

Warning to be aware of "Clip for cash scams" locally

Please be aware of a new menace locally - so called "clip for cash" scams where someone brushes your car or throws an object and claims you broke their wing mirror or something similar. They then angrily demand cash.

This happened recently to one local resident, who understandably wishes to remain anonymous. Their car was clipped at high speed by a black BMW on Pretty Road towards Saxmundham. The male driver and his female accomplice then turned round and blocked her car and demanded money for an alleged broken wing mirror, forced her to drive to Sax and the female accomplice marched her to a cash machine. Police were informed but claimed there was nothing they could do despite significant CCTV availability.

WI News

At our May meeting we welcomed Claire O'Sullivan from Contemporary Hempery in Fressingfield to give us a talk on industrial hemp. This plant, native to central Asia, was used 12,000 years ago in China from there it spread westward to be used by the Greeks and Romans. Here there is evidence that it was used by the Anglo-Saxons for a coarse clothing material. In England, from 1550-1820, there was a thriving hemp industry producing clothing, household linen and ropes and sails for ships. One-eighth of the UK hemp was produced here in the Waveney Valley where the spinning and weaving of hemp fibre was a cottage industry for rural families. Weaving was the most skilled job with the treasured looms being passed down to the next generation. It is believed that there were four weavers in Middleton at this time. The hemp production was never mechanised so with the coming of cheap imported cotton and the invention of the Spinning Jenny and the 1812 Power Loom, the hemp industry went into decline. The final local hemp company which was in N.Lopham closed in 1925.

At Contemporary Hempery they are trying to revive this local industry with traditional methods and skills. The hemp is planted in May and grows without the need for pesticides or herbicides and very little water is needed. In August, when it is 10 feet tall, it is harvested with a small, mechanised cutter and gathered by hand. The bunches go through "retting", soaking in water for 5 days to rot the bonds between fibre and stalk. The next is "scutching", bashing the straw with wood to get the fibres. Then, "heckling", pulling the fibres through horseshoe nail combs to



soften them. It is then ready to spin into yarn ready for weaving into fabric. Needless to say, it takes quite a while to go from plant to material. Contemporary Hempery started in 2021 with 3 aims. 1. to revive hemp for textiles 2. to create beautiful fabrics. 3. to work with the community. At the moment, growers of hemp must have a license from the government. Claire hopes in the near future it will loosen it's grip so that more can be grown because there are 25,000 uses for hemp: oil, food, cosmetics, textiles, hempcrete, hempwood, insulation, animal bedding and food to name a few! Claire's talk was most enthusiastic so that on the next Hempery open day for the community, some of us might be found wandering through the 10 ft tall hemp plants!

Our next meeting will be on the 19th of June at 7:15pm. Malcolm Knott will be the speaker "Laughter and Tears", a lifetime in law. All welcome.

Thank you all so much for my 60th birthday present.

I'm putting the money towards a piece of jewellery that I will treasure always and remember the special people behind it.


Middleton Dark Skies

June Highlights (mostly after 11.00pm due to the lighter skies at this time of the year)

Planets on View As with last month, it will be the early risers that will have the best chance of catching sight of this month's planets. Saturn rises around 1.00am with Mars following 90mins later. Even then they are rising in the pre-dawn glow out to the east, so will not appear particularly bright. Towards the middle of the month Jupiter will come back into view out towards the northeast, rising at around 3.30, and even in the pre-dawn sky will be very noticeable.

<u>Constellations.</u> A couple for this month. The first is Ursa Major, or at least a part of it, 'The Plough', which has been covered before, but is prominent, high up in the sky towards the northwest, even given the brighter post sunset sky down towards the horizon. It can be seen almost standing on end, with the bowl of the 'saucepan' down towards the north and the 'handle' being practically overhead. If the sky is dark enough, use the two pointer stars in the bowl to locate the Pole Star (Polaris). Polaris is at the tip of the tail of the Little Bear(Ursa Minor). Like the Plough, the Little Bear is made up of seven visible stars and resembles a saucepan, albeit smaller.

The second constellation is Cygnus (The Swan, also known as the Northern Cross), and is one of the very few constellations that doesn't need too much imagination to see how in came to get its name. At present it is high up in the eastern sky and doesn't have too many prominent stars nearby so should be fairly easy to spot. It is larger than the Plough, and as one of its names suggests is shaped like a cross. Although, given the light sky at this time of the year, it may be difficult to see, the Milky Way runs through and along the length of Cygnus, but is it probably better to wait until later in the summer to see the fantastic sight of the Milky Way arching directly overhead from one horizon to the other.

