Welcome from the Chair

edition of the magazine. We're really pleased to say that the magazine is doing very well and the addition of an Advertising Manager, Mrs Ali Wade, has really helped to make a difference to the success of the magazine. In fact we have even extended our print run so that readers in Pitstone can also enjoy reading what's going on locally!

Although only in February there is a great deal going on in the parish. We have been discussing since last year a Bucks County Council initiative called the Parish Devolution project. Parish and Town Councils have been invited by Bucks CC to take on the responsibility for delivery of some services which were once the preserve of Bucks CC and AVDC. These include such activities as grass cutting on verges and footpaths, road sign cleaning and similar maintenance activities. Many parishes in the county are taking over the delivery of these services but lyinghoe Parish Council remains unable to make a decision whether or not to proceed.

Last year we requested a full schedule of the works that would fall under our responsibility and also up to date maps of the roads and footpath network. The initial information pack we received was not comprehensive or accurate, meaning that we have been unable to go out to tender and therefore unable to make a decision based on accurate information. Despite continued and consistent requests for the correct data we have still not received the

right information. Some of our neighbouring Parish and Town Councils have already committed to undertake this work which has enabled them to apply for initial priming funds but we have been unable to take advantage of this. Without the right information about the scale of service delivery we cannot tender the work which and evaluate the financial short fall between the funds available from the County Council and District Council and the cost of the work. The inevitable and unfortunate down side of your parish council providing these services is that the parish precept would have to be raised. Consequently, we have added a sum to our next precept in anticipation of the work we may undertake while continuing to seek clarification about who is responsible for providing the information we need so that we can make a decision regarding our future involvement in providing these services.

On a very much more positive note, I am very pleased to tell you that our commissioning of a review of the Conservation Area in Ivinghoe has progressed very well and the draft Conservation Area Review document is now available for review. We have placed a copy of the document in the Library and a copy of it can also be found on the Aylesbury Vale DC website www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk, search for "Ivinghoe Conservation Area Review". Freya Morris, Conservation Area Officer, will be at our parish council meeting on 3 March, and will be taking questions

and comments, however, I would urge you in the meantime to email or send in your comments to **conservationareas@aylesburydc.gov.uk**.

We still have three major planning developments in progress in the parish, one in Ivinghoe Aston and two in Ivinghoe. all of which you will be familiar with. At present we are awaiting decisions from the planning officers at AVDC on the proposed development at Six Acres in Ivinghoe Aston and for 40 dwellings on The Bottom Park, Members of the parish council and Ivinghoe Together met with the architects and developer at The Hub on 31 January, following a public exhibition of their proposal. The developers wished to ascertain if any traction could be gained in terms of community approval for a smaller scale development on this site with the possibility of some of the land being given to the parish council. Both the parish council and Ivinghoe Together are of the view that no development should take place on this site as other more appropriate sites could be found. With regard to the 70 dwellings proposed by Gladman

Developments in Ivinghoe in the adjacent field to The Bottom Park, the decision on this application will now be decided at an appeal in the summer. We have no more information than that at present on the Gladman case but will of course keep you updated through our usual channels.

Finally, Sheena Bexson, parish councillor from Ivinghoe Aston has decided to step down from the council and I would like to thank her for contribution to the parish council over the past three years. This leaves a space on the council. This is an election year for parish and town councils too and so if you have an interest in joining the parish council please read the Guide to Parish Council Elections in this magazine, to find out how you can apply.

Please continue to engage with us at our parish council meetings or via our Facebook page, twitter and at **www.ivinghoepc.org**. Our Annual Parish Meeting will take place in April so do look out on the notice boards and the website for more details.

Parish Council Elections – 7th May 2015

he Parish Council is up for re election in May and you will be voting for your new Council members at the same time as you vote in the General Election.

Notices will be posted on notice boards and the Parish Council website with the dates for the return of nomination papers for those interested in standing. A quick guide to election procedures administered by Aylesbury Vale District Council as follows:

The Election Procedure

Elections take place on the first Thursday in May every four years.

Nomination

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Prospective candidates must deliver or send by post to the Returning Officer a valid nomination paper. Forms are obtained from the Returning Officer based at Aylesbury Vale District Council. The candidate's surname, forenames, residence and description (if desired) must be given. The candidate must have a proposer and seconder.

