Lieutenant-General Sir James Wilson

On Wednesday 22nd December the death of Lieutenant-General Sir James Wilson was reported in The Times. Many Halam villagers will remember him affectionately as General Jim. He lived for almost 20 years at Goldhill Farm, and cared passionately about the wellbeing of Halam. He often invited village folk to his home. He attended Halam Church every Sunday and acted as sideman. By choice he attended family services rather than more formal services, as he felt he could understand them better and felt more at home with young people. His third great passion was football; in the army he ran the British army football team and helped train the future English football captain- Bobby Charlton. In 1957 he became the football correspondent to the Sunday Times and wrote for that paper until the late 1990's.

He was born 1921 and married the Hon Jean Margaret Paul in 1958. He joined the army in 1940, serving as a private until 1941 when he was commissioned. He saw action in North Africa and then Italy where he took part in the final battle south of the River Po, and won the MC. Later he served in Cyprus as UN force commander. He left Cyprus in 1966 and was promoted Lieutenant-General and overall commander of the south east district covering Aldershot and the capital. He retired from the army in 1977 by which time he was resident at Goldhill. He was chairman of the Tobacco Advisory council

1983-1985.

He despised red tape, and was a breath of fresh air in all his various activities. His love for Halam, its church, and football were brought together at a memorable church service held at Nottingham Forest football club.

All those in Halam who remember him, will do so with great affection and a smile- a true gentleman.



Nature Notes: Helping Barn Owls

Many houses in Halam have been converted from old agricultural buildings possibly depriving Barn Owls of their nesting sites. However, we can help give them back a home by supporting the Hawk and Owl Trust's 'Adopt a Box' scheme. Subscribers pay £12.50 a year as individuals or £30 a year for a group, to adopt a box in one of seven regions including the Midlands. You won't find out exactly where the box is, but you will receive a report every year telling you if it was used and how many young owls were reared. You will also receive a newsletter annually and an illustrated guide to Britain's owls as well as a certificate when you join. If a group such as a school adopts a box they also receive an activity pack and ideas for teachers which are related to the National Curriculum. You can also 'Adopt a Box' as a gift for someone else. So, if your New Year's resolution is to do your bit for nature, why not start by helping a homeless owl? 

For the Attention of all Villagers!

Dear Resident of Halam,

I am writing to inform you of an initiative being taken by your Parish Council. You may be aware that the Parish Council has received an offer of land from Ron & Olive Sharman for a new village hall and outdoor space. The land is adjacent to St Michael's Close, in the field located behind the former council houses on Radley Road. This would provide us with a site for a new village hall, car parking & some public open space. In addition to the new facilities, Mr & Mrs Sharman are proposing some development – the size and scope of which is yet to be established. Although the Parish plan did consult on this idea, the lack of firm proposals led to some wild rumours and misconceptions about the proposal.

Our recent village plan consultation process has identified a desire to improve the facilities that are available to residents of the Parish, in particular the village hall and provision of a safe public open space. This coincides with the need to spend a considerable sum of your money (estimated at £20,000) on maintenance and disability access improvement to the current village hall. We would still end up with a hall with limited capacity and uses and inadequate parking.

We now have a choice, albeit a difficult one: do we repair the existing hall or take the opportunity to start afresh?

At our meeting on the 13th of January your Parish Council took the decision to commission a feasibility study that will test the concept of building a new village hall, and the impact that the associated development would have. Apart from developing firm proposals for the new development, the study will assess options for funding the new hall via the sale of the existing one and/or grant aid. This will facilitate an informed debate as to whether this development is desirable in our village.

The study is being commissioned jointly between Ron & Olive Sharman and the Parish Council, and the findings are planned to be available by the end of March 2005.

It is important to stress that we have made <u>no decision</u> on which route to choose, and will only do so after this study has been completed and after full and open consultation with the village. If you have any concerns or questions regarding this process please contact me or any member of the Parish Council either directly or via the Parish Clerk.


New Refuse Collection & Recycling In Halam

Collections: Green Bin 7 & 21, Silver Bin 14 & 28 February

As all Local Authorities now must recycle by law, Newark& Sherwood have set themselves a target of 28% recycling by 2006. This is well above the 18% government target and it is so important that we all help them to achieve this. Each household in Halam averages 1 tonne of rubbish yearly, and continuing to use landfill sites is unsustainable, as well as producing harmful greenhouse gasses.

The new TWIN BIN system means that we can recycle in our SILVER bin – paper/magazines (not in bags); cardboard (not waxed cartons); plastic bottles (remove tops); margarine/ ice-cream/ yoghurt tubs; food tins & drinks cans. Our GREEN bin is for everything else. You can still recycle glass or textiles at the normal recycling points in Southwell: The Leisure Centre; Co-op car park; Church Street car park; and garden waste can be composted at home or recycled at the centre at Fiskerton.

We can all make a difference. Working with the council and taking responsibility for our own waste will ensure a cleaner and better environment for future generations.



