Neighbourhood Watch Drinking Responsibly



Know your limits - Don't drink too much, and don't drink too quickly. In practice, this basically looks like having one drink per hour, with water or a soft drink between alcoholic drinks.

Avoid mixing alcohol and other drugs

- That means both prescription drugs and recreational drugs. Make sure you know how alcohol will react with any medications you're on. If you decide to take drugs, don't drink alcohol.

You'll usually end up pretty sick if you combine the two.

Don't drink and drive

If you have to drive, don't drink. Make arrangements for how you'll get home before you go out. Alcohol is a depressant drug that slows down your reaction speed, which means if you need to think and act quickly, you probably won't be

Don't risk it. If you're drinking, plan to use a taxi, bus, train or a designated driver to get you around.

able to.

Drink driving offences and penalties

 If a person is found guilty of drink driving or attempting to drive while above the legal limit, he/she could get 6 months' imprisonment, an unlimited fine or a driving ban for at least 1 year (3 years if convicted twice in 10 years).

• Refusing to provide a specimen of breath, blood or urine for analysis could lead to 6 months' imprisonment, an unlimited fine or a ban from driving for at least 1 year.

Being convicted of driving under the influence of alcohol has a number of effects on everyday life beyond a drink driving fine or ban. You could lose your job, particularly if you drive for work as your employer will see this on your licence. You may also find it difficult to seek employment in the future.

If and when you are legally allowed to drive again, it won't be cheap. Car insurance costs increase significantly after a drink driving conviction.

How much alcohol can I consume before I am over the limit?

The only safe limit of alcohol to have in your blood and drive is zero!

The official amou<mark>nt of</mark> alcohol is 35 micrograms per 100 ml of breath reading, this cannot be

> translated into an exact number of units as it depends on many factors, height and weight, time when last drink was consumed etc., so the best advice is not to drink at all or order a taxi. Remember also, that the effects of alcohol or drugs can take a long time to wear off and it is possible that a person could still be "Over the limit" the morning after drinking or taking drugs.

When you're out for the evening

• Watch your drinks and food to ensure that nothing is added to them.

Never leave your drink unattended, even if you are going to dance or to the toilet. If your drink has been left unattended, don't drink any more of it. If something tastes or looks odd, don't eat/ drink any more if it. Be aware, though, that some drugs are colourless and tasteless.

- If someone you don't know or trust offers to buy you a drink, either decline or accompany them to the bar and watch that nothing is added.
- Pay attention to your instincts. If you feel uneasy about someone, there may be a reason.
- Make sure someone knows where you are going and when you'll be home.
- Avoid walking home alone and never with someone you don't know well.
- Drink responsibly, arrange for a member of your group to be a designated driver.
- The ideal plan is to book your cab or taxi in advance or call a licensed cab company from the party and arrange for them to pick you up right outside the venue.
- Always sit in the back of a cab/taxi and if you get chatting to the driver, do not give away personal details. If you feel uneasy with the

driver, ask him to stop at a busy familiar place and get out.

 If using public transport, have your ticket, pass or change ready in your hand so that your wallet or purse is out of sight.

This app is designed to help gather information about crimes and incidents that occur in the countryside. The app is not intended for emergency purposes; users should 'phone 999 for a crime in progress or a threat to for a should be applied on the state of the

Country Eye - Helping Keep the Rural Community in Kent Safe

Country Eye Ltd have built a free App for people living and working in the rural community. The app allows users to record and share information on crime, suspicious behaviour and damage in their home community or whilst out and about.

The Crime, Rural Advisory Group (CRAG) has commissioned the design and build of the Country Eye app. Mike Bax, Chairman, explained, "data suggests that the cost of rural crime in Kent stands at 1.8 million, if you include the additional hidden costs to repair property, replace locks and the time taken out of a working day to address these issues, the cost is considerably higher. CRAG was formed to help combat rural crime and to work with farmers, businesses and residents to find solutions."

The app has been built to help residents and farmers in Kent report information quickly and efficiently. This information is securely

stored in a central database and accessed by the voluntary Country Eye team who are fully trained by Kent Police. The team analyse and disseminate the information and then broadcast it out to other local app users.

Dumped on a public walkway in Eccles

Peter Rolington, Chairman of Kent Crimestoppers and member of CRAG will head the team of volunteers, Peter said "Country Eye will be an invaluable tool to inform people living and working in the countryside about incidents that are occurring in their area. Technology has advanced greatly in recent years and has enabled us to develop a digital version of the highly successful Neighbourhood Watch scheme for the rural area.



We will be able to broadcast information directly to users about potential incidents as they happen. The Country Eye app will allow a greater audience to receive information, particularly those living in the most remote parts of the county."

Country Eye has the full backing of Kent Police with information being sent securely to the relevant authorities. Kent Police is committed to responding to concerns in rural communities and to carrying out high visibility patrols. The information collated through the app will give officers a greater understanding of potential problem areas. The app has been supported by Kent Police and Crime Commissioner, Safer Kent, National Farmers Union and BTF Partnership.

