



# Parish Council news

#### Parish Council news from Cllr. John Britt

You will see regular updates on all the parish council's activities in the Focus, our website and social media.

#### Lenham Parish Precept, 2024/25

Lenham Parish Council has worked hard during a tough year to review all its outgoings and how best to structure the money it gets from the parish precept and other income.

As a result, for the coming financial year (2024/25), we have managed to **not increase** the parish precept: we have held the charge for a Band D property at £135.

At a time when everyone will doubtless see increased demands from both Maidstone Borough Council and KCC in their Council Tax bills, Lenham Parish Council will not be adding to the financial burdens people are currently experiencing for the next financial year.

This has been achieved because, due to the current developments, the number of "qualifying" Band D properties has increased. The qualifying Band D properties are a factor the parish council must use to calculate the parish precept element of Council Tax. The increase in qualifying Band D properties in the parish has given us some welcome financial headroom to absorb additional costs for the coming financial year (2024/25).

We cannot promise that this will be the case for future years. However, one of the often-overlooked outcomes from new homes is that, as the number of "qualifying" Band D properties increases, this has the potential for a positive impact on calculations that affect the parish precept. All the while this situation

continues it provides the parish council with a measure of financial headroom which we have been able to take advantage of for the next financial year.

Additionally, because of an agreement to sell a strip of land at William Pit Field to the company which will be developing the land west of Old Ham Lane (outlined as strategic site 5 in the Lenham Neighbourhood Plan), we have a windfall which has delivered some additional income for capital projects. Over the next few months, the parish council will be gathering costs for these current items on the "to-do" list to ensure that we make the maximum use of these funds.

We have managed this despite needing to ringfence funds in case we need to react to the outcome of the review of the Local Plan. This still contains a proposal to parachute 5,000 new dwellings, which amounts to a new town, onto the eastern edge of the parish from 2031.

Some will say "why fight the inevitable?" We firmly believe, as do others who we speak to on a regular basis, that Lenham has committed to more than its fair share of development up to 2031 (from the outcome of the 2017 review).

We still believe that this proposal for a new town is undeliverable, unsustainable and in the long run will not materialise because the myriad of issues surrounding its proper deliverability are going to prove too costly to overcome.



# Climate Change is Happening

ong, long before words such as 'Climate Change', 'carbon' and 'sustainable' entered everyday parlance, King Charles recognised that the global climate would become the most important issue of our time.



Climate scientists aside, the King is undoubtedly one of the most knowledgeable people in the world, thus it was fitting that he addressed COP28 in Dubai. Warning that the dangers of Climate Change 'are no longer distant risks', he said he was 'greatly worried' that countries were so 'dreadfully far off track' in efforts to address the crisis. He also said "In 2050 our grandchildren won't be asking what we said, they will be living with the consequences of what we did or did not do" but his final words were the most telling: "The Earth does not belong

to us, we belong to the Earth". (Climate Change is defined by NASA as 'a long-term change in the average weather patterns that have come to define Earth's local, regional and global climates'.)

Despite the 40.3C recorded in Lincolnshire last year, a jump from previous highest temperature of 38.7C recorded in Cambridge in 2019, at the present time the UK is escaping the most direct effects of Climate Change but some big food producing countries are already severely affected. Consider this in line with the fact that in 2022 the UK produced 58% of domestic consumption; the remaining 42% of our food was imported. Our farmers and growers could increase production but they need to be encouraged by consumers actively seeking labels that identify UK/ Britain. Aligned to this, there must be greater recognition of the very high food safety standards maintained in this country and, as a nation of supposed animallovers, surely we need to acknowledge the rigorous livestock management standards upheld by our farmers?

Problem. It is estimated that one-third of food produced globally is wasted. Another problem. We – and many other countries – continue to build houses that don't factor in climate-related risks. The UK persists in building properties that fail to retain heat in the winter and aren't cool in the summer.

This would be relatively easy to change but, in a country that values history, tradition and conservation, this leads to an even more massive challenge: how are we to decarbonise existing housing stock, some of which is several hundreds of vears old?