LEAF is a charitable organisation which helps farmers to combine economically viable farming with environmental responsibility. Retailers such as Waitrose are supporting this initiative and are including the LEAF Marque on produce which comes from accredited sources – so look out for it if you care about your food and your environment.

We have a LEAF demonstration farm near Halam at Thorney Abbey Farm on the Oxton Road. Andy and Sue Guy have a herd of cows which they operate on a "clean grazing system" where the young cattle eat only pasture which was not grazed in the previous season. This largely eliminates the need for wormers and helps to optimise production whilst promoting the health of both the cows and the environment. They also aim to help the farm's wildlife habitats. The RSPB has surveyed the bird population and have mounted bird boxes around the farm. Lapwings, Yellow Hammers, Tree Sparrows and Skylarks are among the birdlife visiting Thorney Abbey. Hedges are managed sensitively and cut outside nesting season. Look at www.leafuk.org to find out more about the scheme or if you are interested in arranging a visit to the farm to find out more. - Elaine Gathercole



Parish Council Meeting: 10th February 2005

Matters Arising 1) Neighbourhood Watch - progress being made; some groups now up and running; new signs will be put up in the village 2) Plans for Halam House Farm will be received from District Council imminently. A special meeting will be held Wednesday 2 March at 8pm to allow public discussion of this planning application.3) Parish Plan: The first printed copies were presented. The steering committee will write to all parties included in the action plan before being disbanded. It was agreed to pay all outstanding bills as detailed in the parish plan financial statement. Every household in the parish will receive a copy of the published plan shortly. Action points requiring Parish Council input were discussed; letter to be sent to District Council reference planning issues; Halam beat officer/crime prevention officer to be invited to a future meeting; the clerk to investigate further litter bins for Halam.

Community Projects: County Councillor Andy Stewart was asked to apply for £300 grant for a new village notice board. Speed Calming: Chris Chamley (Notts CC Highways) is to attend the annual Parish Open Meeting on 14th April. A survey will be held in late February to see if a mobile interactive speed sign would be appropriate for Halam Hill. It was agreed that the clerk should write to Mr Chamley informing him of the recent highways visit following several accidents on the Mansfield Road near Norfolk House.

There has been no volunteer to head up the community speed watch project so this will be put on hold at present.

Open Meeting: Items raised: 1) Radley Road at the junction with Gray Lane is very muddy; clerk to contact highways department, and also report the general poor structural state of the road. 2) CountyCllr Stewart reported that Fiskerton has entered a WREN competition for a possible prize of £250,000 village hall funding. Contact will be made with them to find out more details. 3) The possibility of a crossing by the school was raised. This can be discussed further with Notts. C.C. Highways Dept. at the April meeting.

<u>Planning</u>: 1) <u>Beckside Cottage</u>, <u>Gray Lane – 2 storey rearextension and re-modelling proposed</u>: passed unanimously with a comment that sympathetic materials should be used.

Village Hall: Mr Sharman declared a prejudicial interest and withdrew from the meeting. The feasibility study is underway and the architect investigating upgrading the present village hall has been put on hold.

Open Meeting It was asked how far the views of the village would feature in the feasibility study; these to be taken into account in subsequent discussion of scheme.

The issue of the strain on the current drains was raised. It is likely that any new development will have its own separate sewage disposal system(s).



Vera Sharman My dear cousin Vera Sharman of Mill View, The Turnpike, died on the 10th of April and was buried in Halam Church on 18th April. I think, at 95, she was the oldest resident in the village. Most of her life was spent in Halam, attending Halam School as a child, living at No. 2 Cottage on the Turnpike, Manor Farm, Manor Cottages and Brookside. She was a well-known hairdresser. She told me two little things about her childhood which have stayed in my mind. One, that as a child, whilst tending cattle up Holme Lane, a tramp appeared from behind the hedge; she left the cows to their own devices and raced off home. The other touching story was in the 1st World War. Halam School children always stood at the school wall (much lower then) to wave to the soldiers as they marched by. Her father was amongst them and he broke ranks to kiss her good-bye. Thankfully he did return.

Olive Kitts (nee Sharman)

John Tunnicliffe (28/5/33 - 5/5/05)

John was born in Derbyshire but moved to Edingley aged 6. The only son among 4 children, he is survived by his sisters Mary Snell & Dorothy Hill. Farming was in his blood & he worked alongside his father at New Manor Farm, eventually taking over with his wife Zelia. He was a dairy farmer which involved long hours, but still found time to be Chairman of Mansfield NFU, Chairman of Farnsfield Discussion Group,& do proficiency testing at Brackenhurst. After long days outside he would pour over journals & records in order to improve his pedigree herd. Sadly, quotas put paid to dairy farming at New Manor Farm, but John was also victim of his love of his herd & had contracted Brucella arthritis. This slowly debilitated him over the years; a hip and knee replacement went sadly wrong and he died from ancillary infections.
