Editorial



Sitting outside the Iden Green Pavilion listening to the Jazz a few weeks ago I was struck by the number of people in shorts and summer frocks. Usually during a British summer we huddle under fleeces and blankets as soon as the sun goes down. But not this year. For a change we've been able to sit outside long after nightfall enjoying the balmy temperatures.

It has struck me before that the key difference between summer activities on the continent and those in Britain is the warmth of the evenings further south. It means that village fetes in France are invariably held later in the day with young and old sitting out or dancing in the square till after midnight often to the accompaniment of loud amplified music. And no one seems disturbed by the noise. It seems accepted that the enjoyment of a couple of hundred people one or two nights a year takes precedence over possible minor inconvenience of an individual. It's a principle actually enshrined in the licensing regulations in Britain, where you can get a Temporary Events License from the local authority legally allowing you to sell alcohol and play music until a specified time - often around midnight.

But that doesn't stop the occasional person from confronting events organisers and angrily threatening or abusing them. Which is a pity. A polite request to lower the volume would seem much more likely to get the desired result. And a little bit of tolerance for other's enjoyment might perhaps make us a warmer and more inclusive community.

Reports of many and varied community activities are to be found throughout this edition of the magazine. We hope you enjoy it, and the remainder of this long hot summer.

I have tried to be a reasonably active member of the community over the years, supporting and getting involved in the various events that happen in both Benenden and Iden Green. More so in Iden Green, where I have helped with the social events run by the team at the pavilion. Many of you might have enjoyed the annual quiz or the summer-time open-air Jazz and Blues at the end of July, both fun events and a great way to mix with your neighbours.

The late Peter Davies introduced me to the work of the BPC. As a close neighbour and family friend, I think he recognised my interest in politics and current affairs, so two years ago I was asked if I would consider being co-opted to the BPC. I don't regret my decision to do so and I am thoroughly enjoying the experience. I have met more local people from around the parish over the past two years than over the last two decades.

There is a good programme of training courses provided by the Kent Association of Local Councils to help equip those of us who are new to the work of a parish councillor. Since joining the council I have attended a New Councillor Course and an Introduction to Planning. I have found this induction and training to be essential in becoming effective in this role. I want to contribute and help to improve and sustain our environment and way of life in Benenden; being a councillor is an excellent way to help me achieve this.

Rector's Letter



Embracing the routine

Well, that's the long summer holiday period over for another year! It has been a hot summer though; one to be added to the annals of folklore: "Do you remember the summer 1949/1976/2003?" Now we can add 2018 to that list. I hope that those who have been away - those who have been fortunate enough to go off on holiday - have returned home and are feeling recharged, refreshed, and ready for a return to the normal routine of life.

Routine is an interesting thing; some people really enjoy it, and will embrace getting back to 'a normal routine', others much prefer life when there is not the everyday, boring pattern of things to have to do. I guess it depends on whether you see the 'conventional, everyday, normal and ordinary' as a positive thing, or view routine as 'regular, unremarkable and plain'. Personally, I like the routine and pattern of the seasonal year, the academic year, and the church year.

At the beginning of September we now face the start of another academic year - with all the excitement, and sometimes the worry, that that can bring. Perhaps it's school for the first time for your first child; or the last year at Primary School; or your youngest going off to University; or your last academic year before retirement - all these milestones bring their own anticipation and emotions. The wedding season is nearly over for another year - just the excitement of another two weddings to go in our parish churches. The Molly Dancers will be camping with us again - and dancing outside church at the top of the Green after the morning service on the 9 September. And other routine but exciting things start up in church once again: Sunday School on the 2 September, Cakes & Chaos (the toddler group with drop-in café) on Friday 7 September, and Messy Church on Sunday 16 September. And then, before we know it, we will be approaching harvest time, with our Harvest service and lunch on the 7 October. Then on to remembering the Faithful Departed in a service on the 2 November, and Remembrance Sunday on 11 November - carrying even more significance this year as we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1. And so our year rolls on, all part of the routine of our village life.

I find there is something comforting in that annual pattern - the annual routine - to our lives. It is a part of who we are as a community. If these regular, ordinary, routine things were taken out of the calendar, and out of our lives, then I believe we would miss them; we would lament their passing. So I encourage you, now we are back from our holidays, to embrace the routine of village life; embrace the pattern of life; and enjoy it with one another.

Just a Thought



No pressure!