Meanwhile: It is a sad fact that many of the promises made at COP27 (held in Sharm El Sheikh in 2022) have been either watered down or shelved, largely due to governments around the world

being forced to concentrate on current economic problems. Only time will tell if COP28 pledges fare better.

And: a report has found the US is warming about 60% faster than the world as a whole and that extreme events cost the economy nearly \$150bn each year.

Globally, the climate crisis is making food less available and more expensive. Spain had unprecedented temperatures of 30C in the month of November.





Our family name is Stedman, you'll find us far and wide but Kent was where we came from, where many lived and died. You'll find us there for centuries, on gravestones and in church records births, marriages and deaths, for many, many decades.

A village called Lenham is our ancestral home, descendants still go back there no matter how far they've roamed. You won't believe how many, share our genes and DNA we're nothing but prolific, there's thousands of us today.

So we'll start with George Stedman, though it goes further back than that a labourer of the land was he, with a long beard and a hat. His wife she was called Mary, her family name was Neaves they had fourteen children, must've brought Mary to her knees

'Twas in the 1800s, new horizons in their minds the Mormons came to Lenham, promising lives of a better kind. So good old George and Mary, who by then were getting quite old, decided to pack and up their sticks, a move I'd consider rather bold

They took twelve of their children and went up to Liverpool, and there they caught a great big ship, it must've been quite cool.

They sailed the seas for many days, disembarking at New York for the people of little Lenham, I bet it caused a lot of talk.

But back in good old Lenham, two kids remained right there I wonder why they didn't go, perhaps they didn't dare. Perhaps they meant to follow on, but just didn't have the cash, or perhaps they thought their parents were really rather rash.

I think that many families left Lenham during that time wooed by having many wives, and a life much more sublime. I imagine them in wagon trains trailing across the USA, did they meet red indians? They survived it anyway.

They ended up in Utah, in the city of Salt Lake, they settled there for many years, and great lives they did make.

Meanwhile back in England, life it carried on, and George's son Henry's wife, gave birth to their youngest son.

This son that they called Edward, my great-grandad no less, he grew up and married Annie Smith and with children they were blessed. They had another Edward, they called him Edward John,

and he married a local lass Milly.

and my dad was their son.

They didn't marry in Lenham, they moved a county away, they went to live near Guildford, and remained till their dying day. When my dad grew up he moved, up North with his new bride, assisting the scattering of Stedmans far and wide

Lenham is now a memory, in our family history tree, I'm proud to be from Lenham, it's a beautiful village to me.
I've visited and wandered, touching walls and ancient stones, thinking of my ancestors and the places that they did roam.

# Recipe of the Month Granny's Warming Vegetable Soup

The selection of root vegetables can be whichever you like. The soup will serve 6.

#### Ingredients:

6 medium Carrots

- 1 large Potato
- 1 large Parsnip
- 1 large Turnip
- 1 Onion: all chopped
- 2 tbsp oil
- 25g butter
- 11/2 litres water
- 300 mls milk
- 3 tbsp crème fraiche
- 2 tbsp chopped dill,
- 1 tbsp lemon juice,
- 1 piece fresh ginger peeled and grated, Salt & pepper

Fresh dill to garnish

#### Method:

Put the chopped vegetables in a large pan with the oil and butter. Fry lightly then cook over a low heat for about 15 minutes stirring the pan occasionally. Add the water and bring to the boil.



Cover and simmer for 20 minutes until the vegetables are soft.

Add the ginger and blend with a stick blender (or put vegetables in a blender) and puree until smooth. Return to the pan, add the milk and heat gently while it slowly reheats.

Remove from the heat and stir in the crème fraiche, lemon juice and dill seasoning as necessary.

Reheat very gently not allowing it to boil. Serve garnished with the dill and/or croutons.

The most unexpected things I have found? Firstly a Bible, and then a mobile phone (which I took to the local police).



I cannot tell you how good you feel when you have spent just an hour, yet filled up a complete sack. Getting plastic out of the soil is even better than recycling, and doing it in a group is very rewarding.

