Grafty Green Stores And Post Office

It is with great sadness that we inform you that we will no longer be able to continue running Grafty Green Stores and Post Office. This is not a conclusion we have reached lightly and we hope the following explains why we have reached it.

The domestic premises are increasingly difficult for someone of Hazel's now severely impaired mobility and it is likely we will need the extra space of the shop area.

Rob is unable to return to a significant presence in the shop due to domestic commitments. Nick only agreed to his current hours as a temporary measure to manage under COVID constraints, particularly when the shop was used more, and now wishes to concentrate on other priorities.

Over the years there has been a substantial change in shopping habits and other trading conditions. We do not consider the shop in an adequate financial state that it is realistic to think we could sell it as a going concern and it is not feasible in our circumstances. We therefore have decided to close the shop. We hope we will be able to continue till after Christmas.

An Update from the Parish Council

Our Maidstone Borough councillors have asked the parish council to collect information on instances of anti-social behaviour which have not been reported to the police - as well as those incidents reported to the police. This refers to such things as threatening behaviour, littering, verbal abuse, damage to property and vehicles. Although some of these issues may technically be crimes, you may choose not to report these to the police, either because you don't think it will lead to any worthwhile action or you fear retribution. The borough councillors would very much like to hear about such instances, which can be kept anonymous or sources treated confidentially. If you are aware of any such instances of anti-social behaviour, but may, or may not have informed the police, could you provide details to the Parish Clerk at boughtonmalherbepc@gmail.com or phone 07972 6309555 and this will be collected for the borough councillors to use, in anonymous form, to present to Kent Police

Helen Whately's Parish Update

Recovery Drive

Along with schools going back this month, September also saw the return of MPs to Westminster. Like workplaces across the country, Parliament is beginning to look and feel more like normal with more MPs allowed in the Commons and more face-to-face meetings.

There are signs of our recovery across the economy with the employment rate back to where it was before Covid, wages rising, and the UK having the fastest growth in the G7. We had to take difficult decisions during the pandemic, and tough decisions are needed again to help the NHS and social care recover from the last 18 months. That's why we're introducing our Health and Care Levy to beat the backlogs in the NHS and deliver reform of social care.

It's not just in health and social care that we're determined to build back better. I've been meeting local businesses to hear how Government support for jobs is helping our local economy recover from the pandemic.

Extra investment has helped deliver record numbers of police officers in Kent, and I've set out my vision for a better local bus network as part of a £5 billion funding boost for bus and cycle links across the country.

The risks from Covid have not gone away. We face a difficult few months ahead, but our vaccine rollout has given us cause for optimism.

Record investment in NHS and social care

We're investing £36 billion in health and social care over the next 3 years – giving people peace of mind that they won't face catastrophic care costs. Our new Health and Care Levy will kickstart reform of social care - making life better for those who need care now, unpaid carers, care workers & all of us who may need care in the future.

It was a huge privilege to serve as Care Minister during the past 18 months. It's been the hardest of times yet now social care reform is happening and we're on track for 50,000 more NHS nurses.

Local Plan shake up leaves residents in limbo

I've called for answers from Swale Borough Council on what changes to the Local Plan process will mean for local residents. The Council has now said that they will be adding an additional stage to the Local Plan process after having previously given local people very little say on the proposals. While I welcome the Council's decision to engage more with residents, there are many unanswered questions about this new process, which I've set out in a letter to the Council's Chief Executive.

New role to lead recovery from Covid

I'm delighted to have been appointed Exchequer Secretary to the Treasury as part of the Prime Minister's reshuffle. As Exchequer Secretary I'll be working hard to deliver economic growth, more jobs with better pay, and higher productivity – helping to raise living standards for everyone.

Our focus on jobs and better infrastructure will help deliver a recovery that benefits everyone, including here in Faversham and Mid Kent.

Record numbers of police in Kent

There are now 3,971 police officers across Kent helping to keep us safe. This is 242 more officers since September 2019, and 184 more officers than in 2010. There has also been an increase in Police Community Support Officers. I'm continuing to work with our local police and councils to help tackle crime in known trouble spots to keep communities across Faversham and Mid Kent safe

Lower Thames Crossing latest

In my latest consultation response to the Lower Thames Crossing, I've called for investment across the road network in Kent. Plans for a new road tunnel under the Thames near Gravesend could bring benefits to people in Faversham and Mid Kent, but only if the project is combined with investment across the wider road network. Junctions including M2/J7 at Brenley Corner, and the A249 and the A229 need improving to avoid traffic problems at Dartford simply being shifted to other parts of the road network.