August is for results and September is for consequences - at least in this part of the globe. But the role of tests and exams looms large the world over, whatever the time of year, and in some places the options and alternatives rest heavy on the test-taker.

It was very hot. Kiyotaka had had a very busy morning in school and now he just wanted to play. But his mother was calling and he realised that it was Monday and he had to go for a special program to develop his powers of thinking. He sighed and wished that it was Tuesday or Wednesday because on Tuesdays he took karate to learn traditional discipline. On Wednesdays he had classes in art and gymnastics to enhance creativity and agility. He was coming to the end of this regime, and then he would sit his entrance exam for the first grade in one of Japan's most competitive elementary schools. Often he woke up at night worrying as he knew that his older brother had failed and his father had been very unhappy. Kiyotaka was five years old and he knew what was expected of him.

It was hot on this country track too as the Year 7 schoolboy, Joshua, was walking the five miles home. The all-important Zambian Primary School Leaving exams were over. Now he was carrying a few battered school notebooks, but the shared textbooks had been handed in. It was his last day at this school and there had been an assembly. He was praised for leading his football team to victory in the local league but most importantly he had had an excellent report from his teacher and headmaster. This was despite having missed a few weeks at the beginning of the year when his parents didn't have enough for school fees. At the end of the month his father would return to the school with him to collect his results and so find out whether this was the end of any schooling, or if the dreams of being a doctor would be a little closer.

Wang had the envelope in her hand. The odds were heavily against her but she had studied for nearly four months for the test, reviewing old questions, taking mock exams and attending preparatory classes on the weekend. She thought back to that Sunday when she joined nearly one million others taking the Chinese Civil Service exam, and the fact that in order to complete the aptitude test in the time limit she had had to train to answer each multi-choice question within 50 seconds. "And I really struggled with the essay about modern governance based on the ancient Chinese understanding and metaphor of water," she fretted. She knew that civil service jobs in China are considered the 'golden rice bowl' because of the stable pay and generous benefits. If she'd scored high enough, the actual job interviews would take place some months later.

New Primary School funding fix

There's been another big step towards Benenden's new primary school. A major part of the unexciting-sounding but vital financial arrangements has been agreed between Kent County Council and the government's organisation the Education and Skills Funding Agency. The agency has agreed to free up enough money to pay for the school except for £1 million which will come through KCC.

The important agreement is that the government has accepted that the local contribution will be capped at £1 million. That is even if costs are higher than would be the case for many school projects because of the exceptional nature of the new building, being set in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

It was a slow process but we have got over this very big hurdle and it means a huge amount to the campaigners who've worked and worked for this school. There has been a lot going on behind the scenes to make this work and thanks are due to the KCC Education Cabinet Member, Roger Gough, and his team.

Discussions have also been taking place to get agreement between KCC and the Diocese of Canterbury, who are committed to working together to secure the new school, about the release of the old school buildings to help the funding. These discussions too have their complexities, but appear close to agreement.

As these final issues are resolved we will have, more or less, a freeway to the new school.

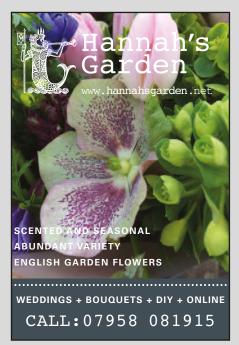

Neighbourhood Development Plan

Housing target falls into line

Much of the focus of our chairman Paul Tolhurst's reports in this magazine on preparing a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Benenden has been on housing numbers. The 'Objectively Assessed Need' for Tunbridge Wells Borough Council (TWBC) is to deliver 14,000 new dwellings in the borough by 2033.

Landowners in Benenden responded so enthusiastically to TWBC's 'call for sites' that, despite Benenden being almost entirely in the High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, it appeared we were being targeted to take a disproportionate number of new dwellings (perhaps over 200) between now and 2033.

In the last few weeks, a number of meetings have been held with TWBC, mainly because our Neighbourhood Development Plan needs to interface with the Local Plan TWBC are preparing for the borough. We reiterated the vision, determined in public meetings, that 'the Parish of Benenden in 2035 will be a thriving, peaceful and rural place to live, work and rest. Its village feel and historic beauty will have been preserved through sympathetic and managed growth'.

We identified that Benenden is one of the remotest parts of the borough; the same distance from Maidstone, Ashford and Hastings as from Tunbridge Wells; journeys from Benenden to the station at Staplehurst and to the A21 are via Sissinghurst and Goudhurst or Hawkhurst, where there are already significant traffic bottlenecks; the evident danger at the crossroads in Iden Green, Benenden and at Castleton's Oak will only be compounded by more houses and more traffic.

