1. Apologies for Absence

None.

2. The minutes of the meetings held on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> November 2002, having been circulated to members were signed as a true record.

#### 3. Matters Arising

Poisons. The clerk had written to farmers and placed a note in the West IIsley News asking parishioners to be careful when using poison or chemicals. No further incidents of suspected poisoning have been reported. Downlands Area Forum Tuesday 14th January, all welcome.

Land Owner Records Project. W.Berks Countryside and Environment had confirmed that the project did not 'compromise the requirements' of the Data Protection Act, and that although the information was available from the Land Registry this could be time consuming and expensive, it was unanimously agreed that in the circumstances the Parish Council did not have the resources to supply the information required. The clerk to write with apologies.

Main Street. Although Main Street appears on the Register of Electors it has not been officially named. The Chairman proposed that the Parish Council take steps to formally register it. Clerk to write to the Royal Mail and to the Emergency Services asking for any objections. If none received then the clerk will consult all residents of 'Main Street' by letter, outlining the proposal and asking for comments. All in favour.

Flooding. West Berks Highways stated that 'due to a budget reduction, it would not be possible to fund the upgrading of the drainage system during this financial year'. The Chairman had discussed the matter with them and was informed that the upgrading was not on the schedule for 2003/2004. He agreed to discuss the matter further before the next meeting. have however, agreed to routinely clean the existing drainage system. District Councillor John Morgan said he would raise the matter at The Downlands Area Forum.

Gritting of Bury Lane. The Highways Dept. had informed the Chairman that although Bury Lane is a bus route it still does not meet the criteria to be upgraded to a primary route. From the floor, it was pointed out that Bury Lane is a designated alternative route for cars and lorries diverted from the A34 in the event of an accident or similar. The Chairman agreed to discuss the matter further with Highways.

Lorries parking outside 30 West Ilsley. The Queen's Agent, Richard Morris had replied stating that he had asked the contractors to stop parking on the corner. From the floor, Avice Morris said that they were in fact still parking dangerously.

<u>Freedom of Information Act.</u> The Clerk has submitted a declaration form to the Information Commissioner stating that W.I.P.C. wish to adopt the Parish Council Model Scheme. The clerk confirmed that the declaration had been sent before the deadline of 31st December 2002.

#### 4. Correspondence Received

The Parish Council have no objection to the Application received by W.B.D.C. for the Renewal of the Public Entertainment Licence applied for by Mrs Audrey Tizzard and The West Ilsley Village Hall.

#### 5. Parish Councillor Vacancies

David Holling reported that the date of the next Parish Council election will be February 13<sup>th</sup>.

#### Accounts for Payment

West Berks Council £84.70 Uncontested Elections (2 @ £42.35)

Audit Commission £222.08 Audit Fee 2000/2001 David Holling proposed payment, Andy Day seconded. All in favour.

#### 7. Audit 2001/2002

Before the Accounts could be submitted for External Audit on February 3<sup>rd</sup>, an Internal Audit is required. David Holling suggested that he approach lan Priestly of West Berks Council who may agree to carry out the Internal Audit for a modest fee. If lan Priestley is in agreement, the Clerk will arrange a meeting with him. All in favour.

#### 8. Parish Precept 2003/2004

The Parish Council set a precept of £1965. The motion was proposed by Andy Day and seconded by David Holling. All in favour.

The Chairman suggested that in future, organisations should be invited to apply to the Parish Council for donations and all that applications would be considered.

#### 9 Planning Applications

No. 02/02616 Downs House Detached double garage and staff accommodation

No. 02/02617 Downs House Demolition of detached garage and outbuildings and erection of a new detached garage and staff accommodation.

As local government officers, all members declared an interest and did not comment.

#### POLICE REPORT

First let me introduce myself. I am PC Andrew Buckingham the newly appointed Community Liaison Officer at Hungerford Police Station. So what does that mean I hear you say, 'just another fancy job title?'.....'I still can't contact the police and speak to a local officer and when I do it's to some answer machine and then the police do nothing anyway so what's the point?'. Well a great deal of my work is as a contact for local communities and parish councils where there are local issues which might necessitate police action or advice, it is with regard to these local issues that I can be contacted. (I do stress, that this is for non-urgent matters only. Obviously if there is an emergency then call 999 or to report a crime or other incidents then use 0163531000 and ask for the appropriate department). You may use my mobile number, and yes I'm afraid there is an answer message when I'm not on duty (my wife and boys like me home sometimes!) but I promise that if messages are left I will contact the caller. I'm afraid that the days of the copper walking or cycling the beat in the rural communities is something of a rarity (yes OK he's probably extinct in some places) I do hope that I will be used as a contact. I don't profess that my appointment is the answer to all of the problems in our communities but I hope it will go some of the way. I can offer advice from the Police perspective and if required contact the department that might have an answer. Hungerford's patch consists of 19 local parish councils from Lambourn to Hermitage and South to Inkpen, obviously I can't spend all my time writing specific articles for each parish so I will endeavour to make them topical and give an overview of Policing commitments, which affect our rural communities. Over recent weeks the Hungerford sector has experienced a number of break-ins to outhouses and

sheds, this happens year in and year out with garden machinery be stolen and I put money on the fact that I will be saying exactly the same thing this time next year. Please make sure that your sheds garages etc are locked and secure, a flimsy padlock on a twenty year old rotten wooden door would blow off in a high wind and probably fall off if a 'burglar' coughs at it!.....These breaks are mainly occurring overnight in the isolated rural villages, the villains are using cars and vans to commit these crimes. You might have had to answer a call of nature in the early hours and looked out of the window and wondered what that strange van was doing driving down the lane, you might not give it another thought or think there is no point in reporting it as the police won't be interested or, who do I ring and speak to in the Police. Well this is just the type of occurrence that we the Police at Hungerford would like to know about, so if you manage to jot down the number of that strange van or see or hear anything suspicious then please give me a call at the station. (Obviously if you think it is something we should know about immediately then if an emergency call 999 or if not 01635 31000 for an officer to attend.) We are also having some break-ins where food and drink is being stolen, are these just hungry burglars or as it might indicate do we have persons sleeping rough on the patch? A vehicle possibly connected to these break-ins is a blue Nissan pick-up K135PKA. This car was seen in suspicious circumstances in Shefford Woodlands on 3/2/03 with two white males aged 20-25yrs, to date we have been unable to trace the occupants. If anyone has any knowledge of this vehicle then please contact me.

Vehicle crime is another high priority and over past weeks a number of vehicles in rural locations have been broken into and some deliberately damaged with what appears to be a catapult or similar device.

Please can householders ensure that the names and numbers of houses are clearly visible, or if you haven't got one please provide one as this will assist us greatly in finding your property if we have to. There is nothing worse than on a dark and foggy night trying to locate a house that has lost it's name or number (especially if ones torch batteries are running down!). Well that's about it......hopefully over the coming months my reports will become a little more coherent. Lock up your chattels and keep them peeled.