<u>Meteor Showers</u> Nothing of any note this month.

The Swan or Northern Cross

<u>Comets</u> Still no known comets to see.

The Moon The name of this month's moon is Rose or Strawberry Moon. Full Moon occurs in the early hours of the 22nd low down in the southern sky. The moon will stay relatively low in the sky during the summer, due to the tilt of the earth at this time of the year. Rule of thumb is, that if the sun is high in the sky, the moon will be low. At the Spring and Autumn Equinox, the sun, and the moon pass across the sky at roughly the same height. Early risers (pre-dawn on the 3rd) could look out for the waning crescent moon sitting next to Mars out towards the east, while on the 8th it will appear as a waxing moon just below the stars Castor and Pollux (Constellation of Gemini) in the late evening sky out towards the east.

Space Station. As it would seem with most things this month, there are no visible passes during June.

Summer Solstice. This occurs on the 20th of the month at 9.51pm.

June Nature Notes

Butterflies fly during the day and moths at night? Most of them do, but there are night-flying butterflies in the tropics, and in this country there are a small number of larger moths that fly during the day. These are moths that are active during the day and tend to fly when it is warm and sunny - similar to butterflies. Many of them are also brightly coloured like their close relatives, and without knowing some subtle differences, they may be mistaken for butterflies. Butterflies and moths can be distinguished through a combination of observations. Firstly, moths tend to always rest with their wings flat, whereas butterflies typically rest with their wings together. Moths also tend to rest with their antennae tucked down or folded back, whereas butterflies tend to hold theirs upwards. Lastly, butterflies have a thickened end to their antennae, giving them a slightly clubbed appearance. Moths do not have clubbed antennae.

Perhaps the most familiar of the day-flying moths is the Cinnabar moth. It is brightly coloured with red underwings and black forewings with two red spots and a red stripe on the leading edge of each wing. Cinnabar caterpillars are black and yellow and are found, often in large numbers, on Ragwort plants, often completely defoliating them. The bright colours of caterpillar and moth signify their distastefulness to predators. The similar looking Burnet moths, are commonly seen feeding on purple flowers such as knapweed and thistles. The most common is the Six-spot Burnet, which is deep black with six red spots on each forewing. Two further moths commonly seen flying during the day are the Yellow Shell – a completely yellow moth, but has brown cross banding on the wings when closely examined and the Latticed Heath moth - a splendid-looking insect with a brown lattice grid pattern on the upper-side and underside of its wings. This species is often mistaken for a butterfly as it tends to bask with its wings open and often rests with its wings held together.





Perhaps, the most interesting day flying moth that are likely to see in our gardens is the Hummingbird Hawk-moth. As its name implies it looks like very like a small hummingbird as it hovers over flowers keeping its body still while feeding through long proboscis. It looks grey in colour but its orange-brown hindwings give it colour as the wings beat in a blur. Hummingbird Hawk-moths migrate here from southern Europe and are becoming an increasingly common visitor to gardens that have plenty of nectar rich plants such as Buddleia, Red Valerian and Verbena. The Silver Y is another common immigrant species seen in gardens. They are mottled grey and brown with a distinctive silver Y mark on the forewing. Many tens of thousands arrive here each summer from North Africa, to breed here (the caterpillars feed on nettles) during the summer, producing a second generation in less than 50 days. Finally you maybe lucky to come across the Broad-bordered Bee Hawk-moth, a scarce moth nationally, but has one of its British strongholds in wooded areas on the Suffolk Sandlings where it is associated with wild honeysuckle. Sonamed for its resemblance to a bumblebee, it is far more agile and much larger. It has reddish-brown bands across its golden abdomen that can change to black as the hairs wear off. It also has reddish bands on its translucent forewings and long, clubbed antennae.

2 Annual Reports

It was confirmed that the following Reports had been received and circulated to the PC.

Middleton-cum-Fordley Parish Council Middleton Community Council Middleton Village Hall Holy Trinity Church Women's Institute

Due to the lack of public support, the PC discussed, again, turning the Annual Parish Meeting into a hospitality event, inviting village organisations. The role of the Parish Council would be to manage the event. Flyers could be issued in advance, with notices displayed in the church, pub, and other public spaces. It is thought that organisations, such as CAB could be invited, with food and drink made available also.