It is the responsibility of the candidate or his supporters to return the signed nomination paper to the Returning Officer on time; even where he has prepared papers for signature. He cannot accept any nomination which, whatever the reason, reaches him too late.

It is not the responsibility of the Returning Officer to see that candidates comply with the nomination rules.

lelcome to our first Neighbourhood Planning news! We are pleased to report that Ivinghoe Parish has recently been approved as a designated Neighbourhood Area. This is an important first step in establishing a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) for our community, so that local people can help shape development in the area through planning policy.

Our neighbourhood Area covers the parish of lyinghoe which encompasses both Ivinghoe and Ivinghoe Aston and a small number of houses towards Ringshall.

The development of a Neighbourhood Plan will form part of the Local Authority Plan and policies within it will be used in the determination of planning applications. However it is a huge undertaking which will only succeed with your support.

A steering group, consisting of Parish councillors and residents from the parish has been formed and will start to create a development plan and critically will reflect the views and vision of you, the residents of the parish. The NDP will attempt to ensure that new developments are built to the maximum advantage of existing and new residents whilst safeguarding the special character, landscape and historical qualities of our Parish.

Our aim is to make the lyinghoe Neighbourhood plan reflect communitywide comments and concerns about its future and we need your input to do this.



How do you see housing developing in the Parish over the next 15 years? What potential sites could be suitable for development in the parish? What level of development is appropriate and suitable....? What infrastructure is needed to support new development? We will be asking you many questions in the coming months but perhaps you have suggestions yourself of the type of questions that we should be putting to the community - if so do please get in touch!

We have a unique opportunity to shape our environment for future generations. All views are welcome and valued.

We plan to keep everyone up to date with progress and collate everyone's views. Watch out for a website, flyers. updates on Parish noticeboards, emails and questionnaires... We'll be hosting various events so you can get involved, have your say, and let you know how we're getting on - watch this space!

on, lvinghoe's postmaster is retiring after 34 years service, having first come to Ivinghoe's Post Office in the High Street in 1981.

After his first posting on the High Street, Ron moved down to Devon only to return again a few years later, to take on the Post Office at the back of the Old School. Three years later he moved full circle, returning to the High Street, only three houses up from the original Post Office site.

Ron could be described as a lynch pin in our community. He has served as a member of the parish council and together with Brian Roger and Tony Jennings started the big November firework display. He also started the Summer Ball and formed an entertainment committee. As if that wasn't enough he set up together with Carol Corn the most famous of publications, The Beacon magazine.

So all in all Ron has kept the flag flying for public services in lyinghoe for many years. We are lucky to have an amazing community served by tea rooms, chemists, pubs, restaurants, library and off course a Post Office. Bearing in mind ten thousand sub post offices have closed since 1981, we are fortunate indeed to still have one. The big change Ron explained is the large diminution of letter post and a corresponding increase in parcel post.

During his time as postmaster, Ron has suffered two robberies. The first robbers got away with money, the second raid, the two robbers left with very sore heads, Ron having bashed them together! Needless to say they left empty handed if not empty headed!

Some of us have been overtaken by email and other electronic communications but we all need from time to time envelopes, stamps. sealing wax or the ability to send a parcel to Australia! So when Ron retires and the new refurbished post office opens let's hope that the great service we've had from Ron over many years continues. The present office will be closed for about two weeks for the refurbishment.

So it is goodbye and thank you to Ron and all the very best wishes for happy retirement!

We have new **Hub Signage** planned and is at present going before the planners. This will then allow us to de-clutter the other banner signage, most of which was there to fulfil our grant funders advertising rules, and this timing is now completed as is the initial alerting to the neighbourhood of our existence. If passed by the planners, our bespoke Victorian lamp-post with solar lighting and two discreet oval signs will cover all our future needs.

What's the point and purpose of the Parish Council vote? I should end right there because I just do not know. As far as I understand planning applications are decided upon by AVDC councillors, I guess its better to have local Parish council support than not but when the count comes in it doesn't.

le continue to wait for a decision from AVDC about the application for 70 houses to be built on the field between Ford End Farm and the Park, which belongs to Mr Jellis. If AVDC does not arrive at a decision soon it will open the way for Gladman, who have made the application on behalf of Mr Jellis, to launch an appeal, as the outcome will be treated as a 'non-determination'. It remains unclear why AVDC have not arrived at a decision. Although the AVDC planning website has not been updated, it has now been confirmed that Gladman intend to launch an appeal, which will probably take place during the summer.

