either the whole route, one of the two sections, or even just a short section between two churches.

As the routes are circular, they can be started and ended at any church along the Athelstan Pilgrim Way.