Annual Reports

Report of the Parish Council for the year ended 31st March 2024

Sizewell C

The potential impact of the Sizewell C (SZC) project on the Parish has continued to take up much of our time in Parish Council meetings. The Development Consent Order (DCO) was approved by the Secretary of State on July 20, 2022, but funding for the project has not yet been secured and no final decision to proceed has yet been taken by the UK Government.

Nonetheless, work has started and the volume of SZC traffic flowing along the B1122 is increasing week by week.

The Parish Council remains opposed to SZC but has taken part in meetings of the B1122 Working Group established under the DCO. This Group's purpose is to consider what can be done to provide relief from the impacts of construction traffic through Middleton Moor and Theberton in the 'early years' of the project before the proposed Sizewell Link Road is operational.

We have also been represented by Parish Councillor Charles Macdowell on the various community forums set up under the DCO. So far, I think it is fair to say that we have not been reassured that SZC will take out concerns seriously. I am grateful to Charles for the time and effort he has put in to represent the Parish Council and to help individual residents.

Planning

The Parish Council is consulted on all planning applications for land and buildings in the Parish. Middleton cum Fordley is classified as a 'Small Village' in the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan which means that new housing will normally be restricted to 'Small groups of new housing and infill within Settlement Boundaries'.

The Parish Council ensures that all planning applications are considered at a duly convened meeting held in public and has normally been supportive of proposals to improve the existing housing stock.

LionLink

The Parish Council has responded to consultations on the proposal to route a cable corridor through the Parish for the LionLink inter-connector en route to a proposed converter station outside Saxmundham. We are particularly concerned at the risk to important wild-life sites where the route crosses the valley of the River Minsmere and we will be asking for this section to be tackled by horizontal direct drilling rather than open trenching.

Causeway Farm

We held a successful public meeting to assess community views as to options for the future of the land comprising Causeway Farm when it becomes vacant later this year. We have since met with officers of Suffolk County Council (the landowner) who have agreed to 'listen' to the views of the community. Thanks are due to Councillors Giles Piercy and Steve Thorpe for their work on this project.

Meals service

Following on from the Village Hall 'drop-in centre' initiative, the Parish Council ran a meals delivery service for Parish residents over last winter. This was warmly received by its customers and we owe an enormous debt of gratitude to Councillor Lesley Taylor who carried out this scheme, from securing funding, shopping, cooking to delivering the meals single-handedly.

Finances

The Parish Council receives income mainly from Council Tax, the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and other occasional grants. CIL is levied on all new housing developments and can only be used for improvements to local infrastructure.

During the year we also continued to receive support from East Suffolk Council to fund the meal delivery service. At the end of March 2024, the Parish Council had general reserves of approximately £7,000. This is approximately 80% of the annual Council Tax received by the Council, which is at the high end of our financial planning guidelines. This gives us scope to consider environmental or infrastructure projects (subject to our limited powers) within the Parish and the Council would welcome proposals from residents.

Recreation Ground Trust

Successive generations of residents have always taken care of and valued the 'playing field' which is owned by the Recreation Ground Trust and operated by the Parish Council. I am grateful to Councillor Chris Reynolds for volunteering to help manage maintenance of the playing field and in particular for getting the fencing repaired. The orchard planted by Middleton WI has continued to thrive. Use of the facilities for community events and private parties continues to grow and this activity will now be better promoted by a part-time pavilion manager taken on by the Council. We are in the process of gathering residents' views on how to further develop the playing field and I am grateful to Councillors Kathryn Rowe and Michele Kendall for organizing the survey.

Village Green

The Parish Council would like to do some work to improve access to the Church from the Village Green and I am grateful to Councillor Graham Lacey for his professional advice on this project.

Middleton Moor

We are concerned about the over-growth of vegetation in the pond near Norwood House and expect to be undertaking work in the Autumn to start reducing willow growth on a island that has formed rapidly over the last few years.

Clerk

Finally, I would like to record the Council's thanks to Rachael Salcombe who is now doing a brilliant job as our Clerk.