And once you have got yourself into the swing of things, why not take your sack with you whenever you are out walking and just do a bit each time. You really will be making a difference as particularly the plastic you rescue will be out of the earth and no longer breaking down into micro plastics which could never be recovered.

# Book Review

#### From the Lenham Library

book I enjoyed recently was Great-Uncle Harry. A tale of War and Empire by the celebrated author and documentary maker Michael Palin. Many books are written about the first World War often exploring its politics or poetry, but few books recount the day-to-day life of the ordinary service man or woman.


Many years ago, Palin discovered that his grandfather had a

younger brother who had died in tragic circumstances aged 32. From a collection of diaries, military and colonial records and family photographs the author has pierced together the life of his relative.

"Great-Uncle Harry is an utterly compelling account of an ordinary man who led an extraordinary life. A blend of biography, history, travelogue, and personal memoir that is Michael Palin at his finest."

Harry, born in 1884, was the youngest child in the Palin family. Son of an Oxford don and his Irish American wife, he had a happy childhood in a sprawling vicarage. A true child of the Empire but lacking the academic ability of his older siblings, Harry decided to try his hand working on the Indian railways and the tea plantations. When this did not satisfy his quest for adventure he moved to a farm in New Zealand.

Meanwhile political tensions were erupting far away in Western Europe and there was a call to arms for young men and women to serve the war effort. Harry and



his friends enlisted in 1914 in the first Battalion of the Canterbury Regiment of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force destination Suez Egypt.

Soon after arriving in Europe Harry was deployed to the Dardanelles where he fought in and survived the carnage of the Gallipoli campaign. The ANZACS were a distinctive bunch with their "lemon squeezer" hats to deflect the rain. They took heavy casualties before

leaving for the western front.

Palin's great-uncle Harry survived a brutal four and half months on the peninsula and almost survived the Battle of the Somme, being one of the very last members of the New Zealand forces to die in that offensive.

Harry Palin lived a brief and unremarkable life. He was not awarded any military honours and his diaries record the trivial and the mundane. Socks knitted by his sisters to keep his feet dry in the trenches and the possibility of leave to visit his mother in Tonbridge. In fact, home comforts that keep us going in adversity.

Most of us have a distant relative who lived and sometimes died in the war and this book could be a testament to any one of them. Harry died and was buried in the mud of Flanders; his mortal remains like the Unknown Soldier known only to God. Michael Palin has given Harry a voice and his free spirit lives on over a hundred years later in his great-nephew. Some family traits never change.

# Simple Well-being. The process of loving others

he understanding that when we love someone what we receive back is not the love of that person, but the "beauty", flourishing of that person, which is a game-changer in loving others.

Based on this understanding it becomes clear that love is not a feeling but an action, directed to create a short or long-term environment that will stimulate a positive response or development in another person, which will be perceived by us as a stimulating power of beauty. In this respect, love is not a noun, but a verb. Furthermore, such an approach, even though it may seem very complicated, will clear the understanding of what love is and guarantee its growth.

There are a few interesting points that can be raised about different perceptions of what love is. Let's look at the classical perception of love – I love someone and expect love in return. It may sound fair, but there is unavoidable selfishness in this formula. Even if I don't accept it as true, if I expect to be loved in return, I love that person for my sake. Also, in these relationships comparison is unavoidable. Sooner or later, I'll begin to compare how much I give and how much I receive, and that is a killer for any relationship, be it between partners, friends, or parents and children.

But what if I love someone to bring up their "beauty"?

In this relationship, I receive a "reward" by seeing the happiness of another person caused by me. In this formula, I cannot achieve results focusing on my expectations. To create an environment or situation that will make another person happy I must focus on that person; on that person's situation and needs. You love the person for that person's sake. The "reward" comes as a side-effect.

The stimulation received from being a source of happiness for someone could be overwhelming, but you will not expect it. Even if you expect such stimulation, could it be perceived as selfish? If it could, then it would be a new definition of selfishness – a positive one.

Have you ever experienced a situation when you gave someone a present or helped someone and all of a sudden saw tears of happiness in that person's eyes? If you have, you know what I am talking about when I talk about an enormous stimulation of "beauty". And here is the thing; the more you experience it, the more you will be drawn to experience it again, and the easier it will be to love others.

