

## **HARBY HISTORY GROUP – Louise Herrick 703662**

For our September meeting, member speaker Harold Paine gave a talk on "Agincourt-or those Damn French" illustrated with a slideshow. This was very informative. We learned of the political history behind it, the actual battle tactics and about those who fought. Harold told us all about the skills and accuracy of the archers who from what I could gather really won this battle for the English.

The October meeting was "Show and Tell". Members brought along varied items including old newspapers with articles on significant news events, a cartridge from a sniper's rifle, pottery and bottles, 100-year-old Ever Ready torches, army demob documents and birthday cards from the 1950s. Also brought in was a His Master's Voice wind up gramophone from the 1930s and the group were treated to a rendition of "Albert and the Lion" by Roy Barber from 1934 on it.

On 29 November the meeting will take place at All Saints Church, Harby from 7-9:30pm. A theatrical performance of "Eleanor Longshanks" will take place by an outside storytelling company. This is to coincide with the anniversary that week of Queen Eleanor's death. The first performance is the night before at Lincoln Cathedral and after visiting Harby they will take the show on the road to all the stops along the route to Westminster. Prices are £12.50 a ticket and can be bought on the door.

Then follows our Christmas break. The first meeting in 2018 is on 31 January when guest speaker Graeme Wade will return with a talk and slideshow on "The Crinan Canal- Is this Britain's Largest Island?" He will extend the talk to cover the history of the area around the Crinan Canal, one of the really ancient areas in Scotland. He'll cover the Standing Stones of Kilmartin which are about 5000 years old and the historical area of Dalriada. Graeme has previously done talks for us on the Canals from Torksey to the Wash and also on the Flying Scotsman. He really knows his stuff and takes wonderful photos for his slides. If it's your New Year's resolution to try something new, then Graeme's talk will be a great introduction to Harby History Group for you.

## **GO AGAIN**

On October 1<sup>st.</sup> a well attended Harvest thanksgiving service took place and was followed by the Harvest Luncheon, held in the village hall.

As in previous years, Sam Owen (The Salted Orange Food Company) provided the main course followed by the sweet courses, cheeses, grapes, etc .provide by the ladies. All in all; a thoroughly enjoyable event.

The ringers for this service were Jayne Rose, Sue Paine, Derek Phillips from Eagle, Sue Pendleton from North Scarle and Ian Hasman from Winthorpe. Upon walking up the footpath to All Saints, the sound of the bells ringing made my day.

More recently the grass cutting carried out throughout the Church-yard by George and Philip has been a pleasant surprise for this time of the year, looks great.

The Remembrance Service was well attended, Colin battled through the ceremony whilst suffering with a throat infection, the clock chimed 11-00a.m. on cue, as we assembled by the war memorial.

Apparently the bells throughout the country were rung for the initial attack by the Lincoln built Tanks on the German front line (between the villages of Combles and Courcelette, France)

Now a campaign appears to be gathering momentum to recruit bell ringers from all walks of life to take up learning to ring (campanology) to commemorate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the first world war. It is hoped that at least 1400 will be recruited to ring for this commemoration (the same number of bell ringers that lost their lives during the war)

By the time you have read this, it is hoped that another ½ peel will have been rung at All Saints. Sue Waterfall from Gainsborough has requested to bring a team on November 23<sup>rd</sup>. ringing to commence at approximately 7-30p.m.

I recently decided that ringing is now beyond my ability (health and safety)and I have subsequently asked Jayne if she will take over getting a team whenever possible, I therefore will make one more request for volunteers to come forward to have ago. I believe it would be fantastic to take part in the commemoration of the ending of WW1




## <u>LOCK UP YOUR GIRLS!</u>

On Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November Harby Playing Field Committee once again held its annual Bonfire and Firework night. This year brought with it a sense of the unknown as for the first time for many a year Patrick Ward and his band of able assistants were not going to purchase and set off the fireworks. In previous musings I have thanked him for his years of sterling service and fantastic displays but I would like once again to place on record our appreciation for everything he has done for us (and congratulations on his engagement) in previous years. Due to this change personnel we had to look elsewhere for fireworks and it was decided to employ a professional outfit (i.e. they charged us to do it) to organise the display.