A cake with cupcakes was created by villagers Jenny, Fiona and Peta and shared amongst the crowd and Adnams contributed prosecco for all those who attended. As part of this national celebration, the MCC were highly commended by the Coronation Community and we received a framed certificate to show the achievement. Our outside Midsummer Quiz was very well attended with 8 or more tables. Peter Vincent hosted the evening and provided a brilliant quiz which was enjoyed by all.

Another activity put on purely for the community's enjoyment, rather than fundraising, was the Summer Boules which was attended by a wide selection of new and old players. Graham and Barbara celebrated as the winners after exciting final against Archie and Rebecca.

The Summer Fete, was once again held up at the playing field where we have easy access to our container, great accessible parking and we saw another large number of people visiting the afternoon's activities and dog show, or helping put up and strike the site. Silmor entertained us and the collection of different food choices, stalls and games really provided a wonderful day for all those who attended. The Chairman's plate was presented to those villagers who every month deliver the Newsletter. Next year we hope to encourage a couple more helpers for the games and parking. A total of over £2150 was raised.

The Autumn Fair was held at The Bell in October. Although the weather had been wet and windy before and after, the day was dry and the music from Random Blues Band kept everyone dancing or singing along. There were plenty of food choices, games to entertain and creative activities for children. It was well attended, although we felt that there were not as many visitors as some previous years, possibly due to the forecast of wet and windy, some may have chosen to do other indoor activities!

Remembrance Day saw the Reynolds family laying a wreath on behalf of the Community Council. Santa Boules, in early December brought together a lovely selection of the village including new boules players. The winners this year were Peter and Brian.

The Residents' Christmas Dinner returned once again to the Village Hall and was a wonderfully festive event with the Ipswich Hospital Band playing those winter tunes and everyone socialising with their fellow villagers. The food was brilliantly organised by Trish and Barbara, who had a multitude of helpers.

The cheer was also extended to the 30 resident younger people (under 18) of our village with a Christmas voucher.

The Winter seemed to be very long, so to brighten our souls, we looked towards our village residents to hold a Middleton Garden Design evening. Neill, Mandy and Steve were entertaining and informative, holding our attention and answering our questions.

This year we have contributed to the Village Hall by purchasing a freezer. Our older gazebos have steadily been replaced with sturdy new ones, so this year another was bought. We also donated to the Thursday community morning group, the newsletter and half the finances for a carpet roller for the carpet bowls group.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 14 MAY 2024 AT 7pm AT THE VILLAGE HALL

1 Election of Chair

Cllr Lacey proposed Cllr Cusack, Cllr Kendall seconded. There were no other nominations and Cllr Cusack was duly elected as Chair.

Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None

Public Forum. District Cllr Sarah Whitelock advised that SZC have been granted a nuclear site licence. Reference was made to areas of the B1122 that have not been resurfaced, Cllr Whitelock confirmed that she is looking into this, with the PC confirming that it is worth pursuing if it does in fact reduce the noise levels. However, it appears that resurfacing was carried out for structural purposes, rather than noise reducing purposes, and thus the section of road from the Moor to the level crossing was not resurfaced because it is already structurally sound. The question was raised as to whether noise reduction was a PR exercise. Local residents feel that they have been deliberately mislead, as well as being subjected to a huge upheaval. It was reiterated that there are several vulnerable residents along the B1122. Cllr Whitelock enquired whether the PC would be interested in speed cameras. Cllr Macdowell advised that average speeds cameras are to be installed.

Cllr Whitelock has been in touch with the campaign group Suffolk Energy Action Solutions regarding Lionlink. An information evening has been proposed to which MPC agreed was a good idea. It is believed that this will take place in June. SEAS are pushing for offshore solutions, as is normal practice in Northern Europe.

6 Minutes

a) The Council approved the minutes of the previous meeting held on 9 April 2024 and the extraordinary meeting held on 22 April 2024.

b) Matters arising and Action Points.