Your love will grow, and so will your happiness. Loving others is the highest form of self-love.

But what has Christmas meant to you? Has it been a round of Christmas parties celebrating with friends or work colleagues? Or a time for meeting up with family and having a beautiful roast Turkey or similar for Christmas lunch? Of course, there is much more to Christmas than all of this, and it is the message of the angels that first Christmas that keeps on recurring in my mind.

I am often asked the question "Why is there so much evil in the world?" My answer tends to come back to the message of the angels who said that it was one of "Peace on earth and goodwill toward men."

It is true to say that we see extraordinarily little peace and goodwill around in the world today. For the past two years or so we have seen the devastation that war between Ukraine and Russia has brought to our TV screens. To have such a relationship, we must listen to the words of Jesus when he spoke to a man called Nicodemus. He told him that he had to be "born again." That is the only way that we can be assured of knowing the "prince of peace" in our lives.

# Getting people the care they need locally - the launch of Pharmacy First'

# Our local MP and Health Minister, Helen Whately, explains

he faster you can get the care you need, the better health you'll be in. This simple but powerful idea is at the centre of everything I'm working on as a Health Minister at the moment to reform our health and social care system. By bringing care closer to home and identifying conditions when they're more treatable, we can help people stay out of hospital and live healthy and independent lives for longer.

Primary care services like GPs have a huge role to play in this, but since the pandemic lots of people locally have found it harder to see their GP. That's why I've made GP and dentist appointments one of my 5 local priorities for Faversham and Mid Kent, and I'm pleased to report on recent progress.

In October 2023 there were more than a million appointments offered by GPs in Kent and Medway – an increase of nearly 20% in the last two years alone. Two-thirds of these appointments are taking place face-to-face, and GPs deserve a huge amount of credit for making this all happen.

I've also been supporting local GPs to expand in Faversham and Hollingbourne, and I'm still working on bringing new services to Park Wood and to Teynham. These expansions will be supported by the new Kent Medical School which I campaigned for when I first became an MP. It opened in 2020 and will soon be churning out new doctors, who we know often stay working near where they train.

However with demand still on the rise we've got to change how we do things too, and that's why from the 31 January the government is launching Pharmacy First.

There's a reason why the local pharmacy is often the first place we go when we're ill or need advice. You might have to queue for a few minutes, but if the pharmacy's open you can guarantee you'll be seen that day. From this month we're going to make even better use of their skills. We're expanding their role and for the first time ever allowing them to prescribe some medicines, as well as increasing access to things like blood pressure checks and oral contraceptives.

These plans go hand in hand with cutting bureaucracy for GPs, hiring 26,000 more primary care professionals, and putting in place new phone systems to finally end the 8am rush for appointments. These changes are to help people get care more easily, and I'd love to hear how they're working out for you. Please do pop into your local pharmacy and have a chat about what they offer, and keep letting me know about any problems you're having in your area.

At the same time I'm also working to increase the number of NHS dentist appointments locally, and I'm currently campaigning with other Kent MPs for a new Kent Dental School.

# Words, Phrases, Formulae, Abbreviations

That you weren't familiar with, didn't know existed – or had a different meaning not so long ago...



### **Pandemic**

While pandemic is certainly not a new word, it has become a far more commonplace part of our daily conversation. A good definition might be "a pandemic is the worldwide spread of a new disease that affects large numbers

of people." The distinction between pandemic and epidemic is that pandemic applies to a disease that has spread to multiple countries and continents, while epidemic is a disease that has spread over a wide geographic area, though not internationally or globally. Epidemiology is the branch of medicine dealing with the incidence and prevalence of disease in large populations and with detection of the source and cause of epidemics of infectious disease.



### **COVID-19/Coronavirus**

You may be tempted to use COVID-19 as a synonym for coronavirus, but that will confuse matters. COVID-19 is the name of the disease that the novel coronavirus causes. It stands for "coronavirus disease 2019."

### R = 1

The now-famous formula, where R stands for reproduction or reproductive.



