I believe there were several acts of vandalism. Are you able to tell me how many such acts there have been and whether they have been reported to the police, please?

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> I write in the belief that the Town Council is responsible for the management of Swaffham Church Yard and any improvements to it.

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> For several years I have maintained one of the memorial gardens by the area where ashes are interred. Over the last few years access to the memorial plaques from the track between the kissing gates and Mangate Street has gradually become grassed over and when wet is not as easy as it was for people less surefooted, etc, who want to see the plaques.

> Whilst attending the garden I quite often see mainly elderly people visit the area. Some are in wheel chairs or buggies. Some are not a steady on their feet as they have no doubt been.

> In order to facilitate access to the plaques could I please ask the Council if it would be prepared to put a pathway across the grassed area between the main surfaced drive through the Church Yard and the plaques, perhaps starting approx 80 metres from the kissing gate where the shortest route would be. Such a pathway would mean people could visit the area in all weather conditions.
