Ramblings from the Rectory

There is so much around once again about the upcoming election I don't want to add too much. However, I will say this. In our most traditional service, the Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion, there is a prayer that we use for the monarch and her government.

'We beseech thee also to save and defend all Christian Kings, Princes and Governors; and specially thy servant Elizabeth our queen; that under her we may be godly and quietly governed; And grant unto her whole council, and to all that are put in authority under her, that they may truly and indifferently minister justice, to the punishment of wickedness and vice, and to the maintenance of thy true religion, and virtue.'

As we head back to the polls, seemingly for a one issue election, who is going to take us through Brexit? this prayer still stands. All those appointed to government are done so to order society with justice for all and proportionate law and order, based on christian values upon which our society is founded. This is an apolitical prayer, it applies to all who take the reigns of power. I prayer this prayer virtually every

Sunday morning and I always reflect as I do so, we lose these things and this focus at our peril. For those who would like to read more about the Church's response to this particular election, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have produced a pastoral letter, you can read it here.

But enough of that... I have been reflecting on my morning walks with the dog on the state of the daffodils. I was so frustrated for a few weeks that these walks could not happen because I broke some toes. As Cath describes it, I had a power slide into some radiator pipes. I am so glad that I can now exercise once again. I just caught the tail end of the amazing display of daffodils that Great Milton (where I walk every morning) produces every early spring, but as I write all has gone over and the result is looking very scruffy. This of course is as it should be. The temptation is to tidy up after flowering but this would be a mistake, the longer the plant has to die back the better things will be next year. The scruffiness now is worth it for the glory then. I usually get to about mid - June before I can't bear it any more and in our garden the whole lot gets mown, together with the cow parsley that grows in abundance at the Rectory and which I tackle every May by blessing and enjoying!

Life is like that, sometimes rather scruffy but with moments of glory. The Church I think should be like that as well. At the beginning of June we will once again be celebrating Pentecost, sometimes called the birthday of the Church, the moment when the Holy Spirit, the presence of God was experienced in a whole new way. Jesus often used metaphors from nature, he likened the activity of the Spirit to the wind, you can't tame it and it blows where it wills. The coming of the Spirit on the day of Pentecost was unpredictable, wild and un-tamed. This Holy Spirit is the essential ingredient for the Church. I do wonder sometimes if the institutional church is counter productive for this, which is where my daffodil illustration comes in (I'm sorry if I am mixing metaphors here with wind and daffodils!) The institution has a tendency towards the neat and tidy, all trimmed with nothing unkempt or scruffy, in truth I think many want life to be like that as well. But as with daffs, this is a great mistake, things might need to be a bit scruffy, untamed in order for there to be moments of glory. There are plenty of people who I believe are very open to the presence of God, to God's spirit working but perhaps for all sorts of reasons see the Church as somehow stifling this, perhaps just a little dull in it's neat and tidy predictability? As the accredited representative of the institution I have been or could be guilty of doing just this, trimming back too soon when things start looking a little scruffy. I said in my last letter that I want the Church to thrive and not just survive. I am convinced that this can only happen if the

Spirit is allowed to generate new ideas and vision in people, not all of which will look neat and tidy. The temptation is to mow the lot down but by doing so diminishing the glory! The Spirit of God can be suppressed when we get the lawn mower out too soon!

May and June of course bring with them three village gatherings. The Spring Fair in Great Haseley has now happened of course and we look forward to the Church fetes in Little Milton and Great Milton. With three to be involved in it is a bit of a marathon, but truly worthwhile and allot of fun. I am grateful to all the hard work that many people invest to make these events what they are. I am also grateful to the very generous contributions to these events. Thank-you.

Oh, and don't forget to vote on June 8, however your conviction leads you. The right and freedom to do so is a precious hard fought privilege.

Wheatley Singers Celebrate Spring with Flower Songs and St. Nicholas Mass

On 20th May, the Wheatley Singers delivered a joyful and confident performance of Haydn's St. Nicholas Mass and Britten's Five Flower Songs in front of an enthusiastic audience at St. Mary's Church, Wheatley.

Since Kate Billimore took on the leadership as Musical Director in 2015, the choir has grown both in membership and in musical maturity. Together with an experienced guest orchestra, the singers performed Haydn's tuneful and energetic mass; four talented soloists (Angela Scott-Smith, Shelley Cox, Ian Barratt and Giles Dawson) added further sparkle to the evening.

After the interval, Britten's five delightful flower-themed miniatures were interspersed with a daisy chain of songs and poems. Highlights included a beautiful rendition of Gabriel's Oboe by Ennio Morricone, performed by Nicola Hands, and some rather tongue-in-cheek songs inspired by the German folklore myth of the Lorelei, sung by Shelley Cox. Finally, the choir 'swept' the audience off their feet with Britten's final flower song, the amusing Ballad of Green Broom.

This concert raised £494 for the charity ROSY (Respite nursing for Oxfordshire's Sick Youngsters).

For their next concert, the Wheatley Singers will collaborate with the Great Milton Singers and Cumnor Choral Society for a joint performance of the Brahms German Requiem on 11thNovember 2017.

