Sewage in Rivers

Did you know water companies are permitted to discharge untreated sewage into waterways during periods of 'unusually heavy rainfall' and this appears to be occurring far more frequently in recent years, despite our sewage treatment plant in the village being relatively small and modern was around the top ten of leaking/discharging of sewage in the country, last year on average it was discharging untreated sewage for an equivalent of 20% of the time!

Beyond the obvious this causes severe problems to our waterways and the natural habitat, to work on addressing this the Parish Council has formally written to protest this behavior to key stakeholders including the water company, the government and the regulator. And we hope to continue to push this issue.

Playgrounds

The Parish Council have agreed to reopen the playgrounds subject to clear guidance on their use in line with government and industry advice.

The guidance requires:

- Maximum stay of 30min to ensure fair use under the limited capacities;
- No eating or drinking and any rubbish must be disposed of;
- As always give people plenty of distance, use hand sanitizer and wherever practical keep equipment clean.

 The Leys Playground 10
 Jubilee Field Playground 15

Please follow this guidance and ensure the playgrounds can be safe shared spaces to everyone who wants to use them and help ensure we can keep them open when practical.

Page three bird The flying fish

There are over 50 species of flying fish belonging to the family Exocoetidae. They cannot fly in the same way a bird does, flying fish can make



powerful, self-propelled leaps out of the water where their long wing-like fins enable gliding for considerable distances above the water's surface. The main reason for this behaviour is thought to be to escape from predators. Flying fish eat a variety of foods, but plankton make up a large part of their diet. They sometimes eat small crustaceans as well. They live in the Atlantic, Pacific coasts of the US and the Indian oceans.

Circular Walks in the Lower Windrush

The Lower Windrush Valley Project (LWVP) has secured funding to improve access and promote three beautiful circular walks in the Lower Windrush Valley. The three routes have been selected because of their ease of access, beautiful scenery, proximity to local businesses and nature reserves and links with longer distance

footpaths like the Windrush Path and Thames Path National Trail. Now you have no excuse to get out for a walk and they have lovely paths as well.

Village Markets:

The algal bloom

As I'm sure many of you are aware that the lake up by the devil's quoits has an algal bloom. Over the past few weeks, it has become very bad from a rotten smell to fish being killed. If you go for a walk (which I don't recommend it can be very distressing) please be careful. DO NOT go in the water or allow your pets to go in as it can kill.

The EA have investigated and confirmed an 'Algal Crash' which is when the algae blooms so much the oxygen level in the water drops to almost nothing affecting fish and wildlife. This can occur naturally in hot weather when the sun drives the bloom and warm water holds far less oxygen than cold water, but it can also be made worse by pollution which can 'fertilise' the algae. The exact cause of this occurrence is unclear but algal blooms are becoming far more common in the waterways, as is hot weather and pollution!