Many people attended a meeting at the Hub on 10th December at which DP Architects presented a proposal to apply for permission to AVDC to build a further 40 houses on the Park, which belongs to Mr Charles Randall. At the meeting it was made clear that the residents of Ivinghoe do not want any form of development on this field, which is in the centre of the village.

Since the meeting DP Architects have requested a further meeting with representatives of Ivinghoetogether and the Parish Council to seek a compromise on their original proposal. The meeting took place on 31st January. The architect wished to discuss a new plan to build nine houses on the Park, instead of forty. He has not yet submitted a new application to AVDC. The possibility of selling the land to the village was also raised. Should this become a realistic option it would clearly be the best outcome.

It remains the view of lvinghoetogether that no development will ever be


acceptable on the land between the Lawn and Ford End farm, which includes the Park. In the circumstances it may be more appropriate for the architects to meet with the newly formed Neighbourhood Development steering group. In the meantime more than 100 objections to the proposal have been submitted to AVDC.

Some good news is that the Conservation Area Officer from AVDC, Freya Morris, has proposed that the Conservation Area should be extended to include the Park, Ford End Farm, an area off Wellcroft, the allotments and two small areas, one bordering the Windmill field and the other in the High Street. Freya will be attending the Parish Council meeting on 3rd March.

In Memory of **Donald Puddefoot**

onald was born at Diblocks and spent his whole life in Ivinghoe Aston. I think that, in itself is a piece of history and possibly only Bill can still say the same. Donald's life reminds us of times that have gone. He went to Ivinghoe Aston School – that closed in about 1967 – and then Ivinghoe School – that began as long ago as the 16th century but also closed in the mid sixties.

In 2008, at the funeral of Donald's older brother, Doug, Jean told me a little about the sort of childhood that the family enjoyed in those days: Jean remembered what a free and enjoyable childhood she and all Donald's brothers and sisters shared in Ivinghoe Aston, playing "Jack, Jack, shine your light" after dark with torches, running around in the fields and on the Beacon, sliding down haystacks and scrumping apples. It was a childhood to be treasured and one that children today can no longer have.

But it was a short childhood as Donald started work when he was 14, as was normal in those days. He went to work for Walter Ashby on Ivinghoe Aston Farm and started learning to plough – with the horses, of course – as that was before the time of tractors. The family remember one occasion when the horses bolted with Donald – and what a great talking point that was in the village at the time. And then the farm did get its first tractor. Donald didn't have a clue how to drive it but he soon mastered the art and was probably grateful that it was unlikely to bolt with him again.

After a while, of course, Donald's summer job was on the Combine Harvester and the village were fascinated to see him coming through the village on such a huge machine which they had never seen before. So Donald

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moved with the times, as we all must, but he retained the old skills as well and was one of the best hedge-layers around. Hedge-laying requires great skill and it is one that very few people have nowadays.

He was very young in 1939 but he still did his bit towards the end of WW2. He and Doug were in the Home Guard and they would stand guard beside the office of the Lime Kilns. They had guns but we don't know if they ever used them. In his leisure time, Donald loved riding his motorbike and he and his friends, the local bikers, would go riding around together on Sundays.

Donald was a reliable and steady worker all his life on the Ashby's farm. His great service was rewarded when, at the end of his career, he received from Princess Anne, a medal for his 46 years of service to agriculture. He had a lovely photograph showing him receiving his medal and he said that was the proudest moment of his life. He always kept the medal and the photograph on display and he would show them to all his visitors, especially all the nurses and carers who came round at the end of his life.

He had very good care during the last year of his life and he enjoyed making friends with all the nurses and carers. When he was in hospital, he spent his whole day chatting to everyone around. He liked nothing better than making friends and they all loved having him there. He was lucky enough to be in good health right up to the final year and he and Bill took the bus in to Leighton Buzzard three times every week. I'm sure all the villagers, including myself, remember seeing them and greeting them as they waited for the bus at 10.30 most mornings.