Dear Editor

In response to Carol Ayton's letter (May 2017 : Issue 520):

I have been developing the idea of providing a taxi-bus service to replace the local bus service for the benefit of the village. There are two ways this can be done legally, either you can register to run a local bus service or you can operate a Public Service Vehicle for hire. There are restrictions on both (information available on the .gov website).

If you attempt to run a local bus service you have to operate to the timetable or suffer penalties, you have to have back-up drivers and a lot of other restrictions that make it unattractive. If you run it under a PSV you can more-or-less set it up to operate as befits the local demand. The only restrictions would be that the drivers have to be PSV licenced and the vehicle is restricted to 8 passengers.

The ideal scenario for the village would be, if everyone that wanted to use the service subscribed with a one-off payment to enable the purchase of a vehicle, then an annual fee to cover insurance, maintenance and taxes. The service would then be "on-demand" although there is nothing to stop you suggesting you might be

doing regular runs on prescribed routes on a first-come-first serve basis. The cost to use it would then be calculated on the running costs for the journey. If two or three people from the village were to take the PSV license then it should be easy to maintain a regular service.

When we lived at our previous location I took the St John's "First Responder" course so that the local community knew they could come to our house if they had an emergency. If you combine this training with the provision of a defibrillator then you can imagine how useful this could be. So my ultimate vision would be if we established a PSV for the village in an 8 seater vehicle (1 being a tailgate lift for a wheelchair), with a driver that had "First Responder" training and the vehicle carried a medical care kit and defibrillator.

I would of course be the first volunteer except that I am at least 5 years off retirement so we would need to find alternative drivers if this becomes a reality sooner. That does not stop me or anyone else doing the St John's training and holding the equipment at home if that idea needs developing in isolation.

Could someone arrange a meeting to discuss the possibilities?

Village view

Before I go further, may I say why I'm using the pages of the Bulletin as a medium to make the following points, as I would be unable to attend PC meetings for more than 15 minutes due to being incapacitated some of the time.

There are two or three points worth a mention. Do any of you, when sitting in your garden for a bit of peace and quiet on a weekend, think you're at the TT races on the Isle of Man? As you know, summer months are worst – Friday night, Saturday and Sunday it's constant. It's been slightly less these last two weekends; May 6-7, 13-14. This all takes place on the A329. I gather about a year ago, there was an attempt to stop this pace-making etc. Speeds are way above 50mph. We must save them from themselves and before a serious accident occurs.

While on the subject of the A329, would it be possible to speak to the powers that be, like the Ministry of Defence via Benson, about the dilapidated fence round the Benson Beacon – perhaps it is not in current use? It needs attention or it will be buried in briars, and look very unsightly.

The last point is the unadopted lane opposite the Old Kings Head, running in

front of Northend Cottage on the triangle. This is used constantly by school traffic as a roundabout. The state of it with axle breaking pot holes is extremely dangerous for vehicles and walkers alike. There could be a small increase in traffic and pedestrians as I see permission has been given for the blue plaque to be placed shortly to mark the residence of the late Darcy Dalton (Oxfordshire Way fame). I wondered if it is all correct in the Bulletin. It mentions the Limes, which is now called Milton Lodge. He lived at Wyverns for many years. Surely it's not beyond the bounds of possibility to get heads together and sort out this short length of lane. I'm aware it's unadopted and not Highways responsibility.

That will do for the time being. See you around.

View from Views

"Manner from heaven", the rain of 11th-16th May some 7mm in total here, was a great relief, you could almost see the plants relaxing in front of your eyes, whether it has done enough remains to be seen but it will certainly help. Who would have thought it would continue to be dry to the middle of May, by which time some plants were looking as if they could do with a good drink, luckily most of our crops



looked exceptionally well except those on the very sandy soils, and the ones planted in the spring. When it did finally rain overnight 11/12th (3mm), the following morning the dawn chorus had risen a few decibels, a lot of relaxed birds enjoying the damp. Last month I wrote one swallow doesn't make a summer, this prompts me to write that there actually do not seem to be that many around this year, we normally have them nesting in our barn they don't seem to have arrived yet, and only spasmodically do we see them around. The Cuckoo is now becoming a scarcity nowadays only twice have we heard it, several days apart, and then only very briefly and in the distance, not one of my favourite birds but certainly their song is an iconic sound of the countryside in summer.

Whilst on the subject of birds, we often observe birds through our window, recently two incidents amused us, one was that a kite swooped down low and tried to pick up a large fat ball that we had put out on a feeding table only to drop it on the lawn immediately (too heavy I guess); a resident crow then tried to peck at it and jumped out of it's skin when it rolled away, this is a fat ball some 4" in diameter. The

other is that we have a pair if doves that visit who will chase all others away even Magpies.