It is the average number of people that a person with an infectious disease is expected to spread the infection to (in population immune to the disease). In other words, if one person is infected, how many other people will they infect? If R is greater than 1, it can spread in a population and cause an outbreak. Estimates vary, but one study measures the R of COVID-19 at 2.2. That means that, on average, each person infected with COVID-19 spreads it to two other people. For comparison, the R of measles is estimated between a value of 12–18; seasonal strains of the flu have been estimated at 1.3.

### Quarantine

One of the most challenging parts of our new normal, quarantines are defined as "a way of separating and restricting people who have been exposed to a disease, such as COVID-19, to see if they too have become infected and get ill."

# Lockdown and Shutdown

Slightly different than quarantine and self-quarantine, lockdown (voted 'word of the year!) and shutdown are



being used by many to describe more general and widespread restrictions on movement, work and travel on all people in a city, region or country.



# **Social Distancing**

It's probably fair to say that prior to March, the phrase social distancing was one few of us had used. It's

putting physical distance between yourself and other people. This means avoiding groups of people (parties, crowds, queues) and maintaining distance from others when possible.

### **Bubbles**

We used to think of bubbles as things we generated in the bath, or the ones children



made from a spoon-like piece of plastic dipped in soapy water. Not anymore! Now it's the strange concept of keeping certain people together and others apart...

# **Flattening the Curve**

A strategy to reduce the number of infections— and controlling the R number (as above).

# **Contact Tracing**

Means the practice of identifying and monitoring individuals who may have had contact with an infectious person as a means of controlling the spread of a communicable disease. A way of isolating Super-Spreaders (highly contagious individuals capable of transmitting to an unusually large number of uninfected others.

# **Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)**

The items that have been in woefully short supply in this country, PPE is specialised clothing or equipment, worn by an employee for protection against infectious materials. Now encompasses such items as gloves, gowns, aprons, masks, respirators, goggles, face shields and anything else you can think of.



# **Furlough**

What on earth is that?? We all know now it's a temporary layoff from work used as businesses conducting non-essential activities were closed. This was done to prevent the spread of the disease by banning large gatherings.

### **Herd Immunity**

Is the immunity or resistance to a particular infection that occurs in a group of people or animals when a very high percentage of individuals have been vaccinated or previously exposed to the infection.

### WHO (what??)

Stands for the World Health
Organization, a United Nations
agency based in Geneva, Switzerland,
whose role 'to direct and coordinate
international health within the United
Nations system through the life-course;
noncommunicable and communicable
diseases; preparedness, surveillance
and response; and corporate services.'.
So that worked then!!

# Climate Change

# A local resident, Ellie Stevens, makes a plea to us all

'The greatest threat to our planet is the belief that someone else will save it.' (Robert Swan, OBE, Polar Explorer)

Before you start reading, please note
- I am not an expert in the field. I'm an
average citizen just trying to make
sense of this crazy world!

o you feel powerless in the face of climate change? Like me, do you do your best to recycle, eat less meat and use the car less but then often wonder: is this making any difference? After some pondering, reading and watching many of the recent climate change TV programmes, I've decided that yes, we, the public, can make a difference. And I ask you to join me to be part of the climate change solution. What we need right now is hope. Hope must come from action.

Whether we like it or not, the climate on earth has changed and is changing. According to the UN: 'To keep global warming to no more than 1.5°C emissions need to be reduced by 45% by 2030 and reach net zero by 2050'. At the moment, we're heading towards an average global increase of 2°C or higher. This will have consequences for all our lives – particularly our children and grandchildren.

But it's not too late to reverse this pattern. Did you know that the UK's Climate Change Committee has provided the Government with a credible plan to reach its target of Carbon Net Zero by 2050 without hurting the economy? It's



all possible. BUT... the Government is not quite sticking to this plan, even though they have commissioned the research. (They are currently still giving oil and gas companies huge tax breaks - money which could be invested in green technology; being incredibly slow to encourage onshore wind farms; and preside over a housing stock that has some of the worst insulated homes in Europe). To avoid this crisis, the world needs to come together and keep to its pledge of Carbon Net Zero by 2050. However, you could argue, why does the UK need to bother if other countries aren't? But as compassionate human beings, surely we have to lead by example?