Getting investment in our water network

I've called on Southern Water to set out a clear plan for improving the water network in Faversham and Mid Kent. Like many people, I was extremely concerned by the

flooding over the summer and the closure of local beaches for swimming because of sewage ending up in the sea. I'll be meeting Southern Water later this year to set out the investment we need in our local water network, including in Headcorn.

Better lorry parking needed more than ever

I know the shortage of lorry drivers across Europe is a huge concern to many local businesses. It has highlighted the need for better conditions for drivers – including safe places to park and access services. I've written to the Roads Minister to call for more lorry parking capacity in Kent and other parts of the country. Better parking is not just needed to support the welfare of lorry drivers but also to stop lorry flyparking in our lanes and laybys, which can be incredibly dangerous.

A plan for better buses

As part of efforts to build back better from the pandemic, I've set out the improvements our local bus service needs. In my response to Kent County Council's consultation on their Bus Service Improvement Plan, I've called for a focus on the rural bus network along with better integration of bus timetables with the rest of the transport network in Kent.

August saw the introduction of the X3 and X4 bus routes which are providing new direct services between Canterbury, Faversham, Sittingbourne, and Maidstone - something I have been calling for.

Grafty Gourmet

These apple pie bars can be enjoyed warm, at room temperature, or even cold. The Salted Caramel Sauce can be brought in supermarkets such as Tesco. I know they do it in jars in their "finest range".

Salted Caramel Apple Pie Bars

For the Shortbread Crust:115g of unsalted butter, melted
50g of granulated sugar
1 teaspoon of pure vanilla extract
1/4 of a teaspoon salt
125g of plain flour

For the Apple Filling:2 large apples, peeled and thinly sliced
(1/4 of an inch thick)
2 Tablespoons of plain flour
2 Tablespoons of granulated sugar
1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon of ground nutmeg

For the Crumble Topping:40g of oats
70g of packed light or dark brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
31g of plain flour
60g of unsalted butter, cold and cubed

- **1**. Preheat the oven to 140°C. Line the bottom and sides of an 8-inch square baking pan with aluminium foil or parchment paper, leaving enough overhang on all sides. Set aside.
- **2**. Make the crust: Stir the melted butter, granulated sugar, vanilla, and salt together in a medium bowl. Add the flour and stir until everything is combined. Press the mixture evenly into the prepared baking pan. Bake for 15 minutes while you prepare the filling and topping.
- **3**. Make the apple filling: Combine the sliced apples, flour, granulated sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg together in a large bowl until all of the apples are evenly coated. Set aside.
- **4**. Make the Crumble Topping: Whisk the oats, brown sugar, cinnamon, and flour together in a medium bowl. Cut in the chilled butter with a blender or two forks until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Set aside.
- **5**. Remove the crust from the oven, and turn the oven up to 160°C. Evenly layer the apples on top of the warm crust. It will look like there are too many apple slices, so layer them tightly and press them down to fit. Sprinkle the apple layer with crumble topping and bake for 30–35 minutes or until the topping is golden brown.
- **6**. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for at least 20 minutes at room temperature, then chill in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours (or overnight). Lift the foil or parchment out of the pan using the overhang on the sides and cut into 12 to 16 bars. Once cut, drizzle some salted caramel sauce on top of each

Maidstone Borough Council has published the long awaited third iteration of their masterplan for the proposed garden settlement at Lenham Heath.

As predicted, the masterplan's redline has shifted away from existing properties in the hamlet of Lenham Heath and has taken in further land north of the railway and towards the A20.

The fundamental flaws and constraints of the masterplan remain:

To date, no principal landowners have signed option agreements with the Council to make their land available for the project; A new motorway junction remains off the table. No significant upgrade of the A20 is proposed; Two primary schools although no secondary school is proposed for a population of over 12,000 new residents; No new GP or healthcare provision is made; A new rail station on the slow mainline railway remains a 'primary objective' of the masterplan although the Council has not had any meaningful discussions with Network Rail to see if it is deliverable.

In summary, the masterplan has barely evolved from the previous iterations and continues to prove that the whole project remains undeliverable, unsustainable, and unviable.

The latest masterplan is 104 pages of 'estate agent style' propaganda that paints a utopian vision of a fictional town more akin to a school geography project. It conveniently skates over the significant constraints of the site not least the proximity to the Kent Downs AONB, the minerals safeguarding, and the lack of vehicular access.