We acknowledged that we needed to take our share of the housing need (but not a disproportionate share) and suggested a housing target for Benenden of about 100 dwellings in the 15 years to 2033 - a proposal

that was in line with the Benenden Parish Plan. Encouragingly, I can report that our proposal has been broadly accepted by TWBC.

Our NDP groups have done a great deal of fact finding. The reality is that there is employment in Benenden and there may be some limited growth in employment in the next decade, but many of those working for employers in Benenden cannot afford to buy houses in the village. Benenden's housing need is to begin to address this mismatch, because a vibrant and balanced community needs affordable family housing for our local employees as well as suitable homes for commuters, those working from home and those who have retired.

The housing in Benenden is dispersed and even in the centre of Benenden the housing density is only about ten dwellings per hectare; we have therefore argued strongly that TWBC's density guideline of 30 dwellings per hectare is not appropriate. Having reached broad agreement with TWBC, we are now working hard writing policies to ensure that development is appropriately sympathetic, sustainable and restrained.

We will be holding a public consultation on Saturday 29 September to keep you advised of progress - please plan to come along.

Design and the built environment

At the first public workshop for the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP), I decided that as I had been in construction all my working life, I could perhaps contribute most to the Housing Design Group and so this is where I have been concentrating my efforts over the last few months.

Our first task was to assess the character of the dwellings we have in the parish and to decide where we would look to review this character. We chose to concentrate on reviewing the design of housing in the three main settlements in the parish: Benenden village, Iden Green and East End. We split our group into three, with each one surveying every house, in every road, in each area, making a note of the characteristics of each house, with the intention of providing a guide for future developers to build houses that would fit in, aesthetically, to the surrounding neighbourhood.

To begin with, we decided to walk through Benenden village to have an understanding of the amount of detail that we needed to obtain, to provide evidence that would support our development guide. It became obvious that the survey of so many houses would require an easy tick-box survey sheet to identify the main characteristics of each dwelling and I designed a spreadsheet to cater for this, which I circulated to our group. For each house where they could be seen from the road, we have made a note of the type of dwelling - house, bungalow, flat - the type of roof tiles used, the treatment of the front and side elevation - hanging tiles, weatherboarding, brick - whether or not there is a porch or canopy over the front door, the boundary treatment - hedge, fence or open - and the

estimated age of the property. From this survey, we produced a statistical analysis for each design element for each settlement (Character Area). We are intending to use this analysis to create design codes within the NDP for developers.

During our walk around the locality, we were all quite surprised to find that, while we all had a distinct impression from driving through these three Character Areas that Benenden village was all old, tiled-front housing with peg tile roofs, Iden Green was all white weatherboarded houses with peg tile roofs and East End was mainly the hospital complex with a few brick-built semi-detached houses, the actual assortment of dwellings was very varied in each.

There is a complete mix of types and looks of buildings in all three areas and it is this blend that we want to try to emulate in any development. Not only that, but there are various policies within the Local Plan, previously produced by TWBC, and the Government's National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) that govern the way buildings are developed within the landscape, and we have produced design policies for the Neighbourhood Development Plan which also take these into account.

While there are a lot of people who feel our voices will not be heard by the authorities, I do believe there is merit in what we are trying to achieve and the authorities are duty bound to take our Neighbourhood Development Plan into consideration when assessing the look and design of housing in our parish. We will therefore continue to work tirelessly to provide future developers with a blueprint of how we as a community want to see the parish develop and what we believe will ensure that future generations will benefit from still being able to enjoy the beautiful area we live in for years to come.

Play Benenden is the campaign to plan, design and raise funds for an improved play area in the village. Initially launched in 2015, the project consulted with children, parents, grandparents, carers and others who live and work in the community to understand the type of play equipment they wanted and the look and feel of the play area. Using this information we created a design brief, and went through a selection process to choose a company to design and deliver a new play area.

In 2016, uncertainties about the new primary school building meant that we had to pause the work on Play Benenden, but

at the beginning of 2018 we gathered up our enthusiasm and energy and prepared to relaunch the campaign. We have revisited the original design and received revised costings from the play area designer, a company based in Sutton Valence called Playspaces (previously Outdoorsy Living). We are now ready to go and you may already have seen posts on our Facebook page (PlayBenenden) about the progress we are making.

