M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

Our work is progressing well and we'll soon be starting to put in drainage for the new carriageway. To do this we need to close the A249 southbound carriageway, from the Bobbing roundabout to north of the Stockbury roundabout, for three weekends in June

The closures will start at 10pm on Friday evening, with the road reopening by 5am on Monday morning. The closure will be in place:

- 10pm 10 June to 5am 13 June
- 10pm 17 June to 5am 20 June
- 10pm 24 June to 5am 27 June

For drivers wanting to head south (towards Maidstone) from the Bobbing roundabout, there will be a diversion in place via Sheppey Way, Chestnut Street and Maidstone Road. This will bring you the Stockbury roundabout, where you can continue your journey.

Public Meeting Rat Running & The Bridge 8th June 19:00 at the Village Hall

After the stunning turnout at the last Parish Council meeting, we have decided to give it one more go ...

Rat running has become a real problem in the lanes around the Parish. The problem on the eastern side of the A249 is temporary as it has been caused by the short term closure of Oad Street; the problem on the western side is likely to remain until National Highways have finished their project.

The Parish Council has been talking to the Kent County Council Highways department about what can be done to limit numbers and speeds but the options are very limited so far as we can see. We know what the problems are and have been conducting vehicle counts at various strategic points; we will also be conducting spot speed checks in the coming weeks. What is needed are real and practical ideas for resolving or reducing the problems. This is *your* chance to come forward and tell us what *you* think should be done and how *you* are able to help.

As you know, the idea of a bridge across the A249 to replace the increasingly dangerous Church Hill junction was rejected by the Department for Transport (DfT). The criteria used by the DfT means that we are never likely to succeed in getting funding through conventional means.

The question for Parishioners is how far should we go to put additional pressure on the DfT and would you want to be part of any campaign / action?

Parish Councillors have put untold numbers of hours into both of these problems but we cannot do everything on our own. It may be that you do not see either issue as a problem, in which case we will cease pursuing them. On the other hand, you may be concerned about one or both, in which case we need some of you to step forward and help.

Accident

Unfortunately, Yelsted experienced its first fatal accident in many years on Friday 20th May. As I write, the police have yet to complete their investigation but first impressions from seeing the site are that speed had a lot to do with it. As you may know, the speed limit in the lanes is 60 miles per hour, so the driver may well have been travelling at a dangerous speed but not breaking the law

On Wednesday 25th May, members of the Parish Council will be meeting with Officers from Kent County Council Highways to discuss a safety audit of the lanes within the Parish. This does not guarantee that any measures can be put in place to reduce the problems but it is an essential first step if we want KCC to do anything.

In the meantime, advice is the same as always: please keep your speed down when driving through the lanes and wear high visibility clothing when on foot, riding or cycling.


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



Mercury Falling by Robert Edric

Mercury Falling is a novel about the decline and fall of Jimmy Devlin, a young man trying to survive in the bleak and unforgiving landscape of the Fens in 1954. For a year we follow him as he takes any work he can get, even if that means becoming involved with petty crooks and conmen and inking deeper into trouble. He has no prospects, no hope for a better life. Even in the best of times, this harsh

area of England is a difficult place to live and these aren't the best of times. A severe flood the year before has only complicated matters for all the inhabitants and any idea of kindness or generosity has gone out the window.

It is no surprise then, that many among the comments about this book referenced its bleakness and as some of the members have associations with the area, they related strongly to the descriptions of the cold and isolation. A couple of people wanted to take care of the principal character and give him a "hot bath and a meal"!

One person only read a couple of chapters before giving up, so abstained from scoring.

There was a general consensus that despite the bleak descriptions, the book did generate interest in that members wanted to read more and find out what happened in the end. There was discussion about the particularly idiosyncratic nature of the inhabitants of the area.

The choice of names of the characters and the references to Romany travellers confused one reader into feeling that it could have been set in Ireland.

One member particularly related to the black-market references and another to the consequences of flooding both having had these experiences in their youth.

The meeting was again somewhat depleted this month with members missing due to physical ailment, geographical isolation (Oad Street closed and general traffic chaos on the A249) and more cheerfully members on holiday but this did not dampen the spirit of the group and the book received a score of 7/10.

Next month we will be discussing "The Fine Art of Invisible Detection" by Robert Goddard.