The village has lost a valued resident and we will miss him.

o keep my aged body fit I walk daily. I enjoy walking up the Beacon and Pitstone Hill but this winter, jaunts there have been less frequent because the weather has made the "going" very sticky. Traffic in Ivinghoe

he continuing saga of Traffic in Ivinghoe. We've seen a fair bit of activity on the traffic front since the last issue of The Beacon and I'll summarise the various issues here. Regrettably there's little concrete progress, but the cogs of local government grind exceedingly slowly and we will continue to apply whatever pressure we can to the road issues of local importance.

Speeding

Firstly the Parish Council wrote to the Rural Neighbourhood Police Inspector asking for some clarification regarding the Police position on speeding concerned. To quote from his reply, "Speeding is, I am afraid, not resolved by enforcement - maybe it is for a day, a week or two but beyond that it is ineffective. Longer term schemes such as Community Speedwatch are generally the answer," and, "I hope you can appreciate that I cannot send local Police Officers to each parish to do two hours of speed enforcement based on someone's opinion. However, clearly MVAS or other technical data will certainly justify the use of my resources to do speeding operations." The Inspector does, however, acknowledge that our specific issue is perceptual only.

Your Parish Council has expressed disappointment that the speeding issue is still not being recognised important. We also explained how important Police support will be in order that Speedwatch volunteers continue to feel valued. Further details of the findings from the Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS)

were sent with our response and these appear within this report.

Dragons Teeth!

Following lobbying by the Parish Council and Local Area Forum we're pleased to be able to report that the entry gate and Dragon's Teeth at the entrance to Great Gap and within the 30mph section have been installed. It will be interesting to see what effect, if any, these have on traffic speeds and the MVAS has been set up to record speeds through this section of road which will give us before and after comparisons.

Repairs

Representations having been made general patching repairs have been made to the local road surfaces. There was a significant delay between the roads being surveyed and the work being carried out but we can be thankful that this has been done before the worst of the winter weather.

Trucks

On 20th December I wrote to Ruth Vigor Hedderly at Bucks CC regarding the increasing lorry traffic on our local and inadequate roads. To date I have received no reply, although ClIr Avril Davies (cc'd) contacted me to say that this matter is being debated within the Local Area Forum as there is recognition that the type of traffic on our more rural roads is often inappropriate. Additionally, by watching the flashing "30" sign on our MVAS we can confirm that many commercial lorries are ignoring the speed limit. In fact the Freight Quality

Partnership is again being talked about as a tool which could be used to encourage some sort of control on lorry traffic, although quite how this would work is difficult to say. There is discussion about a traffic survey so that there is some basis on which to carry the discussion forward and we await more details about this. In the meantime I have written to Stephen Walford, Director of Growth and Strategy at Bucks CC with some further proposals. However, Mr Walford comments "I should however caution you that, whilst we may consider new restrictions as a means to effectively manage traffic, we do start from the basic premise of public highway being public - so the presumption is against introducing new restrictions unless evidence suggests they will be beneficial." The greater the pressure we can apply the more likely will be a favourable outcome, and I encourage anyone who feels strongly about our road issues to contact County Highways to make their views known.

A New Approach

The Parish Council has commissioned Ben Hamilton Baillie, traffic calming consultants, to undertake a one day scoping exercise of our traffic issues. This company specialise in innovative traffic calming solutions that have been most effective, particularly in rural areas. Following a day of looking at the area a presentation will take place at The Hub on the evening on 14 April. We hope that as many residents as possible will attend, together with representatives of AVDC and Bucks CC. We will publish

precise details as soon as they are available. To cover the cost of this exercise we have applied for funding from our Local Area Forum to pay for a full survey following the initial over-view and we await their decision.

MVAS

At the time of printing we should be in possession of another shared MVAS unit to be immediately followed by practical training at the ground screw opposite Maud Janes Close and on our laptops in The Hub. We have volunteers for training from lyinghoe, Great Gap and lyinghoe Aston so will be in a good position to take advantage of this second unit.

