



Suffield is a village of some 50 houses and 140 inhabitants situated in North Norfolk. The village is in two parts separated by a mile: Suffield Common to the South East and Suffield Green to the North West.




Suffield's Village Hall was built by the famous Boulton and Paul concern in 1914 and is one of very few remaining of its type.

Although small with limited facilities, the village hall has character and atmosphere. It is used for many varied events throughout the year and can be hired through Sue Hubbard on 01263 768728 or e-mail

Suffield Footpaths and Walks: There are three designated walks within the boundaries of Suffield.

1. Footpath, sign posted walk from Suffield Common (opposite the Old Rectory & adjacent to the pond) to Elm Farm and on across the meadows to Colby and Banningham (The Crown Public House is a good watering hole).
2. Footpath from Brick Kiln Lane, again across fields to Felmingham and the local shop/ post office.
3. Unmade road - Bunny's Loke, Rectory Road to the Felmingham to Antingham Road, is the longest walk within Suffield boundaries.



There are reputedly 16 **Geocaches** in and around the Suffield roads and footpaths (Geocaching is a treasure hunting game using the GPS to hide and seek containers - see www.geocaching.com).

Ifnotnow.when community woodland and charitable trust was formed in April 2002 after the death of David Hood. Since then, trees have been planted and projects completed including a labyrinth, owl



sculpture, bridge, question mark mound, willow igloo, seating area, insect house and arch. The grazed meadow area has been designated a County Wildlife site and the other half is managed as a formal garden with a sense of adventure.

The shield is that of the Windham family. The tractor represents agriculture in Suffield. The locomotive, horse and rider and the anvil are

symbolic of steam engineering, a riding stables and forge that all existed in the village.

The boots refer to John Schorne who was renowned for having cured gout (the devil in the boot) as depicted in the rood screen in the church.

The **Mobile Library** calls every four weeks in Suffield Green near the Old Blacksmith's Shop, The Street between 9.20 and 9.35am.

A **Bottle Bank** is situated at the road side, 200 yards South of Suffield Church - all proceeds are used for the benefit of parishioners.

School Bus - Colby Primary School bus stops at the council houses and the phone box between 08.25 and 08.35 am in Suffield Green and as needed in Suffield Common.

The Aylsham High School bus stops at the council houses at 8.15 am in Suffield Green and by arrangement in Suffield Common.

Ice Cream Van – travels through village and can be hailed. Arrival is about 4 pm during the week-end and almost daily during school holidays.
