The gift of support, peace, and love given to us by God in the bringing to life of his Son, Jesus Christ, at Easter, heralds new and limitless opportunities for us, if only we can put aside our 'unbelief' and hold onto our 'believing'. This was a theme of the sermon given by Neville Emslie at the benefice service on the Sunday after Easter in Ulcombe church, focusing on the story of Thomas and his needing to have proof that Jesus was really alive after his death.

Eco-shop. We are looking forward to the completion of the alterations to the side aisle, when we can make much better access to the shop. We hope to have an opening social event to mark the occasion and will keep you posted. These things always take longer than we would hope.

Food Bank. Many thanks to those who leave bags of groceries etc. in the basket in the porch. They are being delivered to Maidstone, where the need is growing.

Donations to Ukraine. The collection point is in Lenham church and vans go regularly across Europe. Just follow the directions at the church and it is open from 9-5pm daily. Main items needed are: *Nappies, baby wipes, baby food/milk (not glass), sanitary items, medical kit basics, pain killers, tinned meat and fish (with ring pulls), blankets and warm socks.*

The Village Coffee times. We are pleased to see so many friends taking time for a drink and a chat, from 12.45-2.15pm. each Tuesday, while the pop-up Post Office is open in the village hall.

Benefice service is here at St.Nicolas at 10.30am on Sunday 22nd May. It will be an outdoor service if the weather permits, when the other three church congregations will join us.

May 29th service. This is a fifth Sunday and we are planning for a Songs of Praise type service at 3.30pm. Please could you pass on your choice of favourite hymn, with your name, as soon as possible to help in the planning.

Outdoor Services. By popular requests, following the success of outdoor services through the pandemic, we hope to have as many services as possible outdoors through the summer.

Jubilee event. We will post plans for an outdoor service as soon as possible. Hoping you can join in.

Finale. So many things to look forward to this summer. It will be good to have times together after the difficulties of the last two years. 

News from your local MP - Helen Whatley

I know just how awful Kent's roads have been in the last few weeks.

Disruption at the Channel Ports – largely caused by P&O Ferries – has led to the unwelcome return of Operation Brock and huge pressure on our roads.

I've spent my fair share of time in the queues on the M2 and A20 recently, giving me plenty to say to my ministerial colleagues about the continued use of the M20 as a lorry park.

I have made it clear to Transport Ministers and Kent Police that I do not see Operation Brock as successfully managing the situation.

Despite the best efforts of the police - and they have worked hard at this - it's near impossible to stop lorries rat-running to avoid queueing on the M20 and I've heard plenty of tales of lorries ending in single-track lanes causing chaos.

Enforcing Operation Brock has in fact been the main cause of the long queues we've seen at Brenley Corner. I joined Kent Police and DVLA staff on Good Friday to see their traffic management first-hand.

The checks were clearly serving a purpose with several lorries stopped and dispatched to the nearest lay-by to be fined during my visit. But I could also see how each lorry pulled over meant more frustrating delays for local motorists.

Traffic thankfully improved over the Easter weekend, following my calls to stand down Operation Brock at the earliest possible opportunity. But the past few weeks have made it clearer than ever that we need a long-term solution to Operation Brock.

This time the disruption has been caused by P&O Ferries not sailing, but we've seen problems at the Channel Ports before with bad weather, strikes, and Covid. Turning the M20 into a lorry park every time there is disruption at our ports is simply not sustainable.

My strong preference is to see traffic problems handled at source before lorries arrive in Kent. I've stressed to Transport Ministers that disruption at the Channel Ports should not be seen as Kent's problem, it's a UK problem.

Lorries should not be allowed to pile up in Kent when there are queues at Dover. We had plans ready for Brexit, including the Kent Access Permit for HGV drivers. We need to revive those plans and be ready to go further.

Better use of technology like automatic number plate recognition would also help with this and prevent the need for physical checks, which caused such huge problems at Brenley Corner.

We also need to improve our local infrastructure. I met the Roads Minister earlier this month to call for investment at Brenley Corner to finally get the green light so we can fix this bottleneck once and for all.

More lorry parking is also needed both in Kent and further afield for when there is disruption and for normal times. It's important that HGV drivers have somewhere safe to take a break as well as preventing lorry fly-parking.

The Kent Resilience Forum will shortly be carrying out a review of Operation Brock and I look forward to taking part in that. I'll continue to call for better answers to the question of how to manage disruption at the Channel Ports. Kent's motorists deserve better.

Finally I will urge everyone to visit this jewel in our village and can fully recommend it for any event.

Grafty Gourmet

I thought I would do a chocolate-based recipe this month. I don't know about you, but chocolate is a good "pick me up", especially during these difficult times. And anyone who knows me, knows that I can never say no to chocolate! This is a different kind of a brownie recipe which does not use flour. It makes it more of a chocolate indulgence. The chocolate sauce is optional, and I must warn, it is very very chocolatey! Serve with ice cream and the hot chocolate sauce for extra "pick me up".