The Evidence

Using the MVAS unit over 2013 and 2014, we have collected a significant amount of data summarised below (all figures are average) and all recorded at Great Gap:

- 2036 vehicles per day 5 Aug to 20 Aug 2013 Northbound
- 2058 vehicles per day 22 Aug to 30 Aug 2013 Southbound
- 2014 vehicles per day 4 Sept to 21 Sept 2013 Northbound
- 2565 vehicles per day 22 Sept to 14 Oct 2013 Northbound (Maud Janes Close)
- 2270 vehicles per day 7 Jun to 7 July 2014 Northbound
- 2326 vehicles per day 14 July to 12 Aug 2014 Northbound
- 2492 vehicles per day 13 Aug to 23 Sept 2014 Southbound These figures show that 75 – 80% of traffic exceeds 35mph and around

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45% exceeds 40mph. Approximately 25% of all traffic is at 45mph or greater and we have records of traffic exceeding 70mph, typically around 10 or 11 per month. (Figures for Maud Janes Close, being closer to the centre of the village show a somewhat smaller percentage of traffic at really high speeds although the number of vehicles at 35mph or higher is not very different).

The latest data was downloaded on 11th January and covers the period from 12th October to 23rd November. It has yet to be analysed in any detail but average traffic movements appear to maintain levels. Excessive speeds recorded were 31 vehicles at 70-74mph, six at 75-79mph, three at 80 to 84mph and two at 85 to 89mph. There is no

consistency about the times when these speeds were recorded.

Which brings us full circle and begs the question of why the Police are failing to take our traffic speeds seriously, and why are AVDC so unwilling to do anything to control significantly increasing and speeding local traffic volumes? Although in the total scheme of things we are lucky in being able to say that the number of accidents is very small it will only need one incident of excessive speed when a resident is leaving their driveway and we will have a fatality on our hands. It will not be any comfort that we can say "We told you so!".

The **Miller's** Tale...

irstly I would like to wish Nigel
Thompson, one of our regular
maintenance team, a volunteer
at the farm museum, a roving reporter
for this erstwhile publication and a
thoroughly decent chap all round, all
the best with a speedy recovery from
his recent operation and spell in hospital.
Best wishes from all your friends at
the watermill.

It is this time of year that we are busying ourselves going around the mill and checking things over and making sure everything at the mill is as it should be and ready for our first milling session of the season. Alongside that there are opening and milling dates to agree upon, trying to make sure that they don't clash with any major national or world events and of course large local events, for instance this year is the rugby world cup and 800 years since Magna Carta. Then there is organising the design, printing and then the distribution of our promotional leaflets to other tourist attractions in the local area, as well as to other mills and anywhere that might bring us some much needed publicity and extra visitors.

Once the opening dates are decided we then need to organise enough volunteers to be wardens and guides and to help us out actually running the mill on these open days.

This year we have also got to give some attention to our yellow high visibility signs that we stick up on the main roads leading to the village during the week before we are open. These have served us well for several years but are getting a little sunlight faded and

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are not so easy to read as you whizz past them in your vehicle, we have had to replace the odd sign now and again as they seem to be of great interest to some passers-by who like to break them, or kick them all down, or throw them over the nearest hedge, or just take them away completely.

One task that has recently been carried out in preparation for the coming season was to have the millstones 'Dressed' that is to cut a new grinding pattern onto the surface of the millstones (the 'lands') and shaping of the cut out grooves (the 'Furrows') to the correct profile. This has to be carried out periodically as the grinding surfaces wear down through use. Looking back through our maintenance record the last time the stones were dressed was in early 2006 and before that 1999 and 1993, so we thought they would probably benefit from some attention. Previously millwright, David Emperingham from High Wycombe, had dressed the stones the traditional way using a steel hand chisel called a 'Bill' which is held in a wooden handle called a 'Thrift' and he would steadily chip away at the stone much as a stone mason does.

However this time we had David's son along with another millwright, come to do the work and after helping them get setup and ready we left them to get on with it, the next thing we heard were grinding noises instead of a steady chip, chip, chip of the mill bill coming from upstairs, we quickly went up to see what was happening and found that being of the modern power tool



age they had promptly set about our millstones with angle grinders, we were a little apprehensive as we had never seen this being done before, and rightly expressed concern over our precious millstones, our concern was noted but we were reassured that this is how all the younger millwrights do it these days and that they had dressed many millstones this way with no comebacks, so we cautiously left them to it and when they had finished it looked like a good job.