Once again a lot of people offered their assistance. Burgers were purchased, fencing was erected and bonfires were built in preparation for the big night. There are too many people to thank individually (over 30 people were involved in the event) but I will offer particular thanks to six new members of the firework team. In the burger tent Joseph Hogg, Tom and Harry Haywood, Michael Wilkinson, Cerys Tucker and Alicia Hodson all helped serve and take money and they did themselves proud, working hard and listening to instructions to ensure that there were no long queues for the food.

It was difficult to estimate numbers but we took gate receipts for over 900 adults so there was probably over 1500 people there, just slightly down on last year. So cars parked, people fed and fire alight we looked forward to the fireworks and we were not disappointed. Due to the team we employed having a licence to buy extremely large and powerful fireworks that we were not allowed to purchase ourselves our worries were soon disappearing as we were treated to 15 minutes of a superb display. By 8.00 it was all over and we were left with an empty playing field and a lot of pots and pans to wash but it was all worth it for such great evening so thank you to all who helped and made it such a successful night.

## THE ALLOTMENTEERS - Carol Dallamore

**Rats!!** These industrious, social and organised rodents have decided that our allotment plots are fair game for fodder and having gained entrance to my poly-tunnel completely destroyed my bed of peppers! Richard and Carol's chickens have also been invaded, emerging in a line from under the coop. One large brazen rat sat calmly staring at Carol, so Richard shot it, bull's eye! Carol had the gloves on so she had to dispose of the body. Marion spotted Dora carrying a small one and others have been seen scurrying across the plots during the day.

After salvaging the few peppers left I then set about the problem in hand. The advice is 'management' as complete eradication is impossible. Interestingly they keep returning to the same bed although the plants have been cleared, their little paw prints showing in the soil and the trail marked from the hole they chewed in the polythene.

The Brown rat, Rattus norvegicus, has many names including sewer rat and common rat. With rare exceptions this rat lives alongside humans and thus are never far away. Selective breeding of the Brown rat produced laboratory rats and our pet rats.

An omnivore, the rat will eat generally everything with cereal as the greater part, however I can tell you they do not like aubergines!

Martin Schein, 1964, founder of the Animal Behaviour Society found some of the rats' favourite foods include scrambled eggs and macaroni cheese so we have something in common! Poison is the first response, but there is a risk to other wild life from eating the corpses. Richard is using cages, there are also snap-traps, electrocution traps and sonic deterrents. A natural poison available is based on maize, an overdose of this creates a thirst that cannot be assuaged, death a few days later of dehydration – not pleasant. They will also eat dried cow-pat and this apparently causes extreme vomiting and death. Natural harmless deterrents include onions, mint, owl feathers, used cat litter and snake poo. Placed in their path they turn away from the smell so this week will see me planting mint and scattering chopped onion as snake poo is in short supply at present!!

Being sexually mature at 5 weeks the breeding rate can, on average, produce 15,000 rats from a pair in one year. Around 95% will die from predators and interspecies conflict. Probably just as well! When food is short lower orders in the rat hierarchy die, however once supply is restored breeding rates recover numbers very quickly.

Mating behaviours are very interesting with females preferring unstressed males and males being quite er - vigorous.

Sadly rats carry some very nasty diseases including Coxiella burnetii, one that was to be developed as a biological agent by the USA.

I suggest reading about the Brown Rat on Wikipedia, it is very interesting with this being a mere overview.

I have learned a lot but I still want them away from my poly-tunnel!!

## **HARBY BALL**

So time has passed and memories of the pain and fatigue have faded and I have decided I may have one more endurance event in me to raise some money for some worthy charity. The last two years you have generously supported my charity ball and sponsored me to first take part in the London Marathon and then to run 69 miles from Carlisle to Newcastle, helping raise over £7500 for the charity Children With Cancer. After talking to a few people, I feel there is probably enough interest in going again and arranging another ball so sometime in the New Year details will be announced and tickets will go up for sale.