So, while individuals alone may not be able to make the drastic emission cuts to slow down climate change, it's essential that we take action to raise the importance of this huge issue to businesses and politicians. Ultimately, politicians want our vote and businesses want our custom; if we all demand their true commitment to Net Zero by 2050, then change will have to happen.

### What can we do?

A lot! The advice from Imperial College, London is that 'using your voice as a consumer, a customer, a member of the electorate and an active citizen, will lead to changes on a much grander scale.'

- Write to our MPs (see www.moralfibres.co.uk on how to do this) or attend one of their surgeries. Personal emails are more effective than mass petitions. Tell them how important the climate change crisis is to us and that we're concerned the present government is veering away from Net Zero by 2050. If enough of us speak up, they will have to listen. - Continue to consider our life style choices – fly less, use the car

- less. Continue to reduce what we consume, re-use and repair what we can and recycle. Shop wisely and let businesses know if we are not happy with their policies.
- Talk to everyone we know friends, family, neighbours about climate issues. Thanks for reading. We need to mobilise a ripple of change through the population. Be part of the solution - together we are stronger. Let's keep hopeful and act!






# The Mormons in Lenham...



# a story from Woodside Green



erhaps you have never heard of "Woodside Green", but Woodside Green is, like West Street or Warren Street, part of the Parish of Lenham.


Historically, people living outside of the village often felt that they were an afterthought when it came to parish politics, which were, until not too long ago, represented by the church. Perhaps it was the disenchantment with the church which made one young man, James Turner (born 28.3.1819), turn to the Mormon Church (see also the article: 'My ancestral Home' in the December *Focus*).


James Turner was the son of Mary Stedman and James Turner, who ran a public house which became known as "The Duke of Wellington". The Turner family owned the popular pub in Woodside Green well into the 20<sup>th</sup> Century (see www.heritagelenham.co.uk/public-houses)

James Turner had married Mary Finch from Otterden in 1840 and moved with his wife to London where he became a baptised member of the Mormon Church in 1850. He was sent to Lenham as a missionary where he encountered "considerable prosecution" and "opposition". He emigrated in 1854 to join his brethren in America. At that time, the Lenham Mormon congregation, which he had set up, had 30 members. Some of them followed his example and also emigrated to America.

Turner was ordained a priest in 1857 but was sent on a 'military' mission and it is likely that he was involved in the Utah War. He was ordained a high Priest in 1866 and became a counsellor to a Mormon bishop.

The main obstacle to Utah being recognised as a State of the United States of America was the fact that Mormons were allowed several wives. In order to become a state of the USA this practice was outlawed. James Turner was arrested in 1887 and held for 50 days on the charge of "unlawful cohabitation" with several wives. It was, however, only in 1890 that the Mormon Church rescinded its polygamy laws. James Turner died in September 1895 and did not live to see Utah become a member state of the US on January 4th 1896. He, a man of humble beginnings, is still revered as a prominent member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

# Nature Watch

# The cuter side of garden nature. From Darren Hammond

he birds and the bees are not the only animals to make up what we can see in our gardens and in the undergrowth of the countryside. There are many other creatures like badgers, foxes, hedgehogs and the much maligned mouse, along with its cousin, the vole.

Here I will focus on two particular kinds of the little furry creatures; the **wood mouse** and the **bank vole**.



This tiny little mouse is related to the house mouse but has several differences. If you're lucky enough to spot one look out for the larger ears and bigger eyes relative to their size which are two of the bigger differences between the two. They are also quite different in colour and a house mouse is very unlikely to be seen outdoors.

The wood mouse is probably most common in woodland, rough grassland and gardens. It is mostly nocturnal and an agile climber. Even though they are perhaps the most common rodent in the UK, they are also very shy and nervous and will scamper to safety with any movement or sound.







Wood mice feast on nuts, seeds and invertebrates (like worms and caterpillars) and will gather food stores of berries and seeds in the autumn, which they keep in underground burrows or, believe it or not, sometimes in old birds' nests.