Also whilst the stones are dismantled for dressing, we take the opportunity to remove, clean and inspect the main top and bottom bearings that the millstone driving spindle runs in, and if necessary

through wear, to repair or adjust these bearings, they were in very good condition and so they were just repacked with grease and replaced.

Therefore we should be well prepared for the coming season and look forward to welcoming visitors through the door again and giving them the experience of seeing wheat ground into flour with stones just as it has been for thousands of years before the recent invention of steel roller mills.

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
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Look what you could have made!!

We will need a new Co-Coordinator, someone willing to have their name a phone

number scattered to the four winds of Pitstone. It is not an arduous task and there is a small team of drivers to help, it is more like fitting a jigsaw together pairing patients with drivers. And you will be pleased to know that there is NO EXTRA MONEY for doing it. Please contact me if you are interested.

Pitstone Surfers who meet on Wednesday morning for computer tuition is an uncertain proposition at present. I have had to cancel the last two terms because of the lack of interest which has meant room hire etc has not been viable. If anyone would like to take it on please let me know.

I hope that others will volunteer to assist Dave Nicholls with the monthly Film Club and Alex Wynne with Souperlunches, both are valuable events for the Ivinghoe and Pitstone Communities and would be missed should they have to cease through lack of helpers. Please think about it.

We have met some truly lovely people, and made some great friends in our time in the village. We hope that we have made some small contribution to improving life in the community both spiritually and practically. We pray God's blessing upon all who live here and may the village prosper in its sense of community and togetherness. Finally, as an outsider, cherish what you have here in the villages and surroundings, they are a blessing.

Clearly, we cannot all set off for Whipsnade Zoo with our old trees; for all I know their lions may not even have discovered the fun aspects of such trees. Better by far to go for the chipping service; or, as an alternative for those who have the space, why not create an eco-pile of carefully stacked small branches in a shady corner of the garden? In the process of very gradually decomposing, it will provide a lovely habitat for slug-eating ground beetles and other useful inhabitants.

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


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Ashridge Estate Spring News

We're open!

Don't forget the Visitor Centre and National Trust Shop is now open all year round 10am – 5pm (or dusk if earlier) with just Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Closed.

Wildlife at Ashridge

February is a great time to go for a walk on the Estate and try and spot some of our more unusual winter bird visitors. Wrap up warm and see what you can discover!

Many birds fly to the UK to spend the winter here, where the weather is warmer than in their Scandinavian breeding grounds.

In the mixed finch flocks look out for some of the more uncommon

species such as brambling. Similar to chaffinch, but with an orange rather than pink colouration, the bramblings are particularly fond of beech mast.

Another finch to look out for is the crossbill. You may find these amongst the conifer trees. Crossbills have specialised beaks which enable them to extract seeds from pine cones.

The numbers of ground-dwelling woodcock are boosted in winter by migrants from NE Europe. With their long bills, woodcock probe in the wet mud to find invertebrates to feed on. They are secretive and hard to see, but you may come across them in quiet corners of the woodland.

Get Involved

Are you interested in getting involved in volunteering at the Ashridge Estate and joining the team? Here are some of the opportunities we currently have.

Countryside Volunteers: Our rangers have two regular groups of volunteer who help with scrub clearance and other maintenance and monitoring across the Estate. They meet every Thursday and once a month on Sundays.

Maintenance Volunteer: Help us keep the presentation of the Visitor Centre and surrounding area in tip top condition.

Litter Pickers: Help us keep the Estate clean and tidy. This essential job takes place one Sunday a month.

Mobility Scooters: Help provide this valuable service to our less mobile visitors. Volunteers work in pairs to loan out scooters to visitors who want to explore the Estate but can't do so on foot or by bike. Training on how to use the scooters is provided.

Launch party for beautiful music from a talented duo



here is still, in this day and age of image and supposed style holding sway over real talent, a fair bit of original and innovative music about, if you look for it. A talented duo from the Herts and Bucks borders are just that, **Joanna Mundy** and stepfather Kit Judd-Gratrix. Their synthesiser based music is a haunting, yet melodic mix of beautifully crafted soundscapes. They came together as a musical partnership around a year ago. Kit having a lifetime of musical experience behind him, but still young enough to have plenty more in front of him. For Jo, with less experience, but a wealth of innovative ideas, this is really her first serious project, though she also has a background in music and singing.

