It also provides some funds to support a solution to the bus situation in the future.

The Maple Tree Children's Centre

Historically, the Centre has been funded by Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) and managed by Great Milton Primary School. Early in 2016, OCC announced its decision to reduce the support of the 44 children's centres in the county to 8 Children and Family Centre Hubs located in areas of greatest need in City/Urban locations. The County Council will be withdrawing their support for the Maple Tree Centre in early 2017. Great Milton Primary School is responsible for the management of the centre until the end of their contract in March 2017.

The Friends of the Maple Tree Children's Centre (FMTCC) believe they have a viable proposal to continue the hugely valuable services provided by the Maple Tree Children's Centre to families of children under five in the rural community of Wheatley and the surrounding villages

FMTCC are seeking funding from local Parish Councils and businesses.

FMTCC presented their business plan to the council.

GMPC are in support of Maple Tree Children's Centre and have included funding towards the centre in their budget for 2017/18.

You said we did'/ Priorities Theft from motor vehicles: There has been in an increase in theft from motor vehicles throughout the South & Vale area. High visibility patrols have been increased and crime prevention signs have been placed in the hotspots along with crime prevention events.

Crime Prevention

As the winter months are coming in, the darkness is drawing in earlier. This provides thieves more opportunity to commit crime during the darkness. Here are some tips to help you prevent becoming a victim of crime:

- · Close and lock doors and windows when going out or to bed.
- · Keep valuables out of sight.
- · Don't advertise you're out invest in a light timer!
- If you're going on holiday, ask your neighbours to keep an eye on your house.

The neighbourhood team will be at the Town Hall in Thame on Friday 9 December between 6-8pm. The team will be on hand to give any crime reduction advice and listen to any local concerns you may have.

View from Views

The shortest day is past and a New Year dawns, it is a sobering thought that we also all get a year older, on the other hand we can now look forward to the steady climb back to summer and longer days. Early December saw a cold spell that caused us all to feel very Christmassy and put on an extra layer of clothes wondering if this would prove to be the start of a long cold winter, then overnight it all disappeared in a



nasty mist, we just do not know what will happen. All I know is that as soon as it became frosty large numbers of Pigeons started to attack our Oil Seed Rape, which is the sort of thing that will put another nail in the coffin for this crop, that has served us very well in the past few years being quite profitable, now that we can no longer control certain pests, weeds, and diseases it is becoming almost impossible to grow profitably. Although this year ours seems not to be fairing too badly so far, but many other Farmers have already decided to grow less profitable crops as an alternative. I think if we are to be realistic its success has been its downfall we have been too ready to grow it on a large scale and just over done it, this is always the danger with any good thing it is overdone.

There has been a fair amount in the press about antibiotics, and their use in agriculture this is a very worrying scenario. I understand there is criticism of the Agricultural Industry for the indiscriminate use of these as feed additives, as I understand it these are not used to any great extent any more, some would have the public think otherwise. Beef & Lamb would not have any unless they had a need, through an illness, this is certainly not common, they would only be used in intensive production for pigs and poultry, I understand this has been reduced, and am reliably informed, by 43%. I believe that in this country we are aware of the problem and taking measures to rectify any imbalance. This is another reason for buying British. Now we have to deal with Avian Flu something I know very little about, I understand it is prevalent on the continent, and has now been found in a Turkey flock in Lincolnshire which is a little alarming, the danger is that it is be spread by migrating birds from infected areas. We have been told not to let our birds out for 30 days in the hope that by then migration will have stopped and the danger period will be over. At the moment our birds seem quite happy, and should be ok as long as we do not have too much mild airless weather, fingers crossed!

It will now soon be time to start feeding the wild birds again, I think we will be able to leave feeding them till later this year as there is plenty of natural feed for them, there certainly seems to be a lot of them about his year. They are at the moment feeding on the areas planted for their benefit, which must be a good sign, there are also a lot of berries for them. Now the leaves are off the trees it is more noticeable how many squirrels there are about, we have been aware that the little devils were about but just have not seen them, giving us the impression that there were not so many as there really are, drastic action will have to take place I fear.

The planning proposals still rumble on and no doubt by the end of this year hopefully we will have a better idea of what is going to happen, just hope it is all planned properly and the infrastructure is planned and put in progress at the same time as any building programme starts. So that our countryside is all destroyed at the same time, before we realise what is happening, by which time it will then be too late. It seems to me that the only infrastructure that is planned that will not actually destroy any countryside is the new proposed Varsity line which will be a great boon to us rather, than the White Elephant of HS2. I note still no silent rail in North Oxford what a travesty, just another illustration of how if you are big enough you can get away with anything, in spite of any agreements that may have made. Travelling back for Culham one evening at 1630 we found ourselves in a que virtually, from the rail bridge, to Chiselhampton, this made me realise how important this infrastructure new roads etc is in any new development, and that will mean even more carving up of this area and all its wildlife that we have spent a lifetime preserving. We just don't seem to be able to think far enough ahead, how about all the expense on the roundabouts of north Oxford (would make a good title for a song) as far as I can gather still not solved the problem, with the new development in Barton even more traffic and the congestion that goes with it, in that area. This will be made even worse with less buses and more cars. Now we read that local Post Offices are under threat again, and as reported in the "Oxford Times" 15th December so are some local Primary schools, I think they want to drive us peasants out of the country and into urban the areas, so that we will not cause an uprising over planning issues. Hey Ho! Happy New Year!!! Add to all this on a personal note, our payment for our conservation work due 1st December not arrived yet, makes me wonder what HMRC's reaction would be for us to say we cannot afford to pay our tax as we are waiting for our payment from DEFRA?

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

In November, we took a sunshine break to go walking in Tenerife. We are not beach people and the walking on this beautiful island is spectacular. The island is home to Spain's highest mountain, Mt Teide which is 3718m high and still an active volcano; it last erupted in 1909. The area around the mountain, including a massive caldera resulting from the collapse of an earlier volcano, is within the world Heritage Site of Teide National Park. The park is around 2000 metres and offers walks of varying difficulty all of which afford wonderful views and scenery, and, for the plantaholic some stunning plants. Admittedly, there were few flowers visible with most plants having gone to seed. However, if you visit in spring then there are masses of flowering plants all over the island. Probably the most spectacular plants we saw on this visit were the decaying huge flowering stems of Echium wildpretii; this plant is native to Tenerife, but I have seen them on the Scilly Isles where the climate is very forgiving. One year I persuaded it to flower in my greenhouse, but the plant was very unhappy with terrible bug infestations; as I have grown older I have adapted my plant choices more to those that enjoy the Oxfordshire climate with its heavy frosts.

While we were away the cold certainly hit and, unfortunately, my greenhouse heater chose that time to fail and tripped out at the fuse box rather than at the greenhouse socket so there was nothing my loyal friends taking care of things could have done to prevent plant damage. The temperature had dropped down to -7°C inside the greenhouse and yet surprisingly little damage appears to have been done as I tend to keep plants dry over the winter; it is the combination of wet and cold which kills plants and I normally set the thermostat to around 0°C as I don't have any very tender plants in there. I have cut down the top growth on the huge Salvias growing in the greenhouse bed, but the bases are still alive. Leaves on my tender Fuchsias and on the Pelargoniums are badly damaged, but I am hopeful that most will make it through the winter. I will not discard those which look like they will have a chance of survival and wait and see. In any case I always see death in the garden as an opportunity to justify trying something new!