The new play area will be located along the back of the recreation ground after the Glebe Field access, providing us with a larger space than previously. It will have a rural theme with a wooden/natural look as far as possible to best suit our rural village location. There will be a defined area for pre-school and younger children, further space for older children, and a picnic area for parents, carers and other members of the community to use. In the

pre-school area, the equipment will include baby swings, a wooden tractor for imaginative play, a fun climbing frame with slide, and story-telling area with mini stools for the children to sit on.

In the area for older children, equipment will include swings, a nest swing, a large climbing frame, a trim trail and a rope swing popular for group swinging.

We are very happy with the design and we hope you, the Benenden community, share our excitement about the potential this could have for our children. The play area is designed to provide a creative and imaginative space

for the children in our parish to play, be active and spend more time outside in a safe environment. It will be enclosed by fencing to protect the children and give parents and carers peace of mind, and we have included

Who hasn't wondered what it would be like to run a country pub? There you stand behind the bar, beaming bonhomie at your regulars, welcoming strangers, pulling frothing pints, and dispensing wisdom and largesse.

Well here's your opportunity. The Woodcock is finally up for sale. And that's the freehold, not the lease. So you won't be a tenant or a manager but a proper landlord, not tied to one brewer's beer or forced to buy everything else from them at inflated prices.

No, for an outlay of a mere £495,000 (plus £99,000 VAT!) you could be, as the estate agent's blurb says, the proud owner of this "charming 17th century Freehouse" with "exposed beams and timbers and inglenook fireplace ... pretty beer garden and large car park", complete with three-bedroom living accommodation above.

But before you reach for your cheque-book, remember that old adage: running a pub is like having a rowdy party in your front room - seven nights a week, 52 weeks a year. And that's if you're lucky. Nigel and Hilly who had the William IV used to say "it's a very long winter in Benenden!" Meaning that there would be midweek nights when there wouldn't be any trade at all. And that was in the centre of the village, not in an obscure lane off Iden Green. So you could be paying for a chef, bar and waiting staff, plus electricity and heat all evening for no customers - or just one person and their dog.

But what about those long balmy summer's days when the garden is packed with people sipping Pimm's and quaffing lagers and cool pink wine? That would make it all worthwhile wouldn't it? I recall the scene a few years back in this same Woodcock garden on an early summer's afternoon. The landlord had prepared a hogroast clearly expecting large numbers. As the rain bucketed down with drops penetrating



the awning and dripping onto the few punters, I said to my son: "Remember this, this is the archetypical English bank holiday!"

Anyway I wish whoever buys the Woodcock well. I've been drinking there on and off for about 50 years (they weren't so concerned about checking your age back in the 60s) so I hope it prospers. It's just a pity - particularly for the last landlord's sake - that Greene King took so long to decide to sell off the freehold. Kent Barker

Reclaiming our fruit from the French

I've never grasped why the French are given the credit for anything cooked with apples. Stick any animal in a pot with a pint of cider, a chopped-up Bramley and a bit of cream and suddenly it becomes 'Normandy style', no matter that it was made in Kent from fruit grown in our very own Garden County, booze fermented likewise and cream ... well, we have cows in Kent, too.

I'll happily concede that the Normans make very good cider, but as my colleague Alfred Nicol points out on this page, you only have to go as far as Biddenden to get Kentish versions that are every bit as good.

While we're on apple-related cuisine, it may have escaped your notice that I September has come round again and with it the start of the pheasant season. What better combination than our most colourful and stupid game bird cooked with apple to welcome autumn to our tables? Faisan a la Normande? Mais non! This is Benenden pheasant, hit with a Land Rover in Iden Green and taken home for the pot.

Freelander pheasant (serves four)

- Take two pheasants and brown in a few tbsps of olive oil in a big, heavy pan
- Brown four rashers of smoked streaky bacon and then a dozen shallots and a stick of celery (all chopped) in the big, heavy pan
- Put the birds (seasoned with salt and pepper), bacon, shallots and celery in your big French Le Creuset casserole, add a couple of bay leaves, a few sprigs of fresh thyme and a tbsp of juniper berries, then pour over a soupcon of flaming Calvados as a nod to our Norman cousins
- Add three medium-sized apples (cored and chunky-cut)
- Add 750ml of Biddenden Strong Kentish cider (medium) and 250ml of chicken stock
- Bring to a simmer, cover and cook at 180 degrees for an hour (or until tender)
- Serve with fried apple segments, mash, green veg and more cider.