Chickenstock Music Festival Plans

Plans for this year's festival are now almost complete, so we thought we would share with you a few things that you may want to know. We have looked closely at last years event, which was bigger than previous years, have identified things that we should have done better and have addressed those issues. The festival is on Pett Farm, which is the South Green side of the A249, so does not cause issues to the main village - apart from maybe an increase in customers to the pub and farm shop.

As part of our Traffic Management strategy, we ask attendees when they will be arriving when they purchase their tickets. We will use this information to make sure a suitable amount of stewards are where they need to be to direct the traffic. We anticipate that a majority of traffic will arrive on Thursday 28th July between midday and 4pm. All traffic will be heading to the festival from the A249 from the Oad Street junction and then up Pett Lane and into Pett Road. Some of this traffic will be motorhomes and cars towing caravans which will be difficult to pass going in the other direction. Therefore we politely suggest that those not needing access to Pett Lane area avoid it if at all possible. We also expect day visitors to arrive between 10am and 11am on Friday 29th, Saturday 30th and Sunday 31st July and to leave between 10pm and 11pm. Again this may result in increased traffic using Pett Lane during these times. I have been in contact with Graham with regards to any planned road closures due to the road works, during the dates of the festival and have been assured that there are no closures planned.

For residents living in the immediate vicinity of the festival, there will be 24 hour Security Guards at both the top of Pett Road by the main gate into the camping fields and on the track between Norton Green Farm and South Green Lane to make sure that no unwanted visitors or traffic can get access to the houses in this area. We will also have Security on the festival arena and camping areas to ensure everyone is safe.

We have informed our headline bands (the ones playing last each day) that the music must cease by 11pm at the latest as we have done in all previous festivals, which is the cut off time we requested when we applied for our license. The cut off time could have been later but were conscious to keep late night noise to a minimum for our neighbours.

We will again be offering free tickets to residents of Pett Road, Pett Lane, South Green Lane and this year also to Deans Hill Road. You must have a ticket to gain access to the festival, so if you do want tickets, please email me at moya@chickenstockfestival.co.uk with photo proof of your address, or call me on 01622 884114.

We are very excited to have a total of 47 bands and artists performing over the 4 days including the original and legendary 10cc, as well as workshops for all ages including Circus Skills, African Drumming, Sing-and-sign, Ukulele, Willow weaving and Yoga. There will be a bar selling local beer and ciders as well as wines etc. and a selection of food stalls and retail stands selling all sorts of items and crafts.

Lastly we are an extremely small festival in comparison to others; I'm sure when some people hear the word ' festival' they think of Glastonbury which has over 120,000 attendees. We do not expect more than around 2,000 people to attend the event over the weekend. Most attendees are over 40 and very well behaved. The type of music is not heavy rock or rap and is mostly roots, blues and folk music.

We hope that local people will come and enjoy the event, which is family and dog friendly; we look forward to welcoming you to Chickenstock. We also hope that the disruption to those who live locally and do not want to attend will be as minimal as possible and to assure you that we will adhere to our license at all times.

This month we have seen the emergence of the larvae produced last year., they in turn have been off and fed on flower nectar in the garden, mated and themselves filled all available locations up with next years broods. There is no wonder that I struggle to keep up with the gardening, I spend too much time watching the leaf cutter bees.

Patrik Says ...

Most likely you will have read about the recent election results. Overall the Conservative Party at Maidstone have bucked the national trend, although there is no denying that we lost two members. Fortunately, Cllr de Wiggondene-Sheppard of Detling and Thurnham Ward returned back to us; this leaves us with a majority of one and allows us to proceed with the essential works which we started last year. As previously reported, the new council will operate under a hybrid model of an Executive Cabinet and three Policy Advisory Committees. bThis unique Maidstone model will return to a strong and effective executive leadership, while not entirely discarding the few benefits which the old committee system offered. Members and officers are looking forward to a culture change for the better in Maidstone House.

THE GREEN PARTY

North Downs voters may remember the Green Party candidate who gave me a run for my money in last year's election. This year Mr Jeffery's tireless campaign bore fruit and he became the Green Party's councillor for the urban Bridge Ward. I hear that upon election he joined the Independent Councillors Group. A tactical move no doubt, to get more committee seats than he would otherwise be entitled to as the sole Green Party member. He immediately rumbled the Council Chamber by criticising the Independent Remuneration Panel.