The Country Eye app identifies four different Rural Categories which make up the majority of incidents that occur in the countryside.

Theft: Vehicle, Metal & Cable, Machinery & Plant, Livestock, Outbuilding, Fuel & Oil and Equine.

Farm Crime: Arson, Fly-Tipping, Trespass with and without Firearms, Criminal Damage and Suspicious behaviour with and without vehicles.

Animal, Wildlife Crime: Poaching, Animal Welfare, Endangered Species & Conservation, Hare Coursing and Horse Crime.

Heritage Crime: Off-roading and Metal Detecting (without owner's permission) /Night Hawking

The app has a knowledge section which highlights the key factors for each type of incident above to assist users.

Sign up is simple; the system requires a contact number, email address and postcode.

The app records and disseminates information using the phones camera and GPS location settings. Recording information is intuitive; users will click the camera icon, take an image, choose from a drop-down the type of crime, whether a crime reference number has been issued, and any other useful information.

The location, time and date will be automatically recorded. The app can also use an existing image from the camera's photo library.

The application is not intended for emergency purposes; users should report to; 999 – (crime in progress) 101 – (crime committed) or report to Crimestoppers if they wish to remain anonymous – 0800 555 111

The app can be downloaded from the Apple App Store and Google Play by searching Country Eye



KCC Public Transport Portal

On behalf of Mike Whiting, KCC Cabinet Member for Planning, Highways, Transport & Waste

During last summer's Big Conversation with residents, many people told us that they didn't know who to give feedback to about bus services

To make this clearer, we have launched a Bus Feedback Portal. It includes information about how to make a formal complaint or compliment about bus services and who to contact in the event that bus users experience problems.

It also includes a feedback form for residents to let us know about their experiences of using buses and the quality of service provided.

We will use the feedback that we get a greater understanding of what types of problems bus users experience and to spot trends about the areas or on which services they arise. We will use this information to inform the conversations that we have with bus operators through our Quality Bus Partnerships or more generally and help improve things for bus users.

KCC is encouraging people to use the form to let us know about their experience of using buses and the quality of service provided. A link to the portal is provided below.

BECOMING A LOCAL COUNCILLOR

Could You Be A Councillor?

Any person 18 years of age and older who is a local government elector, lives or works in the parish or lives within three miles of the area of the Local Council may stand for election.

Candidates for election must complete nomination forms and submit them to their local electoral office by the closing date for nominations - usually four to five weeks before polling day. The local electoral office will be at Thanet District Council.

A Councillor's normal term of office is four years. He/ she is a holder of a Public Office.

Councillors can receive expenses for their role. Candidates may stand under a party political label, but most don't.

Councillors are subject to their Council's Code of Conduct and must complete a Declaration of Interest form which will be publicly available.

What Will You Do If Elected?

- Attend Council meetings and raise matters that the Council can consider and formally decide to take action.
- Make informed contributions and influence debate at meetings.
- Receive training for your role.
- Represent the Council externally.

Who Controls the Local Council?

In short, you do. Parish electors vote for Local Council members every four years and are entitled to go to the Annual Meeting and say what they think. Council meetings are also open to the public to observe (but not participate in) and there is usually an opportunity for informal discussion when the meeting is adjourned. Local Councils are public bodies and subject to the Freedom of Information Act and GDPR laws.

Who Supports Local Councils?

Local Councils in England are supported by 38 County Associations of Local Councils that provide legal, procedural and other advice. They provide relevant training for Councillors and representational services too. In Kent, Local Councils are represented by the Kent Association of Local Councils (KALC). www.kentalc.gov.uk At national level, Local Councils are represented by the National Association of Local Councils. www.nalc.gov.uk

A Little About Local Councils

 Elected representative body of the local community. Provide services to meet local needs, improve quality of life and well-being in the community.

- Statutory bodies with certain duties and legal powers. They are democratically and financially accountable to the local community.
- Have the legal right to be informed about planning applications and other issues.
- Give the local community a more powerful voice.
- Help support local groups in their area. This may be through funding, provision of meeting places, or through publicity. This could include voluntary groups that help young people or the older generation to name but a few.
- May take on some devolved duties from the "Principal Authorities", Kent County Council, Medway Unitary Authority and the twelve District and Borough Councils in Kent. The Principal Authorities are responsible for Education, Transport, Planning & Development, Waste Collection and Disposal, Housing, Licensing and Street Trading.
- Local Councils can raise money to spend on public purposes through their "precept" which is collected through the local Council Tax. Most of that money is invested back into the local community to improve facilities and services. Many local councils also supplement the precept by obtaining grants. Sometimes they own property and can use the money from rents and leases. They can also generate income through running their community facilities.
- Local Councils are the least bureaucratic kind of local authority. Their funds are a tiny part of the Council Tax with an average cost across England of less than £65/year to Council tax payers. They get no general government grant so they have every incentive to keep their expenditure low and get value for money.