Amazing apples and great grapes

Many will be aware of the renaissance in English wine. Many may not know that Biddenden, a family-run vineyard for three generations, was a forerunner of that renaissance and boasts some of England's oldest vines, producing some very fine wines indeed. I was delighted to interview winemaker Julian and hear about his passion for the land that is both his home and livelihood.

Julian Barnes' mother was the visionary behind the vines, initially as a means of diversifying the apple orchards they purchased in the 1950s. Inspired by an article on Women's Hour, she set about planting a vineyard that has exceeded all expectations. Julian is the second generation of Biddenden winemakers and two of his boys remain at the vineyard, continuing the family affair that is an authentic combination of identity and modernity.

Their wine style is as much about Julian's gentle conviction as it is about the unique terroir that makes Biddenden so characterful. His family have been making wines for nearly half a century and he is keen for people to look "behind the label".

Biddenden grows 11 different varieties, some well-known, such as Pinot Noir and Gamay, and some less well-known such as the fragrant Schonberger, the vibrant Bacchus, and the fresh Ortega. Unlike many English vineyards riding on the crest of the sparkling wine wave, most of Biddenden's wine is still, and has a definitive

house style which has won a loyal following among those in the know.

Julian is unequivocal that English red need not play second fiddle to the whites. "People think of reds like Bordeaux or Rioja, but in Germany and Austria for example, reds can be light and fruity, something we can do very well."

Biddenden's sparkling is the product of a long and refined process. As we stood by a new planting of Pinot Noir, Julian explained that while these vines will produce wine in five to six years, it may take 20 for their best sparkling to reach the shelves. Their fizz spends several

years maturing on the lees in bottle, minutely turned to gently nudge the yeast deposits from the secondary fermentation into the neck before disgorgement. This is the Champagne Method with a twist; by blending Pinot Noir with the more fruitforward Reichensteiner and Scheurebe, "we never chase Champagne, but look to make something fruitier."

Careful pruning and wilfully reducing the crop to retain quality and a sense of place typifies Julian's

prioritising of quality over quantity. Winemaking with this level of care and attention is without question a labour of love and patience. Biddenden also specialise in ciders and premium apple juices, ideal for enjoying with food as an alternative to wine. For more information see the recently established Wine Garden of England, a co-operation between seven vineyards promoting their cellar door experience: www.winegardenofengland.co.uk.

It was a delight to meet Julian and taste the wines, which are defined by their balance, fresh fruit and genuine sense of place. Here are four of the best:

Bacchus 2016 A refreshing blend of gooseberry, grass, lemon and minerality to rival



Pinot Reserve 2014 Their silver medallist is a serious bottle of fizz with weight, some brioche notes and plenty of fresh fruit. £28.80

Schonburger 2016 The cool fermentation is prematurely halted to preserve freshness and natural sugars, revealing a

Bird Notes

Quest leads to the clifftop

Continuing my quest to visit areas of the British Isles to which I have never been took me to the Brecon Beacons, where my first reconnoitre was to Craig y Cillau nature reserve, just south of Crickhowell, which is famous for having the longest caves in the British Isles. The walk was along an escarpment punctuated with hawthorn bushes, from where a song sprang forth which stopped me in my tracks.

It was a Tree Pipit taking off from a perch on a bush, soaring up and then descending to where it started. I watched this bird for some time as I rarely hear them. Until about five years ago we had four to five pairs in Hemsted Forest but they have now disappeared for reasons not known. Possible explanations are loss of habitat, problems on their migration routes or on their



wintering grounds in Africa. Hemsted Forest has not changed very much so loss of habitat seems unlikely. Tree Pipits are ground-nesting birds so disturbance by the huge numbers of dogs that are exercised could be a possibility.

Having got very excited about hearing a Tree Pipit,

I was pleased to hear many more that day and it was good to know they are doing well in the Brecons. I then heard a song



coming from a scrubby cliff top and was slightly surprised to see a male Redstart, which I usually associate with woodland habitat but he sang very happily from the cliff top, showing off his red breast and black throat.

Where the climb got very steep I kept my eye out for birds of prey and was quickly rewarded with a pair of Peregrine Falcons patrolling the cliffs. They are notorious for being one of the fastest animals on earth when they stoop down on their unsuspecting prey. There were not a huge number of species in this habitat but there were plenty of Willow Warblers singing their delicate, cascading song, together with a few Cuckoos calling, all making this first walk an extremely pleasant one.