THE INDEPENDENT REMUNERATION PANEL

The role of the elected Councillor should, in part, be viewed as unpaid voluntary service. The Independent Remuneration Panel therefore advocates a principle of fair remuneration:

Remuneration should not be an incentive for service as a councillor. Nor should lack of remuneration be a barrier. The basic allowance should encourage people from a wide range of backgrounds and with a wide range of skills to serve as local councillors. Those who participate in and contribute to the democratic process should not suffer unreasonable financial disadvantage as a result of doing so.

The Panel therefore found that £9.03 per hour is a fair rate. This is 47 pence below the National Minimum Wage and limited to 12 hours per week only. Many of us work much longer hours and most of us are not entitled to any special allowance for additional work.

Cllr Jeffrey is right insofar as there will be a steep spending increase for members' remuneration due to our governance system changing. For elected members to take back control of the council we will overall need to spend more time doing our job. The previous committee system failed the people of Maidstone.

Democracy does not come for free but the taxpayers of Maidstone will get a good deal. — I'm not too sure that

the NHS did when they paid Mr Jeffrey £140,000 (including pension contributions) in 2019.

I have been advised that the new KCC Waste Management site in Allington is now open to the public. To ensure maximum efficiency, the new site has been designed to operate without interruption as it is built on two levels thus allowing full containers to be removed safely while residents can still use the site to deposit their recyclables and waste. A number of other environment-friendly features were incorporated into the design, such as solar panels and rainwater harvesting.

The site will offer Maidstone residents an alternative, to the site in Tovil.


MAIDSTONE BUSINESS BOOST NETWORKING EVENT

Fraud Alert

Courier Fraud

The four most common versions of courier fraud are:

Bank card expiry: Fraudsters claim to be from the victim's bank and say their card is no longer valid. They ask for the pin number and then send a "courier" to collect the card before using it for fraudulent purposes.

Purchasing high end items: The suspects pretend to be police officers and ask the victim to help with an undercover operation by purchasing expensive items like watches, jewellery and gold. Once the item is bought, the victim will hand over the item to the criminal.

Counterfeit cash/bank investigation: A person claiming to be a police or banking official informs the victim that they need to help with a banking corruption investigation. The victim is told to withdraw a large amount of money and the cash is picked up later by a courier to "check for fingerprints or to identify counterfeit bank notes".

Computer takeover: The fraudster telephones the victim, purporting to be from their internet service provider, saying that they have had an issue with their internet connectivity and they are due compensation. The victim is persuaded to download a remote access application, giving the suspects access to their home computers. The fraudster persuades the victims into thinking that they have been paid too much compensation and the victims then withdraw cash to pay the money back, which is later collected by a courier.

Some of the signs of courier fraud are:

- Courier fraud usually starts with an unsolicited telephone call to the victim.
- Typically the suspect will pose as a bank official, police officer or a computer or utility engineer.
- Courier fraudsters will usually request the victim purchases high value items such as Rolex watch and gold bullion, withdraws cash or provides a bank card for collection from a courier.
- Fraudsters will instruct victims not tell any family or friends about what they are doing.
- When carrying out courier fraud, criminals will request the victim hangs up the phone to ring their bank for confirmation while keeping the line open. The suspect then purports to be bank official and provides false confirmation.*
- Fraudsters will also make arrangements for a courier to meet the victim to collect the item they have purchased.

*We would *always* advise people to call using a different phone to the one they were called on. If this is not possible, then they should wait five minutes and then ring a family member or friend to ensure that the line has been cleared, before calling.

Remember, if you get a call from someone stating they are from the Police and request that you withdraw money for them to collect, *it is a scam*. The Police will never ask you to do this or to lie to your Bank or family etc.

If you think that you may have been a victim of this type of scam, then contact your Bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or calling 0300 123 2040 or if the crime is happening, ring 999.



Jubilee Trifle Recipe

Celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II with this impressive trifle (the cheats version!), winner of the Platinum Pudding competition.

For this recipe you will need 2 Swiss roll tins, measuring approximately 24cmx34cm/9½inx13½in and a trifle dish with capacity of approximately 3.5 litres/6 pints. However, you could always halve the recipe to serve 10 instead of 20!