Chocolate Brownies With Hot Chocolate Sauce

For the Brownies:

225 grams of dark chocolate (minimum 70% cocoa solids)
225 grams of butter
2 teaspoons of vanilla extract
200 grams of caster sugar
3 large eggs (beaten)
150 grams of ground almonds
100 grams of chopped walnuts

For the Hot Chocolate Sauce:

75 grams of dark chocolate (minimum 70% cocoa solids)
125 millilitres of double cream
2 teaspoons of instant espresso powder
1 tablespoons of water
1 tablespoon of golden syrup

For the Brownies:

- **1**. Preheat the oven to 170°C (150°C Fan Oven). Melt the chocolate and butter gently over a low heat in a heavy-based saucepan.
- **2**. Take the pan off the heat and mix in the vanilla and sugar, and let it cool a little, before adding the eggs (the eggs will start cooking if the chocolate is too warm, but you do not want the chocolate to go solid again). Once cooled, Beat the eggs into the pan along with the ground almonds and chopped walnuts. Turn into a 24cm / 9-inch square baking tin. Use a foil one if possible, as this makes it easier to get the Brownie out after baking.
- **3**. Bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes, by which time the top will have set but the mixture will still be gooey. (Do not over cook, as the top will burn. The centre is supposed to be slightly squidgy, but will go solid once cooled). When cooled, cut carefully, four down, four across, into 16 squares.

For the Sauce:

- 1. Break up the chocolate and put into a heavy-based saucepan.
- **2**. Dissolve the instant espresso powder in the water and add this, along with the remaining ingredients into the saucepan, then place the pan over a gentle heat and let everything melt together.

Once everything has melted, stir well, take off the heat and pour into a jug to serve.

3. Enjoy!

Sue's Nature Notes

A couple of notes on how you can start the spring/summer season and enable the wildlife to prosper:-

There is a trend now known as '**No Mow May'** (or maybe only mow once a month through the growing season!) to allow the grass to grow longer, which will give cover to many small creatures, and for a variety of wild flowers to flourish; the insect life will increase and they are at the start of the food chain. Another upside to this is saving on fuel and your energy.

Nesting birds; you may well have seen the signs in your garden of the birds that like to nest in shrubbery/hedges but some birds nest on the ground in woodland and open fields and they will be vulnerable to being disturbed by walkers and dogs. Locally there are skylarks, meadow pipits, in woodlands nearby - woodcock, pheasants and partridge. Further afield you could come across lapwings, nightjars and a variety of ducks.

This month's anniversary is the birth of Richard Wagner on May 22nd in Leipzig. This German dramatic composer and theorist whose operas and music had a revolutionary influence on the course of Western music, either by extension of his discoveries or reaction against them. Among his major works are The Flying Dutchman (1843), Tannhäuser (1845), Lohengrin (1850), Tristan und Isolde (1865), Parsifal (1882), and his great tetralogy, The Ring of the Nibelung (1869–76).

The artistic and theatrical background of Wagner's early years (several elder sisters became opera singers or actresses) was a main formative influence. Impulsive and self-willed, he was a negligent scholar at school. He frequented concerts, however, taught himself the piano and composition, and read the plays of Shakespeare, Goethe, and Schiller.

Attracted by the glamour of student life he enrolled at Leipzig University, but as an adjunct with inferior privileges, since he had not completed his preparatory schooling. Although he lived wildly, he applied himself earnestly to composition. He failed to get his first opera produced at Leipzig and became conductor to a provincial theatrical troupe from Magdeburg, having fallen in love with one of the actresses of the troupe, Wilhelmine (Minna) Planer, whom he married in 1836.



Christian Message May 2022

It's hard to write a Christian message for May in mid-March as world news will have moved on so much in another six weeks but I suspect we are all feeling slightly speechless:

Speechless at President Putin's decision to invade Ukraine; speechless at the speed at which homes and towns are being destroyed; and speechless at the number of people either displaced from their homes, or who never made it to safety and are now lost to their loved ones.

We have all looked on in disbelief that a country is being destroyed, and fearful of the repercussions around the world. Where is God in all of this?

Watching the news, horrific as it is, I do see God at work everywhere:

Ukrainian officials and soldiers have shown such strength of character to stay in their towns and defend their country despite being vastly outnumbered by their invaders:

families needing to flee have been welcomed by neighbouring countries offering homes to stay in;

and aid has been pouring in from all around the world in the form of money, food, medical supplies, toiletries, blankets and winter clothing.

Locally, we have a collection point in St Mary's Church in Lenham for essential supplies, and as I write this, I have just been told of video footage of the first lorry, with provisions from the Len Valley Benefice, arriving safely in the Ukraine. My thanks goes to those who have organised or contributed to this significant effort and continue to do so. Jesus said:

'For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me...

... Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' (Matthew 25: 35, 36 and 40).

There are miracles happening too. A pastor in Lviv, reported that he had seen rockets disappear in the air without reaching their targets and enemy tanks running out of fuel, their drivers lost and asking for help. Locally I heard of someone offering a supply of PPE without knowing that the people at the depot in Maidstone were, at that moment, wondering where they could find supplies of - PPE.

None of this makes war less horrific and I am mindful that the invasions could step up a gear at any moment, but it does bring hope. Reporters have described Ukrainians, from President Zelenskyy to the ordinary person in the street, fuelled by faith and trust

in God, showing such tenacity and bravery. Many of us feel we want to help but find it hard to know what to do that will be of any effect.

We can pray. Christians from countries throughout the world are praying at specific hours of the day. Many Christians in England have committed to pause for a minute at 9pm every evening, to pray for the peace and an end to the conflict, for the safety of us all and for God to guide the decisions of our leaders. If you can't find any words to say, why not sit quietly and light a candle. The Catholic Agency for Overseas Development (CAFOD) has published the following prayer which may also be helpful:

We pray for the people of Ukraine,

for all those suffering or afraid,

that you will be close to them and protect them.

We pray for world leaders,

for compassion, strength and wisdom to guide their choices.

We pray for the world

that in this moment of crisis,

we may reach out in solidarity

to our brothers and sisters in need.


May we walk in your ways