Our thoughts currently in this area are dominated by planning, and particularly that of Chalgrove Airfield, and mainly the implications if, as they won't, the authorities do not get all the infrastructure ducks in the right order. What concerns me with all this is the fact that disregarding the Green Belt, (not something in principal I am in favour of) Grenoble road is so obviously the better option, is not being considered because it is in the Green Belt, although where it suits them North of the City, it is ok to develop in the Green Belt. But like any other organisation that has more power than the individual, who has to put up with the consequences, they will do just what they want like the Network Rail scandalously not sticking to planning conditions regarding silent rails in north Oxford on grounds of cost then the legal eagles saying it's a waste of time to contest the issue. So we will have prospects of the development, flooding Stadhampton, the roads we be more congested, with whoever is responsible for this infrastructure will be saying we cannot possibly afford this or that. Yet the CC will spend vast sums of money on road improvements which never seem to have the desired effect. Far better also to expand small villages by say 5% this would help make local services Buses and Post Offices for instance more viable. Of course this is all part human pressure that has to come first never mind the destruction of nature, not just in this country but world over.

In agriculture we are facing several conundrums; recently we read in the farming press with reference to immigration, (mainly seasonal workers) and food quality. Seasonal workers are employed, to harvest vegetable crops in particular, as local labour need full time employment. Also the labour laws are so heavily protected, causing the product to be prohibitively costly if producers had to employ labour on a 12 month basis. The only way of overcoming this conundrum is to employ mass-production tactics I have mentioned in previous columns, and thus reducing the quality of food. As far as I can understand this is what has happened in the US, where the majority of food is produced by huge scale farming, and corporate food companies, using commodity foodstuffs to produce cheap branded products of no discernible origin. We then have those starving in Africa saying it is all very well for those in developed counties with full bellies saying we must produce in ways that consider nature and wildlife, again all part of human pressure on the world!

We then have the controversy over the use of chemical aids that by banning one chemical where there does not appear to be any proven scientific reason for doing so, and our response is to use more of a different chemical that will need more than one application using more fuel, water, and time.

Add to all this are the pressure groups stating that this or that food should be avoided for this or that reason. One of the recent issues reported is that of the (I think) the "Clean Eating" campaign, where they are advocating cutting out dairy products. This has been countered by the "National Osteoporosis Society", saying that youngsters should cut out "Clean Eating" and similar fad diets, and up their intake of calcium and vitamin D, as those who reduce their intake of dairy products run a greater risk of Osteoporosis. For a dairy farmer to change his/her direction will take at least 2 years by which time the trend may well have changed to something else, that's someone has another "Bee in their bonnet".

A brief note of comment on 2 letters in the "Great Milton Bulletin" last month, I could not agree more with both, no one seems to care about anyone else, I had so little response to my letter about Buses that I did not feel it worth taking any further, and as for indiscriminate parking and the damage of road verges I am left speechless, we all need to make more fuss.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

The garden looks very different from last year at this time when it was a very cold late spring and a Malus flowered a full two weeks later than it had done for the last 20 years since we planted it; this year it has flowered a full two weeks early. We have had a very dry spring and all our water butts were empty when we left 10 days ago for a week of walking on the Costa Blanca in Spain. It is unusual for us to be away at this time of year when our garden and greenhouse are full of plants being prepared for the fete. Many thanks to Wendy for taking care of things for us.

We arrived back a week later to a tropical jungle as a result of vast amounts of rain; it has made such a difference to everything. Plants are growing well, being lush and green - so lovely to see. Flowering for a lot of plants is well ahead. The sweet rocket spread around is in full flower and looking magnificent in white and shades of mauve and roses, peonies and irises are opening and everywhere is so full of greenery that the weeds are going to struggle now which is always a relief! The fragrance of perennial stock wafts around when the sun shines. It is blissful. A couple of weeks ago there was a very heavy frost which has caused a lot of damage to the English vineyards and also caught the new growth on our Clematis montana 'Elizabeth'. She looks very sorry for herself and, as there is a lot of old, tangled growth on her, we are taking the opportunity to cut it all away and allow it to regrow from the base. This regrowth may take some time and we do not expect any flowers next year, but this is an opportunity mot to be missed and she looks a mess in her current state. It also allows us to cut away a winter flowering jasmine which has suckered horribly along the same wall and yet bears very little flower. It is simply not worth the space it occupies. The frost also caught Rhododendron fragrantissima and there has been no flower this year which is very sad, but just one of those things; I should have covered it with fleece.

Elsewhere, in the meadow, which was cracked and dry when we left, the growth has been phenomenal and there is a yellow carpet of buttercup and yellow rattle which is a huge pleasure to see. I have found one patch of cuckoo flower where we have not seen it before. This is not a plant we have sowed, but it appears sporadically in the wetter areas, but only in some years. The buttercups are normally more spread out in their flowering time and we have not had such a carpet before. Sadly, I still can't see any evidence of orchids, but I am ever hopeful that they will appear one year.

Heavy rain following drought stimulates plants to grow flower and set seed quickly.

There are some beautiful photos on the internet of the Californian desert where there are magnificent carpets of flowers for this reason. On the Costa Blanca, we walked through lovely hillsides of grasses and wild flowers where there were many orchids of different species. There were few people walking as it was hot, but the trails are well marked and easy to follow. I don't know if this is usual for the time of year, but the winter, as we all know, has been unkind to the Spanish farmers with cold and large amounts of rain so I wonder if this wonderful floral sight is later than usual?