The legal challenge mounted by SOHL on behalf of the 19 landowners last November does appear to have been successful though. The Council has had second thoughts about assuming land owned by residents was available to be part of the plan. As you'll see on the redline map above, the boundary has moved away from existing properties in and around Lenham Heath and moved west.

The very large majority of the land now included in the latest masterplan is owned by eight principal landowners. This includes some of the large farming families in Lenham as well as quarry owner/operator Brett Aggregates. We know negotiations are still underway on the option agreements and to the best of our knowledge, none have signed to date.

We make a very public plea to these principal landowners to think seriously about selling our village's natural assets and beautiful green space to this hopeless project. We remain determined to continue to fight our case with the Council on behalf of local residents. We believe this project can be stopped.

What happens next?

This masterplan has been submitted by the Council (as promoter) to the Council (as planning authority) for inclusion in its Regulation 19 draft Local Plan. Councillors will decide next week whether the draft plan and the inclusion of Heathlands as a proposed development site is to be put forward for public consultation. Sadly, we believe the majority of Maidstone's councillors to be pre-determined in their views simply because putting 5,000 homes in Lenham removes the pressure on their own wards.

Despite this, SOHL will be appearing before both the Strategic Planning & Infrastructure Committee next Monday 4th October to make our case for why it shouldn't be included as well as at the Full Council meeting on Wednesday night where we will address all councillors before the plan will be formally voted on for ratification.

Why we still have hope it can be stopped

The national plan-making process means that once a Council has decided on its Local Plan it has to be put forward for examination by an independent Planning Inspector appointed by the Government. Inspectors have a duty to remain neutral and to ensure Plans have been prepared in accordance with legal and procedural requirements. They also have to determine whether the Plan can be found sound and in conformity with the National Planning Policy Framework. Inspectors will see through inappropriate local political influence which has dogged the Maidstone Local Plan to date.

Inspectors will want to know that Heathlands is deliverable, sustainable and viable. We, along with professional advisors to us, believe it is fundamentally not. Inspectors have historically thrown out Local Plans up and down the country on the basis of flawed garden community propositions and this is what we expect to happen for the Maidstone Local Plan. We have repeatedly told Maidstone's councillors that Heathlands will sink their Local Plan and will ultimately see them told to go back to the drawing board and start again.

Public Consultation due to run from 29th October to 12th December 2021

The Local Plan Regulation 19 consultation is due to run from the end of October for just over seven weeks (does anyone remember Maidstone Council running a public consultation last year for nearly 9 weeks on dog fouling. It seems the borough's long-term future is less important!).

This will be the last opportunity for you to have your say on this ludicrous project before the Council finalise the Local Plan and its future development allocations.

We can not stress enough how important it is for every single resident to respond to this consultation and SAY NO!



Christian Message October 2021

Have you ever done some long-distance hiking? I'm talking about the kind where you carry your tent, sleeping bag, food etc and cover some serious mileage. I've loved the times that I've been able to get into the countryside, pitch a tent under the stars and cook on little gas fires. However, in order to be able to bring everything that is needed for that kind of hike, you need a pretty serious rucksack!

Imagine this – it's time for you to move house and I offer to come and help! When the big day rolls around, I turn up, ready to get stuck in. Unusually though, I'm wearing my fully loaded, massive hiking rucksack. You'd probably think to yourself that that was a bit odd. Imagine that as I help move your furniture from the house to the moving van, I'm puffing, panting and wobbling precariously under the extra weight of my rucksack. After a while, you would probably tentatively suggest that I consider taking the rucksack off!

This analogy links to a wonderful verse in 1 Peter 5:7 which says: "Cast all your burdens on Him because He cares for you."

Just like the idea of carrying the extra weight of a loaded rucksack and finding that it inhibits our daily lives , sometimes we need to ask ourselves whether we're carrying burdens that we ought to let go of?

The verse that I mentioned uses the word 'cast' which certainly paints a more active picture than other words that could have been used. Sometimes it takes a real determination and intentionality to let go of and leave behind the things that burden us.

Here's the best bit though – We are invited to cast our burdens onto God precisely because 'He cares for you.' None of us enjoy watching those we love carry extra burdens and the same is true of God. He holds out His hands and invites us to cast them on to Him because of His great love for us. You are never an inconvenience to Him!

So, I'd encourage you to reflect on whether you are weighed down by any burdens and consider whether you can reach out to God through prayers and in the light of His love and care for you, offer them to Him.