They have recently produced their first collection of soundscapes, five very different CD's that make up their

Radiance Collection. Last year they hosted a party to officially launch this beautiful musical collection, at the rather lovely The Other World Gallery in Winslow, Bucks. The lady who runs the gallery, Lauren Isherwood was only too happy to let her charming premises be taken over for the evening. The Other World is a shop also, and stocks the Radiance collection that Kit and Jo have produced, under the name of Synth Music Direct. The ambience and relaxing atmosphere that one can feel in Lauren's gallery is very apparent to those who want to find it.

Also present were several therapists who have commissioned Jo and Kit to customise some of their music to fit exactly to what they need for administering their various treatments to clients in need of relaxing reiki, or massage, amongst other things. These included Rachel Weber of Time and Space Therapies in Pitstone, Karen Puttick who is an accomplished clinical hypnotherapist, Sam Allen who runs several stalls under the banner of Pagan Peace, in places such as High Wycombe and Uxbridge. Many others of similar ilk were present, including two ladies, Linda and Christine from Crystal House Wellbeing Centre in Leighton Buzzard.

Also, yours truly, a writer from Leighton Buzzard who finds this music perfect as a backdrop to writing, proof reading and anything related. Rachel, being an expert in holistic massage, pregnancy and post-natal reiki, and delivering bespoke treatments to suit individual clients' needs, had Kit and Jo make up a mix of soundscapes from their existing library. Karen, conversely, had them create an original piece of music, with her input and her own voice, for use alongside her hypnotherapy treatments. Both have found this music to be perfect for their needs, while Sam stocks and sells the CD's from the collection on her Pagan Peace stalls. So this goes to illustrate how different people doing different things, having different needs, all find their own benefit and enjoyment through this innovative type of music.

As mentioned earlier, there are five CD's in the Radiance Collection. namely Black, White and Pointed, Poetrical, Book of Colours, The Moons of Jupiter and, my personal favourite. the fantastically put together For a Breeze. During the evening both Kit and Jo went on to explain a little more about how they create their music, with the significance and benefit that people can gain from it. Beautifully handmade little 'goody-bags' were gifted to those present, put together by Jo, who is also very talented as the creator of the artwork on the sleeves of all the CD's. Each bag contained a brass incense burner, three incense cones of differing fragrances, hand picked tumble stones and a unique 'mood tag'. The idea being that one would light the incense, play one of the soundscapes and hold the stones, allowing yourself to 'slip off' into whichever mood the whole thing creates for you. You can then jot down on the tag whatever it was that this created for you specifically, individually.

The green bag they gifted, with hand picked tumble stones, is designed to 'energise and motivate', with the purple bag selection tuned to 'relax and soothe'. There was a third, a blue bag. as a specific gift for the evening, minus the tumble stones, but with a small box of cinnamon cones. They also gifted us with a really rather good sample disc, containing one track from each CD in their Radiance Collection. As the sleeve notes say 'embedded with as much positive energy as possible'. Indeed they are, as the whole evening was filled with so much positive energy, in a relaxing, far from stressed, way.

For therapists, lovers of synthesiser music, those suffering from a lack of positive energy or inspiration, those who are able to administer treatments that help to find that positivity, and even those who merely find this music the perfect accompaniment to relaxing or working, you really must check this out. DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.



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Information entirely about Planning from District Councillor Avril Davies

Why are there suddenly so many big planning applications in rural areas?

n the last two years an unprecedented number of speculative planning applications for large numbers of homes on land not planned for development have been submitted to Aylesbury Vale District Council. This is because the new national planning policy introduced in 2012, and the scrapping of the South East regional plan which put a ceiling on numbers, means it is now presumed that planning permission will be given unless there is an overwhelming case against it.

Also encouraging locally to developers is that Aylesbury Vale has no longer got a required 5 year housing land supply, and the Council has failed twice to put in place a strong local plan to state local priorities which can interpret and adapt the national guidance to local needs.