- Village green grass cutting payment made. A further cutting has been undertaken and payment made. It was agreed to seek the Village Green Group's intentions regarding the grass cutting, given that two cuts have been made from the four agreed to for the season and to also confirm what areas are actually being cut. Action: Clerk to liaise.
- No parking signs ordered and received. Six given to Cllr Taylor for the Moor and six given to Cllr Rowe for the village green. It was reported that all signs around the Moor have been removed (including SZC). Action: Cllr Macdowell to discuss the removal of Stop SZC signs with Cllr Cusack.
- The PC have been signed up for the defibrillator supplies reminder service.
- National Lottery application submitted (pond).
- Moor Maintenance see below.
- PCC have confirmed that there is no money available to contribute towards the village path approach to the church. (C/f to next meeting.)
- Updated Personal Data Audit agreed.
- Static speed camera. A camera has been sourced and the information shared with the PC, however it was agreed to carry forward the decision on whether to purchase. (It was noted that the site/post previously used on the B1125 is corroded and provides poor vision.)
- The new handheld speed gun was given to Cllr Taylor. Data will be collected from the Moor with a view to sharing with SZC.

7 Sizewell C and other Energy Projects

From this point forwards Sizewell C will be grouped within the minutes with other energy projects.

- It was confirmed that there will not be a 20mph speed limit through the Moor.
- There will be a permanent (through the early years, at least) average speed camera situated from Yoxford roundabout, through Middleton and Theberton to the Leiston site entrance, with 'reminder' cameras on the Moor and in Theberton. When this will be operational is an unknown.
- Identity discs are now on the rear of SZC 4 x 4 vehicles and are being fitted to contractor HGVs. They are blue ovals with SZC in the centre.
- Sizewell beach footpath will be diverted late August. It is unclear whether the park run will continue.
- Monthly reporting of HGVs. There were 1,800 movements in April, which equates to 90 per day
 (excluding weekends). The cap for the end of this year is 600 per day. This information is available
 through ESC website.
- Councillors inspected the latest maps of B1122 new signage, road marking and pedestrian
 improvements. Cllr Macdowell will request extension of the slow down zone through the Moor to include
 the unsighted sharp bend at the southeastern end of the hamlet. A Yoxford-bound HGV was recently
 seen to overtake a cyclist on this dangerous corner, forcing a Leiston-bound car to swerve to avoid an
 accident.
- There is to be no separate working group for the link road, consequently a request has been made that the link road becomes part of the B1122 working group.

• Lionlink plans show the route crossing the B1122 somewhere between the B1125/B1122 T junction and the Mill Road junction, with the corridor as wide as a motorway. How this proposal will work alongside the SZC link road remains an unknown.

8 Councillors' Reports

- a) Village Hall. No Report
- b) <u>Middleton Primary School</u>. No report
- c) <u>Highways, footpaths and trees</u>. It was noted that the footpath behind the playing field has been ploughed up. Cllr Thorpe has requested, through the relevant contact, that this does not happen again.
- d) Middleton Moor.

<u>Pond</u>. A quote has been received from Peter Frizzle for clearing the pond. The initial quote, that included herbicides, which are not permitted by English Nature, has been revised with the removal thereof. Three days' work, including labour, £765.00 ex.VAT. This work will represent the beginning of ongoing maintenance on an annual basis. Action: Cllr Taylor to give the go ahead for works to commence (to fit in with the Great Crested Newt lifecycle).

Moor Maintenance. The search for a possible contractor has been unsuccessful to date. It was agreed to put a request in the minutes for anyone who might be interested in tendering for the work, along with an advertisement in the village newsletter, deadline to be the end of July. Applicants must possess the necessary land management skills and equipment to improve biodiversity whilst maintaining the habitat for the Great Crested Newts, mowing of the Moor, management of the verges and hedges, coppicing, and buffer strips next to hedges. Please make initial contact with the Parish Clerk (parishclerkmiddleton@gmail.com / 07510 155640). Action: Clerk to prepare and submit an advertisement for the village newsletter.

- e) <u>Causeway Farm</u>. A summary was given highlighting the PC's understanding and position regarding the future of Causeway Farm.
 - * Although SCC do not believe that continuing to let the farm as a single unit is a viable option they are not ruling this out as a possibility.
 - * SCC will be developing a series of options for elected members to consider with respect to the farm's future.
 - * Listed below are the options that the PC (on behalf of the Middleton community) have provided: -

New footpaths.

Working with Suffolk Wildlife Trust.

A care farm or similar initiative.

Hastoe Field – The PC would like to explore the potential to acquire this land with a view to creating wildlife areas, picnic spots, woodland, and paths through to the playing field. Further development on Back Road and/or development of farm buildings adjacent to the existing farmhouse.

Other lots – Individuals and/or groups are given an opportunity to express interest in aspects of the farm.