The chestnut-brown bank vole is our smallest vole and can be found in hedgerows, woodlands, parks and gardens. It eats fruit, nuts and small insects, but is particularly keen on hazelnuts and blackberries. Bank voles are very active and agile animals and incredibly quick so it can be very hard to spot them. If you hear a rustling in the leaves under a hedge or round the edge of a garden, stay very still and you may be lucky enough to see one.





The bank vole is a rich, chestnut-brown above, and white below. It is richer in colour than the similar field vole and has a longer tail compared to its body length. Voles have blunter, rounder faces, smaller ears and eyes, and shorter tails than mice.

They live in shallow burrows, but may make grassy, round nests above ground if the soil is unsuitable for digging.

Also bank voles do not hibernate so can be seen all year round.

Even though they are rather shy, around built up areas or gardens they may be a little braver and you may even see one on a bird feeder or table.

his month we celebrate Valentine's Day and many will prepare elaborate displays of love for those nearest and dearest to them! Perhaps you'll be writing a card, buying a gift or presenting some flowers to someone special in your life? Valentine's Day can also serve as a welcome reminder that even our most sincere displays of love cannot come close to the love that we have received from God.

In the Gospel of Luke (15:11-32) Jesus shares the parable of 'The Prodigal Son'. It tells of a son who asks his father for his share of the inheritance whilst his father is still living. Despite how hurtful this would have been, the father agrees and gives his son the money. The son soon moves away and squanders the inheritance on wild living. He runs out of money, hits rock bottom and eventually decides to return home and ask his dad to live as one of his servants. The incredible twist comes in the father's response to his son and it is designed to

show us the love of our Heavenly Father towards us. Rather than reject or berate his son, the father ran to meet him and embraced him in a huge bear hug. He bestowed gifts upon him and laid on an extravagant feast to celebrate that his son had returned home.

Beyond displaying God's love through parables, Jesus demonstrated it through his life and ultimately through his death. The theologian Thomas Goodwin put it this way; "Christ is love covered in flesh". Jesus showed that there is no length that our Father God won't go to in order to lavish love upon us. # Kevin Gurr reflects on the passing of his dad, Mike

ad's full name was Michael John Gurr but everyone knew him as Mike. He was born on 11<sup>th</sup> July 1938 at Old Shelve Farm, Lenham. Mike had two brothers Peter and Don and two sisters Vera and Pat.

He went to school in Lenham and at the age of 12 joined Lenham cricket club and he became a fast bowler. In 1957 he completed his national service in the Royal Artillery serving a year in Cyprus during their war of independence. When he returned he went to work for Marley Floors where he worked until he retired at the age of 62.

He joined Lenham Fire Brigade when he was 25 years old where he served for 30 years attaining the rank of Sub Officer. The station had an excellent First Aid team; they won many awards including the Kent competition and came fourth in the English competition the same year. The fire station was very active in supporting the Brigade's benevolent fund and always took part in the village carnival leading the procession through the village.

He joined the Royal British Legion for many years and was Standard Bearer for the Lenham branch for around fifty years. This was something he was very proud of. He attended the Royal Albert Hall carrying the Lenham standard on three occasions for the National Remembrance Service. He also attended numerous events in the UK and Europe.

He paraded on the Queen's silver jubilee in front of the then Prince Charles at Horse Guards Parade and the Queen at Windsor Castle. He paraded a second time for the Queen at the Royal British Legion village.



He also attended the Menin Gate in Belgium several times including the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War and never missed an opportunity to parade in the village church on Remembrance Sunday.


Mike was a member of the St. Johns in Lenham for 17 years. He was on the committee of the Forge house charity, which is now the Hatch charity and he was a bell ringer at Harrietsham. When not involved in village organisations he could be found playing whist at the working man's club, enjoying going to the Lenara association and Lenham gardeners.

He had two sons John and me, Kevin, and five grandchildren Shane (who unfortunately passed early), Andrew, Jennifer, Leon and Kai and two great grand-daughters Lilli and Ellie. Although he did many things, in everything he did, he always included his family. He loved spending time with the children and particularly loved swimming with them.
