APPENDIX A Footpath & Sewage Portfolio Report for January 2024

Footpaths

We have inspected all footpaths during the month and are all in good order and the only maintenance was cutting back fallen branches and small trees. In February we plan to start trimming hedges, before the bird nesting season starts.

Sewage updates.

With the very high rainfall specially on the night of 4th January where we had 147 mm in 4 hours which seeped into the sewer system pipes and manholes and seriously overwhelmed the pumping system, tankers had to be employed to support the network in all parishes, at the time of writing this report we have two tankers stationed at Manor Farm.

Unfortunately, we had a miss management of the tanker support at Manor Farm which resulted in a large volume of water spilling down the Monxton Road into our village, which froze owing to the wintry weather which made it impossible to drive on. Hampshire Highways closed the road until they de-iced the road. Prior to the closure a van tried to use the road, but unfortunately skidded and collided with a house, the van driver was okay and limited damage to house.

Hampshire County Council sets out £2.6bn spending plans for local services in 2024/25

Spending proposals for 2024/25, totalling £2.6bn, to keep delivering hundreds of local services to Hampshire's 1.4 million residents will be considered by Hampshire County Council's Cabinet next week

At their meeting on Tuesday 6 February, the Authority's Executive Members will review spending proposals for the coming financial year which aim to continue to deliver important public services while supporting the most vulnerable children and adults in Hampshire.

Setting a responsible, balanced budget for the year ahead is one of our key duties, ensuring we make the most of taxpayers' money to deliver important local services to the people of Hampshire. However, these remain challenging times for everyone, including across local government nationally, as we have to keep finding ways to stretch the budgets that we have available, to meet inflation pressures and increased costs associated with higher numbers of the most vulnerable children and adults who need our help – which in Hampshire will cost an extra £152m from April.

The proposed three-year programme includes:

- £173m to safeguard the long-term viability of the Older Adult care estate.

- £192m investment in new and extended school buildings to provide school places for children in Hampshire - delivering a further 5,312 school places and giving a total of 19,989 new school places by September 2027.

- £163m for structural maintenance and improvement of roads and bridges.

- £73m of Integrated Transport Plan schemes including £43m of schemes focused around walking and/or cycling improvements.

- £76m to address condition-based enhancements to schools.

A final decision on the County Council's budget for 2024/25 will be made by the full County Council on 22 February 2024.

Keep warm

- A cold home can increase the risk of health impacts, particularly for more vulnerable people.
- Try to heat rooms you spend a lot of time in, such as the bedroom or living room, to at least 18°C (65°F), day and night and keep bedroom windows closed. You may prefer your main living room to be slightly warmer.

• Wear several layers of thinner clothing rather than one thick layer – this will help keep you warmer.

- Use a hot water bottle to keep warm in bed.
- Draw curtains at dusk and block out draughts

Household Support Fund community grants available for the final time

Hampshire County Council is inviting community organisations to apply this month for a share of £285,000 to help local people cope with the cost of living

This will be the final opportunity for Hampshire groups to apply for grants from the government's Household Support Fund, with the application window open until 26 January.

For the financial year ending in March 2024, the County Council set aside a total of £1.3 million for community grants from its settlement of more than £14 million from the fund. This included £800,000 for district-based organisations to create initiatives tailored to local need helping to provide vulnerable households with food, utilities and to keep warm. The figure available is the remainder of this, plus £60,000 for organisations to deliver advice services.

Highways Information

20mph policy introduced by HCC

Last month the Universal Services Select Committee scrutinised both the departmental budgets for next year and the proposals for a 20mph policy.

Their comments about the latter were helpful and the cabinet member, Nick Adams King was happy to agree to there being a selfassessment process created to help communities decide whether an application to introduce a 20mph limit would be right for their area, and also to ensure that we undertake a full review of the policy and its impact in a year's time.



The new policy confirms two things; firstly that we will continue to consider 20mph zones in areas where they are deemed appropriate and there is a proven safety need for them - outside of schools for example.

More importantly, the decision will introduce a policy which allows communities to request the introduction of 20mph zones in their own area. There will be a number of criteria any community led application will need to meet:

Firstly, and most importantly, there must be clear evidence of community support. Too often we have seen the introduction of 20mph zones elsewhere in the country where there has been little support, resulting in conflict and division in communities.

Communities will need to fund the introduction of the schemes they request themselves. This should be possible through the use of Community Infrastructure Levy or other forms of developer contributions. You will no doubt have seen the media reports about the financial challenges facing the County Council. There is therefore no possibility of funding to help bring these schemes forward I'm afraid.

The introduction of 20mph zones would need to be accompanied by measures to reduce speed. The implementation of Speed Indicator Devices for example, those that show the speed a vehicle is going with a happy or angry face. The police have been clear that they do not have resources to enforce any new zones, so communities will need to find ways by which they can encourage compliance themselves.

There has been a vocal campaign by campaigners who want a blanket introduction of 20mph zones across the county, similar to that introduced recently in Wales. While I have some sympathy with their argument, which highlights not only the safety benefits of lower speed limits, but also the impact on the environment and health budgets, there remain two issues impeding that consideration.

The first is finance, such a move would cost £20 million, that funding would need to come from highway repair budgets, reducing them by almost 50% for a year. The second being public support, it is clear from Wales, from other parts of England that there is far from universal support for 20mph zones, consequently it is best that communities decide for themselves whether a zone is right for them.

Proposed changes to acute hospital services

Hampshire Hospitals has been included in the government's national New Hospital Programme. The plan is to invest between £700 million and £900 million in creating two acute hospitals; refurbishing the Royal Hampshire County Hospital in Winchester, and building a brand-new specialist acute hospital on either the existing Basingstoke and North Hampshire Hospital site, or at a new location near Junction 70f the M3.

The public consultation on the proposed options has now been launched. The consultation runs until midnight 17 March 2024.
