Editorial

Grafty Garden Cuttings – August

A family of long-tailed tits were busy in the bushes this morning, the multitude of young quite oblivious to the onlooker, continuing to preen or dart about, pecking at insects. Thrushes have also bred successfully here this spring and I have listened to them cracking snails open all over the garden, bits of empty shells crackle underfoot as we walk the paths, alerting everything else that flies/scampers or hops, but despite this, we think we have conquered the rabbit population, for the moment, with the last one going in to the pot for a tasty stew. Everything is home produced and organic.

Naturally, water or lack of, is a major issue, but at the time of writing, we are still allowed to use a watering can. I am only watering the vegetables and anything newly planted or that looks in imminent danger of death. We have just taken down our first casualty, a fir tree that I planted in about 1980, and a dead willow is awaiting the saw. I hope these are not the first of many. We have just visited Beth Chatto's garden in dry Essex, average 20" per year, (it rained as soon as we arrived), and her dry garden is beautiful. It is not hosepipe watered at all, relying on rain, or lack of it and shows we can achieve beauty all year round, even with a hosepipe ban. Soil preparation is all, plus a good mulch of gravel or bark, so that no soil is exposed, after planting

Time to cut back wisteria - all those long trailing shoots should be taken down to 3 or 4 buds from their base. Yew can be trimmed and cuttings taken of border plants like penstemon, verbena and pinks Roses need dead-heading and summer flowering shrubs can be trimmed into shape. To keep pot and smaller plants bushy, the tips can be pinched out to encourage side shoots to grow. An explanation of why pinching out works: plant shoot and root elongation is controlled by hormones called 'auxins'. These collect in the greatest concentration in the growing tips of said shoots and roots and is known as apical dominance. Remove this concentration and side buds are encouraged to grow as the concentration of auxins gathers in them instead.

Yellow sticky traps work well at catching tomato pests like whitefly, although hair or jumpers are favourites prey as well -these traps are not fussy. Blackfly on beans can be washed .away or hand squashed (messy but effective), likewise greenfly. Keep tomatoes and beans well watered in hot weather; the former quickly develop blossom-end rot if allowed to dry out, a problem that is not infectious but ruins the fruit. Meanwhile I will continue to rattle the rain stick daily and hope the water butts can be refilled and the gardens refreshed.

Grafty Green has a successful Heating Oil Club, we have to date nearly 100 members all taking advantage of cheaper heating oil when ordered in bulk. To make this club work all members have to have at least the minimum 500 Litres every time we order, that is about 3 to 4 times a year. It makes sense to have a bulk order delivered over 2 to 3 days every 4 months, rather than have tankers clogging up our village every week.

The Public Consultation on 13 July to discuss the proposed closure of Platts Heath School and merger with Kingswood was extremely well attended. A huge thank you to all of you who gave us support, it was greatly appreciated.

With far too many names to mention, all of our speakers made their case with very valid arguments, they spoke passionately, sincerely and with vigour. They were applauded immensely and are all to be congratulated for their efforts, not to mention their conduct. I have great admiration for every last one of them and they should all be proud of the case presented. "One of the best public meetings ever" said a parish councillor.

There was not a single vote in favour of this proposal. The panel appeared at times lost for words and in my opinion were unable to put up too great a fight. They were urged to end this process immediately, as it was very evident they have clearly made a mistake.

I feel the consultation has only reinforced our belief in our school and our community. I for one am even more confident and if there is any justice in this world Platts Heath School will remain open and be allowed to get on with what it does best. It is a successful, effective, viable and sustainable school achieving significantly above average results. It has a close, caring, family atmosphere, passionate about its worth. It is a strong and vital part of the community it serves. Even in these difficult times when the future of our school hangs in the balance, we are increasing our roll by taking on new pupils.

Platts Heath School Field



On Sunday morning, 23rd July, Platts Heath residents rallied, a total of 204 people - parents, children, and concerned locals, on the playing field in Platts Heath as a show of solidarity against the proposal to close Platts Heath Primary School, an action which would not only affect the school children, staff and families but the wider community as well. One of the wider reaching repercussions, it is feared, would be that the only recreational area in the village would be sold off for development.

In the Public Consultation Document circulated by KCC, the final paragraph states the "the County Council's major objective is to ensure that the outcome of this proposal has local support and is in the best educational interests of the children involved." This proposal has NO LOCAL SUPPORT WHATSOEVER, and the parents of the 74 children who chose Platts Heath School, when they had a choice of many others, can't all be wrong.



Egerton Parish Council's computer training facility based at the Millennium Village Hall is now in its sixth year as a purpose built Telecottage offering advice and tuition.