No visit to the Brecons can be complete without climbing Pen Y Fan (2950ft). It was a glorious hot day and the car park was pretty full so I was not expecting to see much bird life, with a long trail of people climbing the peak. However I was very pleasantly surprised to hear a Skylark singing its heart out on the lower slopes, and even more surprised to hear them all the way up the mountain, one territory after another. It really was a lovely background to the uphill grind, especially as it was uncomfortably hot. Unfortunately one or two climbers had mobile telephones blaring out some thumping beating noise, which interrupted the serenity of the



climb. A Meadow Pipit also displayed its parachute song. Normally Meadow Pipits outnumber Skylarks on most mountain terrains but it was 20 to one here.

At the top a lovely Wheatear was searching the summit rocks for insects, showing off its white rump while trying to catch its lunch. On the way a Cuckoo sang from a small copse near the path, making not just one or two calls but continuing as long as I was in hearing range, which for a Cuckoo is some distance.

Near the bottom, the path crossed a stream and while waiting for the rest of the party I wandered a little way upstream and settled near a very small waterfall. It was

not long before a Dipper appeared with a beak full of food to feed young in a nest under the lip of the waterfall, just far enough away from the water itself.

Unlike most flying birds whose bones have a honeycomb structure, Dippers have solid bones so that they can 'walk' underwater to catch their prey - particularly Caddis Fly larvae. I watched for about 15 minutes in which time both parents came back two or three times with a beak full of food. I found it amazing that they could find so much nourishment in a relatively small stretch of stream to feed three or four young for three or so weeks. Even though I only recorded 12 species of bird, the walk will be remembered for some good bird watching/hearing.

Any visit to Wales must include a woodland walk, as the deciduous woods tend to contain species not found in the Southeast. There is lovely wood called Dert Fach on Sugar Loaf mountain containing mainly oak trees, which for some reason all seem to grow in a spiral, which gives the woods an intriguing and strange appearance. The canopy was quite thick so there was little undergrowth and at first there seemed to be little bird life, until I heard an unfamiliar song although I was sure I knew what it would be. Looking up I saw a brilliant white bird with a black head and tail above me. It was a Pied Flycatcher, only ever seen in Kent on passage as it is a

migrant wintering in Africa. The darkish surroundings seemed to enhance its plumage as it flew around, and from above it appeared more black than white, with a prominent white wing bar. It is one of those birds to set one's pulse racing.

As we emerged from the wood to climb the hill I was delighted to find a pair of Whinchat among the bracken - another declining migrant.

In Your Garden

Good value plants

I like to think I move with the times when it comes to new plant introductions and am very appreciative of the merits of plant breeders, particularly when they can breed out a nasty strain of powdery mildew or can reduce the height of a favourite plant from I.5m high down to a more manageable 0.6m (I'm thinking of asters and verbena bonariensis as examples).

However, one can get carried away and forget about all the other plants we once grew which have tremendous value in the garden, are hardy and fuss-free, easy to propagate and give a long show, particularly at this time of year. The trick is to have some of the old with some of the new.

Take sedums for example (or 'Hylotelephiums' as they are now). Early into growth in spring, they provide a structural element to borders from just a few inches high, are drought and disease resistant and an autumn/winter stalwart. My favourite two at the moment are the purple black stems of 'Purple Emperor' and the lovely white 'Iceberg'. I would be happy with just the foliage on any variety, but on come the flowerheads in late summer which are simply stunning and a magnet for pollinators. They respond well to the 'Chelsea Chop' too - in late May, I randomly reduce stems by about a third. Combined with division every few years,

this prevents the familiar stem-flop and keeps the crowns tidy.


Another highly valued, rather ubiquitous plant called Euonymus fortunei 'Emerald 'n' Gold' is a quietly understated hero in the garden. I prefer this variety to the more icylooking 'Emerald Gaiety' as the leaves are shiny and the green and gold

is a better foil for neighbouring plants, although both are excellent for cutting and in bouquets.

Very useful in early spring when planted alongside heathers and early yellow narcissi, handy at hiding tulip and allium foliage, it merges into the backdrop over the summer and in winter provides a wonderful contrast with bright dogwood stems, hellebores and snowdrops. I have even seen it climbing up, and hiding, downpipes on a shady wall. It really does tick a lot of boxes.

While new flower movements come and go, these two plants, and others besides, have a firm place in my garden plant lists.