Ingredients

For the Swiss roll

- 4 large free-range eggs
- 100g/3½oz caster sugar, plus extra for dusting
- 100g/3½oz self-raising flour, sieved
- butter, for greasing

300gm jar of Lemon Curd

1 packet of lemon jelly - follow packet instructions to make 568ml / 1 pint

500ml / 18fl oz ready made custard

100gm / 3½oz amaretti biscuits

600ml / 20fl oz double cream

For the chunky Mandarin Coulis

4x tins mandarins, around 300g each

45g/1³/₄oz caster sugar

16g/½oz arrowroot (2 sachets)

½ lemon, juice only

Method

- To make the Swiss rolls, preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C Fan/Gas 4. Grease and line the 2 Swiss roll tins with baking paper. In a large bowl, beat the egg and sugar together with an electric hand whisk for approximately 5 minutes or until light and pale. Using a metal spoon, gently fold in the flour. Divide between the two tins and bake for 10–12 minutes or until the sponges are lightly golden and cooked through.
- Sprinkle some extra caster sugar on two sheets of baking paper then turn the sponges out onto the sugared paper. Peel off the paper from the underside and, while still warm, roll them both up from the short end into a tight spiral using the paper to help. Leave to cool.
- To make the chunky mandarin coulis, strain two tins of mandarins of their juice. Discard the juice and put the fruit into a saucepan with the sugar and heat gently until broken down. Remove from the heat. In a small bowl, slake the arrowroot with 2 tablespoons cold water then add to the warm mandarins. Add the lemon juice and mix well before pouring into a large bowl. Strain the remaining two tins of mandarins and add the fruit to the bowl then leave to cool completely.
- To assemble, unroll the cooled Swiss rolls and spread with the lemon curd. Roll back up again and slice one into 2.5cm/1in slices and place upright around the bottom edge of the trifle dish so the swirl is visible. Slice the other Swiss roll into thicker pieces and use these to fill the bottom of the dish, ensuring the top is roughly the same level as the slices that line the edge. Use off-cuts of sponge to fill any gaps.
- Pour the lemon jelly over the Swiss roll layer and set aside in the fridge to completely set. This will take approximately 3 hours. Once set, pour over the custard then arrange a single layer of amaretti biscuits, keeping a few back for the top. Pour over the mandarin coulis. In a large bowl, whip the double cream until soft peaks form then spoon this over the coulis. Scatter reserved amaretti biscuits, mixed peal and white chocolate drops to decorate.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacon Tart

The ingredients represent all 4 nations of the UK:

England: Cheddar Cheese Northern Ireland: Potatoes Scotland: Smoked Salmon

Wales: Leek
Ingredients

Pastry Case:

- 140 g (5 oz) plain flour
- 35 g (1 ½ oz) margarine
- $35 g (1 \frac{1}{4} oz)$ vegetable fat
- About 1 ½ tablespoons cold water

Or use ready-made shortcrust pastry

*20cm (8') loose-bottom flan tin

*baking beans

Filling

- 100 g (4 oz) Smoked salmon (trimmings or chopped small)
- 50 g (2 oz) leek
- 100g (4 oz) cooked potatoes
- 70g (2 ³/₄ oz) Cheddar cheese (grated)
- 200 ml (7 fl oz) single cream
- 2 large eggs (beaten)
- 1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley
- Black pepper
- · Butter or oil

Method

- To make pastry place flour in bowl add the fats and rub in lightly with fingertips until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add enough cold water to bind to a soft dough, knead briefly and shape in to a ball. Wrap and chill for 30 minutes.
- Roll out the pastry and use to line the flan tin. Prick the bottom of the pastry with a fork. Line pastry shell with foil and fill with baking beans. Place tin on a heated baking tray and bake in preheated oven at 200°C Fan (Gas 7) for 10 minutes, remove foil and baking beans, return to the oven for a further 10 minutes.
- Reduce oven temperature to 160°C Fan (Gas 4).
- Scrub potatoes and place in a pan of lightly salted boiling water to cook for 15 minutes. Drain and allow to cool before removing the skin and then slicing thinly.
- Finely chop leek. Heat a little butter or oil in a small frying pan, add chopped leek to the pan and cook over a low to moderate heat, stirring occasionally, for about 10 minutes until soft but not coloured allow to cool.
- Mix together cream, beaten eggs, chopped parsley and plenty of ground black pepper. Layer filling in pastry case; spread smoked salmon over base of tart followed by cooked leek and then 50 g (2 oz) grated cheese (keeping remaining 20g (¾ oz) to sprinkle on top). Top with thinly sliced cooked

potatoes. Sprinkle remaining grated cheese over the top, then gently pour cream and egg mixture in to the tart.

• Bake in oven for 30 - 35 minutes until filling is set and golden. Serve cold.