Applications for mind boggling numbers are now accumulating across the Vale. For example as well as the approval in principle for 40 houses on land at Rushendon Furlong in Pitstone (not yet signed off) and 30 in Edlesborough in Cow Lane, 47 houses were approved on appeal in Aston Clinton on Stablebridge Road, their development currently delayed by the discovery of an Iron Age village on the site, plus another 47 on land

off Chapel Drive, granted on an appeal with far reaching consequences for other decisions, leading almost directly to permission for 120 in Brook Street Aston Clinton. In Haddenham 280 were recently granted on the Glebeland, with still larger numbers applied for on other Haddenham sites. There are outstanding applications in Slapton, Waddesdon, Steeple Claydon, and many more.

Why are so many of these applications being allowed?

Many applications have been allowed because although Aylesbury Vale planners can still apply policies saved from previous plans, such as encroachment in to the countryside or detriment to the character of the landscape, a succession of planning

appeal judgements have given very little weight to these, stating instead that the benefits of supplying the houses needed for a five year supply of housing outweighs these considerations and the traffic growth. One of the first policies to be thrown out at appeal was the former limit on rural developments to 5 houses.

So planning applications are being judged on whether the 'good' in terms of providing a five year housing land supply outweighs the 'harm' as measured by the criteria in the NPPF for sustainable development. This is defined as building a strong competitive economy; promoting sustainable transport; delivering a wide choice of high quality homes; requiring good design; promoting healthy communities; conserving and enhancing the natural environment; conserving and enhancing the historic environment. When applications are submitted in outline only this is often hard to judge, which is why appeal judgements are so important in interpreting the guidance.

The two applications in Ivinghoe for 110 houses

The two planning applications for lyinghoe are still not determined. The first application for 70 houses by Gladman has been referred to the planning inspectorate on the grounds of non determination by the planning authority within the statutory time limit, and the other adjacent one on The Park for 40 houses is still being evaluated at AVDC.

Ivinghoe conservation area revision

Meanwhile the long overdue revision of the 1971 Ivinghoe Conservation Area has been published for consultation and can be viewed on line http://www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/environment/conservation-listed-buildings/current-conservation-area-consultation/ivinghoe-conservation-area-review/or in the Beacon Villages library. This proposes major extensions to the conservation area to include the Park and Ford End farm, and describes the significance of views in and out of the conservation area from all points.

Appeals won

It is not all bad news. What we think in Aylesbury Vale still holds some weight. On 26th January the appeal for three sites, Hampden Fields, Weedon Hill and Fleet Marston, totalling 5,800 houses, was dismissed. The inspector upholding in almost every detail the council's grounds for refusal. Even if these appeals had been allowed, The 5,800 would not have increased the 5 year supply as the sites would not have delivered any houses inside five years, as so much pre construction and infrastructure work as well as detailed plans would have been required.

Aylesbury Vale still one of the fastest growing areas

In Aylesbury the Buckingham Park and Berryfields developments, still being built out from an earlier plan, make Aylesbury Vale the fastest house building area in the country. In addition between Bierton and Broughton, 'Aylesbury East', 2450 houses have been given permission in outline and currently the detailed planning permission is being considered. A further 1560 between Bierton and Watermead are currently at appeal hearing.

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Progress on a new plan for Aylesbury Vale

The new Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) was begun in May, and has just completed the 'call for sites' stage http://www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/planning-policy/vale-of-aylesbury-local-plan/vale-aylesbury-local-plancall-sites-response/. These sites will all be examined for viability and deliverability, and consulted on next summer. The final plan is expected to be adopted in 2017.

Neighbourhood Plans

The third important strand for planning after the NPPF and the District plan is the Neighbourhood plan. Ivinghoe, Cheddington, Pitstone have had their respective neighbourhood areas

approved and the process of putting together a plan has begun, with Cheddington being further ahead having already held a public consultation. Slapton have made an application to designate an area for a plan.

Winslow has completed its plan and held a referendum as required. Wing, Marsh Gibbon Haddenham and Great Horwood are following closely behind.

Neighbourhood plans are intended to complement rather than contradict District Plans, so it is with interest we await the outcome of a judicial review brought by Gladman against the Winslow plan on the grounds it had no status without an overarching District Plan, as this will affect every neighbourhood plan currently being put together by hard working volunteers.

Why are we handing the WI Baton over at Ivinghoe? It is where the first WI was opened in Buckinghamshire, even before the Federation was started.




